11. Ilam Road/Middleton Road/Riccarton Road Intersection - Safety Improvements

Officer Recommendations / Ngā Tūtohu

The Officer recommendations, as follows, were moved by Mike Mora and seconded by Jimmy Chen.

That the Council and the Waipuna/Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board:

1. Note for the purposes of the following resolutions:
 1. An intersection is defined by the position of kerbs on each intersecting roadway; and,
 2. The resolution is to take effect from the commencement of physical road works associated with the project as detailed in the agenda staff report; and,
 3. If the resolution states "Note 1 applies", any distance specified in the resolution relates to the kerb line location referenced as exists on the road immediately prior to the Community Board meeting of 4 February 2020; and,

4. If the resolution states "Note 2 applies", any distance specified in the resolution relates to the approved kerb line location on the road resulting from the resolution, as approved.

Part A

2. That the Waipuna/Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board endorse Option 1C for the Ilam Road/Middleton Road/Riccarton Road - Safety Improvements project and recommend to the Council that the project be approved, along with the following traffic control resolutions:
3. Approve all traffic controls, except for the speed limit, at the intersection of Riccarton Road with Middleton Road and Ilam Road, be revoked. Note 1 applies.
4. Approve that the intersection of Riccarton Road with Ilam Road be controlled by traffic signals, in accordance with section 6.2 of the Land Transport Traffic Control Devices Rule 2004, as detailed in Attachment A of the agenda staff report.
5. Approve that a special vehicle lane for the use of west bound buses and cycles only, be established on the south side of Riccarton Road, commencing at its intersection with Middleton Road, and extending in a westerly direction for a distance of 60 metres as detailed in Attachment A of the agenda staff report. This special vehicle lane is to apply at all times. This special vehicle lane is authorised under clause 18 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, and is therefore to be added to the Register of Roads or Traffic Lanes Restricted to Specific Classes of Vehicles.
6. Approve that a special vehicle lane for the use of westbound cycles only, be established on the south side of Riccarton Road, commencing at a point 90 metres east of its intersection with Middleton Road, and extending in an easterly direction for a distance of 65 metres as detailed in Attachment A of the agenda staff report. This special vehicle lane is to apply at all times. This special vehicle lane is authorised under clause 18 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, and is therefore to be added to the Register of Roads or Traffic Lanes Restricted to Specific Classes of Vehicles.
7. Approve that a special vehicle lane for the use of eastbound buses and cycles only, be established on the north side of Riccarton Road, commencing at a point 58 metres west of its intersection with Ilam Road, and extending in a westerly direction for a distance of 41 metres as detailed in Attachment A of the agenda staff report. This special vehicle lane is to apply at all times. This special vehicle lane is authorised under clause 18 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, and is therefore to be added to the Register of Roads or Traffic Lanes Restricted to Specific Classes of Vehicles.
8. Approve that a special vehicle lane for the use of eastbound buses and cycles only, be established on the north side of Riccarton Road, commencing at its intersection with Ilam Road, and extending in an easterly direction for a distance of 54 metres as detailed in Attachment A of the agenda staff report. This special vehicle lane is to apply at all times. This special vehicle lane is authorised under clause 18 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, and is therefore to be added to the Register of Roads or Traffic Lanes Restricted to Specific Classes of Vehicles.
9. Approve that a special vehicle lane for the use of southbound cycles only, be established on the east side of Ilam Road, commencing at its intersection with Riccarton Road, and extending in a northerly direction for a distance of 27.5 metres as detailed in Attachment A of the agenda staff report. This special vehicle lane is authorised under clause 18 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, and is therefore to be added to the Register of Roads or Traffic Lanes Restricted to Specific Classes of Vehicles.

10. Approve that a special vehicle lane for the use of northbound cycles only, be established on the west side of Ilam Road, commencing at its intersection with Riccarton Road, and extending in a northerly direction for a distance of 27.5 metres as detailed in Attachment A of the agenda staff report. This special vehicle lane is authorised under clause 18 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, and is therefore to be added to the Register of Roads or Traffic Lanes Restricted to Specific Classes of Vehicles.
11. Approve that the pathway on the east side of Middleton Road, commencing at its intersection with Riccarton Road and extending in a southerly direction for a distance of 52 metres, be resolved as a bi-directional shared pedestrian/bicycle pathway. This shared path is authorised under clause 18 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, and is therefore to be added to the Register of Roads or Traffic Lanes Restricted to Specific Classes of Vehicles.
12. Approve that the pathway on the west side of Middleton Road, commencing at a point 52 metres south of its intersection with Riccarton Road and extending in a southerly direction for a distance of 16.5 metres, be resolved as a bi-directional shared pedestrian/bicycle pathway. This shared path is authorised under clause 18 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, and is therefore to be added to the Register of Roads or Traffic Lanes Restricted to Specific Classes of Vehicles.

1. Purpose of Report / Te Pūtake Pūrongo

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is for the Waipuna/Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board to approve the proposed road names for the subdivision at 200 Cashmere Road in Hoon Hay.
- 1.2 This report is staff generated resulting from a naming request received from the subdivision developer.

2. Officer Recommendations / Ngā Tūtohu

That the Waipuna/Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board resolve to:

1. Approve the following new road names for the subdivision at 200 Cashmere Road (RMA/2018/1921):
 - a. Ed Cephas Drive
 - b. Pōkākā Place
 - c. Ellis Lane

3. Background / Te Horopaki

Introduction / Te Whakatkinga

- 3.1 Road naming requests have been submitted by Cashmere Park Limited for the subdivision of 200 Cashmere Road (RMA/2018/1921). A preferred name and alternative names, have been put forward by the developer for each road.
- 3.2 The recommended road names have been checked against existing road names in Christchurch and bordering districts, for duplication, alternative spelling, or other similarities in spelling or pronunciation to avoid the potential for confusion. The proposed names are considered sufficiently different to existing road names.
- 3.3 The recommended road names have been checked against the Council's Roads and Right-of-Way Naming Policy dated 2 November 1993 and are considered to be consistent with this policy except as outlined below.
- 3.4 The recommended road names have also been checked against the Australia and New Zealand Standard AS/NZS 4819:2011 Rural and Urban Addressing. The names are considered to be consistent with the Standard unless otherwise stated below.
- 3.5 Under the Roads and Right-of-Way Naming Policy, the names considered must be requested by the developer. There is not an ability to consider alternative names without first checking whether there are any duplications or similarities with other road and right-of-way names.
- 3.6 Consultation has been undertaken with Land Information New Zealand (LINZ) who have raised no concerns with the proposed road names.
- 3.7 The names requested have been accompanied by an explanation of the background to the names, which is summarised below, along with correspondence with the applicant.

Assessment of Significance and Engagement / Te Aromatawai Whakahirahira

- 3.8 The decision in this report is of low significance in relation to the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.
- 3.9 The level of significance was determined by the number of people affected and/or with an interest.
- 3.10 Due to the assessment of low significance, no further community engagement and consultation is required.

Proposed Names

- 3.11 The proposed names are shown in **Attachment A**.
- 3.12 Road A as shown on the plan, will be an extension of an existing road named Leistrella Road and does not need to be named.
- 3.13 The proposed options to name the roads are set out below and broadly fit into two themes, the historical land owners and Te Reo words that reflect the original agricultural nature of the land.
- 3.14 Road B - preferred name is Ed Cephas Drive
- 3.15 Edward Cephas John Stevens immigrated to Canterbury in 1858, and owned the land along with Henry Hill until 1913. He was a land agent, businessman, sportsman and politician. Stevens was a regular cricket player for Canterbury and initiated the acquisition of land that became Lancaster Park. At various times he was Chairman of the Board for the Christchurch Press, the Canterbury Agricultural College and the Horticultural Society. He also served as Secretary of the Canterbury Boating Club. As a politician, he was elected to several positions between 1863 and 1881, and also served on the Legislative Council from 1882 until his death in 1915.
- 3.16 LINZ have noted this name has similarities to Cephas Close (a private lane), however it is considered to be sufficiently different.
- 3.17 Road C - preferred name: Pōkākā Place
- 3.18 *Elaeocarpus hookerianus*, commonly known as Pōkākā, is a native canopy tree of New Zealand and is planted in the subdivision.
- 3.19 Road D - referred name: Ellis Lane
- 3.20 Robert Ellis, a farmer from North Linwood, owned the land from 1913 to 1975.

Alternative Names

- 3.21 Road B - Emily Knowles Drive
- 3.22 Emily Knowles was a school teacher and suffragist, she arrived in Lyttelton with her husband Henry Hill in 1873. Throughout her life, Emily held executive positions in various organisations promoting social welfare and the interests of women and children.
- 3.23 Tuawhenua Drive - a Te Reo Māori word meaning mainland or land.
- 3.24 Road C - Henry Hill Place
- 3.25 Henry Hill owned the land with Edward Stevens. Hill immigrated in 1873 on the *Merope* with his wife Emily Knowles. Hill was employed by the Canterbury Provincial Government to assist with the administrative aspects of establishing new schools. He went on to become the first recipient of the University of New Zealand's Bowen Prize in English Literature and an Inspector for the Hawkes Bay Education Board. Henry and his wife were known for their humanitarian

deeds and as foster parents to Hamiora Hei, who with their help, received a good education and returned to the East Coast as a qualified lawyer.

3.26 Deborah Place - Acknowledging the women who supported businessmen in their endeavours in Canterbury, Deborah is a biblical name chosen to reflect the current landowners chosen charitable trust, Project Esther. Project Esther offers a multifaceted range of activities and support to women and children.

3.27 Road D

3.28 Taiapa Lane - A Te Reo word meaning paddock, field or any fenced off area.

3.29 Pākihi Lane - A Te Reo word meaning grassland or meadow.

This report provides information on initiatives and current issues within the Community Board area, and to provide the Board with a strategic overview and inform sound decision making.

3. Community Board Activities and Forward Planning

3.1 Memos/Information/Advice to the Board

3.1.1 Fireworks in Public Places

The Christchurch City Council has joined with other councils, including Auckland Council, to request central government to change the law, to ban the sale of fireworks to the general public and to end their private use.

A change to the national legislation is seen by most councils including the Council as the only effective way to address the dangers and other problems associated with the ad-hoc private use of fireworks.

Members will recall that this matter was raised recently with the Board (Public Forum) by Dr Chrys Horn.

3.1.2 Denton Park – Suffragette Memorial - Signage

Further to the request previously made to the Board by the Greater Hornby Residents' Association, staff have advised that signage will not be provided for the memorial plaque installed for a Camellia planted in Denton Park in 1993 to commemorate Women's Suffrage.

The Denton Park site is not deemed significant enough for signage to be installed. This is in keeping with other plaques for women's suffrage located around the city which also

do not have additional signage. Investigations however are underway for this site to be added as a link on the Council's women's suffrage website.

3.1.3 Te Hāpua Summer Pool - Extended Hours - Update

A staff memorandum (refer **Attachment A**) is provided as an update on the Te Hāpua Summer Pool trial of extending the operating hours for the 2019-20 season.

Extended hours started on 16 November 2019 with participation numbers being recorded. The participation data in the memorandum is from 16 November 2019 until 31 January 2020.

3.1.4 Riccarton Road Upgrade – Early Completion of Construction Works

A staff memorandum (refer **Attachment B**) is provided to inform the Board of the early completion of the Riccarton Road Upgrade Project.

It was originally anticipated that work to upgrade Riccarton Road between Harakeke and Matipo Streets would take until the end of 2020.

In September 2019, the contractor (Fulton Hogan) advised that the works would be completed by August 2020. This timeframe however has been brought forward by a further four months. The most disruptive elements of the road works, the underground pipes and road reconstruction, will be complete by Easter 2020. Line markings and landscaping including tree planting, is still to be completed.

3.1.5 Waimairi Road Community Centre

Members will recall the presentation made to the Board on 4 February 2020 from Jadon Dance regarding hire fees for using the facility.

The Council's Facilities Management staff have considered the matters raised and advise as follows:

A review was undertaken around confirming the maximum occupancies for a number of Council-managed community facilities.

As a result of this review, the capacity for the large hall and the small hall at the Waimairi Road Community Centre are both now classified as Category C.

Therefore, the fees and charges for Jadon Dance will reflect these changes from the start of the 2020 calendar year.

This outcome will be communicated back to Jadon Dance.

3.2 Draft Annual Plan 2020-21

3.2.1 The Council's Draft Annual Plan 2020-21 opened for submissions on 24 February 2020 and closes on 2 April 2020 (refer <https://www.ccc.govt.nz/the-council/consultations-and-submissions/haveyoursay/show/299>)

3.2.2 The Council will adopt its Annual Plan for 2020-21 in late June 2020.

3.2.3 The Board via Submissions Committee, will be making its own submission on the Draft Annual Plan.

3.3 Board Reporting

3.3.1 The Board is asked to consider any matters they would like to suggest as articles for the Council's Newline.

- 3.3.2 The Board is also asked to consider any matters they would like the Board Chairperson to raise at the Council.

- 6.2.1 An awards ceremony is to be jointly hosted by the Canterbury Horticultural Society and the Community Board on 6 April 2020 at Rārākau: Riccarton Centre, to present certificates.

6.3 Community Pride Garden Awards 2020

- 6.3.1 Judging for this year's Community Pride Garden Awards took place from 18 January to 9 February 2020. The Christchurch Beautifying Association selected award winning gardens taking into account, effort, overall tidiness and impact of gardens on the street.
- 6.3.2 Certificates will be presented at an award function on Monday 23 March 2020 at Riccarton Park.

6.4 Culture Galore 2020

- 6.4.1 Despite the unsettled forecast, an estimated 6,000 people turned out for this year's Culture Galore event at Ray Blank Park on Saturday 22 February 2020.
- 6.4.2 Attendees were entertained by the vibrant cultural performances and enjoyed appetising ethnic cuisine, which celebrating the diversity of our community.
- 6.4.3 This year we proudly introduced the Compostable Food Packaging at Events initiative that aims to reduce event waste going into landfill. Positive feedback has been received on this initiative and will continue to build on this for future events.

- 6.4.4 A big thank you to the Waimāero/Fendalton-Waimairi-Harewood and Waipuna/Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board's for their ongoing joint support of the Culture Galore annual event.



6.5 Hello Hornby 2020

Hello Hornby, Our Community Party in the Park, was successfully held at Wycola Park on Saturday 7 March 2020 from 12pm to 3pm.

With over 3,000 attending, the event brought people together from all over Hornby to connect and showcase their local area.

Among the festivities, over 38 local businesses and organisations ran activities from their stalls and there were performers from the Hornby Primary School and An-Nur Pre School. A talent quest was held with seven performers and a variety of competitions were held and prizes issued throughout the day.

Families were able to get a ride on a double decker bus, as well as get picked up from stops in South Hornby and brought to the event.

The event is put together by an organising committee of local businesses and organisations, Council staff, MSD and individuals.

6.6 **Connect 2020**

The aim of the Connect event which was successfully held at Harrington Park, Riccarton, on Sunday 8 March 2020, is to build relationships between various members of the local Riccarton community. Started in 2015 with the objective of connecting incoming university students with local longer term residents, it has now evolved to not just focus on students but also to bring together all sectors in the area and involve them in community life.

The Oak Development Trust provided oversight for the range of local community members (including University of Canterbury students, social housing tenants, multicultural communities) who came together to deliver an event which allowed Riccarton people to bond with each other.





7. Community Board Funding Update

7.1 For information, a summary is provided on the status of the Board's 2019-20 funding as at February 2020 (refer **Attachment C**).

7.2 Youth Development Fund

In accordance with the Board's delegated authority, the following allocations were made during February 2020:

- \$500 to Harrison Bisphan towards competing in with the New Zealand U17 Indoor Cricket Team at the Tri-Series Tournament in Singapore.
- \$500 to Molly Mooar towards competing in the 2020 Under 19 European Korfball Championships in Leeuwarden, The Netherlands.
- \$500 to Michelle Tapp towards competing in the 2020 Under 19 European Korfball Championships in Leeuwarden, The Netherlands.
- \$500 to Mitchell O'Hara towards competing in the 2020 World Irish Dance Championships in Dublin, Ireland.

7.3 The Youth Development Fund at the time of writing has a balance of \$1,875. Staff are therefore recommending a transfer of \$4,000 from the Board's 2019-20 Discretionary Response Fund to its Youth Development Fund for the remainder of the financial year through until June 2020. There is a current balance of \$60,885 in the Discretionary Response Fund.

Finishing line in sight for Riccarton Road works

An \$18.4 million project to upgrade a busy stretch of Riccarton Road is going to finish eight months earlier than expected.

It was originally anticipated that work to upgrade Riccarton Road between Harakeke and Matipo streets would take until the end of 2020.

However, in September last year contractors Fulton Hogan advised Christchurch City Council they would have the work done by August 2020.

That finish date has now been brought forward by a further four months.

"The contractors inform us that by Easter they will have completed the bulk of the work, which is fantastic news," says Cr Mike Davidson, Chair of the Urban Development and Transport Committee.

"We are thrilled they have managed to get this important infrastructure project completed eight months ahead of schedule. Road users, local residents and businesses have been very patient throughout the works, and I'm sure they will be glad to see the road works come to an end."

The work along Riccarton Road has involved replacing ageing sewer and water supply pipes, some of which were over 100-years-old and buried about four metres below ground.

The pipe work has now been completed and the road has been reconstructed to accommodate bus priority measures along this busy public transport route.

The Council has also taken the opportunity to create a nicer environment for pedestrians by making streetscape improvements including additional seating and landscaping.

"Line marking and landscaping including tree planting, will still need to be completed, but the most disruptive elements of the project – the replacement of the old underground pipes and the reconstruction of the road – will be done," says Council Transport Planning and Delivery Manager Lynette Ellis

"Fulton Hogan has worked hard to find ways to get this project completed as fast as possible because they are conscious that Riccarton Road is one of Christchurch's busiest thoroughfares and carries a huge volume of traffic every day."
