


HPL Land North of SH1






RESPONSIBILITY OF COUNCILS UNDER SECTION 23 OF THE HEALTH ACT

Subject to the provisions of this Act, it shall be **the duty of every local authority** to improve, promote, and protect public health within its district, and for that purpose every local authority is hereby empowered and directed—

- (a) to appoint all such environmental health officers and other officers and servants as in its opinion are necessary for the proper discharge of its duties under this Act:
- **(b)** to cause inspection of its district to be regularly made for the purpose of ascertaining if any nuisances, or any conditions likely to be injurious to health or offensive, exist in the district:
- (c) if satisfied that any nuisance, or any condition likely to be injurious to health or offensive, exists in the district, to cause all proper steps to be taken to secure the abatement of the nuisance or the removal of the condition:
 - (d) subject to the direction of the Director-General, to enforce within its district the provisions of all regulations under this Act for the time being in force in that district:
- (e) to make bylaws under and for the purposes of this Act or any other Act authorising the making of bylaws for the protection of public health:

All LUC1-3 land in The Christchurch City Boundary should be excluded from quarrying operations.

While Commissioners are approving individual quarry operations as being of less than minor effect, the true fact is that they are far more damaging than less than minor when combined.

These facts have been tested in the Environment Court and upheld.

The G.H.R.A. are currently undertaking dust monitoring, and this will remain ongoing into the foreseeable future.

At this time they are in negotiations with suppliers in Australia; USA and China. These monitors must be robust enough to stand up in court proceedings, while remaining mobile, so they can be located to various sites.

It is somewhat bewildering to see all three authorities, The C.C.C., Ecan and the C.D.H.B. burying their heads in the Crystalline Silica sand, and leaving their more prominent part in the air, over PM10/PM2.5 dust.

If the same attitude was taken with log fires we would still have a serious smog issue. The difference here is, that Crystalline Silica dust, comes not only from crushed aggregate, but also from the sand the aggregate lies in. Crystalline Silica is also harder to see, so often ignored. Crystalline Silica dust has also been recorded as travelling 8 – 10km. Crystalline Silica also does not cause Asthma but Silicosis and other respiratory illnesses, so in fact is far worse and more dangerous than soot.



The quarry industry has long been suspected by many for it's perceived lack of accountability, or else they would have stepped up with the true facts, instead of the lines they tend to distribute to justify themselves.

If what they say is true there would be no setbacks in Australia, India or anywhere else in the world. New Zealand is way behind the times on this matter, and a revue of the RMA Act is well overdue.

Queensland requires a 2km setback, if over 1000 people live in a village, while India, which is heavily populated, requires 1km. Does this mean we live in a forth world situation?

It is our opinion, these quarry operators have very deep pockets and very short arms when it comes to resident's health and safety, but the opposite when trying to buy within the city boundary.

We have quarries with Earthquake salvage still in them, often buried, when it was meant to be sorted and relocated to safe disposal areas.

In Short, the public of the western area of this city has been manipulated for long enough. We have constant complaints about the level of dust in our area.

This dust issue has really come to the fore since the earthquakes and the Roberts Rd. quarry opening.

When asked if complaints have been lodged with Council, the reply is you are just wasting your breath. No one really listen to complaints about quarry's, or past quarries, such as those behind Boston Ave. Perhaps this dialogue may need further airing on Fair Go in the future.

The Greater Hornby Residents Association believes no further quarry operations should be approved between Islington; Hei Hei; Templeton and Yaldhurst.

In the meantime the Greater Hornby Resident's Association request a moratorium on all quarry consents, and approvals, from today forward, under the current District Plan, so public health can be considered, along with residents concerns, regarding the ongoing quarrying, that has been taking

place against their wishes. This should be a full and open, as well as transparent investigation moving forward. Any opposition from within the quarrying faction should be seen as merely trying to protect their patch so to speak, while still ignoring residents concerns and health. Under Standing orders, I believe this request is not out of order, seeing there is an aggregate supply, equivalent to some 23 years without a decision on the Roydon Quarry application which is currently before The Environment Court.








Children's Day 2021







- Red Zone 6 bike race is due to take place on Monday, 26 April 2021.Make sure you check it out!








Stitch-O-Mat



Metro Sports Facility

Background to name gifted by Ngāi Tūāhuriri





The Metro Sports Facility promotes sporting excellence and physical wellness.

Physical strength and agility for Māori are directly linked to the core narrative thread of wellbeing.

Traditional Māori existence demanded high physical ability of men and woman alike to survive the transient subsistence way of life within this southern landscape and to survive as warriors.





Physical and mental excellence is celebrated through the many traditional

narratives that tell of the relationship between Māori and the environment

and interdependency of both for continued health and wellbeing.





One such narrative from Ngāi Tūāhuriri tells a story of resilience, determination and agility. It is summarised in its simplest form in the following slides.







Tūrākautahi was the founding chief of Kaiapoi Pā for Ngāi Tūāhuriri and Ngāi Tahu in the North Canterbury area in the 1700s.







One of his sons was named Parakiore

And he was known for his prowess, agility and quick thinking.

He was embroiled in a battle on the Moeraki beach. The invaders were close by. Parakiore and his wife were chased along the Moeraki beach where their pursuers caught up with them. They taunted him about his supposed fleetness of foot and how easy he had been to catch.





Parakiore was not concerned and replied with a cryptic remark;

"Kia whati te tai, kia pao te torea, kia ina te harakeke a Hine-Kakai."

"When the tide recedes the torea (oyster catcher) strikes. The flax of Hine-Kakai burns." The above pepeha was recited by Parakiore. It was a boast that they were never going to catch him, because he was too fast for them.







The proverb from Parakiore tells us that his speed was the same as a spark igniting dried flax. Māori would use dried flax as a fire starter and like the torea, the oystercatcher, if Parakiore had moved too soon he would have been slowed down by the surf and tide washing on to the sand.

He then promptly lifted his wife onto his back and piggy-backed her down the beach, so quickly that he still outran his pursuers.







This is a Ngāi Tūāhuriri, Ngāi Tahu Story of endurance, agility and speed. Parakiore is a legend, a hero from the 18th century and his proverb has been handed down from generation to generation. The story of Parakiore also tells the significance of understanding the environment we live in and our interdependence on the flora and fauna by becoming more eco-literate, about learning to read our environment visually and the physical landmarks and iconic features within our environment.

Ngāi Tūāhuriri gifts this name for the Metro Sports Facility,

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
