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#### 1. Brief Summary

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is for the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board Submissions Committee to consider and, if appropriate, prepare a Board submission to the Christchurch City Council on its proposed Replacement Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021.
- 1.2 The current Freedom Camping Our bylaw was made under the Freedom Camping Act 2011. It was amended in 2016 and 2018. As the bylaw has been in place for five years it now needs to be reviewed (neither of the 2016 or 2018 amendments were considered a review).
- 1.3 The Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021 aims to balance freedom camping opportunities with necessary limitations to ensure areas are protected. Some changes to improve the bylaw are proposed and are being consulted on.

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### 1. Brief Summary

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is for the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board Submissions Committee to consider and, if appropriate, prepare a Board submission to the Christchurch City Council on its proposed Plan Change 7: Managing significant indigenous vegetation.
- 1.2 Plan Change 7 seeks to better protect and maintain indigenous vegetation while still providing for its clearance, where it is small scale and low impact, to provide for the continuation of farming activities. It will also amend the policies and rules around the type and size of native trees and plants (indigenous vegetation) that can be cleared generally across the district, and within areas of existing pasture (otherwise known as improved pasture) on coastal farmland.
