### 9.1 10 Shirley Road

The Board raised the cost of the landscape plan they had originally requested and asked whether staff could look at the feasibility of the community's suggestions for the site. It was noted that the estimate for landscape plan was \$15k and staff were looking at cheaper options to still allow the Board do landscaping at the site. The Board was keen to examine

partnership options with local business to help reduce the cost to the Board. It was also raised that now the LTP has been approved the Board asked the next step. It was noted that there is money on budget for the feasibility study next year. Staff advised they were going to do a temperature check and start looking at past reports and engagement done in regards to the site in advance of the feasibility study and start consulting with relevant units regarding future collaborative use of the site and developing a community hub strategy.

The Board suggested that reviewing the community engagement results and the notes from the meeting held with the local community at the Shirley Intermediate School would provide valuable insights about the community's needs and wants for 10 Shirley Road and asked that staff consider these when compiling the feasibility study.

It was raised that the Board would like to have a plan moving forward. This includes investigating the feasibility of relocating the Palms Shirley Library and Service Centre to be incorporated as part of a future Community Centre at 10 Shirley Road. Staff advised this is one of the reasoning's for the temperature check and to ensure that options are feasible and/or challenge options internally before going out to the public with options.

#### 9.2 Parks Update - St Albans Park Rubbish Bins

The Board requested that the Parks Team consider an additional smart rubbish bin for St Albans Park as the rubbish problem at the park has not abated and noted they are still receiving emails from residents about the issue.

The Board wish to receive a response back to the Board by its next meeting of 3 September 2021 and that this also be reported back in the September area report.

#### 9.3 Start Work Notices

The Board raised the issue of insufficient information in the Start Work Notices to residents, in particular relating to Dover/Ranfurly/Cornwall/Lindsay and Trafalgar Street works specifically the length of time that the works would take and the amount of information shown on the website. The detail is seen as too limited and generic and the Board requested more detailed information be given to residents and the public.

The Board requested that staff:

- 1. Review and increase the amount of information to be provided in the Start Work Notices and include timelines of works to be undertaken.
- 2. Provide copies of all communications to the Board when residents are notified of any work to be undertaken including any letters from letter drops.
- 3. Provide more detailed information on the relevant Council website page.

This project started in 2012 when the Shirley/Papanui Community Board identified the growing trend within local communities in creating their own edible gardens within their backyards, schools and community spaces.

This award is dedicated to residents within the ward that grow their own edible gardens. Judging for this award is done by the Canterbury Horticultural Society.

The 2019-20 Edible Garden Awards were held on Monday 25 March 2019 at the Papanui Village Centre with Ray White and Mitre 10 sponsoring two award categories.

The awards event attracted 91 attendees, of which 66 were nominees, and friends and families of the nominees. The remainder were Elected members (Board and Councillors), Judges and presenters, Members of the Canterbury Horticultural Society, sponsors representatives from Ray White and Mitre 10, Housing New Zealand staff and Council staff. Student photographers from Papanui High School also attended.

The 2020-21 Edible Gardens event was scheduled to take place in April 2020, this event was cancelled due to Covid-19 restrictions.

- 3.7 Staff note that an application to the Discretionary Response Fund (from St Albans School for school traffic wardens) will be before the Board on 20 August 2021. Should the Board accept the staff recommendation for this application, the balance of the Discretionary Response Fund would be reduced by \$2,500, from \$37,530 to \$35,030.
- 3.8 Additionally, it is noted that the Board will allocate funds from their 2021-22 Discretionary Response Fund for Community Board projects at their meeting of 3 September 2021. Staff are recommending a total of \$18,000 be allocated to Board projects. Should the Board accept the staff recommendation for Community Board projects, the balance of the Discretionary Response Fund would be reduced by \$18,000, from \$35,030 to \$17,030.
- 3.9 Based on the current Discretionary Response Fund criteria, the applications listed above are eligible for funding.

#### Staff Assessment

FC Twenty 11 have 14 senior teams, 17 junior, eight youth and five teams (5-8 year-olds) in their Fun Football and First Kicks programmes. They cater for all players ranging from elite footballers to beginners. They also deliver football programmes in schools and provide community-based programmes such as holiday programmes, futsal programmes, and futsal/football skill sessions.

FC Twenty 11 is seeking funding to replace the broken football goals at Avonhead Park and Ray Blank Park. Unfortunately the club has had two separate senior goals broken during this current season. The consequence is that the club has been unable to use two of the senior pitches. With the growth in the number of senior teams they have had at the club, the two fields now out of use at Avonhead Park and Ray Blank Park makes it very challenging to allocate games to their home teams.

As a club, FC Twenty 11 decided not to lock up their goals when not in use, so they are available for the community to use. Ultimately a consequence of the club having their goals available for anyone to use is the increased wear and tear and risk of being damaged. With the club hosting a tournament in October, they need to ensure the required number of goals available. The club will allocate their volunteers time to assemble the goals, keeping costs to a minimum.
