2. Declarations of Interest Ngā Whakapuaki Aronga

Part B

There were no declarations of interest recorded.

3. Confirmation of Previous Minutes Te Whakaāe o te hui o mua

Part C

Board Comment

It was clarified that the reference to possible changes to the District Plan in Item 8.1 – Elected Members Information Exchange – Vape Shops was the density of vape shops rather than the distance between shops.

Lee Sampson moved that the minutes be confirmed subject to amendment to Item 8.1 – Elected Members Information Exchange – Vape Shops by deleting the words “distance between” and substituting the words “density of”. The motion was seconded by Callum Ward. Following invitation from the Chairperson there was no debate on the item, and the motion was put to the vote and was declared carried.

Community Board Resolved SCCB/2022/00021

That the minutes of the Waihoru Spreydon-Cashmere Community Board meeting held on Tuesday, 3 May 2022 be confirmed subject to the deletion of the words “distance between” and substitution of the words “density of” in Item 8.1 – Elected Members Information Exchange – Vape Shops as follows:

Board members noted further frustration from residents regarding the opening of vape shops in Addington and queried whether changes to the District Plan that could restrict the ~~distance between~~ density of shops could be a response.

4. Public Forum Te Huinga Whānui

Part B

4.1 Spreydon Domain carpark

Kelly Perazzolo spoke on behalf of the Spreydon Tennis Club regarding the condition of the parking area by the tennis courts at the north end of Spreydon Domain.

Mr Perazzolo stated that the carpark is overdue for maintenance. Particular issues he referred to were the visibility and lack of marking of the mobility parks as well as drainage and lighting in the carpark.

Mr Perazzolo said that, in his view, the current condition of the carpark has an unkempt look that is likely to attract vandalism and other anti-social behaviour.

Mr Perazzolo requested that an upgrade to the carpark be considered by the Council. Mr Perazzolo estimated that combined membership of the Spreydon Tennis Club, the Kereru Sports and Cultural Club and the future lessee of Coronation Hall will number over 900 people as potential users of the carpark.

Mr Perazzolo tabled a document including photographs of the current carpark. (Attachment A)

A Board member queried whether carpark maintenance would be included in the scope of repairs for Coronation Hall.

A Board member suggested asking staff advice on when the carpark last had any maintenance work and when it would be due for maintenance in the future.

A Board member suggested staff investigate options to improve the conditions of the carpark, including marking the mobility parking spaces and improving drainage.

A Board member suggested asking staff to note the Club's aspiration for better lighting in the carpark.

Following questions the Chairperson thank Mr Perazzolo for his presentation.

That the Waihoru Spreydon-Cashmere Community Board agreed to request that staff investigate and provide advice on the following:

1. Whether there is scope within the Coronation Hall rebuild for maintenance work on the Spreydon Domain carpark to be undertaken.

3. Options to upgrade the Spreydon Domain carpark.

7. Waihoru Spreydon-Cashmere Community Board Correspondence - Potential Re-Naming of Marylands Reserve, Marylands Place, Nazareth Avenue and Magdala Place

Board Comment

In its deliberations, the Board also considered Item 11, the Waihoru Spreydon-Cashmere Community Board Area Report – May 2022. (refer to Item 11 - 4.3)

A Board member noted that Mr Benton had been invited to speak to the Board, but had elected not to at this stage.

Members agreed that staff advice should be sought on how the interim recommendations of the Royal Commission of Inquiry into Historical Abuse in Care can be implemented in relation to park and street names, noting the need for active and respectful engagement and communications with relevant parties including victims, supporters, residents of the streets concerned as well as other stakeholders, to support any process. The staff advice should be provided to both the Waihoru Spreydon Cashmere and Waipuna Halswell Hornby Riccarton Community Boards.

9. 79 Hoon Hay Road - Proposed No Stopping Restrictions

Board Comment

The traffic Engineer was in attendance and spoke to the report. It was clarified that the purpose of the report is to seek approval for no stopping lines on Hoon Hay Road outside Pennylane Early Childhood Centre to improve safety and visibility. The proposal is in response to a request from parents of children attending the centre. In response to an observation by a member about the safety of Hoon Hay Road staff advised that work is being undertaken on a programme of lower speed limits around schools. Further information on this will be provided to the Board in the future.

Community Board Resolved SCCB/2022/00023 (Original Officer Recommendation accepted without change)

Part C

That the Waihoru Spreydon-Cashmere Community Board:

1. Approves, pursuant to Clause 7 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, that the stopping of vehicles be prohibited at all times on the north east side of Hoon Hay Road, commencing at a point 9.5 metres south east of its intersection with Bencard Place and extending in a north west direction for a distance of 9 metres.
2. Revokes any previous resolutions pertaining to traffic controls made pursuant to any bylaw to the extent that they are in conflict with the traffic controls described in resolution 1 above.
3. Approves that these resolutions take effect when parking signage and/or road markings that evidence the restrictions described in the staff report are in place (or removed in the case of revocations).

10. Waihoru Spreydon-Cashmere Community Board Discretionary Response Fund 2021/22: Huntsbury Community Centre, Graeme Dingle Foundation Canterbury, Cashmere Bowling Club.

Board Comment

Community Development staff were in attendance and shared key points from the report and answered questions.

In response to questions regarding the application from Huntsbury Community Centre, staff noted that the amount recommended would allow the organisation to proceed with the project.

A Board member suggested that the Board may need to be mindful of the level of funding that will be available to the Board going into new representation arrangements.

The Board discussed the amounts of the recommended grants for the various projects and whether these are appropriate.

Regarding the application from the Graeme Dingle Foundation, a Board member questioned the distinction between curriculum time and non-curriculum time, particularly with regards to funding. Board members agreed that it would be helpful for the Board to receive further clarification on this issue.

Tim Scandrett moved the officer's recommendation. The motion was seconded by Lee Sampson. Following discussion about the recommended grant amounts proposals to amend the motion to increase the grant to the Graeme Dingle Foundation Canterbury from the recommended \$1,500 to \$3,000 and to increase the grant to the Cashmere Bowling Club from the recommended \$1,500 to \$2,000 and to seek staff advice on the distinction between curriculum and non-curriculum time were agreed by the majority of members and with the agreement of the mover and seconder the substituted motion was put to the vote and was declared carried.

11. Waihoru Spreydon-Cashmere Community Board Area Report - May 2022

Board Comment

1. The Board heard from staff, who shared key points from the report.
2. A Board member noted that the Port Hills Trust is seeking further advice regarding installation of Closed Circuit Television cameras for Mt Vernon Farm Park.
3. A Board member noted that an aspiration to receive feedback on the Cashmere Road / Barrington Street roundabout before the end of the current Board term.

12. Elected Members' Information Exchange Te Whakawhiti Whakaaro o Te Kāhui Amorangi

Part B

Board members exchanged information on the following:

- A member was approached by a cyclist who was knocked off his bike by a bus and considered that they had received an inadequate response from the transport operator. The member will refer the resident to Environment Canterbury.
- A member attended a meeting of the Te Tira Kāhikuhiku Red Zone reuse group. It was noted that the red zone land on the Port Hills will be within the catchment area of the new Community Board under the new representation arrangements.
- A member noted that in regards to the Centaurus Road roadworks where two children were nearly hit by a vehicle, the Council and the contractor had quickly addressed the issue that led to the incident. The member noted that there are significant issues with motorists speeding through the roadwork area.
- A member attended the Rowley Hoon Hay network meeting. A new Kāinga Ora community engagement staff member spoke to the meeting.

- A member met with a resident on Wychbury Street who is concerned with the multi-story developments that are being built in the area. The resident also expressed concern about the proliferation of rubbish and recycling bins from multi-unit developments on the footpath on collection days.
- A member was contacted by a resident adjoining Gainsborough Reserve who had questions about the length of grass in the reserve. The resident was mowing a rectangle around the soccer posts. One of the Council's park rangers is now working with the resident.
- A member reported that the final leg of Quarryman's Trail cycleway has been approved by Council.
- A member noted that Waka Kotahi is making speed limit changes on State Highway 75 to Akaroa.
- A member noted the success of the "Mother of All Cleanups" event that took place around the Opawaho Heathcote River on Saturday 7 May 2022.
- A member advised that the Cashmere Catchment Working Group is about to meet again after a brief hiatus.

3. Deputations by Appointment Ngā Huinga Whakaritenga

Part B

3.1 Ester Vallero - Tennyson Street Pedestrian Improvement Options

Ester Vallero, resident, spoke to her submission on the proposed pedestrian improvements on Tennyson Street and the staff report on this matter (refer Item 4 – Tennyson Street Pedestrian Improvements Options). Ms Vallero thanked everyone who provided feedback on the proposal, including school pupils, parents, residents and local schools.

In response to a query, Ms Vallero advised that she would have preferred if the proposal included a zebra crossing. But the proposal in the staff report is an improvement to the current pedestrian safety treatment on Tennyson Street near its intersection with Norwood Street and the original proposal that was consulted on.

The Chairperson thanked Ms Vallero for her deputation.

4. Tennyson Street Pedestrian Improvement Options

Boards Comment

In its deliberations, the Boards considered the deputation from Ester Vallero, resident (refer Item 3.1 – Ester Vallero - Tennyson Street Pedestrian Improvements Options).

The Boards heard from the Area Traffic Engineers and Engagement Advisor who shared the key points from the report. Staff noted that Option Two, which is the staff preferred option,

incorporates changes into the proposal to take account of comments and concerns from submitters (refer to the report in the agenda for this meeting for details).

In response to queries, staff noted that a raised zebra crossing across Tennyson Street near its intersection with Norwood Street is not included in the preferred Option Two as it is considered that the street environment does not meet the threshold to warrant one. Staff made the additional comments below:

- Zebra crossings are typically proposed for high use pedestrian areas, which does not apply to part of Tennyson Street.
- The zebra crossing would be near the Tennyson / Norwood Streets intersection, which would increase the risk to pedestrians.
- A pedestrian island as proposed in Option Two is consistent with other crossing points in the area.
- If Waka Kotahi considered a zebra crossing to be unsafe, it could withhold its funding contribution to the project.
- Zebra crossings can have higher crash rates as pedestrians can assume it is safe to cross when it is not. For example, children can misjudge vehicle speeds and the likelihood of vehicles being able to stop for them.
- A zebra crossing would require further design and consultation, which could delay implementation until early-2023 due to the election period.

Option Two in the staff report includes two raised platforms on either side of the pedestrian island near the Tennyson / Norwood Streets intersection to slow traffic as it approaches the crossing point. In response to queries, staff made the comments below:

- Some people may choose to cross at the raised platforms, but they are not intended to be crossing points. In the detailed design stage, staff can consider how to design the streetscape so that the raised platforms are not perceived as crossing points.
- Option Two proposed raised platforms rather than speed humps or judder bars as the former are better suited for large vehicles, including buses. In addition, judder bars are only appropriate for vehicles travelling at very slow speeds.

In response to a query, staff noted that Tennyson Street will get busier over time due to general population growth, but there are no major new subdivisions planned in the area.

In response to queries, staff noted that Option Two in the staff report would not preclude future improvements to the cycleway on Tennyson Street. But it is outside the scope of this project to incorporate implementation of a major cycleway.

In response to a query, staff noted that there is no proposal to reduce the speed limit on Tennyson Street at this time.

Karolin Potter left the meeting at 10.47am.

In response to a query, staff noted that this project will be undertaken as part of the school safety programme.

In response to a query, staff noted that a kea crossing across Tennyson Street near its intersection with Norwood Street would improve pedestrian safety, but Beckenham School does not have capacity to consistently operate it.

In response to a query, staff noted that each design undergoes an internal review and a safety audit.

Lee Sampson moved the officer recommendation, and Tim Scandrett seconded it.

Melanie Coker foreshadowed an alternative motion to lay the report on the table and request that staff investigate:

- Options for a raised zebra crossing across Tennyson Street near its intersection with Norwood Street.
- Options to replace the two raised platforms approaching the crossing point with other traffic calming measures, such as speed humps.

The Chairperson invited debate on the motion to adopt the officer recommendation.

Four Board members expressed disappointment that a zebra crossing would have to be consulted on, which would delay implementation. A Board member noted that they would have liked the option to install a zebra crossing to have been included in the staff report.

A Board member noted that they would like the area to be safer for pedestrians, and the officer recommendation achieves this.

A Board member noted that they would like the speed limit on Tennyson Street to be reduced.

A Board member noted that they are concerned that pedestrians will confuse the two raised platforms as crossing points.

The Chairperson put the motion to adopt the officer recommendation to a vote, and it was lost.

Melanie Coker moved the following motion, which was seconded by Keir Leslie.

Lay the report on the table and request that staff investigate:

- Options for a raised zebra crossing across Tennyson Street near its intersection with Norwood Street.
- Options to replace the two raised platforms approaching the crossing point with other traffic calming measures, such as speed humps.

The Chairperson put the motion to a vote, and it was carried.

Staff Assessment

Smash Volleyball Club was established in 1975. After being dissolved as an incorporated society in 2017 the club has register again as of June 2021. This has been to meet an increase in participants which has led to an increase in junior teams, and for the first time in several years a male team. The majority of the clubs members are in the surrounding area of Pioneer Stadium where the majority of games are played, and also Riccarton. The club has 6 teams plus a developmental team which equates to 80 players. Alongside this the club has a strong volunteer base with 8 volunteer coaches and 5 on the committee. The club have been looking towards fundraising and funding opportunities to help support the growth of the club and keep costs low.

The club has a strong focus on participation, allowing players to have fun and building a strong connection on and off the court. This is highlighted by their development team of players who are new to the sport and developing skills to compete and back up for the other junior teams over the season. This year has seen an increase in playing numbers, especially within the Pasifika community and a large cohort from Te Whānau Tahi. This has seen the establishment of a male team for the first time in several years for the club.

The club supplies players with uniforms to help keep subscriptions low, and remove the cost barrier to participation. The club will collect the uniform back at the end of the season to be able to use again in coming years. With the increase in players, the club, as well as the new male team there is not enough uniforms for all of the players. The club is seeking funding assistance towards the purchase of new playing uniforms. Fees are currently \$200 per season, and \$130 for those that are training and not playing. These fees cover venue hire, uniform and competition fees.

The rationale for recommending \$ 1,500 from the Discretionary Response Fund 2021/22 to the Smash Volleyball Club is that;

- The club is meeting the need of the community by supporting an increase in participants
- This supports a grassroots organization that is looking to provide the best support to its community.
- Providing funding will meet the following strategic objectives of the Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy and the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy.
