#### 1. Brief Summary

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide the Road Closure Subcommittee with information to enable the Subcommittee to make a decision regarding the application for proposed road closure for the Matariki Festival 2022.
- 1.2 This report has been written because the event organiser proposes to close the following roads from 5pm to 11.30pm Daily from Thursday 23 June to Sunday 3 July 2022:
  - Oxford Terrace, between Gloucester Street and Worcester Street.
  - Cathedral Square, between Colombo Street and Worcester Street
- 1.3 The event organisers have indicated that they have undertaken direct notifications to impacted parties, which is required as part of the road closure application process. The event organisers will provide a record of any feedback received, from impacted parties, to the Subcommittee in advance of the scheduled meeting or alternatively the organisers may present the information in person to the Subcommittee.
- 1.4 Public notifications were carried out through the placement of a public notice in The Press and on the Council's website, with the period of time allowing for objections to be received, meeting the minimum time period of one week. The application was publicly advertised on Wednesday 18 May 2022 with objections closing on Thursday 26 May 2022.
- 1.5 No objections have been received as a result of the public notification process.
- 1.6 Staff support the proposed closure and believe the closure will not unreasonably impact traffic.

### 1. Brief Summary

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to provide the Road Closure Subcommittee with information to enable the Subcommittee to make a decision regarding the application for proposed road closures for the Matariki Winter Fireworks 2022.
- 1.2 The report has been written because the event organisers have proposed to close various roads in the New Brighton area (listed below) to provide a safe area for public attending the event and for the provision of efficient access and egress of Public Transport to and from the event.
- 1.3 Roads proposed to be closed from 4pm to 9.30pm on Saturday 9 July 2022, or the Rain Date contingency on Sunday 10 July 2022:
  - Beresford Street, between Marine Parade and Owles Terrace
  - Brighton Mall, between Beresford Street and Union Street
  - Collingwood Street, between Owles Terrace and Union Street
  - Hardy Street, between Seaview Road and Owles Terrace
  - Mafeking Street, entire length
  - Marine Parade, between Hawke Street and Hood Street
  - New Brighton Road, between Hawke Street and Pratt Street
  - Oram Avenue, between Beresford Street and Hood Street
  - Seaview Road between Owles Terrace and Union Street
  - Shaw Avenue , between Hawke Street and Seaview Road
  - Union Street, between Hood Street and Seaview Road
- 1.4 The event organisers have indicated that they have undertaken direct notifications to impacted parties, which is required as part of the road closure application process. The event organisers will provide a record of any feedback received, from impacted parties, to the Subcommittee in advance of the scheduled meeting or alternatively the organisers may present the information in person to the Subcommittee.
- 1.5 Public notification was carried out through publication in The Press and on the Council website. The period of time allowing for objections to be received met the minimum time period of one week. The application was publicly advertised in The Press on Thursday 19 May 2022 with objections closing Friday 27 May 2022.
- 1.6 No objections had been received as a result of public notifications process.

- 1.7 Road closures for similar events have previously been approved by the Road Closure Subcommittee in these locations with no unexpected impacts, regarding traffic movements, in the area.
- 1.8 Staff support the proposed closures and believe that they will not unreasonably impact traffic.

  - b. Brighton Mall, between Beresford Street and Union Street
  - c. Collingwood Street, between Owles Terrace and Union Street
  - d. Hardy Street, between Seaview Road and Owles Terrace
  - e. Mafeking Street, entire length
  - f. Marine Parade, between Hawke Street and Hood Street
  - g. New Brighton Road, between Hawke Street and Pratt Street
  - h. Oram Avenue, between Beresford Street and Hood Street
  - i. Seaview Road, between Owles Terrace and Union Street
  - j. Shaw Avenue, between Hawke Street and Seaview Road
  - k. Union Street, between Hood Street and Seaview Road.
