1. Nature of Information Update and Report Origin

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is for the Waitai Coastal-Burwood-Linwood Community Board Submissions Committee to consider preparing a submission to the Council on the "Where should we send green bin organics?" consultation.

2. Officer Recommendations Ngā Tūtohu

That the Waitai Coastal-Burwood-Linwood Community Board Submissions Committee:

1. Considers preparing a submission on behalf of the Board on Where to send green bin organics.
2. Notes that given the consultation timetable, the Submissions Committee will exercise its delegated authority to complete and lodge a submission on behalf of the Board.

3. Brief Summary

- 3.1 The issue of offensive and objectionable odours from the Organics Processing Plant has been a persistent and longstanding issue for some residents living in areas near the plant.
- 3.2 Residents have told Christchurch City Council that the odour has a negative impact on their health and quality of life. This is why Christchurch City Council is seeking feedback on short-term options for managing mixed organics collected from green bins all over the city.
- 3.3 Five ways to manage mixed kerbside organics have been identified until Christchurch City Council have a permanent solution.
