4.1 Former Addington saleyards site

Claire Mulcock, Deans Avenue Precinct Society Incorporated Secretary, addressed the Board regarding the former Addington saleyards site (25 Deans Avenue).

Ms Mulcock outlined that there have been issues over many years with the vacant site. The area is overgrown in parts, is occupied by squatters, some with dogs and subject to dumping of rubbish. She noted that there is a resource consent for redevelopment of the area.

The Deans Avenue Precinct Society Incorporated is concerned that the area is intimidating for local residents and considers there has been a lack of coordination between parties interested in the maintenance of the area and is seeking the Board's support for formation

David Hawke, Halswell Residents' Association Secretary, and John Bennett, Halswell Residents' Association Chairperson, addressed the Board regarding traffic travelling from the Selwyn District through to Christchurch City via Whincops Road.

The Association considers the volume of traffic travelling from the Selwyn District on suburban streets is unacceptable. They asked that the Board Chairperson meet with the Chairperson of the Waihoro Spreydon-Cashmere-Heathcote Community Board to discuss the issue and consider any ways of addressing this.

Tufulasi Taleni, local resident, addressed the Board on behalf of himself and other Kathleen Crescent residents.

Mr Taleni described the effects that the Cedar trees on Denton Park have on neighbouring properties on Kathleen Crescent and tabled correspondence outlining the effects. These include shading, fear of falling branches in high winds, pine needle residue and pollen. He considers the effects are unacceptable and requests that the Cedar trees be removed from Denton Park.

After questions from members, the Chairperson thanked Mr Taleni for his presentation.

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Current Actions

- DAPS committee has met recently with Sam Yau (owner's representative) to discuss how we can find lasting reduction of problems
- Owner's rep will block remaining vehicle access to the site, to stop easy vehicle access for unauthorised dumping of rubbish
 - This will also cut informal access to the sub-station for Orion
- Owner's rep has recently issued trespass notices to the squatters, and notified Police, but has been unable to get a timely response.
- Even when the people are evicted they can be back within 24hrs, which is insufficient time to clear out their mess.
- CCC enforcement has recently visited the site after neighbours' complaints, and has contacted owner's rep to clear up rubbish etc in area where squatters are currently.

Possible Approach

- DAPS considers that a coordinated approach, involving DAPS, landowner, Council, Police, and Orion is required to:
 - Evict squatters;
 - Tidy up the site;
 - Clear low undergrowth to open up the site and make it less attractive for rough sleepers.
- Owner's rep has advised that the landowner was likely to support legitimate activities on the site (e.g. community garden) in the short to medium term
- Some resources would obviously be required to get the area cleaned up, and to maintain it that way.
- But improved communication between all parties would be key.



Support Requested

- DAPS is asking the Community Board to support and assist our proposed approach to:
 - Nominate a person responsible for coordinating a liaison group involving the parties involved, with a view to:
 - Improving communication and co-ordination amongst the various parties (including within the Council)
 - Identifying resource requirements and availability
 - Developing and implementing a workable plan to achieve a safe and attractive outcome.

To whom it may concern,

On 23rd August 2023 Heat Force attended a job to service the heat pump at Kathleen Cresent. Part of this servicing work involves cleaning / checking of the heat pump outdoor condensing unit and during this servicing work it was found that pine needles from trees in the neighbouring park area had accumulated in the body of the outdoor condensing unit and had blocked the drain sump of the machine.

This can lead to corrosion of the external metal casing, and raises the risk of potential corrosion of other components such as the compressor which can ultimately result in a catastrophic mechanical failure.

The presence of the neighbouring trees and resulting leaf litter / debris means that some additional maintenance and monitoring of this heat pump is required to ensure that it is not damaged or suffers a shorter than expected serviceable working life.

To whom it may concern,

I purchased my house at **Constant** Kathleen Crescent in August 2021. From May to August each year I have noticed huge amounts of pollen from the cedar trees in Denton Park coating my entire house and my car.

The trees run right along the back fence of my property and there is even one rogue cedar tree inside my property.

I love trees, but these cedar trees are causing so many issues for me in terms of my health, damage to my house and car, the pathways, the roof, and the air conditioning unit/heat pump.

Cedar fever is phenomenon which is well known and researched in the USA and Japan. <u>Cedar Fever:</u> <u>Causes, Symptoms, Diagnosis & Treatment (clevelandclinic.org)</u>. I suffer from hay fever during the spring but the yellow cedar pollen in the winter now means that I suffer from allergies all year round.

The trees planted in Denton Park are the male species of the cedar trees as these are the only ones that produce pollen. Throughout the winter months thick layers of cedar pollen cover all surfaces of our home and the outdoors areas.

I have noticed that I need to spend a lot more money and time on maintenance than I did in my previous house. Once the pollen settles on a surface it tends to turn into lichen which then covers all the roads and footpaths, along with our roofs and it also gets into our air conditioning/heat pump units which means that we need to spend more money on servicing them and they are not running as efficiently as they could be due to constant pollen build up over the years.

I really love trees and Hornby has the lowest tree canopy cover in all of Christchurch, but these trees need to be removed and replaced with native species. The current trees have grown so tall and are so close to our houses that the amount of pollen they produce has increased astronomically over recent years and they are also shading our houses and clogging our gutters with needles and pollen, not to mention degrading the outside structure of our houses and roofs.

I hope you will consider removing all the cedar trees in Denton Park and replacing them with something more suitable as if these trees remain the current problems will continue to increase.

(photos submitted) In particular in the last 5 years the situation with pollen most of which comes from the trees has increased immeasurably. The pollen has an effect of leaving large deposits of yellow dust on every surfaceincluding window sills, drapes, paths, houses, cars (even when garaged). The HRV filters in our house have to be changed more frequently because of excess pollen clogging them. We also suffer from Hayfever and medical advice suggests that this is exacerbated by nearby large trees. The height and age of trees (planted for the 1974 Commonwealth games) creates a large number of needles and shades a number of houses and the stability of the trees and branches is also of concern during wind events. 



1. Purpose and Origin of Report Te Pūtake Pūrongo

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is for the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board (Board) to approve the parking changes at Wigram/Hayton Roads intersection; and to recommend that Council approve the proposal including signalisation.
- 1.2 The report has been prepared by Council staff. The project will provide safe pedestrian and cyclist connections from Hayton Reserve to the Wigram/Hayton Roads intersection, and safe vehicular access from the intersection to the Ngā Puna Wai Sports Hub.
- 1.3 The decisions in this report are of medium significance in relation to the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy. The level of significance was determined by the new pedestrian and cycle connection to the Major Cycle Route (MCR) Little River Link provided by the recommended proposal.

2. Officer Recommendations Ngā Tūtohu

That the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board recommends that the Council relying on its powers under the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, the Land Transport Rule: Traffic Control Devices 2004 and Part 21 of the Local Government Act 1974, approves:

- 1. That in accordance with Sections 6 and 10.5 of the Land Transport Rule: Traffic Control Devices 2004, all road user movements at the Wigram Road / Hayton Road / Nga Puna Wai Access Road intersection be controlled by Traffic Signals.
- 2. Pursuant to Clause 18 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017:
 - a. That a Special Vehicle Lane for use by northeast bound cycles only be installed on the northwestern side of Wigram Road, commencing at its intersection with Hayton Road and extending in a south westerly direction for a distance of 105 metres as detailed on plan TP359001, dated 21/09/2023 and attached to this report as **Attachment A**.
 - b. That a Special Vehicle Lane for use by southwest bound cycles only be installed on the southeastern side of Wigram Road, commencing at its intersection with Nga Puna Wai Access Road and extending in a south westerly direction for a distance of 109 metres as detailed on plan TP359001, dated 21/09/2023 and attached to this report as **Attachment A**.
 - c. That a Special Vehicle Lane for use by northwest bound cycles only be installed along the southwestern side of Hayton Road, commencing at its intersection with Wigram Road and extending in a north westerly direction for a distance of 51 metres as detailed on plan TP359001, dated 21/09/2023 and attached to this report as **Attachment A**.
 - d. That a Special Vehicle Lane for use by southeast bound cycles only be installed along the northeastern side of Hayton Road, commencing at its intersection with Wigram



Road and extending in a north westerly direction for a distance of 44 metres as detailed on plan TP359001, dated 21/09/2023 and attached to this report as **Attachment A**.

That the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board approves:

- 3. All kerb alignments, road surface treatments, lane changes, raised safety platforms (at the Wigram Road / Hayton Road intersection and across Nga Puna Wai Access Road adjacent to the proposed pedestrian / cyclist crossing point), coloured pavement surfacing and road markings as detailed on plan TP359001, dated 21/09/2023 and attached to this report as **Attachment A**.

- 18. That through movements from the Hayton Road northwest approach into Nga Puna Wai Access Road be prohibited in accordance with Clause 17(1) (a) of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017. This restriction is to apply every day from 11:00pm to 6:00am.
- 19. Revoke any previous resolutions pertaining to traffic controls made pursuant to any bylaw to the extent that they are in conflict with the traffic controls described above.
- 20. Approve that these resolutions take effect when parking signage and/or road markings that evidence the restrictions described in the staff report are in place.

3. Reason for Report Recommendations Ngā Take mō te Whakatau

- 3.1 Wigram Road is an arterial road with approximately 13,700 vehicles per day and Hayton Road is a collector road with approximately 2,800 vehicles per day. The existing shared path on the north side of Wigram Road starts at the Wigram/Skyhawk Roads roundabout and ends near Hayton Reserve, approximately 250 metres west of the Wigram/Hayton Roads intersection. There are no footpaths or crossing facilities along this section of Wigram Road to provide safe access for pedestrians and cyclists to the MCR Little River Link.
- 3.2 Following the opening of the Ngā Puna Wai Sports Hub in 2018, residents in the Aidanfield area have raised concerns about the traffic and parking issues due to the single entrance to the Ngā Puna Wai Sports Hub from Augustine Drive.
- 3.3 An original proposal was developed, which completed the link from the existing shared path to the intersection, and upgraded the intersection to improve crossing facilities, but did not address the access to Ngā Puna Wai. This was brought to the Community Board on 30 November 2021 where the design was approved where delegations applied, with other elements referred to Council to approval. This was then dropped from the Council agenda of 10 February 2022.
- 3.4 The development of a Netsal facility at Ngā Puna Wai has resulted in access needing to be provided to the facility through the existing motorway underpass by the Wigram-Hayton intersection. This has resulted in the intersection being upgraded from a T-intersection to a 4-way intersection.
- 3.5 The revised recommended option will improve safety and accessibility for the community by signalising the Wigram/Hayton Roads intersection with a raised safety platform. This option incorporates the following aspects.
 - Replacement of the existing three-way priority-controlled intersection with a four-way signalised intersection with a raised platform to reduce operating speeds through the intersection and provide a safer environment for all road users.
 - The existing access to the Ngā Puna Wai Sports Hub (Ngā Puna Wai Access Road) via the Christchurch Southern Motorway (CSM) underpass will be sealed, narrowed and connected to the proposed signalised intersection.
 - The Ngā Puna Wai Access Road will only be open to light vehicles between 6am and 11pm. Full time pedestrian and cycle access will not be affected. The existing 2.4 metres height restriction on the Ngā Puna Wai Access Road will be maintained.
 - Cycle and pedestrian crossing facilities such as signalised crosswalk, cycle lane, Advanced Stop Boxes and hook-turn boxes will be provided at the signalised intersection.
 - A shared path will be provided on the northern side of Wigram Road connecting the existing shared paths terminating near Hayton Reserve to the Wigram/Hayton interchange, from where pedestrians and cyclists can access the MCR Little River Link.

- The MCR Little River Link cycle crossing on Ngā Puna Wai Access Road will be moved away from the underpass to improve visibility between crossing cyclists and vehicles passing through the motorway underpass culvert and will be upgraded to a crossing with a raised safety platform where vehicles stop for crossing cyclists.
- Removal of 34 on-street parking spaces due to accommodate turning lanes and road widening. This includes five on Hayton Road, three on Wigram Road north-east and 26 on Wigram Road south-west.
- Introducing five new trees and new landscaping in the street reservation to improve amenity.
- 3.6 This option provided the greatest benefit for vulnerable road users safety and connectivity due to the signalised crossings across all four legs of the intersection and connectivity between the existing and proposed cycle lanes.
- 3.7 This option also allows for direct control and direction of access restriction on the Ngā Puna Wai Access Road.

4. Alternative Options Considered Etahi atu Kowhiringa

Priority controlled intersection option

- 4.1 This option proposed a priority-controlled intersection with Ngā Puna Wai Access Road connected to the intersection.
- 4.2 The advantages of this option include:
 - 4.2.1 It has the lowest capital construction cost and easiest constructability due to the smallest intervention extent to the existing roads.
- 4.3 The disadvantages of this option include:
 - 4.3.1 There is an overall negative impact on the safety of vulnerable road users, mainly due to the lack of priority crossing facilities for pedestrians and cyclists at the intersection.
 - 4.3.2 The safety of motorists will also be compromised by the additional approach to the intersection (Ngā Puna Wai Access Road), as this introduces additional conflict points.
 - 4.3.3 Time restricted access to Ngā Puna Wai would be difficult to implement.

Roundabout with raised safety platform option

- 4.4 This option proposed a four-leg roundabout with raised safety platforms on all the approaches to the intersection.
- 4.5 This option provides improvements for safety and connectivity for vulnerable road users compared to the priority controlled intersection option described in paragraph 4.1 above.
- 4.6 The disadvantages of this option include:
 - 4.6.1 Safety concerns about pedestrian and cycle crossing facilities will not be addressed.
 - 4.6.2 A roundabout would require significant road re-alignment, seal widening and land acquisition from neighbouring park lands which would also increase construction costs and project timeframes.
 - 4.6.3 Time restricted access to Ngā Puna Wai would be difficult to implement.





5. Detail Te Whakamahuki

- 5.1 This project was initiated in 2019 to complete a safe linkage for pedestrians and cyclists between the Hayton Reserve and the Wigram/Hayton Roads intersection, and to provide safety facilities at the intersection. This supported the growth in subdivisions in the area.
- 5.2 The Ngā Puna Wai Sports Hub opened in 2018 has an entrance only from Augustine Drive at Aidanfield, which has caused some challenges with traffic and parking. In 2020, the Council agreed to lease land in Ngā Puna Wai to the Christchurch Netball Centre to build a new indoor Netsal Centre, which would attract more traffic to the Ngā Puna Wai.
- 5.3 There is a private access road to Ngā Puna Wai from Wigram Road on Council land. It is a gravel access road with a wide entrance. It has a 2.4 metre height restriction as it passes through the State Highway 76 underpass culvert. The access road is currently closed to vehicular traffic and is only opened for major events such as the New Zealand Agricultural Show.
- 5.4 The scope of this project has therefore been extended to include upgrading the existing private access road to the Ngā Puna Wai Sports Hub from the Wigram/Hayton Roads intersection to share the traffic load from the main access to Ngā Puna Wai from Augustine Drive at Aidanfield.
- 5.5 This proposal combines the two main objectives by proposing a signalised intersection. It provides a shared path link for the long missing section of shared path on Wigram Road. It also improves safe connections for all road users at the Wigram/Hayton Roads intersection, including an alternative access point to the Ngā Puna Wai Sports Hub from Wigram Road.
- 5.6 The Ngā Puna Wai Access Road from Wigram Road will be upgraded for vehicle access between 6:00 am and 11:00 pm. Full time pedestrian and cycle access will not be affected. The Ngā Puna Wai Access Road will only allow light vehicles due to the 2.4 metre height restriction of the motorway underpass culvert.
- 5.7 The decision affects the following wards/Community Board areas:

5.7.1 Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board

6. Community Views and Preferences Ngā mariu ā-Hāpori

Public Consultation Te Tukanga Körerorero

- 6.1 Businesses at the Hayton Road/ Avenger Crescent/Ballarat Way intersection were engaged early in May 2023 to understand the concerns and get feedback on the Wigram Road and Hayton Road Intersection. Staff advised businesses of public consultation on Wigram and Hayton Road intersection upgrade occurring later in the year.
- 6.2 Staff attended Halswell Residents Association on 31 July to discuss this project to get early feedback and understand residents concern around the intersection. Feedback from this meeting informed the online Frequently Asked Questions of the consultation.
- 6.3 Consultation started on 7 August and ran until 27 August 2023. An email was sent to 45 key stakeholders, including Police, St Johns, Fire and Emergency, Spokes, and AA inviting submissions online through <u>Social Pinpoint platform</u>, email or phone call. A printed submission form for those wanting to make handwritten submissions were available upon request.
- 6.4 The consultation was posted on the Halswell/Westlake/Wigram/Aidanfield/Kennedys Bush Community Facebook Group and the <u>Social Pinpoint platform</u> link was shared by Councillor Andrei Moore Facebook page, Reddit Christchurch review, and Wigram MP Megan Woods

Facebook page. Signage was also installed around the Nga Puna Wai access and shared path on Wigram Road.


6.5 During consultation, 25 businesses in the local area were visited with posters to inform them and their customers of the consultation.

Summary of Submissions Wigram and Hayton Road Intersection Upgrade

- 6.6 54 submissions were made on the project via <u>Social Pinpoint platform</u>, with three email submissions made by the Disabled Persons Assembly and the Halswell Residents Association and a late submission by an individual ID#7293.
- 6.7 Submitters were asked if the Intersection upgrade would improve safety.



- 6.15 Priority control for vehicles on the Ngā Puna Wai Access Road changed from 'give way' to 'stop' to the raised cycle crossing.

- 7.10 This proposal also significantly improves vehicular access to the Ngā Puna Wai Sports Hub by providing an additional access point from Wigram Road to share the traffic load from the existing main and only access point from Augustine Drive.

- 9.1 The Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, the Land Transport Rule: Traffic Control Devices 2004 and Part 21 of the Local Government Act 1974 provide the Council with the authority to approve traffic lights, special vehicle lanes and to declare the Ngā Puna Wai Access Road on the Council land to be used as public road.
- 9.2 The Community Boards have delegated authority from the Council to exercise the delegations as set out in the Register of Delegations. The list of delegations for the Community Boards includes the resolution of stopping restrictions and traffic control devices.
- 9.3 The installation of any signs and/or markings associated with traffic control devices must comply with the Land Transport Rule: Traffic Control Devices 2004.

Other Legal Implications Ētahi atu Hīraunga-ā-Ture

- 9.4 There is no legal context, issue, or implication relevant to this decision.
- 9.5 This specific report has not been reviewed and approved by the Legal Services Unit, however the report has been written using a general approach previously approved by the Legal Services Unit, and the recommendations are consistent with the policy and legislative framework outlined above.

IMPLICATION

The advice below in yellow is what was provided in the report to the Board relating to the platform:

 Replacement of the existing three-way priority-controlled intersection with a four-way signalised intersection with a raised platform to reduce operating speeds through the intersection and provide a safer environment for all road users.

In considering the NoM, I would recommend the Board be advised as follows:

- The project installs traffic signals at a new cross intersection on a long straight on Wigram Road where vehicles have not been used to stopping. The platform is proposed to assist with control of speed with the effect of reducing high speed crashes which could result in serious injury. Cross movement crashes are a risk, and do occur, at signalised intersections. The platform installed at the Barrington/Whiteleigh/Lincoln intersection has proven to be very successful at crash reduction.
- Retrofitting n platform at a later date will give a far less quality finish particularly in regards to pedestrians, cyclists, and drainage. When installed in conjunction with new works, kerb levels can be set to ensure a high level of accessibility for pedestrians at crossing points. The design of drainage makes this significantly less desirable when retrofitting a platform.
- Retrofitting a platform at a later date will less cost efficient than installing it with the new intersection.
- If a platform is removed a new safety audit would need to be completed.

Advice from Sharon O'Neill, Programme Manager Transport Capital Programme Transport and Waste Management Unit

The detailed design safety audit has been in process and the auditors were advised of the potential notice of motion. The audit has now been completed and the auditors have commented as follows:


"The project connects the existing provisions provided by the Little River Link and Hayton Basin shared paths which will improve safety for vulnerable users and provides a safe, legible, and consistent active mode network for users as they travel between Wigram, Hillmorton, Aidanfield, and other nearby locations.

Given the surrounding environment, there is a tendency for motorists to travel at higher than desirable speeds despite the current speed limit being posted at 50km/h. The southern side of Wigram Road consists of paddocks and reserve area between the Christchurch Southern Motorway and Wigram Road, with Wigram Road only being built up on the northern side. This gives the sense of being peri-urban and particularly outside of peak times, motorists are likely to travel higher than the speed limit. All other intersections along this section of Wigram Road are priority-controlled along with a roundabout at Aidanfield Drive. Therefore,



with the introduction of a signalised intersection at Wigram Road / Hayton Road, this creates a significant change in the form of control in this area and results in Wigram Road traffic no longer having the priority as they do now. The presence of the raised platform at the intersection will assist with managing speeds on all approaches and through the intersection, similar to the raised platform installed at the Lincoln Road / Whiteleigh Avenue intersection. It also provides definition to the intersection and the pedestrians and shared path crossing points on all four approaches. To omit this platform from the intersection improvements but retain the signals places motorists, pedestrians, cyclists and other vulnerable users at risk of higher severity crashes. This is because there are no mitigation measures to reduce speeds to a survivable level particularly in the current environment where it is not urbanised on all quadrants.

The Audit team are in full support of signalising the intersection in conjunction with implementing the raised platform."

1. Purpose and Origin of the Report Te Pūtake Pūrongo

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is for the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board to approve the proposed road name at 50S Shands Road, Hornby.
- 1.2 The report is staff-generated resulting from a naming request received from the developer.

2. Officer Recommendations Ngā Tūtohu

That the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board:

- 1. Receive the information in the Proposed Road Name 50S Shands Road Report.
- 2. Note that the decision in this report is assessed as low significance based on the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.
- 3. Approves the following new road name for 50S Shands Road (RMA/2023/702)
 - a. Road 1 Akoranga Place

3. Detail Te Whakamahuki

Introduction Te Whakatkinga

- 3.1 A road naming request has been submitted by the developer. A preferred name and alternative names have been put forward for the road.
- 3.2 The recommended road name has been checked against existing road names in Christchurch and bordering districts, for duplication, alternative spelling, or other similarities in spelling or pronunciation to avoid the potential for confusion. The proposed name is considered sufficiently different to existing road names.
- 3.3 The recommended road name has been checked against the Council's Naming Policy dated 15 November 2023 and is considered to be consistent with this policy. The specific criteria for assessing a name from clause 2 is set out below.
 - 3.3.1 A traditional or Māori name which is acceptable to the Rūnanga or Iwi; this may be a name reflecting the physical characteristics of an area, an activity or event associated with the area or of a notable ancestor.
 - 3.3.2 A feature of historical, social, cultural, environmental or physical importance in the area (e.g., Carlton Mill Road or Carlton Mill Reserve*).
 - 3.3.3 The name of a notable family, person or event associated with the locality or with the wider Christchurch area.
 - 3.3.4 A name in recognition of a person's service. This can be for community service, conservation, sport, the arts, science and research or other sphere of activity.

- 3.3.5 Consistency with a common or established theme for naming in a subdivision or locality.
- 3.3.6 A name that reflects the diverse cultures and communities of the locality or of Christchurch generally.

- 3.3.8 A name associated with a person, event or activity of significance to Christchurch including names associated with people, events, or places of national and international significance.

 - 3.4.1 Names of people, flora, fauna or geographical features not associated with the area, e.g., names of native trees which are not present in the area or views that cannot be identified, except where the name continues a current naming theme in the locality.
 - 3.4.2 Currently trading commercial organisations except for sponsorship names for facilities and leased parks.
 - 3.4.3 Anagrams, amalgamations or derivatives of people's names.
 - 3.4.4 Names of living persons.
 - 3.4.5 Names related to the developer of a subdivision.
 - 3.4.6 Name of a person, club or organisation associated with a privately owned building on Council land, where the club or organisation does not hold the ground lease for the building.
 - 3.4.7 Names for roads which may cause confusion because they are associated with another geographical location or feature e.g., Parklands Drive which is not located in the Parklands suburb.
- 3.5 The recommended road name has also been checked against the Australia and New Zealand Standard AS/NZA 4819:2011 Rural and Urban Addressing. The name is considered to be consistent with the Standard.
- 3.6 Under the Roads and Right-of-Way Naming Policy, the names considered must be requested by the developer. There is no ability to consider alternative names without first checking whether there are any duplications or similarities with other road and right-of-way names.
- 3.7 Consultation has been undertaken with Land Information New Zealand who have raised no concerns with the proposed road names.
- 3.8 Consultation under the policy with rūnanga is not required because the road to be named is not a collector road and/or sites of significance under the District Plan (clause 3 of the Naming Policy).
- 3.9 No addresses of neighbouring properties are affected by the proposed road naming (clause 12.2 of the Naming Policy).
- 3.10 The names requested have been accompanied by an explanation of the background of the names, which is summarised below.



Assessment of Significance and Engagement Te Aromatawai Whakahirahira

- 3.11 The decisions in this report are assessed as low significance based on the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.
- 3.12 The level of significance was determined by the number of people affected and/or with an interest.
- 3.13 Council's Principal Advisor Treaty Relationships has been consulted and has raised no concerns with the suitability of the proposed Te Reo Māori names set out below.
- 3.14 Due to the assessment of low significance, no further community engagement and consultation is required.

Proposed Names

- 3.15 The proposed roads are shown in Attachment A.
- 3.16 The below names are themed for schooling/learning as the site was previously the location for South Hornby School, which moved sites in 2017.
- 3.17 Road 1 Akoranga Place
- 3.18 Akoranga is a te reo Māori word meaning: learning, subject, discipline, profession, school, educational course, academic programme, academic course, teaching, class, lesson.

Alternative Names

- 3.19 <u>Akoako Place</u> Akoako is a te reo Māori word meaning: to consult together, give or take counsel, rehearse, practise, train, teach.
- 3.20 Kuranga Place Kuranga is a te reo Māori word meaning: schooling, education.

Assessment of Names



SECTION SIX: STAFF ASSESSMENT

Te Korowai o Grannies (TKOG) is a newly established Charitable Trust; however, the organisation has been working with and providing support to the Hornby community for many years.

The purpose of TKOG is to relieve poverty, advance education and provide services by:

- Providing a mobile distribution service of kai/food to marginalised neighbourhoods ie: disadvantaged, deprived and vulnerable.
- Encourage participation and involvement from the neighbourhoods they are supporting and strengthen their connections to the wider community.
- Educate and break down barriers for the community to help shape opportunities towards healthier decisions, healthier livelihoods, and healthier neighbourhoods.

TKOG is committed to delivering its services under Kaupapa Māori principles including Ponodoing what is right, Tika, value for all, Whānaungatana- sense of belonging and relationships, Manaakitanga, respect and support, Rangatiratanga- ownership and leadership, Wairuatangaspiritual wellness and wellbeing, Kotahitanga – unity and collaboration, Mātauranga- knowledge, wisdom and understanding, Maramatanga- insight and meaning, Aorha- compassion and empathy, Whakapapa – whanau journey, Kaitiakitanga- the responsibility to care and nurture and Whakatauki- growth, development and future pathways.

TKOG deliver many services from their base at the Hei Hei community centre to the Hornby, Islington, Hei Hei and Broomfield communities including the redistribution of food from Kairos, local businesses and leftover lunches from the local schools to the community via weekly kai runs. All food is redistributed to the community on the same day that it is received by TKOG, so no food is stored on site.

Te Korowai o nga Maatua is a new project for local parents who make personalised care packages for other parents who are unable to buy their hygiene products and are also distributed to the local community.

The establishment of a Community Garden in Hornby is a project that sits within the strategic plan of Te Korowai ō Grannies. To date, they have supported a proposal to the council to retain the 151-153 Gilberthorpes Road property where TKOG would reestablish the community garden beds that are located on that site. In addition, they have been working with council staff to investigate opportunities for a garden at Wycola Park and the land available outside the Community Link building, also located on Wycola Ave. The recommendation in this report is to provide TKOG funding to establish a community garden and build raised garden beds that can be used both immediately and long-term when a permanent site is confirmed.



The Community Garden will be used as both a sustainable source of Kai for the community, with food produced in the garden to be given to the community via the food runs they already provide, and it will be an opportunity to educate the community on how to grow and produce their kai, also with an emphasis on Kaupapa Māori principles and how this can guide the development and maintenance of a success garden.

This report also recommends funding toward a Tangi Pack. Since the beginning of TKOG they have supported the local Hornby community during some of their most vulnerable times, that being during the process of Tangihanga. This has included the delivery of Kai, urns, tables and crockery to Tangi.

While there is no Marae on the west side of Christchurch, urban Māori have adapted to not having marae for wananga and Tangi. Their homes are their new Marae, and when tangi happens the tupapaku/body is brought to the home. Te Korowai ō Grannies Tangi project is a place where whanau can come and borrow the things that they need to have tangi in their home marae.

The Tangi Pack project enables TKOG to enable the community to engage in the tangihanga process which is essential for promoting cultural preservation, community well-being, respect and empowerment. It reflects a commitment to honouring and valuing the diverse cultural traditions identified within the community. The resources held within the Tangi Pack will be available for all in the community to use.

SECTION SIX: STAFF ASSESSMENT

Halswell Community Church was established in November 2019 and is located at Sevens Oaks School, 77 Murphys Road Halswell. As the church continues to grow in membership, it also continues to grow in what it offers to the community.

Halswell Community Church employs two Youth Development workers who aim to ensure the welfare of young people in Halswell and have been doing this by connecting with the youth where they are



(schools, sports clubs). This project seeks to ensure that 2 Youth workers can continue to work in the Halswell community with young people.

In early 2024 the Halswell Community Project provided a Youth Report that had been developed from their Youth Pilot Project. Recommendations from this report included:

- Developing a calendar of activities aimed at young people in Halswell, including the development of new initiatives where there are gaps.
- Work with rangatahi to put on a series of events aimed at young people.
- Identify/promote facilities around Halswell that could be used for youth activities and hangouts.

The purpose of supporting Halswell Community Church to extend the hours of their current Youth Workers is to ensure they can increase their delivery of youth initiatives in Halswell, and enable them to explore and trial new opportunities for engaging and providing opportunities for young people in Halswell, supporting the recommendations in the Halswell Community Project report.

The youth workers will seek to provide after-school initiatives and activities at or near local schools and at local facilities, like the Halswell Community Hub. These initiatives will be free and easily accessible to Halswell young people. This may mean that the location of the activity changes to explore and introduce Halswell young people to the different spaces that are available to them in Halswell and to ensure accessibility to all Halswell youth. The Youth Workers will also lead and/or support events that are specifically targeted at Halswell Youth.

In its 2023-25 Community Board Plan the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board identified in Halswell that is was a priority to *Support initiatives that provide safe recreation spaces and opportunities for youth in Halswell to come together.*

This project will strongly support this priority and continue to build from the work that the Halswell Community Project was leading in the last 2 years. Halswell Community Church will connect and work with many different Halswell-based organsiations that will be able to support positive outcomes for young people in Halswell.

The recommended funding will allow this project to continue until September 2026, at which point the Halswell Community Church will be required to seek additional community grants, including (but not limited to) the Strengthening Communities Fund.

Across NZ, Community Patrols work in partnership with other organisations, including the NZ Police to prevent crime and reduce harm through the active presence of trained patrollers. In communities where there is a strong Community Patrol, the organisation is often a key part of the social infrastructure that makes up that community.

Currently, both the Hornby Community Patrol and the Christchurch South Patrol have included parts of Halswell within their patrol routes. As Halswell has continued to develop and grow, so has the desire from the community to establish its own Halswell Community Patrol.

At the end of 2023, the Halswell Community Patrol was established and has since become an Incorporated society and gained charitable status.

The Halswell Community Patrol Incorporated has a new volunteer committee and has 20+ Volunteers who are all undertaking training to become volunteer patrollers. Currently, training is being undertaken alongside Christchurch South Community Patrol as the Halswell Community Patrol Incorporated does not own a patrol vehicle.

Enabling the Halswell Community Patrol Incorporated to purchase a patrol car will mean they can train volunteers quicker and be able to retain the volunteers as the patrol roster will be able to begin. The Halswell Community Patrol Incorporated will be an asset to the wider Halswell Community and support the perception of safety within the community. The patrol also provides a meaningful volunteer experience locally for its members and in turn, supports the promotion of a connected Halswell community.

Funding is recommended for this project subject to Halswell Community Patrol Incorporated supplying certified bank account details.

It is recommended that the Board set aside funds for the development of a Mobile Youth Centre (MYC) to be jointly managed by Riccarton Community Church (RCC) and Community Development Network Trust (CDN). Funding would be conditional upon delivery of a sustainable project plan by RCC and CDN to be approved by the Board.

The MYC will serve as a flexible platform for youth events and programs, addressing the community's need for accessible youth-focused spaces. The project plan will present various MYC options, including super trailer, truck, and e-truck, each with distinct benefits and drawbacks. This comprehensive approach enables informed decision-making by the Board.

Partnership and Management:

RCC will assume day-to-day management responsibilities for the MYC, ensuring efficient operation and sustainability. They will establish usage charges to cover maintenance, repairs, insurance, and administrative costs.

Collaborative Approach:

RCC and CDN have a proven track record of collaboration and have engaged with key stakeholders such as La Vida Youth Trust, Student Volunteer Army, Halswell Community Church, and Hope Youth. Leveraging existing resources, including two minivans, they aim to extend their model to benefit additional organizations.

Mobile Solution:

Acknowledging the trend towards mobile youth centres, the proposed MYC offers cost-effectiveness and increased outreach compared to static centres. Initial plans favour a trailer model due to lower operational expenses.

Community Engagement:

A community-led design process will shape the MYC's features, potentially including amenities like a coffee machine, BBQ, sound system, gazebo, sports equipment, and kitchen area. This inclusive approach ensures alignment with community needs and preferences. Reflecting community aspirations for enhanced connectivity, particularly among young people, the MYC aligns with the visions developed in the Halswell, Hornby, and Riccarton wards.

Financial Strategy:

Funding will be supplemented by additional sources such as Rata Foundation, Rotary, and business sponsorships. Sponsorship opportunities will be explored for the MYC vehicle, enhancing community involvement and support.

The Matatiki Hornby Centre located at 25 Smarts Road is home to the new Pool and Library Complex. The Centre has a large outdoor courtyard, adjacent to Kyle Park there is a triangle-shaped grass area, this will be the location of the nature play space.

The site is accessible via a footpath from Waterloo Road and Kyle Park. It is situated next to the outdoor stage, near the children's end of the library, which means that it will get a lot of foot traffic and attract people to the space, making it the ideal position for a nature play space.

The vision is a place that encourages interaction, play and connection. A space that can be used by the likes of families, individuals, story time groups, schools, pre-schools and parent coffee groups.

This project will be completed by Woodland Escape Limited. They will do the planning, design and delivery of the project. Woodland Escape Limited is a nature-based playground design, consultation and gardening company. While the project lead is Woodland Escape Limited, the project will be done in close collaboration with the Council's Recreation, Sport and Events Unit, led by James Jowsey, Project Lead Facility Establishment. This is to ensure that all play equipment satisfies the Council's Health & Safety requirements.

The creation and design of the play space will have a large amount of input from the community through a participatory design process with children and the local community. SECTION SIX: STAFF ASSESSMENT

Wycola Park is located in the middle of Wycola Avenue, Manurere Street and Hei Hei Road.

Over the last three years, Wycola Park has made some significant safety improvements. This has been due to a community-driven response to make it safer for park users. Several key local community organisations have been involved in making this happen.

As part of this process, the community advocated for Wycola Park Skate Park to be brought forward in the Council's Long-Term Plan (LTP). It currently has a budget of \$336,292. The timeline for the skate park has the design being completed in 2023/24 FY, consultation in 2024/25 FY, and the build completed at the end of summer 2025.

In addition to the skate park, a CPTED (crime prevention through environmental design) report was completed in 2021 to identify how the park could improve safety for all users. One of the solutions was to move the small playground in front of the skate park. The smaller playground could be moved to the left to allow for space to create a natural entry onto the park. This will then open up a clearer line of visibility onto the skate park.

Pre-engagement on the skate park was completed in 2021 by the Christchurch City Council, one of the key pieces of feedback from this engagement is that the smaller playground is very well used so the community would like to see it stay. At the same time, the line of sight into the skate park is compromised with the playground's current position. The parks unit has suggested that the playground be moved to the left of the skate park to open up the space. As the playground is due for renewal at a similar time and taking this into account the skate park and playground renewals will be completed at the same time.

Both the skatepark and playground have adequate budgets to complete their projects. However, the sunshades and picnic tables are not included in the budget. The sunshades and picnic tables would make a significant difference in this space as Wcyola Park has a lack of tree cover. Funding to create more areas of shade will help to enhance the new playground and overall experience for the local community.

The Halswell War Memorial, unveiled on 21 June 1924, is of high historical and social significance in Halswell and the wider city, representing the selfless consequences and impact World War I had on the country and the local Halswell community. In 2006 a flagpole was erected next to the memorial which illustrates the continued relevance the memorial has for the local community.

The Halswell War Memorial hosts the annual Halswell ANZAC service each year which is organised and delivered by the Halswell Residents Association Incorporated and the Halswell ANZAC committee. As the Halswell area continues to be developed and demographic growth continues, so does the ANZAC service with the service attracting 1500-2000 people each year.

This project aims to install a permanent wooden fence next to the Halswell War Memorial to ensure no thoroughfare and preserve the dignity of the site. The fence will provide a defined boundary to the memorial area and provide an extra area for immediate and future ceremonies at the memorial. The proposed fence does not in any way restrict access to the Memorial.

This project has been proposed by the Halswell ANZAC Committee with the support of the Halswell Residents Association Incorporated and the Templeton RSA. Council staff are working with these groups to ensure all of the required information is obtained and all required approvals are met.

The Lions Club of Halswell District Inc (Lions) are a group of community volunteers who help with the needs of the Halswell community along with their 5 main causes of diabetes, vision, hunger, the environment, and childhood cancer. When funds are raised the full proceeds go to the cause as Lions Clubs do not incur administration costs. This makes them distinctly different from other charities and fund raisers.

The Halswell Lions have been operating for over 15 years and have a range of successful community events, the most popular being the Christmas Carol event "Carols in the Quarry". They regularly fundraise all around Christchurch to support different causes, most recently:

- Donations to the Wales Street Kindergarten Trikathon;
- Delivering pea straw to those that need it;
- Donations to the Cancer Bus;
- Christmas Giving Tree event;
- Development and repairs to the Halswell Community Hub;

The Lions Club's two gazebos were damaged in strong winds in 2023 and are no longer able to be used. This project funding would enable the Lions to purchase two new gazebos [1 3x3m, 1 3x6m], including side walls and sandbags.

Enabling the purchase of two new gazebos will mean they can continue to run the same community events in all weather, be protected and sun safe.

The South West Sport and Recreation Hub Incorporated (the hub) is a new sports hub that was developed in 2023 to encourage and support all forms of community-based sport and recreation in the South West area. This is done for and through the clubs, their members, schools, the community and all recreation participants. The hub's members include Awatea Athletics, Halswell Bowling Club, Halswell, Cricket Club, Halswell Softball Club, Halswell Tennis Club, Halswell United AFC, Halswell Wigram RFC, Hillmorton High School, and Hornby United AFC.

As the Hub's inaugural project, it demonstrates a collaborative approach to leveraging resources and expertise, with the partnership between the hub and Christchurch City Council. Repurposing the former site of the rugby league clubrooms strategically optimises space, catering to the needs of the local youth population while addressing existing parking concerns through stakeholder consultation.

As part of this consultation additional parking lines will be installed to ensure there are extra parking spots available for the rugby league club to use.

The hub possesses a robust capacity for fundraising and sourcing in-kind support, ensuring financial sustainability for the project. Leveraging community partnerships and volunteer contributions enhances the project's viability and extends its reach within the community.

The establishment of a basketball court at Halswell Domain will have far-reaching benefits for the community, fostering youth development, promoting physical health, and encouraging social interaction. The project aligns with the hub's mandate to support all forms of community-based sport and recreation, serving as a catalyst for positive change.

There were 26 organised events held in the Board area during the submission period where the public were informed and able to provide feedback in various ways. This included;

4. Advice Provided to the Community Board Ngā Kupu Tohutohu ka hoatu ki te Poari Hapori

4.1 Accessibility of pedestrian crossing - Chappie Place, Hornby

At its meeting on 14 September the Board noted that it is currently difficult for those using mobility scooters and wheelchairs to use the pedestrian crossing facility on Chappie Place, Hornby in the vicinity of "Wendy's" and requested that staff investigate the accessibility of the pedestrian crossing facility and provide advice on measures that could improve accessibility.

Road maintenance staff have advised that it is proposed that isolated smoothing be applied to both shoulders of the road at the crossing to improve comfort and transition particularly for mobility and other impaired pedestrians. The work has been programmed for May 2024.

4.2 Former Addington saleyards site

At its meeting on 12 October the Board received a public forum presentation from the Deans Avenue Precinct Society's presentation raising concerns about the state of the former Addington Saleyards site (25 Deans Avenue). The Board referred the issues raised to staff for investigation and to provide advice on the possible participation of the Council in a liaison group for the former Addington saleyards site.

Staff have now advised that the landowner has responsibility for this area and has declined to interact with the Council on this matter. No staff have been added to the liaison group.

4.3 Community Patrols

Community Patrols of New Zealand is dedicated to helping build safer communities in partnership with NZ Police and other organisations. Patrols in the Board area include the Hornby and Riccarton community patrols. Their Monthly Patrol Statistics can be found on the Community Patrols of New Zealand website:

1. INTRODUCTION

The Waipuna Halswell Hornby Riccarton Community Board appreciates the opportunity to make a submission to the Christchurch City Council on the Draft Long Term Plan 2024-2034.

The Board <u>wishes</u> to be heard in support of this submission.

What Matters Most?

Our overarching proposal is to focus on a deliverable capital programme that helps drive our city forward, with particular investment in roads and transport infrastructure and in protecting and upgrading our water networks. We're borrowing for new projects that have long-term value and ensuring that the debt repayments are spread fairly across the generations of ratepayers who will benefit from them. We're maintaining enough financial flexibility to be able to handle unplanned events, and we're finding permanent efficiencies in our day-to-day spending.

Overall, have we got the balance right? Comments:

- Overall, the Board considers that the Council has got the balance right and that focus on a deliverable capital programme that helps drive the city forward, with particular investment in roads and transport infrastructure and in protecting and upgrading water networks reflects the feedback provided in response to the "What matters most" consultation.
- The Board is aware of residents' concerns about the proposed level of rates increase to fund the programme and encourages the Council to investigate other options for revenue, for example reviewing options to increase the financial return to ratepayers of CCHL without selling the asset.

Rates

Given that both the Council and residents are facing significant financial challenges, should we be maintaining our existing levels of service and level of investment in our core infrastructure and facilities, which will mean **a proposed average rates increase of 13.24% across all ratepayers and an average residential rate increase of 12.4%**?

Yes

Comments:

• While the Board considers that the Council should be maintaining existing levels of service and level of investment in core infrastructure and facilities it is aware that many residents consider that the proposed average rates increase of 13.24% across



tem 11

all ratepayers and an average residential rate increase of 12.4% are not acceptable and that any increase should be less than 10%.

- The Board is aware that it is not only service levels that impact rates and urges the Council to explore other options for revenue to enable a lower level of rates increase.
- The Board appreciates the inclusion of rates analysis provided in the consultation document that enables residents and business owners to see the likely increase in their rates that will result from the proposed budget.

We're proposing some changes to how we rate, including changes to the city vacant differential, rating visitor accommodation in a residential unit as a business, and changes to our rates postponement and remissions for charities policies.

Comments:

- The Board supports the extension of city vacant differential rating to suburban centres.
- The Board supports the proposal for rating visitor accommodation in a residential unit as a business differential if they're used for unhosted short term accommodation for more than 60 nights per year, have a resource consent for such activity, or are predominantly used for such activity. The Board agrees that this is equitable because it will result in these properties being rated in the same way as other short term accommodation providers such as motels.
- The Board supports extending qualification for rates postponements to people of any age who are experiencing financial hardship but considers that the current automatic qualification for postponements for those aged 65 years or older be retained.
- The Board supports simplifying the wording of the Remission Policy 1 (not-for-profit community-based organisations) and Policy 2 (land owned or used by the Council for community benefit) to give more flexibility to grant remissions that are consistent with the Council's objectives and the extent of the ratepayer's financial need, noting that this change is not expected to have a material impact on the total amount of remissions granted, or on the rates revenue required to pay for them.

Fees and Charges:

Do you have any comments on our proposed changes to fees and charges (e.g. our proposal to introduce parking charges at key parks)?

Comments:

• The Board does not support the introduction of parking charges at the Botanic Gardens Armagh Street carpark and Riccarton Avenue North Hagley carpark that could result in impacting access of families to these facilities but would be supportive of charges to deter all day parking.



Operational Spending

Operational spending funds the day to day services that the Council provides. Our operational spending is funded mainly through rates and therefore has a direct impact on the level of rates we charge. Everything we build, own and provide requires people to get the work done. For example, ongoing costs to operate a library, or to service our parks and waterways includes staff salaries, and maintenance and running costs such as electricity and insurance.

Are we prioritising the right things?

Yes

Comments:

- The Board considers that the proposed spending accords with the feedback provided in response to the "What matters most" consultation.
- The Board supports the development of a road map for obtaining Chlorine exemptions for Christchurch water supplies?

Capital Programme

In this LTP we have focused on developing a deliverable capital programme. We're proposing to spend \$6.5 billion over the next 10 years across a range of activities, including some key areas that you've told us are important through our residents' surveys, and our early engagement on the LTP:

- \$2.7 billion on three waters (drinking water, wastewater and stormwater) (31.5%)
- \$1.6 billion on transport (24.9%)
- \$870 million on parks, heritage & the coastal environment (13.4%)
- \$286 million on Te Kaha (4.41%)
- \$140 million on libraries (2.16%)
- \$137 million on solid waste and resource recovery (2.11%).

Are we prioritising the rights things?

The Board notes that the funding for the Heritage component is only a small proportion of the \$725 million operational Spending proposed for Parks, Heritage and coastal Environment over the next ten years.

Is there anything that you would like to tell us about specific aspects of our proposed capital spend or capital programme? Transport? <u>Comments:</u>

The Board considers that there needs to be additional provision for footpaths in Halswell. This is a Community Board Plan priority.

The Board urges the Council to include provision for the revitilisation of Sockburn Park as this is identified as a priority in the Community Board plan and is much sought after by residents in an area that is lacking in useable greenspace.

The Board suggests that the investigation a new Dog Park in South West Christchurch be retained in the LTP and brought forward to 25/26 to align with the Community Board Plan Priority.

Additional opportunity and options to our main proposal

We're working hard to reduce the impact of rates rises on residents while ensuring that Christchurch and Banks Peninsula continue to be great places to live. To do this we have had to balance the impact of rates rises with the investment needed to care for our city and asset. However, there are some additional things that we could do that would accelerate work on some projects and programmes, or we could continue to explore ways to bring down our proposed rates increases.

Which of the following do you think should be our focus for the 2024-2034 Long Term Plan?

Explore other ways to bring down proposed rates increases across the Draft LTP (e.g. reduce or change some of the services we provide, review our grants funding, increasing fees and charges for some services)



Additional savings and efficiencies

Are there any areas where you feel we should be reviewing the services we provide to reduce our costs throughout the Draft LTP 2024-2034?

Comments:

The Board considers that the Council could review the opening hours of libraries to determine whether a reduction could result in savings while still providing a good level of service to residents.

Additionally the Board considers that the Council could revisit the abolition of Library fines for overdue items.

Major event bid funding

Christchurch competes with other cities in New Zealand and around the world to attract major international sports, business and music events through event bid funding. While the city has an established portfolio of events and attracts a range of other events, there are opportunities to grow the existing events and attract new events to the city. This would require additional funding.

Should we leave bid funding for major and business events at current levels in the draft LTP, as proposed? Or should we increase the bid funding?

Increase the bid funding. This means we will be able to continue to attract new major international sports, business and music events, but would also mean an additional rates increase of 0.42% in year one of the LTP, 0.04% in year two, and 0.14% in year 3.

Do you have any comments on the additional event bid funding proposal? Comments:

There are mixed views within the Board and the community on the appropriate level of bid funding.

More Investment in adapting to Climate Change

Our district faces diverse climate hazards, from rising sea levels to more frequent extreme weather events. At a high level, we're spending \$318 million over 10 years on projects that have a direct impact on climate change mitigation, and \$1 billion over 10 years on projects that directly help us adapt and build our resilience. We could bring forward to 2024/25 the additional \$1.8 million annually that is currently proposed to start in 2027/28. This would accelerate the Coastal Adaptation Planning Programme and boost overall community preparedness and resilience.

Do you think we should bring forward to 2024/25 the additional \$1.8 million spend currently proposed to commence in 2027/28, to accelerate our grasp of the climate risks? The early investment would bring forward a rates increase of 0.29% to 2024/25 from 2027/28.

No - don't bring \$1.8 million forward.

Should we create a climate adaptation fund to set aside funds now to manage future necessary changes to Council assets, including roads, water systems, and buildings, in alignment with our adaptation plans? Implementing this fund would result in a rates increase of 0.25% per annum over the LTP period. How this fund would be established, managed and governed, and the criteria of how the fund will be used, all require further work. As part of that process there will be further opportunity for residents to have their say.



12. Election of Community Board Chairperson

1. Purpose of Report Te Pūtake Pūrongo

- 1.1 The Local Government Act 2002 prescribes the processes by which Community Boards must elect their chairpersons and deputy chairpersons. This report describes the alternative processes available, one of which must be adopted.
- 1.2 The report has been written following the resignation of the current Community Board Chairperson, Helen Broughton effective as at 9 May 2024.
- 1.3 Helen Broughton will continue as a member of the Community Board.

2. Officer Recommendations Ngā Tūtohu

That the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board:

- 1. Receives the information in the report.
- 2. Adopts, by resolution, whether it will use System A or System B to elect a Chairperson.
- 3. Proceeds to elect a Community Board Chairperson.
- 4. In the event that the current Deputy Chairperson is elected as Chairperson, elects a Deputy Chairperson.

3. Legal Considerations

- 3.1 The provisions of Schedule 7 of the Local Government Act 2002 apply to Community Boards (with a small number of exclusions), with necessary modifications as if the boards were local authorities. Clause 21 of Schedule 7 requires that each Community Board, at its first meeting, must elect one of its members to be its Chairperson and another to be Deputy Chairperson.
- 3.2 At its Inaugural meeting on 26 October 2022 the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board elected Helen Broughton Chairperson and Marie Pollisco Deputy Chairperson. Helen Broughton has resigned as the Chairperson of Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board effective 9 May 2024. A further election is therefore required to elect a new Chairperson to take office as of 9 May 2024.
- 3.3 The manner in which a Community Board is to elect these positions is prescribed in Clause 25 of Schedule 7 that provides that the Community Board must determine by resolution that the Chairperson and Deputy Chairperson be elected or appointed by using one of the following systems of voting:



System A

- 3.4 Requires that a person is elected or appointed if he or she receives the votes of a majority of the members of the Community Board present and voting; and
- 3.5 Has the following characteristics:
 - 3.5.1 There is a first round of voting for all candidates; and
 - 3.5.2 If no candidate is successful in that round there is a second round of voting from which the candidate with the fewest votes in the first round is excluded; and
 - 3.5.3 If no candidate is successful in the second round there is a third, and if necessary subsequent, round of voting from which, each time, the candidate with the fewest votes in the previous round is excluded; and
 - 3.5.4 In any round of voting, if two or more candidates tie for the lowest number of votes, the person excluded from the next round is resolved by lot.

System B

- 3.6 Requires that a person is elected or appointed if he or she receives more votes than any other candidate; and
- 3.7 Has the following characteristics:
 - 3.7.1 There is only one round of voting; and
 - 3.7.2 If two or more candidates tie for the most votes, the tie is resolved by lot.

Practical application of clause 25

- 3.8 Each Community Board must first determine, by resolution, which system of voting it will use, that is System A or System B.
- 3.9 Nominations for the position of Chairperson and Deputy Chairperson are called for.
- 3.10 If there is only one candidate, then the Community Board may resolve that that person be elected.
- 3.11 If there is more than one candidate the Community Board must then put the matter to a vote according to the system, it has adopted. The Community Board members are then asked to vote on each candidate.
- 3.12 The following examples may be useful to illustrate two of the system:

System A

Example 1

Three nominations are received and upon the votes being counted the result is: A (5) B (2) C (1). In this case A is elected to the relevant position.

Example 2

Three nominations are received and upon the votes being counted the result is:

A (3) B (3) C (2). In this case no candidate is successful, so a second round of voting is held for candidates A and B. The lowest polling candidate, C, is excluded.



System B

Example 1

Three nominations are received and upon the votes being counted the result is: A (5) B (2) C (1). In this case A is elected to the relevant position.

Example 2

Three nominations are received and upon the votes being counted the result is:

A (4) B (4) C (0). In this case a lot is held to determine who between A and B will be elected to the relevant position.
