4. Alcohol Licensing Briefing

1. Detail Te Whakamahuki

Timing	This information session is expected to last for 15 minutes.
Purpose / Origin of the Information Session	<p>This briefing provides background information to the Waipapa Papanui-Innes-Central Community Board. The Community Board is requesting information on the role that a Community Board has in relation to an alcohol license application/renewal, and also the role that individual members can have in their own capacity.</p> <p>The Community Board has furthermore requested information about Drug Testing at events.</p>
Confidentiality	The workshop and any shared information are not confidential.
Background	<p>The Sale and Supply of Alcohol legislation allows for objections to licence applications. The objection must apply to a particular premise, and practice occurring at that premise.</p> <p>The Community Board's role is to represent the Community voice generally. If a community/suburb has an opposition to alcohol then it would be represented in patronage at the premise, anyone wishing to object to that license would need to show an opposition greater than the locality opposition.</p> <p>As part of a licence application for a large scale events the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012 provides for applicants to work with Police and the territorial authority to develop a bespoke event management plan in relation to drug testing at events. The event management plan supports event providers to manage risk and ensure patron wellbeing. Ultimately, the decision to include a drug checking service at an event rest with the organizer.</p>

Purpose / Origin of the Information Session	The purpose of this information session is to provide information through a presentation to the Community Board regarding the updated Good-to-go ways to get to school programme the Council provides to schools.
Confidentiality	The information session and any shared information are not confidential.
Background	<p>Good-to-go ways to get to school is a programme designed to support schools in encouraging safe, active, fun, affordable, low-emission ways to travel to school and around their community.</p> <p>The programme requires schools to participate in walk or wheel to school week (primary and intermediate schools only), participate in crash bash (high schools only), promote and participate in our annual school travel survey and receive our termly newsletters. Many of our schools are already meeting these requirements. Council works in partnership with registered schools to focus on transport issues that are prevalent for them. Depending on the type of issue the school is facing we look at the different interventions that could be used.</p> <p>The Good-to-go ways to get to school programme has been well received with over 43 schools registered.</p>
