


How has housing intensification in Spreydon impacted the overall liveability of the neighborhood?






District Zoning Plan

Parks and Play Structures



Canopy Cover

- Spreydon has 10% canopy, recommended coverage in Canterbury is between 16-24%.
- There is not equitable canopy cover across Christchurch.




<u>Transportation Trends: Addington School, Spreydon:</u>

(Travelling to-and-from Addington School)

- **51%** (n=70) of children travelled by **car**.
- **26**% (n=52) of children **walked**.
- 19% (n=70) of children scooted.
- 3% (n=70) of children biked.
- 1% (n=70) of children travelled by **bus**.

Commonly Themed Barriers and Obstacles:


- Quality of the footpaths
- Location of pedestrian crossings
- Hard and/or unsafe to bike (inconsiderate and dangerous behaviour of road users).

To all Forum Members

In March 2024 on the corner of Simeon Street/Athelstan and Simeon Street/Milton Street you have a Stop sign or is this a Give-way?

Monitoring drivers on their behaviour at both these signs, I am appalled and disappointed to see the amount of drivers not sticking to the law of these signs.

I have seen so many close mishaps, as in this area there are so many retired aged persons crossing this road every day, which has me so concerned. Knowing I have a lot of health issues I've had some near misses also.

Here is a record of what I have noted with video footage to go with this. Police 105 have assisted me a few times but with minimal effects.

Simeon/Athelstan Street

Vehicles noted: 487 vehicles Not Stopping.

Metro Bus: 35 of these drivers are going through the stop sign at least 2 or 3 times. I have been in contact with the Bus company who have me still monitoring them as there are still a few who haven't learnt yet.

Simeon Street/Milton Street

Same companies decided not to stop here also.

Every time I go and sit on these corners I am there for 2 hours at a time in mixed weather conditions and have started getting a little bit of interest from passersby.

I do have a few suggestions and from passers by on how to combat this.

A: Speed bumps close to stop signs



- B : Have Simeon Street/Athelstan Street changed back to a Give-way like it was 12 years ago. Also Milton Street with either Give-way sign or a roundabout to be able to keep the flow of traffic going.
- C: Also put pedestrian crossings instead of courtesy and not too close to the corners.

Hi Callum

I'm writing to try and address an issue we have with our local park - undesirable use and occupation.

Approximately 4-5 times per week we have people arriving in cars, sitting in the car park and surrounding areas, dumping rubbish and occasionally intimidating locals who choose to question the rubbish.

The biggest issues are

- 1. Rubbish. I have picked up maybe 2 large buckets of rubbish including takeaway wrappers, boxes and cups plus food waste in the last 24 hours. Most is from the big well known food companies. Some of the rubbish is drug related nangs balloons and last week I picked up a small bag with a small white pill in it? Also cans and bottles are being thrown down the bank and on to the tennis courts (mt pleasant tennis club). Obviously broken glass is part of the problem. This happens day and night and I have just returned from collecting 1 full bucket of lunchtime rubbish
- 2. Behaviour. Some of these cars have pretty unfriendly occupants. And within 20 metres of the parking is a modern children's playground.
- 3. Parking limitations. Parking areas are obvious but many park on the grass. Use the bushes as toilets and I suspect some are dealing drugs as they are there for many hours at a time and other vehicles have short visits. This mainly happens on the road up to the tank. There are too many spots that are available to park cars that could be fenced or barriers constructed.

I would like the community board to engage with this issue please. Often I use snap solve send but the response is too slow and rubbish gets blown around, down the bank and into the playground. And our dog certainly has to be kept away from the unmaintained planted areas. Some of the local residents also pick up rubbish. There are no bins in the area so it then goes into our personal red bin. It's too disgusting to sort so potential recycling ends up in landfill.

The area has become a known spot for this and it's really exhausting seeing and dealing with this multiple times weekly. I'm really not exaggerating the scale of this.



I would like at least bins supplied - so we can pick up and dispose waste. But am generally concerned about the local playground vs the drug waste (and general waste). Also more barriers, lights and whatever can be done would be helpful. Surely council have some strategies to tackle this.

































Urban Forest Tree Planting Program

Planting plans for Remuera, Simeon and Lincoln Park




The Urban Forest Planting Program

- Increase canopy cover across our city
- Focus on getting the overall canopy cover within our Parks spaces to 40%
- Providing for a network of native forest patches across the city
- Increasing the visibility of indigenous species
- Planting trees in sites that are able reach maturity


Distribution of indigenous forests nearby

Addressing safety concerns

- Planting is setback from paths
- Trees proposed are primarily specimen trees with lower branches removed
- Density in most situations will be at least 5m apart.






Remuera Park

- 20 submissions
- 15 support
- 2 oppose











- -Much of the feedback related to shading on a property located directly to the south of the property. Staff have visited the owner and confirmed the concern relates to the existing trees and not the proposed trees.
- -Staff met with Community Board and resident regarding safety concerns.
- -Staff will be undertaking pruning and removal of a small suppressed tree to improve site lines.



Remuera Fruit Trees

- Proposal to plant 10-15 Fruit trees
- Te Ringitini Group will lead the planting
- Fruit will be available for the community
- Primarily considering Apples, Pears, Stone Fruits
- Letter Drop was undertaken with all immediate residents
- One email submission which expressed no issue with the planting of fruit trees





Simeon Park

- 19 Submissions received
- 17 in Support
- 1 somewhat oppose
- Concerns raised about ongoing maintenance of the trees


Staff worked with local group who operate out of the park to develop plan

- No Changes Proposed




Fast facts - Lincoln Park

Planting will be completed over a number of years by the Councils internal tree planting team
