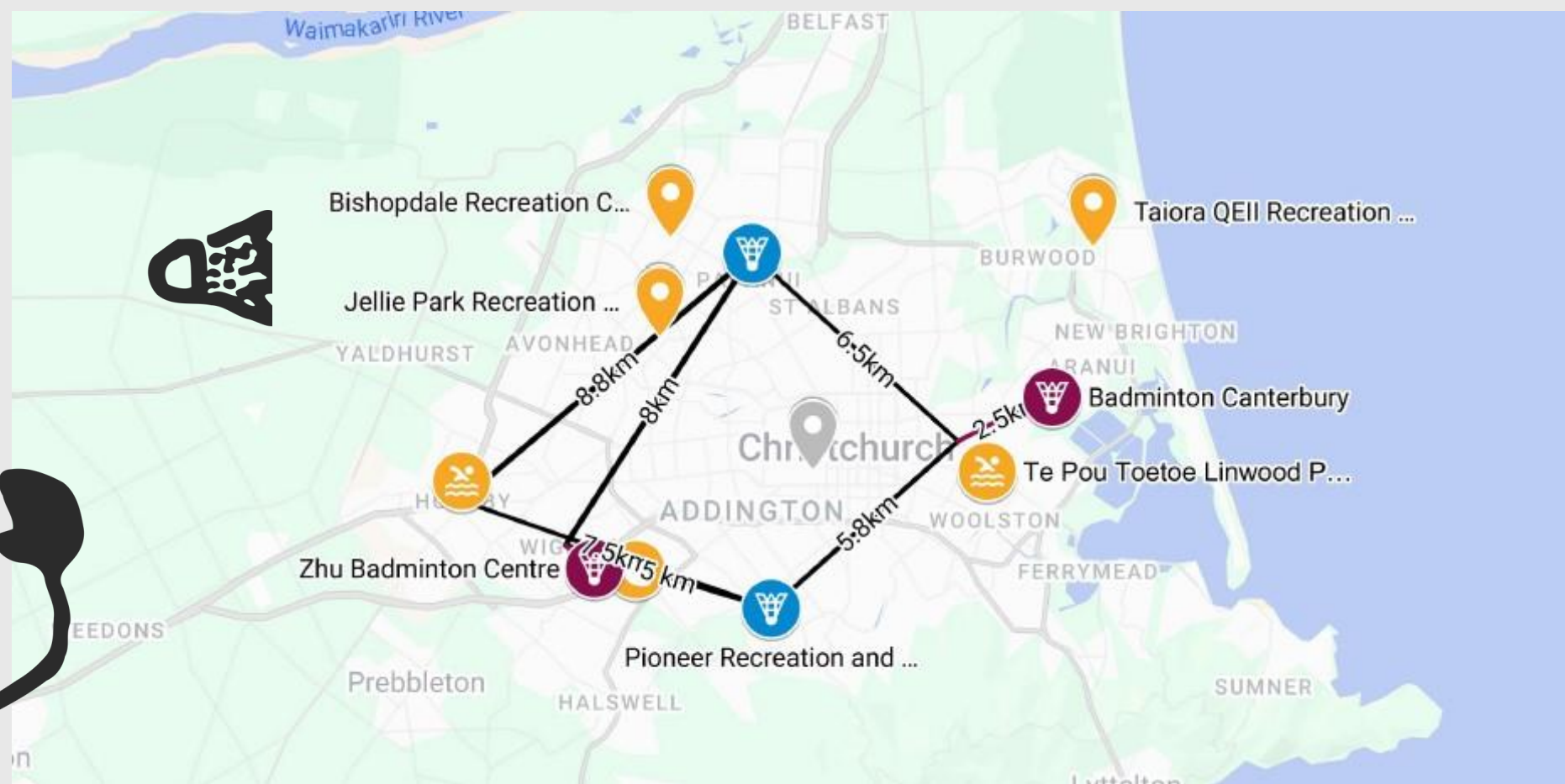
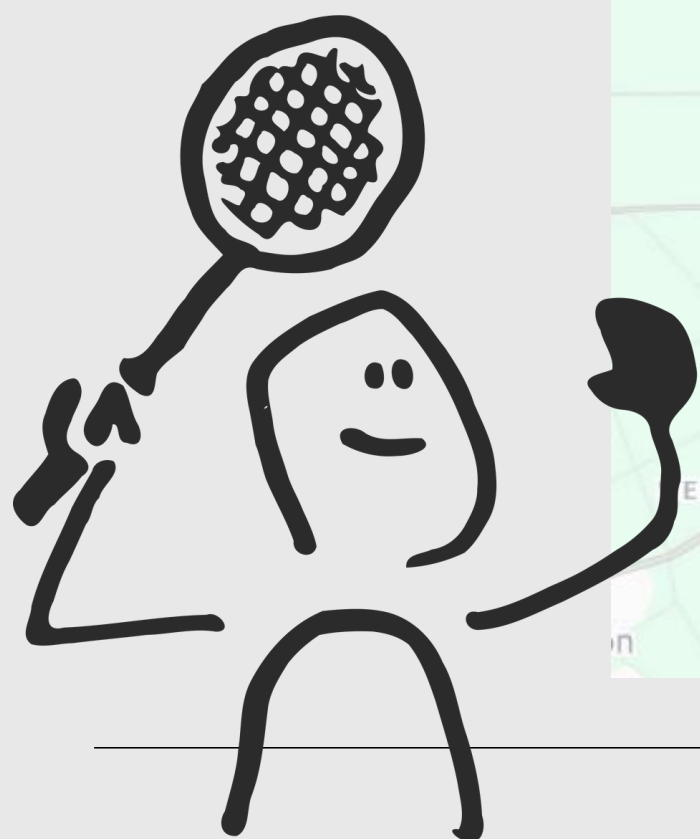

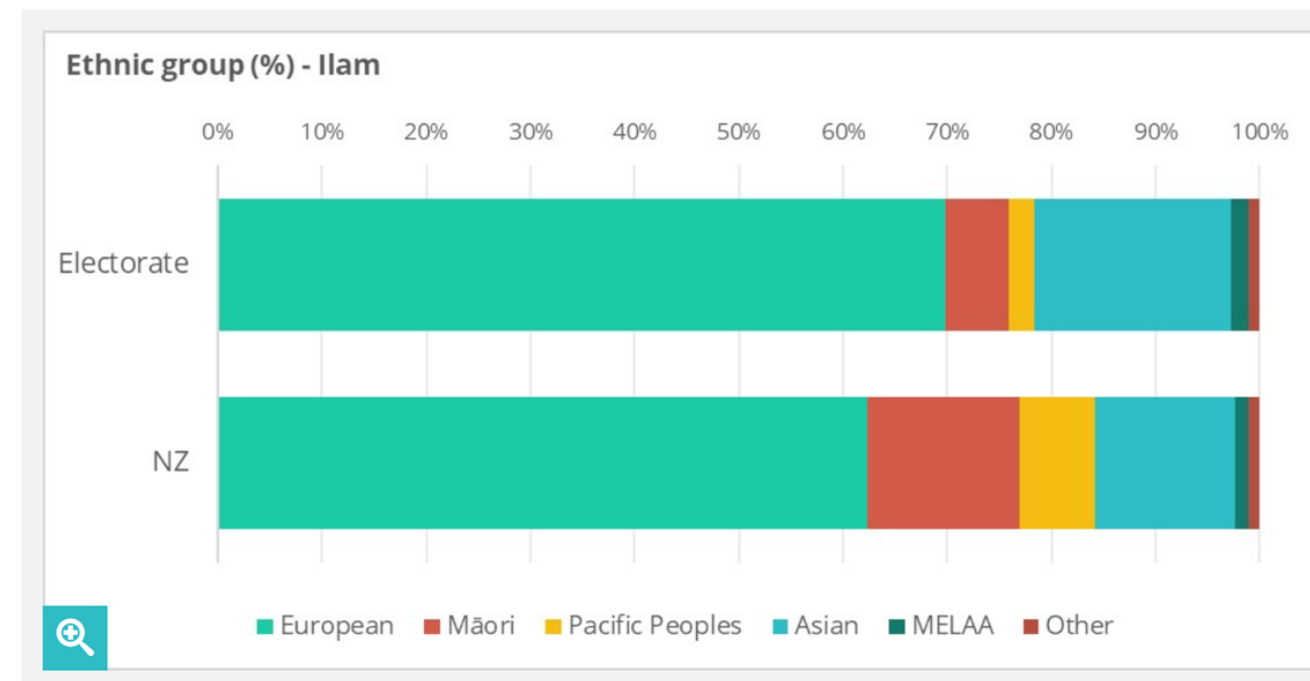

Reason 3

Break the cultural stereotype by providing a “cultural play”

1. Certain leisure activities were simply no longer available in the country of settlement
2. Some turned out to be too expensive (particularly taking into consideration the fact that many leisure activities were subsidized heavily in the communist system)
3. Some were perceived to be too dangerous (wilderness areas in Canada, unmarked trails, abundance of potentially dangerous wildlife)
4. Some were too time-consuming or simply no longer suitable for the new lifestyles of immigrants.

The meaning of cultural relevant games

In the Sport New Zealand's report, "The value of play, active recreation and sport for local government", it addressed the Cultural Wellbeing of play:

"Participation in play, active recreation, and sport can strengthen feelings of identity and culture and feelings of belonging within and across cultures."

Evidence relating to the impact of play, active recreation, and sport on cultural wellbeing outcomes can be considered across two broad themes as follows:

- **Strengthened cultural ties from participation in play, active recreation, and sport**
- **Increased wellbeing from participating in culturally relevant physical activity**

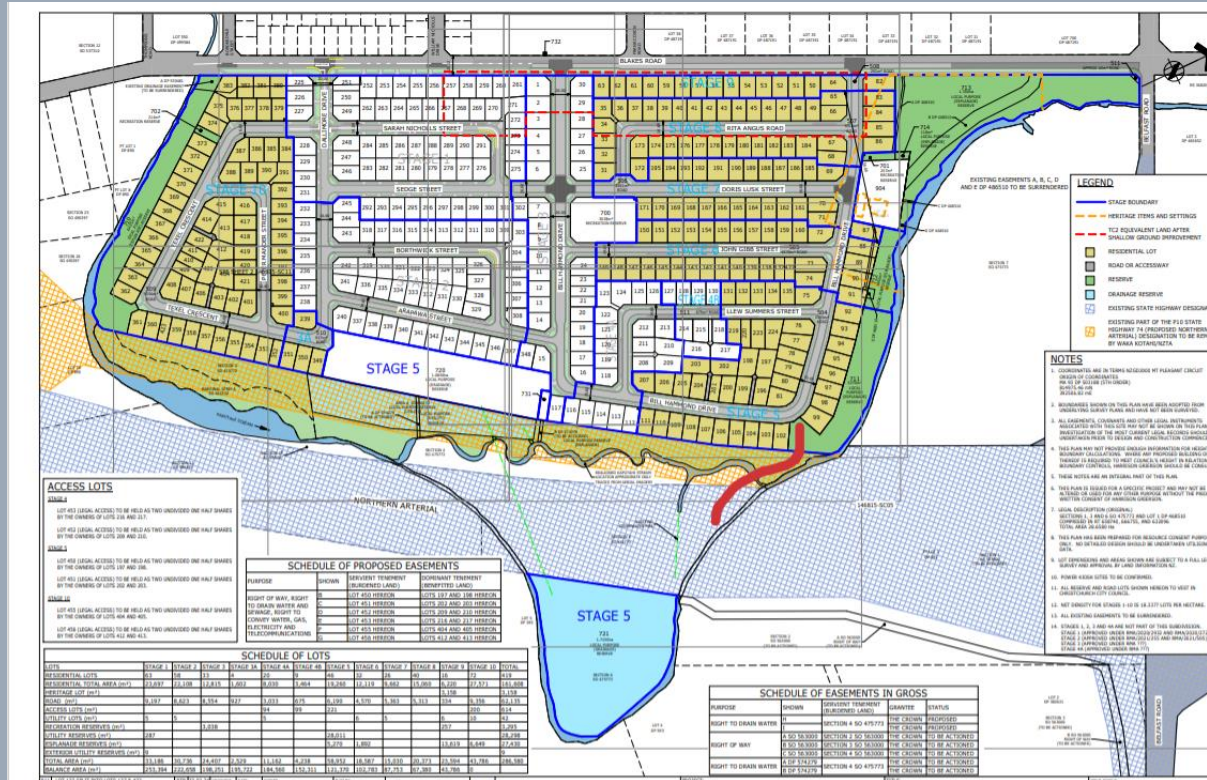

The Linking Path – In Detail

This path will form part of Ka Putahi Creek leg of the Styx Source to Sea Walkway (Vision-2 of the Styx Vision 2000 – 2040), and this walkway is being constructed over time as a 2.6 m wide crusher timber batten-sided crusher dust path so that it retains a high(er) degree of natural character and wilderness experience.

The path looks really wide when it's constructed, but eventually plantings spill over the side of the path and it starts to look more natural – yet still wide enough to walk and bike along and not feel too squashed up.

We have these types of paths in many other reserves, and they're great for wheelchairs and prams too.
