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

Reduce maximum trading hours for off-licences from 7am – 9pm, Mon-Sun

Where?

District wide

All new off-licences

Exemption available where primary purpose of their business is not the sale and supply of alcohol.

Restrict new off-licences establishing in areas of high deprivation

Areas with a deprivation score of 8 - 10

New bottle stores

Exemption available where applicant can demonstrate mitigations of community concerns.

Policy 3

Restrict new bottle stores near primary & secondary schools & addiction/ rehabilitation facilities.

District wide but different settings for Central City and Banks Peninsula

What we've heard

- There are a wide range of views about the impact that alcohol has on communities in Christchurch and Banks Peninsula and the most appropriate way to address this; we heard divided views from the community that often were strong on each side.
- Our communities are concerned about the impacts that alcohol related harm has; some are concerned about the ease with which alcohol can be accessed in the city and the disproportionate impact this has on vulnerable communities and individuals.
- There is a desire for a proportionate and effective approach to addressing alcohol related harm in Christchurch and Banks Peninsula.
- Consistent with feedback and themes that we've seen in previous engagement.









Foetal Alcohol Syndrome

- Foetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) devastating lifelong, irreversible neurodevelopmental disorder caused by exposure to alcohol before birth
- THE leading cause of preventable intellectual disabilities in NZ
- Costs NZ about \$4.8 billion per year, more than 1/2 of the estimated cost of alcohol harm in New Zealand per year (\$9.1 billion)



FASD

- Estimated 1800-3000 babies born with FASD each year in NZ
- Experience complex behavioural, learning, intellectual and physical problems that persist throughout their lives
- This results in poor educational and employment outcomes, increased benefit dependence, interaction with the criminal justice system and with alcohol, drug and mental health services as well as an increased early death rate



These individuals have no "freedom of choice"

- International data confirms that longer opening hours leads to increased alcohol consumption, and increased alcohol consumption is known to lead to more FASD
- Common sense indicates that late night sales of alcohol relates to increase potentially unplanned / unprotected sex
- I don't believe the LAP goes far enough in looking at the closing hours of ALL places that sell alcohol
- Please think of FASD when thinking about the impacts of your policies



International data shows closing hours the most important aspect of reducing alcohol harm

- Closing hours is a very powerful way of reducing risks from alcohol
 NZ paper by O'Connor showed reduced harm when closing was reduced to even 4 am from no closing times
- I strongly support the Council's proposal to reduce the off licence trading hours to 9 pm but I would like to see their opening delayed to 9am
- I would like to see central city bars/nightclubs closing at 2 am and suburban ones at midnight



Density of Off Licences Important for reducing harm – and called for by people in areas of Chch

- I strongly support the proposal for no new off licences in decile 8-10 but believe this should include decile 7 as well – there is a risk otherwise that there will be an increased density in these areas, which is already high
- I support the restriction of the bottle stores from within 200m of schools and addiction/rehabilitation centres but believe that for bottle stores this should include the 4 Avenues area, and for outside this area, it should also include bars and nightclubs
- AND should include other areas where there is a high density of young people eg the Bus Exchange

IN CONFIDENCE SUMMARY

- 1. This report is to inform the Canterbury District Alcohol Harm Prevention Team in relation to The scntral business District, within the Four Avenues, Christchurch.
- 2. Alcohol a Contributing Factor (ACF) data was drawn from the Police NIA and CARD systems from the period of 4 years. Event types are those at the time of closure. 2020 and 2025 are incomplete years.
- 3. It is important to note that both the 2019-2020 and the 2020-2021 periods include data from COVID-19 Alert Level 3 and Alert Level 4 lockdowns, likely effecting ACF demand for alcohol related event types.
- 4. The area for the stats, was limited to a one kilometre radius surrounding this location.
- 5. The data analysed offence/incident types that have had alcohol confirmed as a contributing Factor to the incident.
- 6. This is now known as AFC data (Alcohol Contributing Factor).



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




LICENCED PREMISES IN AREA (1km Radius)










ALCOHOL CONTRIBUTING FACTORS

Alcohol is no ordinary commodity

- Alcohol harm is not confined to people who drink alcohol or to those who drink irresponsibly or to intoxication
- Alcohol causes both acute and chronic harmful effects across the lifespan - there is no risk-free dose of alcohol
- Evidence-based Local Alcohol Policies are an important tool in reducing the harm caused by alcohol in our communities




Alcohol and Cancer

- International Agency for Research on Cancer classified alcohol as a Group 1 (highest risk) carcinogen in 1987
- Same category as smoking and asbestos
- Most clearly associated with mouth, throat, oesophagus, breast and bowel – almost certainly also contributes to other cancers
- Alcohol is broken down into acetaldehyde, a toxin that damages DNA



A woman drinking 2 drinks a day had 30% higher risk of cancer than those drinking < 1 drink per week





We have a big problem with mental health and suicide in Aotearoa New Zealand

- About 1/3 of adults in Aotearoa NZ experience depression or anxiety (New Zealand Health Survey 2022/3)
- Aotearoa NZ has the highest youth suicide rate in the OECD (UNICEF, 2025)
- Alcohol consumption plays a key role in depression, anxiety and suicidal behaviour



Alcohol is a cause of mental health disorders

- Alcohol is a **cause** of major depression: problem drinking **doubles** the risk of developing **major depression** (Boden & Fergusson, Christchurch Health and Development Study, 2011)
- Alcohol is also a **cause** of suicidal behaviour: severe alcohol use disorder increases the risk of **suicidal behaviour** by **50%** (Crossin et al, Christchurch Health and Development Study, 2022)
- One quarter of all suicide attempts involve acute alcohol use



How can we reduce the incidence of mental health disorders caused by alcohol?

- One key to reducing mental health disorders in the population is to reduce the amount of alcohol that is being consumed (Babor, 2022)
- The proposed Christchurch Local Alcohol Policy has a key component to accomplish this: reducing the availability of alcohol by...
 - Reducing hours where alcohol is available for sale (off-license)
 - Reducing the density of licensed premises
- The LAP will reduce alcohol consumption, and reduce the incidence of major depression and suicidal behaviour in the Christchurch area













Alcohol affects EVERY person in the ED

The National Public Health Service:

- Strongly supports the proposed reduction in trading hours for offlicenses to 9.00pm
- Also recommends a reduction in trading hours for on-licences to 3.00am (CCZ and entertainment precincts) and 1.00am (suburbs)
- Strongly supports the freeze on new off-licences in high deprivation areas (and suggests this should include deciles 7-10)
- Supports restrictions on proximity of new bottle stores to sensitive sites (and suggests this should also include early childhood centres)
- Recommends a discretionary condition restricting external alcohol advertising and signage on all licensed premises
- Recommends the inclusion of drink serve limits (maximum 2 drinks per serve) for special licensed events (particularly large events)
- Recommends restriction of same day deliveries of alcohol after 7.00pm
- Recommends prohibition of buy now pay later services at off-licences

- 1. We are open to a change in hours but must be the same for all
- 2. Why would Council provide an exemption for remote sellers Intentionally or unintentionally?
 - Does nothing to reduce alcohol related harm
 - Shifts customer behaviour and creates a commercial advantage for remote sellers.
 - Inconsistent with the Object of the Act and what the Christchurch City Council intended for its LAP



MAXIMUM TRADING HOURS

Exemption for remote sellers doesn't make sense:

- 1. Compliance: Remote sellers do not have the same compliance or licensing requirements as retail stores
- 2. Increase of Remote licenses:
 - Potential for opportunists
 - Delivery of alcohol at late hours
 - Consumption in private or public places.
- 3. Does not Align with the Object of the Draft LAP
 The aim to reduce alcohol-related harm and promote responsible consumption.






DISCRETIONARY CONDITION REMOTE OFF-LICENCES

We believe....

"The Committee may impose a condition further restricting the hours alcohol may be delivered if sold remotely from those set out in section 59 of the Act".

For example;

Super Liquor would support a condition that deliveries by Remote Sellers would be restricted up to the closing time of Off Premise stores.





RESTRICTION ON THE LOCATION OF NEW LICENSES

1. RESTRICTION ON THE LOCATION OF NEW BOTTLE STORES

Super Liquor believes that each application should be judged on its own merits - Quality over Quantity

• Why is the following exemption offered?

"An applicant can apply for an exemption to this policy provision if they can show in their application that the primary purpose of their business is not the sale and supply of alcohol".



RESTRICTION ON THE LOCATION OF NEW LICENSES

2. How are the distances measured in regards to sensitive sites?

Policy requires clarification.

Marlborough Draft LAP defines this as being "this distance is to be measured as a pedestrian would travel via footpath, road reserve or any other public place""





WHY ARE ON PREMISE NOT TREATED IN THE SAME WAY?

3. Why are On Premises not treated in the same way?

The Draft LAP does not have a similar condition for ON-licences.

Why?

We are not sure why this condition is imposed solely on off premises licences.

Super Liquor submits that consistency is key when granting a licence

46 No sale or supply outside permitted trading hours: all licences

48 Sale on Anzac Day morning, Good Friday, Easter Sunday, and Christmas Day restricted: offlicences

The holder of an off-licence must ensure that-

- (a) no alcohol is sold on or delivered from the premises on Good Friday, or Christmas Day, or before 1 pm on Anzac Day; and
- (b) no alcohol is sold on or delivered from the premises at any time on Easter Sunday unless it is grape wine or fruit or vegetable wine made—
 - (i) on the premises; or
 - (ii) from produce harvested from land on which the premises are situated.

Compare: 1989 No 63 s 37(1)

49 Remote sales exempted from trading hours restrictions

- (1) A remote sale of alcohol may be made at any time on any day.
- (2) Subsection (1)—
 - (a) overrides the restrictions on sales imposed by sections 46 and 48; but
 - (b) is subject to the restrictions on delivery imposed by sections 48 and 59(1).

59 Requirements relating to remote sales by holders of off-licences

- (1) The holder of an off-licence must ensure that any alcohol sold by remote sale is not delivered to the buyer (or to any other person on the buyer's behalf) at any time after 11 pm on any day and before 6 am on the next day.
- (2) Subsection (1) applies whether the alcohol is delivered by the seller or by some other person.
- (3) The holder of an off-licence must take reasonable steps to verify that the buyer of any alcohol that the holder sells by remote sale (and, if a person other than the buyer is to receive it, to verify that the receiver) is not under the purchase age.
- (4) The holder of an off-licence takes reasonable steps to verify that the buyer of any alcohol that the holder sells by remote sale is not under the purchase age if he or she complies with a procedure declared by regulations made under this Act to be a reasonable procedure for the purposes of complying with subsection (3).
- (5) The holder of an off-licence who sells alcohol by remote sale via the Internet must comply with any regulations made under this Act requiring information to be visible on the holder's website when people browse, enter, or otherwise access it.
- (6) The holder of an off-licence who sells alcohol by remote sale by mail order must comply with any regulations made under this Act requiring information to be published in the holder's catalogues.
- (7) The holder of an off-licence who sells alcohol by remote sale by telephone must comply with any regulations made under this Act requiring information to be given to callers.





Reminder: On what we consulted

POLICIES as consulted

Reduce trading hours for all off-licences to 9pm daily

POLICY 1

 Maximum off-licence trading hours of 7am to 9pm Monday to Sunday.

Applies to all (new and existing) off-licences in the district.

PURPOSE

To restrict late-night purchases of alcohol for unsupervised consumption including when people have been drinking already.

RATIONALE

- Reducing trading hours can reduce harm.
- Most alcohol-related harm occurs at night or in early hours of the morning.

POLICY 2



Freeze on new offlicences in high deprivation areas

- No new off-licences where deprivation scores 8 or more.
- Exemption available.

To reduce the disproportionate levels of alcohol-related harm experienced by higher deprivation communities.

- Stakeholder and community concerns about off-licence proliferation in these areas.
- There are more off-licensed premises (and on-licences) in higher deprivation areas than in areas with lower levels of deprivation.
- Freeze on new licences will prevent further concentration of off-licences in these areas.

POLICY 3



Restrict new bottle stores locating near sensitive sites

- No new bottle stores near* primary or secondary schools, or addiction facilities.
- Does not apply in City Centre Zone.
- Exemption available.
- To minimise exposure to alcohol of potentially vulnerable populations.
- Community preferences that bottle stores are not located near sites where exposure to alcohol should be minimised, or certain parts of the population may be vulnerable.



Policy 1 Reducing Off-Licence Trading Hours

For every **seven** submitters who supported the proposed settings, **one** suggested changes to the proposed maximum trading hours.

Support

- Feel alcohol is already too readily available
- Support for settings that will reduce late night harm & nuisance and make communities safer
- Concern that the current rules enable late night top ups, often made when judgement is already impaired

Support Part

Generally supported the intent, but:

- Suggested changes to the maximum trading hours
- Asked for consistent rules for all off licences (including remote sellers)
- Asked for the policy to be more restrictive (e.g. address morning hours)


Oppose

- Overreach from the Council
- Adults should be free to decide when they purchase and consume alcohol
- Questioned whether it would have any meaningful impact
- Concerned about the impacts on business



Policy 2 Freeze on new off-licences in high deprivation areas

Do you support a freeze on granting an off-licence to new premises in areas that service high deprivation communities?



For every ten submitters who supported the proposed deprivation deciles 8, 9, and 10, one suggested including different areas.

Support

- Feel that there are already sufficient places to purchase alcohol in these areas, some expressed concern about the current level of availability
- Support settings that will protect communities vulnerable to, and disproportionately affected by alcohol related harm
- Associate easy access to alcohol with more alcohol related harm

Support Part

Generally support the goal of reducing alcohol related harm, but:

- Are concerned that it unfairly targets certain areas of the city
- Opposed the proposed exemption for supermarkets
- Suggested more restrictive settings (e.g. include decile 7)
- Have concerns about effectiveness and economic impacts

Oppose


- Feel that the policy is unfair, discriminatory and inequitable
- Questioned whether the policy would have any meaningful impact
- Feel that the policy impinges on personal freedoms and the free market
- Have a view that people will simply travel further to access alcohol





Policy 3 Restrict new bottle stores locating near sensitive sites

Do you support restricting new bottle stores from opening within 200 metres of sensitive sites in Christchurch?



For every **eight** submitters who supported the proposed settings, **one** provided an alternative suggestion.

Support

- Support intent to protect vulnerable members of the community
- Feel that there are already a large number of places to purchase alcohol and their communities don't need any more in them, particularly around sensitive sites
- Agree that the proposed policy settings would support safer and healthier environments

Support Part

Generally support the goal of reducing alcohol related harm, but:

- Suggested alternative distances to those proposed
- Wanted the definition of "sensitive sites" broadened to include additional sites and facilities
- Want a more case by case approach, as opposed to blanket rules

Oppose


- Questioned whether the policy would have any meaningful impact
- Many supported the restrictions only around addiction/rehabilitation centres
- Provided existing rules and restrictions are properly enforced, risk of bottle stores around schools is negligible






Policy 3 Restrict new bottle stores locating near sensitive sites

- Most submitters supported the proposed settings for Banks Peninsula
- Supporters appreciated the need for a tailored approach and felt it strikes the right balance
- Submitters who opposed either felt the buffer was too short or called for consistency with citywide rules





Summary of what we heard



Overall, most submitters supported the proposed settings, viewing them as balanced and proportionate.



There is a strong desire to reduce alcohol-related harm in our communities and protect vulnerable members of our communities.

Ease of access to alcohol, both the hours it is available and its widespread availability across the city, is a concern for many.



Submitters provided a broad range of views on the extent to which the Local Alcohol Policy should restrict the sale and supply of alcohol – both for and against.

- Submitters who supported the Draft Local Alcohol Policy in part, generally supported the intent of the policy, but called for stronger restrictions in specific areas.
- Opposition was primarily driven by scepticism about the effectiveness of, or need for, a Local Alcohol Policy.


