#### TERMS OF REFERENCE NGĀ ĀRAHINA MAHINGA

#### 2 December 2019

#### 1. Name of Committee

The Committee will be known as the "Akaroa Museum Advisory Committee".

#### 2. Status of Committee

The Committee will be a committee of the Banks Peninsula Community Board.

# 3. Purpose of Committee

The purpose of the Committee is to provide advice to the Community Board on the strategic issues facing the Museum and the matters arising from them.

# 4. Responsibilities

Responsibilities of the Committee are:

- To provide advice on the Museum's aims, objectives and policies and its role in the community.
- To provide a local link with the Museum's stakeholders including Friends of the Akaroa Museum, local Rūnanga and the wider community.
- To assist in obtaining local support and financial resources necessary to achieve the Museum's aims.

# 5. Composition of Committee

- The two Akaroa subdivision members of the Banks Peninsula Community Board
- Two representatives from the Friends of Akaroa Museum<sup>1</sup>
- One community representative <sup>2</sup>
- One representative from Ōnuku Rūnanga

In addition, a liaison member should be appointed from each of the Wairewa and Koukourārata Rūnanga, to attend meetings when matters of significance to their rohe (district) are being discussed.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> The position of community representative will be publicly advertised, seeking expressions of interest.



The Community Board will appoint the Chairman of the Committee.

#### 6. Term of Committee

The Committee will be discharged three months from the coming into office of the members of the community board, elected or appointed at, or following each triennial general election.

#### 7. Administration

The Committee shall meet quarterly, or as required, and report to the Banks Peninsula Community Board following each Committee meeting.

A schedule of quarterly Committee meetings will be adopted annually.

As a committee of the Community Board the Committee shall be bound by the various Acts and Regulations governing the operation of a Local Authority and shall also be subject to the Council's Standing Orders.

The Akaroa Museum Advisory Committee will be assisted by the Museum Director and Community Board support staff.

### 8. Remuneration of Committee Members

Committee members will not be eligible to claim the Council's approved allowances for attendance at meetings.

# 7. Committee Members' Exchange of Information Te Whakawhiti Kōrero a ngā Mema Komiti

#### Part B

Members exchanged the following information:

- A book was shared called 'Pakeha Settlements in a Māori World' covering what was going on from the 1830's to 50's during colonisation. One of the last whaling stations was Oashore and it was possibly the only station that has had an archaeological dig completed. A discussion was suggested with Heritage NZ about the possibility of an archaeological investigation at the site where an old hotel was located adjacent to the Britomart Memorial site.
- The recent heavy rain event caused flooding at floor level in two areas of the museum. They
  were quickly dealt with and probably caused by blocked drains. The clearing of gutters and
  drainpipes only occurs every six months, which may not be adequate.

# 1. Purpose and Origin of the Report Te Pūtake Pūrongo

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to explain the considerations and process behind acquisitions for Akaroa Museum.
- 1.2 This report was initiated by a request from the Chairperson of Akaroa Museum Advisory Committee as a topic that would have value for members of the committee and interested community members.

# 3. Background/Context Te Horopaki

- 3.1 The parameters of collecting are defined by Akaroa Museum's Acquisitions and Disposals Policy: part 2 describes the **existing collections**; part 3 **future collecting** process and methods; part 4 **limitations**.
- 3.2 From that high level there is a process for handling object entry that is intended to assist capturing details about objects offered to the museum, additional research is sometimes needed, and together these feed into decision-making.
  - Deciding on acquiring or rejecting an object is about weighing up what each object offers the museum as a piece of evidence. Is it rich in potential to develop our knowledge somehow? Does it make existing collections richer? Does it go towards filling in a gap in our existing collections?
- 3.3 Some examples of recent acquisitions will be presented and the reasons they were acquired explained.

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#### Friends of Akaroa Museum (FOAM) Report

#### 20 August 2025

Since The Friends of Akaroa Museum (FOAM) last Akaroa Museum Advisory Committee report for the meeting held in May 2024, here is a summary of FOAM's activities in support of the Museum.

In late May the work on framing the painting, *Akaroa Harbour* by John Gibb, was completed. This involved the fabrication of a new frame and gilding it with 23.75ct gold leaf, and then applying a patina to give an aged appearance consistent with the age of the painting. The reframing cost of \$3,600 was paid for by FOAM.

In July FOAM Treasurer, Diana Stronach, completed the Financial Statement of FOAM for the period 1 July 2023 through to 30 June 2025. The Statement shows that FOAM is in a healthy financial condition following its two successful fundraisers (House and Garden Tour, and the Akaroa Antiques Fair) in late 2024 and early 2025. The Statement will be presented to members at the Annual General Meeting in September.

# 3. Brief Summary

3.1 Annual Results

For the year ended 30 June 2025 the Museum met or exceeded all its levels of service targets:

- Visitor total was 25,233
- Visitor satisfaction was measured at more than 95%
- Hours open to the public totalled 2,107
- Enquiries received from the public totalled 408, on subjects related to family history, the collection and general history
- The collection grew with the addition of 64 objects, all documented within three months of receipt.

#### 3.2 Exhibitions

Our current exhibition, *French Connections: Language and Culture in Colonial New Zealand* is nearing the end of its run and will be replaced in early September with an exhibition of Donald J. McKay's photographs from the 1950s. The exhibition has been developed to accompany the book *A Rural Life in Black and White* and will open at the same time as the book launch.

Donald has lent the Museum his Speed Graphic camera and accessories for the exhibition, a large camera that he carried around rural Banks Peninsula as he recorded life in the 1950s.

Looking ahead, our summer exhibition will focus on the wharf and next year we'll be marking the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Akaroa Mail, developing the exhibition content in conjunction with the Akaroa Mail's editor, Michael de Hamel.

#### 3.3 Collections

With financial support from the Friends of Akaroa Museum we have completed the conservation and reframing of the John Gibb oil painting of Akaroa Wharf and Harbour donated two years ago.

The painting is now clean, bright and in an exhibitable state.

#### 3.4 Events

The launch of *A Rural Life in Black and White* will be the highlight of our year. Published with the generous support of the Friends of Akaroa Museum, this hard-cover book contains 77 photographs selected to illustrate the range of activities, work and social, that rural Peninsula people were engaged in. It is a fitting tribute to the important photo-documentary work of the photographer, Donald McKay, who is now in his nineties.

Collections manager Daniel Smith has written a substantial introduction to the images, extensively quoting the photographer.

A Rural Life in Black and White will be launched at the Museum on Friday 5 September at 4pm.
