- 3.7 The 2025-26 Strengthening Communities Fund opened on 1 May 2025 and closed on 30 May 2025.
- 3.8 A total of 98 applications were received, requesting a total of \$1,904,324.
- 3.9 The Waitai Coastal-Burwood-Linwood Community Board has a total funding pool of \$712,717.
- 3.10 Staff have recommended a total of \$653,400 for the 2025-26 Waitai Coastal-Burwood-Linwood Strengthening Communities Fund (this includes \$241,500 of pre-committed multi-year funding), which would result in \$59,317 remaining for the 2025-26 Discretionary Response Fund (plus any carry-forward from the 2024-25 year which is currently being finalised).
- 3.11 In the 2023-24 funding round, the Board approved multi-year funding to the following organisations:

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Continue to offer several weekly groups and activities, fostering a sense of connection, value, and community support helping to reduce loneliness and isolation.

Respond to changing needs by reviewing some groups and initiating new groups and projects.

People will be supported and empowered to meet the challenges of everyday life.

Overall attendances at Te Whare Taonga o Ngā Iwi Katoa continue to grow. Currently a monthly total of about 400 attendances is recorded, accounting for new, returning, and regular participants.

The Men's Shed expects to have 25-30 attendances over 4 days each week from a constantly renewing pool of more than 30, with some very regular participants attending several times a week.

Organise for guest speakers and special interest sessions regularly providing opportunities for participant to connect and learn.

Activities are supported by 8 volunteers contributing roughly 10 hours weekly.

Collaborate with Linwood Avenue Community Trust, Avon Heathcote Ihutai Estuary Trust, local schools, Kāinga Ora, City Mission networks, and other community agencies to diversify engagement.

Staff Assessment

This request is recommended as a Priority One due to its depth, reach, collaboration and value for money, and its close alignment with both Council and Community Board priorities.

Social Service Council of the Diocese of Christchurch - Christchurch City Mission employ two Community Development Kaimahi (CDK) based at Te Whare Taonga o Ngā Iwi Katoa at 322 Linwood Avenue. Open from Monday to Thursday 9am-2:30pm, the facility operates as a space providing opportunities for residents to connect, learn and grow, both as individuals and as a community.

The roles are separated to a Community Development Kaimahi (CDK) and a Community Development Kaimahi- Men's Projects (CDK-MP). Through an agreement with the Trust of Te Whare Taonga o Ngā lwi Katoa, the kaimahi are embedded within the community working alongside local people, particularly those who are marginalised, vulnerable or at risk, to support social inclusion and wellbeing.

The CDK works to identify and assess within the community the needs, issues, expectations and priorities of people in the wider Linwood community and motivate the community to meet these needs. They are also responsible for the day to day running Linwood Resource Centre projects. These include drop-in activities like board games and jigsaws, craft groups, coffee mornings, cooking and community events celebrating seasonal highlights such as Christmas, and Matariki, aimed at further building community connectedness. Guest speakers and other workshops as 3 Steps to Life, Understanding Grief, tech skills and financial management also support build community capacity.

The CDK for Men's Projects has a slightly different lens, with a remit to encourage and support the development of a range of community programmes and activities that meet the identified needs of men aged 25-80 who are frequently socially isolated within the local community, as well as oversee the running of the Community shed.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project strongly aligns with Te Pou Tuatahi: Te Tangata, Objective 1.7 Work with others to reduce loneliness and social isolation, with particular focus on intergenerational approaches.

The project addresses the critical need for connection in the wake of widespread loneliness and disconnection. It also removes common barriers to participation such as transport and cost by operating locally and providing free or low-cost programming.

Through facilitating and initiating group-based activities using Te Whare Taonga o Ngā Iwi Katoa as a base, the kaimahi help to foster strong, connected, and resilient communities where tangata are supported to thrive, contribute, and belong.

Outcome 1: WACST services contribute to participants ongoing health, wellbeing, and resilience; they support older people to remain active and involved. Continue providing a service that will contribute the ongoing health, wellbeing and resilience of our community and encourages participation and connectedness.

Outcome 2: Address social isolation issues by providing health (physical and mental), wellness, and physical activity classes to keep participants mind and body active. Mitigating these feelings and getting them involved helps their sense of wellbeing; being informed is one way we can help

Outcome 3: Continue to provide classes and activities should that are affordable for everyone, removing the financial barriers that can prevent attendance; charging \$2-3 per class.

Staff Assessment

This request is recommended as a Priority One due to its alignment to the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy as well as the significant depth and impact it has on the community and that they have a proven track record of delivering quality programmes for their community.

The Trust's aim is to address known social isolation issues in Christchurch's eastern suburbs by providing health, wellness, and physical activity classes to keep participants minds and bodies active. In 2024 WACST relocated to St Pauls Lutheran Church and have continued to grow and improve their programme despite the challenges that come with moving to a new venue. They achieve this through providing a range of cost-effective activities and programmes that aim to increase physical and mental wellbeing of older people within a fun and engaging environment. These activities include Tai Chi, Line Dancing, Move It or Lose It, Zumba, Walking Group, and Indoor Bowls. Additionally, they run regular healthy living initiatives throughout the year such as Community Lunches, Healthy Living lectures and a dementia support group. The Trust coordinator role is key to the success of the trust. They are responsible for planning and managing the timetable of the programmes, finding suitable instructors and presenters.

Many of the programmes and topics for the lectures are suggested by attendees, creating a greater sense of ownership and community within the Trust. Examples of lecture topics include sustainability, keeping safe in community and at home and Civil Defence preparedness. Weekly attendances for classes have been regularly averaging over 200 highlighting the local and value WACST has to the community.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Rationale for staff recommendation:

- The Trust provides essential community-based services that improve wellbeing and enriches the lives of their participants.
- They work to a low cost to user model ensuring that their classes and activities are accessible and affordable for everyone.
- There is significant demand in this community for these programmes and activities.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

People who are restricted by income, disability, mental illness, addiction, homelessness, age, lack of friends, etc., from mainstream places of social activity (coffee shops, food courts in malls) have an affordable/free place where they can interact socially, make friends, engage in mutual support, seek help, and become the sort of people they want to be.

People of different backgrounds and demographics will connect and create a sense of belonging by volunteering or participating in community programmes offered.

Elderly, especially frail elderly, will benefit from the activities provided for them, namely, weekly Elder Care programmes at St Luke's and St Andrew's, and six-weekly foot clinics at St Faith's and St Andrew's. At the foot clinics, the mobility of the elderly is assisted; at the Elder Care groups, the ageing process is slowed through physical exercises, and fun activities that stimulate the mind.

Staff Assessment

This request is recommended as a Priority One due to its depth, reach, collaboration and value for money, and its close alignment with both Council and Community Board priorities.

Anglican Diocese of Christchurch – Parish of East Christchurch (the Parish) seeks funding to support Te Waka Aroha, a key community-based programme it delivers. Operating primarily from St Faith's in New Brighton, with additional activities at St Andrew's in North New Brighton and St Luke's in South Brighton. Te Waka Aroha community lounge is open Monday to Friday from 10am to 4pm, 48 weeks a year. It offers opportunities for socialising, skill-building, healthy meals, conversation over coffee, and volunteering. Participants include people on the margins particularly men living with addiction, mental illness, unemployment, or homelessness.

Weekly activities include music group, exercise class, craft club, elder care groups, Menz Shed, CAMEO (Come and Meet Each Other) and Te Reo for toddlers. The programme also operates a vegetable co-operative with around 80 members, supplying affordable fresh produce. This co-op also supports Compassion Trust with regular donations. A free weekly community lunch is offered and regularly attended by 40–50 tangata. Additionally, a foot clinic that's held every three weeks. The Parish further supports community wellbeing through its backing of the New Brighton Community Fridge and Pantry, located at St Faith's. The Parish provides electricity, houses one of the foodbank's freezers and acts as its umbrella organisation for funding purposes.

To deliver its initiatives, the Parish employs two community workers who together work a total of 40 hours per week. One serves as the Te Waka Aroha Manager, working 26 hours per week and overseeing the Information Centre based at St Faith's. The second works 14 hours per week coordinating the community lounge, vegetable co-op, and other tasks such as promotions and volunteer support.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project delivers high-impact, low-barrier services such as free meals, health clinics, social activities, and access to affordable food while leveraging volunteers and existing infrastructure, making it a cost-effective and sustainable investment in community resilience. Te Waka Aroha provides inclusive, community-led support for vulnerable and isolated individuals, including those experiencing addiction, mental illness, unemployment, and homelessness helping them build connection, purpose, and wellbeing in a safe, welcoming environment.

This project supports the Community Board plan under New Brighton Mall by positively contributing to Food Resilience in the New Brighton area. Kai security is a significant challenge for whānau and individuals, as the price of groceries increases. The Pātaka Kai (Fridge and Pantry) and Veggie Co-op directly address food insecurity for local communities. This project supports the New Brighton Safety Initiatives outlined in the Community Board Plan by providing essential support services to marginalised and vulnerable tangata and their whānau in New Brighton and the surrounding areas. The Te Waka Aroha Manager is an active member of the New Brighton Safety Partnership Group, contributing to collaborative efforts aimed at improving safety in the local community.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Increase engagement at the Centre:

The Centre is welcoming to all, regardless of culture or background, offering a safe space where people feel valued. Continuing to remain open to our public with staffed office hours will ensure vulnerable/isolated members of the community can engage with our programmes and we can refer to other services as required.

Increase in attendees of our events and programmes:

Continue to deliver free community events. Hosting 7 events annually brings community together, encourage socialisation, inclusivity, and connection. Running a programme of 18 workshops, groups, and programmes promote friendship, education, fitness, mental health, and self-confidence. These all help to reduce isolation, support positive growth, and empower individuals to build independence and resilience.

Increase advocating for local community:

Aim to provide a platform for our community to be heard. Encourage and support the community to engage with local issues, stay connected with council, conduct surveys, and encourage feedback. By removing barriers, this will help ensure everyone is heard and where possible the Centre can advocate on their behalf.

Staff Assessment

This request is recommended as Priority One due to its strong alignment to Council outcomes and priories, depth, and impact on the community.

The Bromley Community Centre (BCC) is a vital hub at the heart of the Bromley community, dedicated to meeting local needs by offering free or lowcost activities that support physical and mental wellbeing while creating welcoming spaces for connection and interaction.

BCC offers a diverse range of workshops and activities, including playgroup, exercise classes, stone carving, harakeke weaving, crochet, macramé, watercolour painting, and budget-friendly cooking. The Centre also collaborates with other organisations to expand its offerings—such as one-on-one computer tuition, after-school hip hop classes among others.

BCC plays an active role in the wider community as a key member of both the LinWard Collective and the Greater Linwood Forum, fostering strong partnerships and collaborative efforts across the Linwood area. In addition to their regular programmes BCC organises major community events that are annual highlights for the community, including the Bromley Fair, Matariki celebrations, outdoor movie and Christmas in the Brom. All of which are free or low-cost, ensuring accessibility for everyone.

The Centre also serves as a platform for community voices, encouraging feedback and participation on important local issues. The Trust Board acts as a strong advocate for Bromley residents, having engaged in initiatives such as the Bromley Traffic Project, the Organic Processing Plant relocation, and the upgrade of assets within Cypress Reserve.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The centre is a vital community asset that is well utilised and offers low cost, well utilised activities and facility hire in the heart of the local community. BCC aim to keep their fees and charges as low as possible to ensure that the local community can access all of its spaces and programmes. The Centre staff are key to ensuring that these programmes and the facility continue to operate.

BCC is one of the few community bumping spaces in the Bromley Area. This helps foster social connection and interaction as well as providing the platform for people to recreate and be creative.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

The club will track a range of measures to assess the success of our proposed project. This includes recording the number of registered players, coaches, referees, volunteers and community members involved in club activities. The club will monitor the number and type of programmes and events delivered and compare participation numbers against previous years to identify growth.

Volunteer engagement will be tracked by recording the number of active volunteers supporting the club and its events. We will also gather feedback through surveys and informal conversations to understand their experiences, sense of connection, and personal outcomes from being involved.

To measure diversity, we will monitor participant demographics across age, gender, ethnicity, and ability, aiming to increase representation and ensure inclusivity. These insights will help the club evaluate the effectiveness of the clubs initiatives in promoting active lifestyles, building community connections, and providing meaningful opportunities for all.

Membership stats and qualitative feedback will provide a clear picture of the clubs progress towards building a thriving, inclusive, and resilient club for the people of EERLC, Aranui and neighbouring communities.

Staff Assessment

This request is recommended as a Priority One due to its community reach, collaboration and value for money, and its close alignment with both Council and the Community Board priority - Aranui/Wainoni Safety.

Eastern Eagles Rugby League Club provides tamariki and rangatahi and adults with the opportunity to train, play, coach, administer, and support rugby league in eastern suburbs. The season runs from April to September with teams training at Wainoni Park and home games on Saturdays. The club also provides preseason fitness and skills training for all ages including the whole whanau. Eastern Eagles provides a positive influence within the suburbs of Aranui, Wainoni, Burwood, Parklands, New Brighton, with a majority demographic of Māori and Pasifika peoples living locally. It is a significant and successful community sport provider that encourages positive use of Wainoni Park for all ages/grades, supporters and the public. Eastern Eagles are seeking operational funding support which is essential for the club to maintain and develop quality programs, events, and safe sporting environments. This includes covering costs such as venue hire, equipment, referee fees, first aid training and equipment, whanau days, player affiliation fees and team entry fees, end of season prizegiving events and trophies for prizegiving.

The club anticipate membership of approximately 450 to 500 for the 2025/26 season for playing members from juniors to prems with up to 190 of those being junior and youth players. The Club is striving to maintain and grow their membership whilst addressing the cost of living challenges facing their community and the cessation of Te Kiwa funding. With a focus on whanau well-being and hauora, the Club helps to bring the community together, builds a strong sense of belonging, develops skills, keeps people active, gives people opportunities to volunteer, and meets expressed interests and needs within their community. Eastern Eagles' vision is to see a thriving, sustainable club that can field all grades while providing equal opportunities for every player, volunteer, and whānau member. Through partnerships, collaboration, and upholding our values of Accountability, Culture, Financial Security, and Effective Communication, we strive to meet the diverse needs of our community with integrity and mana.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project aligns strongly with the Strengthening Communities Together and Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy.

The grant will directly impact the provision of local community sport reducing barriers to participation

The club attracts a high percentage of Maori and Pasifika players.

The club promotes the participation of tamariki, rangatahi and women in sport and also aligns with Sport NZ strategy to provide more opportunities to engage and retain female youth in sport and physical recreation

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

The New Brighton Community Gardens Trust (NBCG) will continue to be a thriving organic garden that models environmental sustainability through recycling, composting, and the use of freely available coastal resources.

NBCG will support people with disabilities and collaborates with organisations such as Allendale, Ferndale, Te Otu Mātua, and Kingslea to provide a welcoming space where individuals can experience growth and joy.

NBCG will continue to manage the Sensory Garden for young people with special needs and will encourages their involvement in the wider NBCG community.

NBCG will continue to work in partnership with Corrections and Police to support low-risk, first-time, and youth offenders, many of whom have limited opportunities to feel valued and connected to their community.

Staff Assessment

The New Brighton Community Gardens Trust (NBCG) has operated at Rawhiti Domain since 2005. It maintains a thriving organic garden that models environmental sustainability through recycling, composting, and use of freely available coastal resources. Open four days a week, the gardens are also accessible by request for educators, community groups, and members of the public. NBCG is an inclusive and safe space where everyone is respected, valued, and heard. It brings together people of diverse backgrounds to participate in shared activities with a common purpose.

Unlike traditional volunteer models, NBCG focuses on working with clients, supporting individuals to feel valued, adopt healthier lifestyles, reduce isolation, and build confidence. This approach contributes to improved wellbeing and stronger, more connected communities. Clients may participate independently or as part of a group. NBCG provides a range of initiatives to support diverse community needs. It supports people with disabilities through a purpose-built, wheelchair-accessible garden and partnerships with organisations. It also maintains a dedicated Sensory Garden for children with disabilities and their families. An 8-week winter programme for local schools engaged 95 children in 2024. NBCG also works with Corrections to support low-risk, first-time, and youth offenders. Each year, it hosts a popular open day, giving the wider community a chance to connect and purchase organic seedlings.

In 2024 alone, NBCG has worked with 4,783 clients. Staff record daily interactions and participant information in a diary, which is later transferred to a reporting spreadsheet. This data feeds into NBCG's Annual Report, helping to identify community needs and ensuring the garden remains a welcoming, respectful, and mentally supportive environment.

NBCG is seeking funding to support operational costs, specifically wages for its three essential staff members: a Sensory Garden Assistant (15 hours/week), a Garden Manager (33 hours/week), and a Funding and Administration Manager (20 hours/week).

Rationale for staff recommendation

This project supports New Brighton Safety Initiatives in the Community Board Plan by helping make Rawhiti Domain more welcoming and safe, aligning with CPTED recommendations from the 2025 report.

This project also supports the Community Board plan under New Brighton Mall by positively contributing to Food Resilience in the New Brighton area.

NBCG is a well-established and trusted organisation delivering significant community benefit, particularly for marginalised groups who often face barriers to inclusion and wellbeing.

Our programs are built to fit the individuals that use them, catering to all levels of skill and prioritizing accessibility for all.

Positive growth in clients confidence and independence:

We'll see noticeable improvements in how clients interact with others, express themselves and take initiative. Through individual goal setting and progress tracking, clients will develop stronger communication skills, improved social interaction and greater self-reliance in day to day activities.

Increased wellbeing and sense of belonging:

The activities and programmes will support both mental and physical wellbeing, helping each individual to feel more connected and valued within the wider community.

Staff Assessment

Helen Anderson Trust (HAT) is a Christchurch-based day service that provides a safe, inclusive, and supportive environment for adults with intellectual and physical disabilities and those on the autism spectrum. For over 30 years, the Trust has delivered personalised, goal-driven programmes that encourage independence, promote skill-building, and foster meaningful community connections.

HAT is currently seeking funding to extend the hours of the Activities and Programme Coordinator role. This position is pivotal in planning, coordinating, and delivering a range of key initiatives, including the Helen Anderson Trust Choir, community gardening projects, social events, and the Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DoFE) camps. The coordinator will also provide administrative support for individualised, goal-based programmes aligned with client needs.

This additional staffing capacity will enhance the structure and delivery of services, broaden opportunities for engagement, and strengthen HAT's responsiveness to the evolving needs of clients and their whānau. By supporting this role, the Trust can continue offering person-centred activities that contribute to greater social connection, improved communication, confidence, and overall wellbeing.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Hillary Award, alongside HAT's adapted "Believe and Achieve" programme for those over 25, plays a central role in the Trust's service delivery. These programmes focus on personal development through volunteering, skill-building, physical activity, and adventure-based challenges. The Trust has seen a marked increase in participation, prompting the need for additional coordination to maintain programme quality and ensure alignment with Enabling Good Lives principles.

Helen Anderson Trust is committed to equity, inclusion, and empowering individuals to lead fulfilling lives. Investing in this role is an investment in the ongoing success and impact of their mission-driven work.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The Trust is currently the only day service disability provider in Christchurch that is offering these programmes.

This work promotes lifelong learning through unique experiences that would otherwise not be available

Staff Assessment

He Waka Tapu is a kaupapa Māori, non-government organisation based in East Ōtautahi offering free services in Alcohol and Other Drugs, Family Harm, Hauora, and community support, including a tinana community gym. Guided by the whakataukī "Me mahi tahi tātou mō te oranga o te whānau" (Working together for the wellness of family), their mission is to be the go-to place for practical knowledge about whānau wellbeing.

Over the past two years, He Waka Tapu has worked to strengthen relationships with whaiora and the wider community by delivering inclusive, cost-free whānau events. Since 2023, these events attracted whanau from across the east of the city, with numbers growing year on year with increasing diversity and at least 60 volunteers involved in delivering the events. In the 25/26 funding year, they plan to host four major Whānau Days—Pae Ora, Christmas, Easter, and Matariki—offering kai and engaging activities for tamariki and rangatahi, all designed to reflect the organisation's values of manaakitanga, whanaungatanga, and rangatiratanga.

These events aim to remove financial barriers, support cultural identity, and promote wellbeing through Te Whare Tapa Whā by enhancing taha tinana, wairua, hinengaro, and whānau.

He Waka Tapu's approach ensures that each event is more than just a celebration, it is an opportunity for whānau to reconnect, heal, and thrive. By creating consistent, accessible spaces for community connection and cultural expression, the organisation continues to empower whaiora and build a stronger, more inclusive Ōtautahi. These Whānau Days represent a vital part of He Waka Tapu's ongoing commitment to uplift whānau wellbeing through practical, meaningful, and culturally grounded experiences.

Rationale for staff recommendation

They are offering a valuable and cost-effective service to the community, especially to marginalised and vulnerable tangata and their whanau. They are actively seeking to build and maintain collaborative working relationships with partner organisations.

These events will provide valuable opportunities for community to gather and meet creating stronger connected communities.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Compassion Trust aims to provide over 1,000 financial mentoring sessions this year, while continuing to offer its regular Community Lunches and Coffee & Chat sessions.

Clients report reduced stress at home and a renewed ability to work towards personal goals. After partnering with a budget mentor, most clients make meaningful progress in paying off debt and feel more confident in their ability to meet daily needs. In many cases, clients are referred to other organisations, enabling access to services that improve the overall circumstances of their families.

The organisation's fortnightly Community Lunch provides a welcoming space for inclusion and companionship over a hot meal, open to all members of the community. It offers a sense of belonging, particularly for those who are elderly, lonely, or isolated.

At the weekly Coffee & Chat sessions, community members come together for social connection and informal conversation. Food is often available for participants to take home, helping to ease the pressure of weekly grocery expenses, thanks to a partnership with Kairos Food Rescue.

Staff Assessment

Compassion Trust is a free financial mentoring service based at Grace Vineyard Christian Fellowship in New Brighton. The service supports individuals and families in the local community to address financial challenges and work toward long-term financial stability. Funding is sought to support operational costs associated with financial mentoring and community care programmes. Financial mentors work directly with each client to assess their current financial situation and develop realistic, achievable goals to reduce debt and build financial independence. Support includes liaising with banks, finance companies, negotiate manageable repayment plans, and completing KiwiSaver Hardship applications. Where appropriate, referrals are made to other organisations for additional support.

Throughout the year, Compassion Trust delivers group-based courses focused on basic money management and wise financial decision-making. The Trust also operates several community care initiatives, including a fortnightly Community Lunch for individuals experiencing loneliness, or vulnerability, and a weekly Coffee and Chat group. Food parcels are provided to clients engaging in financial mentoring to support immediate needs while long-term solutions are developed. Client feedback frequently highlights a marked improvement in mental wellbeing after engaging with Compassion Trust services. Many report reduced stress in the home environment and an increased sense of confidence to begin working toward financial goals. Significant progress is often made in reducing debt and increasing financial capability. Referrals to organisations further enhance support by addressing wider household needs.

The 'Client Voices' CRM system tracks client demographics, goals, and progress, including age, family structure, income, housing, debt, and referral source. Both clients and mentors complete evaluations to measure the impact of financial mentoring. Data is also collected on staff and volunteer hours, and attendance at financial education sessions, Community Lunches, and Coffee & Chat mornings. These insights help assess the reach and effectiveness of support services, particularly for vulnerable individuals.

Rationale for staff recommendation

This project supports New Brighton Safety Initiatives in the Community Board Plan by providing essential support services for marginalised and vulnerable tangata and their whānau in the New Brighton and surrounding areas. The Trust works closely with a number of other services based in New Brighton and in the wider area including housing and local rental agencies, the Ministry of Social Development, Comcare, Vision West, Cancer Society, Youth Alive Trust and food network agencies to provide an holistic service to individuals and families with in the community.

For the past eight years, Compassion Trust received contract funding from the Ministry of Social Development for Financial Mentoring and Budgeting services. This funding ceased on 31 March 2024 and was not renewed for 2024/2025, creating a gap in the operating budget. Compassion Trust is now fully reliant on grants and donations to continue delivering programmes and services to the community. Continued funding will enable Compassion Trust to deliver essential financial and community care services, equipping individuals and families with tools and guidance to achieve greater stability and wellbeing.

Provide lighting, cooking, chilling and most importantly heating over the winter months to bowling club members, RSA members and community members.

Providing a warm and inviting atmosphere. Power costs have increased significantly over the last year and the Club are actively looking at ways to reduce costs including options for solar panels in future.

Staff Assessment

The New Brighton Bowling Club is a community-oriented sports club located on Mafeking Street, New Brighton. The club provides a range of activities including lawn bowls, indoor bowls, snooker and darts, social events and community outreach programmes.

In 2025 the club celebrated 111 years and received Bowling Club of the Year award from Canterbury Bowls. The Club has a Level 1 Umpire, two Measuring Umpires and are in the process of getting a coach, which will be a first for the club. Membership is open to individuals of all ages and skill levels, fostering a sense of belonging and encouraging participation from the wider community. Full playing members pay \$210 pa, limited playing members pay \$90 pa and first year members pay \$50.

The club has a well-maintained bowling green that is maintained by a dedicated Greenkeeper. They have hosted Bowls New Zealand National tournaments and Bowls Canterbury women's champion tournament along with interclub games. The clubhouse offering members a comfortable environment to relax and socialise after a game and modern amenities for hosting community events, private functions, and competitions. The New Brighton RSA came to share the Clubs facilities after their club was destroyed in the 2010 Canterbury earthquakes.

Funding is to ensure members are socially and actively engaged, having access to fit for purpose facilities means they will be able to meet socially, play indoor bowls in the winter months and to provide a warm and welcoming environment for new and existing members. Some of the clubs elderly members live alone and its really important for them to have a social connection. Winter presents challenges for participation and social connections especially when it's cold, dark and wet. The Club is investigating options for alternative energy use as energy costs are forecast to increase.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

The club will be able to continue its growth in engagement and opportunities for its members, local schools, and tamariki as co-curriculum support, as well as within the Parklands and Queenspark community. In 2024-25, a 34% increase was observed, reaching 1,281 members as a result of this type of engagement. The club aims to continue this growth by an additional 10%.

There will be greater activation of the current club facilities, along with sports and recreation facilities within the Parklands and Queenspark community.

The club will create opportunities for minority groups, as outlined by SportsNZ, by providing affordable programmes for lower socio-economic areas, girls, and women. Currently, 32.5% of its membership identify as female, and fewer than 10% belong to a minority ethnicity group. This funding will help provide opportunities and programmes targeted specifically at these groups. The target outcome is to increase female membership to 40% and ethnic minority membership to at least 15%.

Staff Assessment

Parklands United Sports Club Incorporated (PUSCI) based at 75 Queenspark Drive, operating independently within the Parklands Community Centre building. As a year-round community sports hub, PUSCI offers Football and Netball in winter, and Cricket and Touch in summer.

PUSCI is seeking funding to support the wages of the full time Operations Manager, a role vital to the coordination of all club activities. Responsibilities include volunteer coordination, day-to-day operations, supporting each sporting code, overall administration, and delivery of club-based initiatives.

Since the introduction of the Operations Manager role in 2024, community engagement has significantly increased. The club has expanded affordable programmes for whānau, promoting physical and mental wellbeing through active lifestyles. Between 2024 and 2025, membership grew by 11% in Netball, 21% in Touch, 31% in Football, and 110% in Cricket. Overall membership rose by 34%, reaching 1,281 members.

Beyond core sports, PUSCI now delivers wider community services such as holiday programmes, local events like Street Football, preschool-aged programmes, and participation in initiatives like Parklands at Play.

PUSCI has expanded its use and activation of local facilities, including Parklands Reserve, Parklands Community Centre, Queenspark Reserve and Courts, Broadhaven Reserve, QE2 Fields, and Avondale Park. In addition to this growth, the club actively advocates for improved, inclusive, and accessible spaces to better serve the needs of the Parklands and Queenspark communities.

Rationale for staff recommendation

This project aligns with the Community Board Plan under New Brighton Safety Initiatives by contributing positively to youth engagement in the Parklands area.

PUSCI operates under a hub model that delivers a range of positive outcomes for the community. This approach enables the efficient use of shared resources and facilities, fosters collaboration across sporting codes and community groups, and strengthens community engagement by creating a central, accessible space for inclusive sport and recreation opportunities.

Funding support will enable PUSCI to continue this growth and provide affordable, high-quality sport and recreation experiences for the Parklands and Queenspark communities particularly important during a time of increasing financial pressure on whānau.

Staff Assessment

Queenspark Community Trust (QCT) was established in 1994 and is dedicated to fostering connected and thriving lives within the local Parklands and Queenspark communities. QCT achieves this through a range of programmes and activities to meet the diverse needs of the community. Current QCT programmes include Move n Groove sessions, community events, Mums n Bubs, craft groups, Thursday morning tea, foot clinics, weekly youth drop-in centre, 24/7 youth workers, and Queenspark Kids Programme an after-school initiative. These programmes operate on a regular schedule, coordinated by the Trust's Children and Family Coordinator and Youth Workers, who provide leadership to volunteers supporting the activities.

Participants build meaningful connections through these activities, forming a sense of community with others facing similar life circumstances. Whether seeking friendship, shared experiences, or support through life's challenges, individuals are welcomed into an inclusive environment. Programmes are supported by approachable and compassionate staff and volunteers.

Across QCT's programmes, in 2024 there were approximately 19,100 instances of attendance, involving 620 unique participants. QCT delivered 193 events, contributing to a total of 933 events held across QCT initiatives.

In addition, QCT's Youth Worker Coordinator leads the Parklands/Queenspark Network, established to bring together key local groups in the area. The network fosters collaboration and mutual support, enabling these groups to work collectively on community projects. One key project arising from this network is the ParkLife newsletter, which highlights positive developments and events happening in Parklands.

QCT is seeking funding to support wages for four key staff roles, totalling 48 hours per week. These roles include the Trust Manager (4 hours per week), Youth Coordinator (18 hours), Family Coordinator (15 hours), and Youth Worker (11 hours). The Family Coordinator role has increased by an additional 5 hours per week to enable the planning and delivery of more community events.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Funding this project supports an organisation that has a proactive approach to identifying community needs and delivering effective programmes that directly address and support those needs.

The strength and impact of the volunteers involved are greatly enhanced by the support provided by staff, creating a collaborative environment essential for the success of the programmes.

This project aligns with the Community Board Plan under New Brighton Safety Initiatives, by contributing to safer, more connected youth engagement in the Parklands area.

Have a Youth Worker complete 10 hours a week. Supporting students with a consistent and positive role model. Listening, supporting and walking alongside the 380 students at Parkview Pārua School.

Staff Assessment

La Vida Youth Trust (LVYT) is a community-based organisation committed to empowering young people. LVYT works with a diverse range of youth from various ethnic and cultural backgrounds through school partnerships and tailored programmes. LVYT places strong emphasis on inclusivity, striving to meet cultural and language needs wherever possible.

LVYT's work focuses on building positive relationships, fostering identity and belonging, and addressing challenges such as anti-social behaviour and social isolation. Staff and volunteers serve as consistent, positive role models, offering young people safe and meaningful opportunities to connect. Taking a holistic approach to wellbeing, LVYT supports not only the practical needs of youth but also their mental, emotional, social, and spiritual development. Through a combination of practical care, emotional support, and advocacy, a welcoming environment is created where young people feel accepted, supported, and equipped for the future.

LVYT is seeking funding to continue two core programmes: the QE2 Youth Drop-in Centre and the 24-7 Youth Worker role at Parkview Pārua School. The QE2 Youth Drop-in Centre operates on Friday nights and serves intermediate and high school-aged youth. It provides a safe, welcoming space for young people to gather after school, connect with peers, and take part in activities such as basketball, volleyball, table tennis, and other games, alongside sharing a meal. On average, around 52 young people attend each week.

The 24-7 Youth Worker, based at Parkview Pārua School for 10 hours per week. Following the 24-7 Youthwork model, this role focuses on building consistent, long-term relationships with students through listening, encouragement, and ongoing support. The youth worker helps students develop positive connections with peers, teachers, and external services, while empowering them to contribute positively to their communities. Support is offered to all students, including those at risk and those in leadership roles, with guidance tailored to individual needs.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Providing a 24-7 Youth Worker at Parkview Pārua School helps reduce anti-social behaviour, which is regularly reported in the Parklands area. The presence of a consistent, trusted adult supports positive student engagement and early intervention.

The QEII Youth Drop-in Centre promotes positive social interaction and offers a safe, inclusive space for young people to connect, build friendships, and strengthen community ties.

La Vida Youth Trust supports youth in forming meaningful relationships, developing a strong sense of identity and belonging, and addressing social isolation and anti-social behaviour.

This project aligns with the Community Board Plan under New Brighton Safety Initiatives, by contributing to safer, more connected youth engagement in the Parklands area.

Staff Assessment

The Salvation Army New Zealand Trust is an international movement providing services to more than 120,000 New Zealand families and individuals in desperate need each year. They operate an office and Community Centre at 177 Linwood Avenue from which they provide frontline service, offering a multi-disciplinary approach, working to address clients' emergency needs as well as underlying issues by providing immediate, compassionate support to those experiencing food insecurity, financial hardship and social isolation. By providing a safe, welcoming space where all individuals, regardless of background, are treated with dignity and respect the Trust support people from diverse communities ensuring they have access to essential services and opportunities to thrive.

The Trust is seeking funding towards equipment and materials to sustain and strengthen their ongoing services in Linwood Community Ministries. They employ a Navigator who is employed to offer one-on- one support, advocacy and connection to a network of services including financial mentoring social work and life-skills programmes. The Navigators work with people to encourage them to create some goals, taking an active role in shaping their lives, making informed decisions and being able to access the tools and services they need to move forward with more confidence. The role also includes coordinating a range of activities which include a walking group, BYO women's craft group and Coffee 'n Colour.

The Community Hub at Linwood support around 200 individuals and families in Linwood by providing immediate food assistance and wrap-around support, aiming to reduce the impact of poverty and ensure more people can meet their basic needs with dignity. This, in turn helps to protect the environment by rescuing edible food that would otherwise end up in landfill.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Linwood Community Ministries operate a Community Centre from where they operate a frontline service providing immediate food assistance and wrap-around support.

The locally provided service is well utilised and has had an increase in demand with the impacts of rising cost of living.

By providing accessible and immediate support through their drop-in service Linwood Community Ministries positively contributes to some of the communities most vulnerable tangata, helping to reduce the impact of poverty and ensure more people can meet their basic needs with dignity.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

- 1. Volunteer participation: Establish a volunteer crew of 3-4 people to help develop the systems and structures needed to make this a permanent, aesthetically pleasing maara kai for the community of Pā Whakaoranga to engage in. The project also allows for networking with other community groups doing similar work, encouraging resource & knowledge sharing, peer support and inspiration spread amongst providers.
- 2. Opportunity for learning: Organise workshops for community to participate in, that will build confidence, knowledge and skill towards being more self-sufficient in terms of kai. Workshops will give people from all generations the space and time to gain and share experiences and mātauranga. Improved hauora (holistic wellbeing) and sense of belonging in community is expected for volunteers and community members.
- 3. Contribute to acts of manaakitanga(hospitality)

Having a thriving maara kai at Pā Whakaoranga enables us to gift produce to individuals, whānau & groups that engage with the hub on a regular basis. Contributing towards meals when hosting visitors, worship groups and cooking lessons within the crime prevention program can be more consistent.

Staff Assessment

Pā Whakaoranga is a new community hub located across two properties owned by the Presbyterian Church in Aranui. Before the recent reopening and renaming, this was Iona Presbyterian Church. The two properties wrap around the Mobil petrol station, on the corner of Pages Road & Breezes Road.

The Church was damaged in the 2011 earthquakes and were left this way until 2022 when members of the Alpine Presbyterian Board appointed two members to transform the site into a community hub and initiate some community programmes. There are several initiatives delivered from Pā Whakaoranga, including a crime prevention program for youth, a carving studio (limestone and wood) and outreach services. The most recent development has been to establish a maara kai which works towards solutions for local whānau and individuals, that attempt to address food insecurity and poor health outcomes for families in the area. It is also a space to connect with the environment to improve mental health and spark mauri. Last year the Alpine Presbyterian Trust sponsored pea straw and 8m3 of soil. There was an existing garden that had become overgrown with twitch and agapanthus. With the help of volunteers and the rangatahi involved in their programs, the area was cleared and new beds built up.

Pā Whakaoranga loosely means 'a place for healing'. The connection between the whenua, identity and wellbeing is a key determinant in Māori wellbeing.

This application is seeking support towards establishing a seed raising area and greenhouse, a garden shed to keep tools locked away safely and building more raised beds, and compost system. Once this infrastructure in place the group can start to plan community workshops for whānau to learn and engage with growing produce, preparing food and understanding nutrition.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The application strongly aligns with the Community Board Plan Priority Aranui/Wainoni Safety Initiatives: Partner with key local organisations who work with tamariki and rangatahi to provide opportunities for pro-social activities and events.

Food security continues to be a significant challenge facing communities in the East. This project aims to address food insecurity and poor health outcomes in the area through the development of a maara kia based at Pā Whakaoranga Community hub.

Through providing educational workshops and access to a local community garden, the group are providing opportunities to develop skills in growing kai, increasing household capability in food preparation and increasing understanding of nutrition. This provision helps to support community in living healthy lives, having a positive impacts at an intergenerational level.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Increased Participation and Skill Development: The project will enable the continued operation of a safe, inclusive gym environment where participants of all ages and abilitie can learn the fundamentals of amateur boxing. Through structured classes and individual goal-setting tools like athlete goal books, members will develop discipline, fitness, and personal resilience.

A Safe, Supportive, and Inclusive Space: Woolston Boxing Club will continue to provide a positive, controlled space where individuals from diverse backgrounds, including those involved in reintegration programmes such as Waipuna, can engage in sport. The Club's focus is on respect, equality, and teamwork promotes community safety and personal growth.

Sustainable Growth and Community Impact: The Club's success is reflected in continued community engagement and increasing interest in our programmes. Funding will allow the Woolston Boxing to maintain high-quality equipment and administrative support, helping provide consistent, safe, and welcoming services to a growing number of participants.

Staff Assessment

Woolston Boxing Club, established in 1967, is based at The Woolston Club and provides a supportive environment for people living in a low-income area with a particular focus on junior participants.

The Club welcomes rangatahi into their beginner classes each school term and manage senior class numbers to maintain safe group sizes. With a passionate team and strong community ties, the Club has a rich legacy in New Zealand boxing and continues to be a place of growth, mentorship, and discipline for rangatahi in the Woolston community, instilling values such as commitment, self-discipline, and respect while creating a safe, structured, and inclusive environment.

Woolston Boxing are seeking funding towards purchasing replacement sets of gloves and head gear which are critical to upholding safety standards during training and competition. This equipment is heavily used and must be regularly updated to ensure their members are protected. This is an expense which many families are unable to afford and so the club stock these items to ensure all members can participate and train safety. The Club are also applying for support toward the wages for their club secretary, a vital role that ensures the smooth and compliant day-to-day running of operations. The role includes managing memberships, coordinating events, supporting communication with members and families, and overseeing administration that enables our coaches to focus on training delivery.

Woolston Boxing has a 'turn no one away' policy and does not push payment on any of their members, recognizing that some cannot afford the membership fee. The Club works closely with Canterbury Boxing to run regular development camps for youth over weekends leading up to the national competition. They also host positive intervention programmes with Waipuna and CAYAD (Community Action Youth and Drugs) to strengthen the opportunities available to young people in the community.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The club provides a valuable long-standing service within the Woolston community, offering affordable boxing opportunities which help to develop transferable life skills and positive healthy lifestyles for tamariki and rangatahi.

Given the financial barriers faced by many families in the Woolston community, the club provides this gear at no cost to ensure all young people have the opportunity to participate in the sport safely and confidently.

A grant for funding will enable to Club to continue to grow, sustain a safe training environment, and deliver positive outcomes through sport.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Stronger community partnerships with local businesses and organisations contribute to residents developing a sense of belonging to an engaged and motivated community. People feel safer and more connected to others and to the places within their local area.

Staff Assessment

The Waimairi Beach Residents Association (WBRA) is a passionate, volunteer-led group dedicated to fostering a strong, inclusive, and close-knit community. As the official liaison for the subdivision, WBRA keeps residents informed about local issues and provides a platform for voicing concerns. With diverse backgrounds and skills, board members work collaboratively to build neighbourhood connections, host quality community events, and lead by example to create meaningful, positive change.

WBRA is seeking funding to support its AGM costs, annual Community Christmas Party, volunteer recognition efforts, website fees, and flyer distribution.

These initiatives aim to strengthen social connections and foster a greater sense of belonging, especially for residents who are new to the area. Feedback from informal conversations, listening sessions, and past events indicates a strong desire among residents for more opportunities to connect, share experiences, and feel part of something meaningful.

By engaging with their local organisation, residents gain access to support, resources, and opportunities that can enhance their quality of life. This initiative is expected to reduce isolation and increase community engagement, providing regular chances for residents to meet others, build friendships, and develop a stronger sense of community.

As involvement grows, residents are likely to become more confident and empowered—developing new skills, sharing ideas, and playing an active role in shaping their neighbourhood. They will feel more supported—whether through emotional encouragement, practical help, or simply the reassurance of a local network they can rely on. Ultimately, this engagement can inspire residents to participate in community activities, volunteer, or even lead their own initiatives in the future.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The WBRA offer tailored information, activities, and events for residents in the Waimairi Beach area.

A funding grant will enable the WBRA to continue to maintain the website and provide their annual Christmas event to help keep local residents informed and build connection.

The project contributes to the implementation of the Waitai Community Board Plan priority of New Brighton Safety Initiatives; by supporting local events aimed at bringing the community together.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

The club expect over 500 participants aged 4 to 65 to take part in their football programmes across the 2025/26 season, with a focus on growing numbers from last year—particularly in youth, women's, and underserved groups. By keeping costs low and providing support to those in need, the club aim to reduce barriers and increase both total participation and diversity across age, gender, and background.

The club will deliver over 20 team programmes and multiple seasonal events, including community tournaments and development clinics. With strong operational support, they anticipate an increase in both the number and quality of events offered compared to last year. The club also expect to engage at least 40 volunteers in coaching, management, and event delivery—many of whom are parents and past players, contributing to a strong community-led culture.

Participants will benefit through improved physical activity levels, confidence, and social connection. The Clubs youth programmes, in particular, foster leadership and life skills. With structured support and inclusive environments, players build resilience, friendships, and a strong sense of belonging.

Staff Assessment

Coastal Spirit is a football club based in the eastern suburbs of Christchurch, catering for male and female players from age 4 to 65 in beginners, social and elite players. The Club is based at fields on Cuthberts Green and Linfield with office space at Linfield Sports on Kearneys Road. The clubs kaupapa is the vision of a football club where every individual feels valued, supported, and able to thrive—on and off the field.

The Club has players of all ages playing in teams on Saturday's and Sunday's in Men's, Women's and Junior competitions. They have player pathways firmly established by a full-time Football Development Manager, for performance as well as participation athletes.

Funding will directly support coaching wages, essential equipment, and operational infrastructure. These components are vital to the successful delivery of safe, high-quality programmes. The clubs Operations Manager is central to this, overseeing logistics, communications, and the coordination of training, matches, and events—ensuring a smooth and supportive experience for all participants.

The clubs commitment to inclusion is demonstrated through strong female participation and dedicated youth development initiatives. These programmes help build confidence, leadership, and important life skills in young players. They are also focused on maintaining affordability and provide equipment and financial support for families facing hardship, ensuring no one is left on the sidelines due to cost.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The programmes strongly align with the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy and Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy

Providing funding assistance for their programmes will allow the Club to keep its activities affordable and accessible by breaking down any financial barriers to participation and direct their funds to other essential club expenses such as sporting equipment.

The club rely on over 40 volunteers to support the delivery of weekly training sessions and games for all ages with over 40 volunteer supporting delivery including coaches and team managers.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Continue engaging with a diverse range of vulnerable/marginalised people in our community, in a safe space of creative connection. In 2025-2026 we are aiming to engage with around 185 people.

Provide a supportive community for our art group members who are struggling with socia exclusion, addictions, and mental health issues. We are planning to run eight regular groups, as well as one-to-ones, at our studio throughout the year.

Empower our art group members to connect with the community through the arts and develop a stronger sense of identity. This year we have plans for collaborations with community art studios and libraries, as well as two public workshops.

Staff Assessment

Established in 2014, Art-East is an award-winning community support initiative that emerged from Drug-ARM Christchurch. It was created to provide a safe, inclusive space for individuals facing addiction, mental health challenges, social isolation, and exclusion. Over time the programme has grown significantly receiving national recognition, including the 2021 Te Putanga Toi Arts Access Holdsworth Creative Space Award and funding from Manatū Taonga's Creative Spaces Initiative.

Art-East helps individuals discover their creativity in a safe and supportive environment, offering a pathway to hope and self-worth. Many participants arrive feeling marginalised and disconnected, but through art and community, they begin their journey toward healing and reconnection. The programme operates without barriers, offering long-term, holistic support built on mutual respect and trust.

Participants range in age from 12 to 65+ with a diverse demographic made up of approximately 25% Māori, 40% Pākehā, 10% Pasifika, and 25% other ethnicities. Many experience neurodiversity (including ADHD, ADD, and ASD), financial hardship, trauma, mental illness, or histories of institutionalisation, homelessness or involvement in the justice system.

Art-East's services are in steady demand, largely through self and agency referrals. The team works closely with other organisations, adapting as needed to remain relevant and accessible. Many who come to Art-East have struggled to engage with mainstream services and are at risk of being overlooked. By offering consistent, compassionate support, Art-East plays a vital role in reconnecting individuals with themselves and their communities.

Rationale for staff recommendation

This project engages with some of the most marginalised and disenfranchised groups in the community.

The project aligns with the People pillar of the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy, particularly the objective of harness the strengths of diverse communities and address issues of social exclusion.

Whānau and tamariki will enjoy a fun afternoon supporting and engaging with one another while enjoying a sense of community as neighbours.

The community will have an opportunity to celebrate where they live with others and strengthen their sense of belonging and pride for Spencerville.

Staff Assessment

Spencerville Residents Association (SRA) have been operating since 1957. As well as representing their community and acting as liaison to the Council, their mahi includes several projects which aim to enhance the well-being of the community and environment in the Spencerville area.

SRA run a community Facebook Page and produce and distribute the Styx Post community newsletter. Both these are used to share news and updates, keep people informed, advertise local businesses and connect with those who are less active or visible within the community. They also have a Predator Control Group who have been working on setting up, monitoring and maintaining trapping lines along the river and lagoon in Spencerville and Brooklands.

SRA's River Clean-Up and Fun Day has been an annual event in the community for many years. It starts with the community helping out with a two hour clean up along the Pūharakekenui. The Clean-up is followed by an annual duck race assisted by volunteers from the Spencerville Surf Club. Community members can buy and decorate a duck in advance of the event making it a much anticipated, vibrant and exciting event for whānau. At the close of the day SRA hold their Gala at Spencerville Community Hub with a sausage sizzle, bouncy castle, water fun, crazy bikes, a children's entertainer and coffee cart. It is an opportunity for the Spencerville community to come together, celebrate the place they live and the community.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The annual Duck Race and Gala is a much anticipated, free community event, organised completely by volunteer committee members.

Facilitated and coordinated by the SRA, the event is a strong collaboration between local CCC Rangers (based at Bottle Lake Forest), Spencerville Volunteer Fire Brigade, and Spencerville Surf Life Saving Club.

For the small contribution towards the costs of running the event, SRA's annual Gala is a great example of what can be accomplished with local groups working together and taking a lead on their own community event.

Continue to offer opportunities for volunteering

Offer a monthly Kai Night for whānau to enjoy an affordable meal out together and giving parents a break from cooking.

Continue to connect our tamariki with their local community and strengthen their confidence through activities and play.

Provide opportunity to learn and increase confidence in the use of Te Reo Māori in everyday situations and conversation.

Staff Assessment

Linwood Avenue Community Corner Trust (LACCT) operates from the Union Church complex on the corner of Linwood Avenue and Tilford Street. It is a highly valued, well established, cost-effective local organisation offering a safe, warm and welcoming environment and a number of activities and services which are kept at minimal or no cost to participants. These include a range of emergency assistance, food parcels, support services and community activities to benefit all ages in Linwood, Bromley and Woolston areas. The trust runs a number of community programmes which included a Community Lunch, Games Café, Tai Chi, Gentle Exercise, Friendship Club, Girls Group, Craft Group. Family Kai Night and a Te Reo Māori Beginners Course.

These programmes and services are managed and overseen by the Community Coordinator who is responsible for supervising daily activities run by volunteers. The Trust relies on their 56 volunteers who give their time and expertise across the range of their programmes.

The Coordinator role also includes monitoring and evaluating programmes to ensure they continue to meet the needs of the participants and initiating new activities to adapt and respond to changing community needs.

The Trust is part of the LinWard Collective and are involved in on-going initiatives in collaboration with other organisations in the area. These include the Linwood Waterway working group (initiative from a clean-up event that their Girls Group delivered), the Domestic Bliss series, Hot Water Bottle Drive in support of the Blanket Bank and ReCreate events.

Funding is sought towards staff salaries, activity expenses and regular operating costs associated with programmes and services to suit all ages within a safe and welcoming environment and at reasonable cost to participants.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Linwood Avenue Community Corner Trust provides a welcoming space and offers a range of valuable services, activities and opportunities for connection for the local community.

The Trust is part of the LinWard Collective and work with the other organisations in the area to ensure that collectively, they are catering for all sectors of the community and offering a range of opportunities for residents to engage with.

The Trust continues to try new ways of engaging and reaching more people whilst adapting their programmes and services to the changing needs of the diverse communities they serve.

Staff Assessment

St Albans Sports Club are located in the heart of Woolston since moving from St Albans Park in 2023. The Club provide social and active well-being to the people of the Woolston community for sport or social activity. The Club have two outdoor greens with significant funds raised towards building Christchurch's first indoor green at their new location, a project endorsed by Bowls Canterbury. The greenskeeper is a full-time key role for the club to operate well, this is a skilled position requiring the expertise in using pesticides and insecticides. The greens are used for Canterbury Bowls competitions and the clubs own tournaments. The greens are mowed 5 times a week and cut 3 times and requires maintenance all year round. Our season goes for 8 months of the year, and its weather dependent. The Greenskeeper has a team of volunteers that help him throughout the season, with the majority of the maintenance doner in winter.

The club have been running a schools competition organised with three local schools (Te Waka Unua, Ngutu Awa and St Annes) during summer months. The children are absorbed in the sport as it less competitive and non-contact.

The club are undertaking a number of significant upgrades to their facilities including new toilet facilities and would also like to improve the lighting in the hall space and ultimately reduce the ongoing costs utilising new energy efficient lighting.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Strong alignment to Strengthening Communities Together Strategy and the Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy

The club have a well-established schools programme with a strong base and require the support to offer additional opportunities for potential new players to experience the game.

This project is about maintaining and increasing participation and providing opportunities for intergenerational connection.

This project would be viewed as low-risk high reward for the local community.

Participation increases among individuals previously identified as having low engagement in physical activity and recreation, supported by the provision of varied sport and physical activity options.

Enhanced Social Connectedness

Participants report stronger social bonds and a greater sense of belonging. Whānau and community members take part in intergenerational and cross-cultural activities, contributing to strengthened community ties.

Positive Behavioural Change

Participants show increased confidence, motivation, and knowledge related to maintaining an active lifestyle.

Improvements are observed in participants' physical and mental wellbeing.

Staff Assessment

The Pūkeko Centre Incorporated (PC) based at 30 Chadbury Street in Parklands. PC features a multi-use sport and recreation hall, pavilion, and two bowling greens. It's home to the Parklands Bowling Club and Parklands Junior Rugby Club and serves as a base for several other groups who regularly use the venue. The core aim of the Pūkeko Centre is to foster a connected, healthy, and vibrant community by providing accessible sport and recreation opportunities for people of all ages and abilities, both on-site and in the wider community.

The full-time Sport and Facilities Coordinator is responsible for the operations and management of the PC sports hall and other facilities that hosts a wide range of activities from local sports teams and school groups to birthday parties and baby showers. This facility has significantly expanded access to sport and recreation in the Parklands area, particularly for children and young people. Through locally delivered, low-cost programmes that require minimal transport, the PC reduces barriers to participation and supports broader community engagement in play, active recreation, and sport.

Funding for this project will support the coordinator to deliver and promote a range of community-based initiatives aimed at enhancing youth participation, connection, and wellbeing. This includes a boys' activity programme for ages 11–13, which focuses on building resilience, teamwork, and exposure to positive male role models. Alongside this, the "Girls Get Going" programme targets Years 7–10 and is designed to build confidence, self-esteem, and social skills through physical activity. A partnership with the Parklands Bowling Club also introduces school children to the inclusive and social sport of lawn bowls.

The coordinator also leads the delivery of the annual Parklands @ Play event, a celebration that brings the community together to showcase local groups, encourage participation, and strengthen connections across the area.

Rationale for staff recommendation

This project aligns with the Community Board Plan under New Brighton Safety Initiatives by contributing positively to youth engagement in the Parklands area.

The Pūkeko Centre provides inclusive, low-cost, and local sport and recreation opportunities that reduce barriers to participation and support the wellbeing, connection, and development of young people in the Parklands community.

Funding will support the ongoing delivery of targeted youth programmes and community events, as well as the effective management of a key community facility.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Provide opportunity for an average of 40+ volunteers to learn new skills, connect to others, mitigating social isolation.

Participants have a place where they can feel valued and appreciated, enhancing the mana of individuals who volunteer.

Support food resilience in Woolston and Linwood through the veggie share programme providing fresh, healthy produce at an affordable price.

Community have access to plot holdings to be able to grow their own produce

Provide a place of belonging for community to strengthen their whakapapa to the whenua.

Staff Assessment

Smith Street Community Farm is a charitable trust and the largest māra kai (food garden) in Ōtautahi, operating on one hectare of Council land adjacent to the Linwood offices at 180 Smith Street. The Trust grows and provides low-cost produce as part of their veggie shares programme, with support from Corrections and volunteers who harvest and maintain this part of the gardens. Another third of the gardens is dedicated to individual and group plot holding providing groups like Christchurch City Mission with a plot of land where they can grow and harvest produce. There are also parts of the gardens that are dedicated to being publicly accessible foraging areas designed to allow local community members to visit and harvest kai as they need it.

The Trust employ a Garden Manager who has oversight of the gardens, implementing the annual schedule of planting and harvesting to supply the veggie shares with produce as well as being on site to offer advice and support to plot holders, volunteers and manage the Community Work contract with Ara Poutama Aotearoa Department of Corrections. The Garden Manager is also responsible for all the day-to-day operations on site, health and safety, equipment and machinery upkeep and maintenance, record keeping, liaising with suppliers and visitors to the site.

The Trust have recently undergone a significant amount of change, with three members of the Trust stepping away and new members added, bringing fresh ideas and a wealth of experience and skills to the Board. Whilst this upheaval has been an unsettling time for the volunteers and Trustees at the gardens, the transition has bought about many positive outcomes, including a review of all operational and governance processes and the writing and implementation of robust policies and procedures.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Food security continues to be a significant challenge facing communities in the East. SSCFT is endeavouring to directly address this issue through their veggie shares programme by providing fresh seasonal produce at an affordable price to those who are already vulnerable and struggling to make ends meet.

It is evident from the reaction to recent challenges of the Trust earlier this year, that Smith Street Community Farm is greatly valued by the volunteers, plot holders and other stakeholders involved. The outpouring of well-wishes and number of people stepping up to bolster and assist the Trust when they reached out to the community is a testament to how much the gardens are valued and treasured.

The Trust are working through a strategic planning process with a view to increasing their revenue sources, consolidating and enhancing their communication channels and streamlining data collection and operational processes in order to work towards becoming financially sustainable over the next year. The Garden Manager is a key role in implementing these plans and so a grant towards the salary for this role will ensure they have the staff in place to coordinate the planting, harvesting farm maintenance and volunteer coordination to execute the operational functions of the strategic plan.

Continue to operate opening hours six days a week, providing a safe and inclusive space for all the local residents and anyone else who comes through our door.

Maintain a wide selection of books including fiction, nonfiction, children's and large print available for local community to access and borrow.

Continue to offer free WIFI and access to a computer, printer and scanner for local community to access.

Continue to offer regular activations including free shows for local whānau, weekly tamariki sessions, book sale and seasonal themed colouring competitions for community.

Staff Assessment

Woolston Community Library (WCL) is located at 689 Ferry Road in the heart of Woolston Village. It is open 6 days a week, 10am – 3pm Monday to Friday and 10am – 12pm on Saturdays providing a safe and inclusive space for Woolston residents and patrons from surrounding suburbs.

WCL have a core membership base, with new members joining every year. They recorded 1,312 users for their services, other than borrowing books, and have had 44 new members join since May 2024. Run by a small group of volunteers, the library includes a children's play area, a laptop for public use, free Wi-fi and a printer from which the public can use to print or scan documents for a small fee.

The WCL offers a wide selection of books including fiction, nonfiction, children's and large print. They have many elderly people who come in to primarily borrow books but also relish the connection and interaction with the volunteers, helping to address social isolation in the suburb. The Library have stocked a substantial collection of large print books to accommodate for this. They also have a sizable range of children's books which can be borrowed at no cost to whānau. There is a small charge of \$1 per book for adult books which helps the Library to bring in a modest income. They aim to continually grow and update their book collection, adding new books every 1-2 weeks.

WCL also organise concerts and events for local tamariki during the school holidays, and these have become more popular recently as their advertising has improved. They aim to maintain these numbers as well as continuing to grow their membership base to continually improve as they explore more options for community outreach and support.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Woolston Community Library offers a warm and safe place where local residents can come in six days a week, use the computers and free WIFI, print, borrow books, participate in an activation or attend their shows and Annual Gala.

The Library provides free access to resources that tangata in Woolston may not otherwise have access to (WIFI, free printing, free books and activities for tamariki).

This project aligns with the Waitai Community Board's priority of Woolston Village Safety Initiatives, by activating a space which has experienced regular safety concerns.

Partner with local organisations to deliver Workshops offering skill and knowledge sharing, collaboration, connection and wellbeing and health support. EG Cooking on a budget, vegetable gardening, knitting, sewing, CV writing, wellbeing centred etc.

Provide one-one support through referrals (eg Plunket, Aviva, MSD etc)

Plan and deliver activities - eg clothing swop, linking with "The Village" online platform supporting mothers and babies.

Offer safe and rewarding volunteering roles providing opportunities for training, support and friendships and connections.

Staff Assessment

SuperGrans SuperSkills Charitable Trust is a national organisation operating in eleven locations across Aotearoa with three in Te Waipounamu.

Originally going by just SuperGrans the organisation was established in Ōtautahi until 2016. The organisation is now looking to re-launch as Supergrans Superskills and are seeking funding towards operational costs once they have established.

Supergrans work alongside individuals, whānau and communities, mobilising volunteers to share practical life skills and knowledge to enhance the well-being and confidence of the tangata they engage with. The types of services they offer include financial mentoring and budgeting, cooking healthy meals on a budget, growing kai at home, developing household routines, making your own cleaning products, basic repairs around the home, clothes mending, sewing and knitting and job seeking skills among others. Supergrans generally work 1-on-1 with whānau or individuals and collaborate with other agencies where there is a need for a particular skill or kaupapa.

The Trust are seeking funding for their manager role who is responsible for planning and implementation of operations, fundraising, volunteer management, the administration, communications and networking to build relationships in the community with a view to partnering and collaborating with local organisations.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Supergrans Superskills is a long established and well-resourced organisation with eleven locations across Aotearoa. Supergrans Ōtautahi is newest location having recently launched in the East of Christchurch.

Data from the 2023 census suggest that the Linwood Ward has areas of high deprivation and number of vulnerable tangata who could directly benefit from one-on-one support offering support and skills to enhance their well-being.

Many of the community organisations who work in the Community Board area report an increased demand on their services and increasing numbers of tangata who are struggling with maintaining their well-being. Supergrans are looking to work with other agencies and services to support their mahi and fill any gaps in provision through their programmes.

The financial relief sort will enable the club to continue to fully insure and maintain its buildings; $4 \times 10^{-2} = 10^{-2}$

The Club will also be able to focus more on community engagement and learn to sail programs rather than worrying about our ability to pay our insurance bill and funding any unexpected boat maintenance costs.

Since re-establishing the Club at South New Brighton Park, Club membership has increased from 95 to 150 with a significant growth in juniors, families and young adult sailors.

PPYC welcomes diversity and welcomes participants from all walks of life, socio economic groups. We have fully disabled and able bodies access to communal and private changing and toilet facilities.

Staff Assessment

Pleasant Point Yacht Clubs new clubrooms based in South New Brighton Park opened in September 2019.

PPYC is the primary provider of recreational and sporting activities on the Christchurch Estuary. They promote and facilitate the development of the skills necessary to enjoy the estuary and marine environment safely.

As the new clubrooms are valued over \$1.4m the annual insurance premium has increased from \$2.5k to over \$12k. The clubs rescue / coaching boats are used on race days and during training programmes to provide rescue and coaching service to new and existing club members. The combined cost of these two expenses is greater than the revenue from member subscription.

The Club run multiple learn to sail programmes for the local community each season with over 40% membership growth over the past 5 years, membership numbers are now up to 150. The Club's 14 learn to sail dinghies are often all in use on sailing days by sailing school participants.

The Club hires their facilities for weddings, funerals and for numerous community groups including a local model train group, annual Christmas social for the staff of a local intermediate school and most recently a community group providing health education for young women. All aspects of hiring the Clubrooms are managed by the Club Committee volunteers.

The club has several membership types for racers through to social sailing for ages 7 through to 80 years, offering reduced rates for tertiary students and families. The club is run entirely by volunteers and all members are rostered to do duties throughout the sailing season.

The Club has recently adopted a new constitution based on a template developed by Sport NZ which addresses equality, diversity and inclusion. The club also holds a current liquor license and complies will all host responsibility guidelines.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Alignment with the SCT Strategy and Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy

The Club will be able to insure and protect the Clubrooms and equipment necessary for sailing.

The Club will not have to raise subscription costs to cover the increased overhead costs.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Between 80–120 people are expected to attend four community events, providing opportunities for connection and enjoyment in an increasingly stressful world.

An increase in participation is anticipated for community-delivered wellness activities under a new funding model. Two to three activities will be trialled, with evaluation focused on how many more people are able to access them for a koha of up to \$5.

Improved awareness of the Bridge Community Hub and its volunteering opportunities. Like many other community organisations, the Hub has faced challenges in attracting volunteers. A targeted approach is proposed, including clearly defined roles and time commitments, to encourage greater community participation (e.g. offering a free ticket to the quiz night in exchange for two hours of setup support).

Enhanced awareness and connection through social media and the South Brighton Community Newsletter. Plans include increasing the newsletter's content to incorporate relevant city and regional council updates, helping ensure the community is informed and has the opportunity to participate in civic processes.

Staff Assessment

The Bridge South Brighton Trust (The Hub) was established in 2016. Operating as a co-created space, the Hub offers a versatile venue that includes a hall, performance area, meeting rooms, learning space, and a well-being centre for community use. The Hub is an inclusive space for Southshore and South New Brighton residents, fostering connection, participation, and pride. It provides a wide range of activities and services, including a monthly online newsletter, civic engagement opportunities, and community meetings.

The Hub plays a key role in local democracy and emergency response efforts as one of three designated Community Emergency Response Hubs. It also hosts wellness and recreation programmes—from Te Reo Māori to yoga, Pilates, and community markets. Due to rising living costs, participation in some wellness activities has declined, prompting a plan to trial a subsidised model to improve access and affordability.

The Hub aims to deliver four major community events annually for 80 to 120 people, along with four whānau movie nights. Funding helps cover the costs of organising these events, including decorations and other collateral. Planned 2025 events include a Mid-winter Quiz, Brighton's Got Talent, Pie and Pint Night, Music Bingo, a Christmas Craft Market, and a Christmas Black Tie Dinner. With continued funding, these events will extend into 2026.

To increase accessibility during financially challenging times, the Hub plans to pilot a funding model for wellness classes such as children's yoga and pre/postnatal yoga. The model would fund instructor hours and venue hire, while allowing participants to contribute a koha of up to \$5. This ensures practitioners earn a stable income while classes remain affordable.

The Facility Assistant works 8 hours per week and supports the Hub's social media, event marketing, monthly newsletter distribution, and assists the Facilities Manager.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Without the support of an Events Coordinator and Facility Assistant, the venue would remain underutilised, and valuable opportunities to strengthen community resilience, connectedness, and wellbeing could be lost.

The Facility Assistant plays a key role in enabling a diverse range of activities that are tailored to meet local needs. These programmes support the physical, mental, and social wellbeing of the community, creating a welcoming environment for all.

This project also aligns with the Waitai Community Board Plan, specifically contributing to New Brighton Safety Initiatives by supporting local events that bring the community together through accessible, well-managed spaces and funding support.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Participation in tennis fosters physical, mental and emotional growth among participants as they not only develop tennis skills but skills such as discipline, resilience and confidence.

Bringing children together from diverse backgrounds builds stronger community ties and provides equal opportunities for children regardless of socioeconomic backgrounds and will instil lifelong habits of physical activity and wellness.

Our junior numbers are increasing slightly every year and we hope to build on this trend.

Staff Assessment

North Beach Tennis Club are located at 34 Palmers Road, North New Brighton. The junior kiwi tennis programme runs on Saturdays from September until March catering for 50-60 tamariki and rangatahi. The aim of this programme is to provide a quality affordable coaching programme for beginners and intermediate junior members. Participants benefit from a structured coaching programme that is split into age and ability groups. This allows participants with diverse abilities to grow and develop at a pace that is right for them and in an environment in which they feel safe and supported. The programme is led by two paid part-time roles with an additional 8 volunteer coaches/supports with an estimated 350 volunteer hours to deliver the junior tennis programme.

Feedback from participants is that they learnt new skills and co-ordination and made new friends. The Club report that each season has seen participant's move on to play competition tennis. Skills learnt as part of the programme enable children to slot into interclub tennis and provide the chance to improve their tennis.

The Club are also encouraged to see new participants each season, with caregivers supporting their Tamariki to give tennis a go. Key messaging from Sport New Zealand is 'balance is better' for Tamariki to try a variety of sports and not specialise too early. This programme is provided to all junior members at a very affordable rate, the current junior membership rates are \$75 for 11 year and under or \$85 for 12-18 years. Promotion of the programme is via a leaflet drop advertising the new tennis season, as well as advertising in local school newsletters. The Club encourage parents bringing their children along to get involved in the club or to pick up a racquet and 'have a go'.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The application aligns strongly with the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy and the Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy Goal 2, Availability and Accessibility.

The programme encourages children to have a go at tennis in a safe welcoming environment.

Volunteer recognition, salary/wages and administration would be an appropriate way of supporting NBTC in enabling young people to be involved in the sport.

Enhanced Physical Skills and Confidence: Participants will show measurable improvements in physical fitness, motor skills, and coordination, as well as increased confidence and enjoyment in physical activity.

Greater Diversity and Inclusion: An increase in the diversity of participants, including a higher percentage of Māori, Pasifika, disabled, and low-income community members, ensuring broader representation and access.

Community Connection and Social Impact: Strengthened sense of belonging and community engagement, as evidenced by participant surveys and feedback, with increased connections among peers, coaches, and volunteers.

Staff Development: Increased upskilling of coaches and staff, contributing to the sustainability and effectiveness of the programme.

Sustained Programme Growth: Continued expansion of the programme, with more members and community groups participating in the GFA programme.

Staff Assessment

Christchurch School of Gymnastics Incorporated (CSG), located at QEII Park, is a community-focused sports club dedicated to providing accessible gymnastics opportunities for all. This project seeks funding support to contribute toward the wages of CSG's full-time Gym for All (GFA) Manager, who leads the design, coordination, and delivery of inclusive, community-based gymnastics programmes. Sustaining this role is essential to ensuring the ongoing growth, accessibility, and long-term viability of recreational gymnastics for people of all ages, backgrounds, and abilities.

CSG's broad range of programmes includes recreational gymnastics, aerobics, trampoline and tumbling, preschool sessions, school-based programmes, holiday and KidsFest activities, and regional-level competitive gymnastics and trampoline.

The GFA Manager plays a key role in facilitating access to gymnastics for community groups, disability organisations, and underserved populations ensuring that programming promotes equity, participation, and wellbeing through recreation, sport, and play.

Participants benefit physically and socially. The GFA programme is designed to build confidence, coordination, strength, and fundamental movement skills in a supportive and enjoyable environment. It also fosters connection, belonging, and a sense of achievement particularly for those who may not thrive in traditional competitive sports settings.

By securing wage support for this role, CSG can continue delivering high-quality, inclusive programming that encourages physical activity and community connection, while also strengthening the sector through staff development, partnerships, and advocacy for accessible, fit-for-purpose spaces.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Promotes inclusive access to sport and recreation by delivering gymnastics programmes that support physical, social, and emotional wellbeing for people of all ages, backgrounds, and abilities especially those who may not thrive in traditional sports settings.

Funding support will enable CSG to continue growth and provide affordable, high-quality sport and recreation experiences for local communities particularly important during a time of increasing financial pressure on whānau.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Provide opportunities for young people to connect with and develop opportunities to support their local community.

The young people that attend Youthtown programmes can engage with positive role models and have a safe space to hang out, that isn't home or roaming the streets.

The young people that attend our programmes engage with the community in a positive manner.

Offer more opportunities for the young people in Woolston that are affordable for them to attend and support them along their journey into adult hood.

Offer 35 activities in the community, 3 days a week in school and 1 day of the week to promote connection and engagement with opportunities in the area for young people.

Run holiday programmes 10 weeks of the year

Staff Assessment

Based out of Woolston Community Centre, Youthtown deliver low-cost afterschool and holiday activities for rangatahi in the Linwood and Woolston area. Youthtown employ a Programme Team member who is responsible for organising and delivering a variety of safe activities and programmes specifically designed to engage and develop the rangatahi who attend. These can focus on employment skills and qualifications such as learners licence theory courses, while others are youth-led and focus on providing a safe space for them to hangout and just be themselves.

The rangatahi they currently have attending the programme come with a wide range of needs depending on their home circumstances. Some of the participants have been expelled from schools and are prospects for gangs, while others have disclosed wellbeing challenges. Some of the participants also don't have anyone at home after school and are looking for some company, kai and connection in the community. The Programme Team Member's role is to directly engage with participants, build trust and support them with their personal, social and educational development. A key part of this mahi is sharing their own experiences and passion for recreation with the rangatahi who attend the programmes. Some days that might look like a picnic in a park, and others a hike in the Port Hills. By showing participants the recreation opportunities in their local area the staff can encouraging participants to enjoy being outdoors and make safe choices while using parks and tracks.

Often young people are seen as the cause for a lot of antisocial behaviour but Youthtown are committed to changing this narrative. By taking participants out for walks in the community, and keeping them engaged in positive activities, the community can begin to see young people in a more positive light.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Through their Programme Team Member role, Youthtown support rangatahi and tamariki to be engaged positively in their community, providing programmes where participants can build positive relationships and connections with other young people in their community fostering a sense of belonging.

Funding will allow for continued activation of the Woolston Community Centre and surrounding area providing a safe space for rangatahi to connect and develop.

Many of the participants whānau have limited resources. Money or access to transport and time are the key barriers to participation. The free and low-cost programmes that Youthtown provide in Woolston offer rangatahi opportunities to broaden their horizons and try new activities they wouldn't otherwise have access to.

Youthtown have noted that the more they have a staff presence and are running activities from the centre, the less anti-social behaviour they see occurring out the back and in the car park. This outcome supports the Waitai Community Board priority of Woolston Village Safety initiatives.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

The condition of the lawns is very important to the club as this makes it possible for members to enjoy their participation in the sport. Visiting members from other clubs for competitions and social events are encouraged if they know the lawns are in good condition to enable confident play.

Membership is kept affordable - 2024/25 season has been \$220 full membership and \$65 for the first year with green fees for social events at \$10 per person. The rates for the coming season will be determined at the upcoming AGM.

Members can pay by internet banking or whatever suits them best, eg weekly/monthly.

Staff Assessment

Edgeware Croquet Club Inc (the Club) is a small club based at St Albans Park. The Club has existed since 1913 and has 40 members and increase of 10 members since the 2023/24 season. The Club continue to promote themselves to attract new members, primarily through their social programme and pay-for-play as well as one off social events. The average age of club members is approximately 75 years old.

The Club has three croquet lawns and a small historic clubhouse. A significant ongoing cost for the Club is the maintenance of the clubhouse and lawns to keep them suitable for playing. The Club members spend approximately eight hours a week during the season to ensure the lawns are in good playing condition. However, their ability to conduct maintenance is reduced because of age, disability and the small pool of members to call on. The Club is seeking support for the costs of maintaining its greens and surrounding area.

The Club do not want to increase membership fees which are currently \$65 for new members for the first season and \$200 annually thereafter. They are aware of financial constraints on their membership and offer payment plans.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project aligns strongly with the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy, Council's Community Outcome of Resilient Communities, and inclusion and equity policy.

The Club provides for those on low and/or fixed incomes, providing a place where the community can meet and reducing social isolation amongst older people.

The grant will directly impact the provision of essential facilities needed to participate in the sport.

The Club is fiscally responsible and has a proven track record of delivery, ensuring they meet their outcomes within budget.

Participation from 12 business staff, community Groups and local residents to enhance the three Coastal wetland projects that the Estuary Trust conducts under guidance from the CCC Coastal Park Rangers.

1,500 volunteer hours to plant, weed, mulch, water and prune vegetation. This means the park rangers do not have to conduct the work required to maintain the work required in these areas and can focus on other areas which are not supported by volunteer groups.

Provide an opportunity for individuals to learn about the values of our estuary and surrounding parks whilst working around the Ihutai.

Evidence through research has shown clearly that due to this project the number of invertebrates has increased substantially due to the coastal wetland restoration projects.

Staff Assessment

The Avon Heathcote Estuary Ihutai Trust (Ihutai Trust) is a non-profit organisation formed in 2002. The Trust holds and delivers the Estuary Management Plan 2020-2030 which sets out to enhance Council owned lands around the Ihutai Edge and increase areas of restored and enhanced wetland areas in Ōtautahi

Ihutai Trust work closely with CCC to manage five major projects as part of this Management Plan, three of which are located in the Waitai Coastal-Burwood-Linwood Community Board area. At South New Brighton Park and South Shore Spit the Ihutai Trust works with CCC to restore the wetland area. Bexley Reserve Enhancement project focuses on part of the Reserve between Bridge Street and Pages Road, south side. The project aims to maintain and enhance the vegetation, creation of a bird habitat through ecological restoration, increase water quality in Mugfords Drain (which flows into the Ihutai) and increase community pride and sense of ownership of the roadside Reserve through engaging local communities.

Over the last few years, the Trust have seen a significant increase in the number of requests from community groups and businesses organising 'volunteer staff days', to assist in wetland restoration. However, the level of demand has grown beyond the current capacity of their part-time Trust Manager. The Trust has the expertise and experience to plan, promote and manage these voluntary efforts but now needs extra resourcing to manage the demand.

The Ihutai Trust is seeking funding to contract a part time field assistant to meet the additional labour requirements. The Field Assistant would liaise with CCC park rangers, set schedules, set tasks, maintain tools, brief volunteers on health and safety, show volunteers how to carry out the necessary tasks, educate the volunteers on the values of wetlands, supervise the work and report back on activities.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Te Ihutai and its catchment is of significant cultural and spiritual importance and is recognized as a Wetland of International Significance by the East-Asian Australasian Flyway Network. Home to 586 species including 149 birds, 26 fish, 235 invertebrates, 95 microalgae, and 92 saltmarsh and other plants, the area provide a diverse habitats for resident and migratory fish and bird species.

The mahi the Ihutai Trust does helps to maintain and enhance this important habitat and promotes understanding of the importance of this wetland area, delivering on the Community Board Plan priority Enhancing Environmental Well-Being as well as extensively assisting CCC in delivering the 2020-2030 Estuary Management Plan.

The Ihutai Trust already manages a number of estuary edge projects, but it is facing increased demand from community and business groups to provide more volunteer enhancement events. Funding for the Wetland Reserve Restoration Coordinator would help the Trust meet the growing demand and continue their support of around 1,500 volunteers engage in restoration and enhancement work on the estuary edge.

Staff Assessment

The New Brighton Athletic Club was incorporated in 1986 and changed its name to New Brighton Olympic Athletic Club (NBOAC) in 2011. The club caters for track running, road running, and cross-country athletics. They are an all-round club for all grades from 4-14-year-old children through to junior athletes, senior athletes, and master athletes. The club is located at Rawhiti Domain and has a full-sized track and field facilities. NBOAC helps at grassroot levels to support and develop athletes. They have a wide range of abilities from beginners to seasoned track, field, or ultra-marathon runners. The club does its best to encourage and support young people to join the club and offers a range of programs that are designed for any age, including Get Set Go (4-6-year-olds), Littlies Club (3-6-year-olds), Club Night (7-14-year-olds), and adults can start at any age.

The club makes athletics accessible by keeping the costs low with funding assistance to provide resources, coaches, and equipment to support development and training. Eliminating financial barriers to participation improves athletes physical and mental well-being and encourages the development of social networks. The club is supported by volunteers which helps to develop a sense of belonging and community pride.

NBOAC is one of 21 clubs in Christchurch and Canterbury. Athletics Canterbury organise events to cater for all ages from children, to senior and masters' athletes. We work with Athletics Canterbury, Athletics NZ and ECSR to promote athletics for people of all ages. Our programmes include Get Set Go (ages 4-6), Littlies Club (ages 3-6), and Club Night (ages 7-14) based on the Athletics NZ Run, Jump, Throw Programme. Adults can start at any age and our club welcomes beginners.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The application aligns strongly with the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy pillars of People and the Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy goals 1, 2 and 5.

The project offers a supportive environment so young people can feel that they are valued and included, which results in ongoing participation.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

The Parklands Toy Library aims to sustain its current opening hours—Wednesday mornings, Thursday evenings, and Saturday mornings to ensure maximum accessibility for members. These varied session times accommodate different schedules and lifestyles, with member feedback confirming that this flexibility is highly valued and supports equitable access for local whānau.

The organisation is committed to maintaining or increasing membership by continuing to provide a well-run, reliable service that meets the evolving needs of the community. It also seeks to remain an active participant in community events such as Parklands @ Play, dedicating both resources and volunteer hours to support the initiative. This involvement helps strengthen community ties and promotes the value of play beyond the library itself. Continued funding for the librarian role is essential to sustaining these efforts and ensuring ongoing community engagement.

Staff Assessment

Parklands Toy Library Incorporated is located at Parklands Community Centre on Queenspark Drive. The library is open every Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday and provides affordable access to a wide selection of toys for its members. The Toy Library memberships have grown over the past year with 150 member families totalling 250 children and reach more families when participating in events such as Parklands at Play. By facilitating learning through play, the toy library service enables children to explore a variety of experiences, fostering cognitive development, creativity, and the expression of their imagination.

The organisation is seeking funding to support the salary of its toy librarian – a key role at the heart of the toy library. The librarian is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the library and is the friendly, familiar face who welcomes both new and returning members. With a strong understanding of the toy collection, the librarian helps families select toys that are not only fun, but also age-appropriate and developmentally beneficial for their children. Beyond toy management, the librarian plays a vital role in building relationships within the community, offering guidance, support, and a listening ear to members.

While volunteers play a significant role in the library's operations, the consistency and expertise of the librarian are essential to its smooth functioning. The librarian ensures that members feel supported, connected, and confident in their choices, helping to create a welcoming and inclusive environment

Income from membership fees and toy hire alone is not sufficient to meet the library's operational costs. Securing funding for the toy librarian's salary would enable the organisation to redirect more of its membership income toward expanding and improving the toy collection. This helps maintain the high quality of resources available to local whānau and supports the library's continued growth and positive community impact.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The Parklands Toy Library plays a vital role in supporting early childhood development by providing affordable access to educational and imaginative play resources. With over 150 member families and engagement through community events, the service promotes cognitive and social development for local tamariki while also reducing barriers to participation for families.

Funding the librarian's salary is essential to maintaining consistent, high-quality service delivery. As the central figure in daily operations, the librarian not only ensures smooth functioning but also fosters a welcoming, inclusive environment. Their expertise and ongoing community relationships are crucial to the Toy Library's growth, sustainability, and positive impact on whānau in the Parklands area.

The Toy Library actively supports wider community initiatives such as Parklands @ Play, helping to strengthen local connections and extend its reach to more families through collaborative events.

Tamai Sports is a not for profit established in 2021 which provides children aged 8-13 years from the Tamai Learning Cluster in the Eastern suburbs the opportunity to participate in a variety of sports including: rugby, football, netball, touch, cricket, and futsal. They also run a rugby tournament Games of Ranginui, 20 days of school holiday programmes and in schools taster sessions for every year 3-6 tamariki from the kahui ako cluster (Ngutuawa, Bromley, Te Waka Unua, Whitau, Linwood Ave)

Enabling, equipping, encouraging and empowering Tamariki and whānau to participate in sport and strengthen their health and hauora/wellbeing by addressing key determinants such as improved physical activity, emotional wellbeing, whānau involvement, cultural identity and nutrition.

Tamai Sports have addressed key barriers to participation including cost, transport, gear. There is no cost for the children attending, transport is provided from school to the field, all kit is supplied, afternoon tea is provided on arrival and dinner is served at the end of training. This is a time when whanau can come join.

Tamai have strong relationships with local sports club and regional sporting organisations to support the delivery of their programmes such as Linfield Sports, Linwood Rugby, Coastal Spirit, and Mainland Football.

Tamai Sports continues to thrive, engaging 1,937 participants and 1,570 whānau from diverse backgrounds in sports. Moving into the 2025/2026 season, their focus will be on refining their existing programmes and ensuring sustainable growth whilst addressing resource challenges.

Volunteers are essential to the delivering of the tamai programme, a partnership with UC Sport Coaching provides practical experience for 22 students; strengthening coaching and positive role models for tamariki while fostering future sport and recreation professionals. Tamai are continuously exploring new partnership opportunities to support their kaupapa, including working with local businesses to support coaching and kai preparation.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Staff Assessment

Shirley Toy Library is a not-for-profit registered charity that provides the local community with access to a wide range of toys, games, puzzles, and ride-on equipment for hire. The Library is one of the biggest in New Zealand and plays an important role in promoting play-based learning and strengthening connections among families.

As a member of the Toy Library Federation of New Zealand, Shirley Toy Library supports the Federation's core belief that all children should have the opportunity to play. Play is essential to early childhood development and contributes significantly to the emotional, cognitive, and social growth of tamariki. The Toy Library encourages families to engage in shared play experiences, helping to build stronger family bonds and creating positive, lasting memories.

The library offers a large, diverse collection of toys suited to a variety of age groups and developmental stages. From educational puzzles to outdoor ride-ons, the selection supports a wide range of activities that stimulate creativity, motor skills, and problem-solving. By making these toys available for hire at an affordable cost, Shirley Toy Library ensures that families can access high-quality play resources that might otherwise be out of reach. In addition to supporting child development, the Toy Library promotes environmental sustainability by reducing waste, encouraging the reuse of toys rather than disposal, the library helps minimise landfill contributions and supports a more sustainable future for coming generations.

The Toy Library operates two sessions per week, managed by their librarian with the support of a volunteer committee. The librarian is responsible for welcoming families, offering guidance on toy selection, and handling the day-to-day administration that keeps the library running smoothly. Shirley Toy Library continues to be a valued resource that brings learning, joy, and connection to its community.

Rationale for staff recommendation

This project aligns to the People pillar of the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy, particularly the objective of facilitate and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all.

The funding has been integral to allowing the Toy Library to continue employing a librarian who is a consistent connection point for members and allows the library to offer regular opening hours without the need to rely on volunteers.

Staff Assessment

The Dallington Residents Association (DRA) was founded in 1990 and after a brief recess between 2000-2003 they have run continuously since. The DRA annually run two key events for their community, Skip Day and Carols in the park as well as advocating and providing opportunities for the community to engage with Council decision making process'. They also collaborate and support other local organisations to provide help for events or initiatives that they are running within the Dallington community. The DRA in recent years has taken the lead on publishing and delivering a quarterly newsletter for residents, with support from the Dallington Community Trust. The Newsletter is a key tool in sharing local stories, Community notices, events and provides local business' a platform to share their services and is delivered to over 1200 households across the Dallington community.

Their annual Skip Day is a long-term event the association run. They hire two skips and encourage residents to bring any hard waste they have and dispose of it, while looking to recycle and reuse. This is combined with a BBQ and used as an opportunity for locals to meet and connect. This event continues to be highly successful and beneficial. The Dallington Carols in the Park event is another regular event the association have been running for several years and regularly see well over 300 locals participate. The event is located at Burwood Park. Alongside the carols sung by locals throughout the event, there is a range of other activities on offer such as a free sausage sizzle and ice cream, face painting, lolly scrambles and an opportunity to meet Santa. The funding will cover the ongoing costs for the newsletter printing and the associations liability insurance costs, without which no events would be able to happen.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Each of the programmes strongly aligns with the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy by specifically encouraging communities to create and sustain a sense of local identity and ownership.

Their services will strengthen the connectedness in the community, bringing a sense of belonging.

The DRA contribute a large amount of volunteer hours into planning and delivering their key events

We will operate a supportive and connected club environment by celebrating club day and regular team gatherings as a community.

We will encourage whanaung at and celebrate our identity as a club and community through participation in rugby league

We will offer support, mentoring and encouragement for volunteers, coaches, trainers and managers to upskill through CRL courses or mentorship.

We will provide affordable and accessible opportunity for active recreation to all players, including 3 youth girls grades.

Due to the large increase in junior members the volunteers within the club are struggling to cope with the administration demands, in addition to committing time and energy to the clubrooms rebuild.

Staff Assessment

Linwood Rugby League Football Club is the oldest league club in Canterbury. They offer rugby league opportunities for people of all ages including children, teenagers, and adults, both men and women. The season runs from April to September, with training sessions usually held twice a week and games taking place on Saturdays.

Being the largest league club with 550 members in Canterbury, Linwood Rugby League takes pride in its connection to the Linwood community. It serves as a positive space, particularly for residents in low-income neighbourhoods, and aims to ensure that Linwood Park is utilised effectively, encouraging community connection.

Operated by a board of seven directors and supported by committees for junior and senior players, the club's coaches mainly consist of senior players and volunteer parents. They uphold values such as teamwork, honesty, and mutual respect among members.

The club serves the wider Linwood area of Christchurch, a ward area that features prominently in the most deprived on the Deprivation Map. With a membership exceeding 550 individuals, including approximately 450 juniors, the Linwood Keas are committed to growing while ensuring that everyone feels valued and included. The majority of its members are of Māori and Pacifica descent, and the club aims to encourage pride in their cultural heritage while promoting health and happiness.

The club hosts various activities including games, practices, and fundraising events, with the goal of providing opportunities for skill development and promoting a sense of belonging and community spirit among its members. Each season, the club relies on around 150 volunteers who generously give their time to meet the needs of both players and the club. These dedicated volunteers play an essential role in ensuring that everything runs smoothly.

This is a new part-time paid role of a club Administrator to support the day-to-day operations of the club during the season and 'take the load' of busy volunteers. This role will also support the club to integrate and collaborate with other park user groups as well as neighbouring stakeholders such as Te Pou Toetoe, Te Hua Rahi Linwood Avenue School and Te Aratai College.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project aligns strongly with the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy and Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy.

The grant will directly impact the provision of local community sport.

The club attracts a high percentage of Māori and Pasifika players. The club promotes the participation of children and women in sport

Staff Assessment

The Burwood East Residents Association (BERA) have been advocating for their community since 2011, aiming to bring neighbours together, supporting each other and creating a greater sense of connection and community among residents. In 2023 BERA expanded the size of their boundaries to incorporate more residential properties due to the large amount of redzone land that was included within their original boundaries.

The committee meet monthly at the Burwood Legacy Church on Bassett Street to discuss community issues and represent residents' concerns to the Community Board. BERA also manages a Facebook group with over 2.2k members for people to connect and share information. BERA has been working hard over the last two years to increase the number of residents on the committee and have seen numbers grow in the last 12 months, bringing new ideas and fresh energy to the committee.

BERA has continued to grow and adapt through this period of growth, involving themselves in several local projects. They continue to run a community Skip Day where residents can dispose of waste and provide extra trailers to collect recyclables and a table for people to swap or take items for free. They also continue to support positive activations within the red zone recently running a successful Family Easter Egg Hunt and are working with CCC staff to keep the learn to ride and pump track assets within the local redzone, keeping them as key community recreation assets for residents.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The work undertaken by the Association strongly aligns with the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy by specifically encouraging communities to create and sustain a sense of local identity and ownership

Their services will strengthen the connectedness in the community, creating a sense of belonging.

Unite the community by bringing as many local residents together as possible, building on successes of the 2024 Community Day which attracted around 600 attendees.

Gather community feedback on proposed ideas for a local facility, including its potential uses, to ensure the project reflects community needs and aspirations.

Increase community involvement by encouraging more residents to actively participate both in supporting the Trust and helping to organise future Community Days.

Staff Assessment

The Marshland Hall Trust is working to replace the original Marshland Hall, a community-funded facility established in the early 1900s for recreational, educational, and social use. Previously managed by Parafed Canterbury the hall was extensively damaged in the 2010 earthquake and subsequently sold. The sale of the facility has created a gap in local facilities, particularly for accessible sport and recreation in the Prestons/Marshland Community. Since then, the population in the local area has grown, but no new community space has been developed.

The Marshland Hall Trust, comprising of local community members and Parafed Canterbury, is committed to filling this gap. The upcoming Community Day in 2025 aims to unite residents, celebrate community spirit, and raise awareness of the need for a new facility. Previous events have fostered strong local support and reinforced the importance of such a space. This year's event will also share the results of a recent feasibility study, highlighting the actual community response, potential sites, and next steps for progressing the project towards completion. By creating a day filled with entertainment, sport, and shared experiences, the Trust hopes to strengthen the community's connection to the project and lay the foundation for future engagement and fundraising.

The proposed facility, which will be located near Burwood Hospital's spinal unit, will be fully accessible and inclusive, reflecting the ongoing partnership with Parafed Canterbury. As a community-led initiative, its success depends on ongoing stewardship and support from local residents.

With an expected 600 attendees, the Community Day will showcase what the facility could offer while inviting everyone to play a role in bringing it to life.

Rationale for staff recommendation

This project aligns with the Waitai Coastal-Burwood-Linwood Community Board Plan priority of Improving Access to Community Facilities.

The Trust is fiscally responsible and has a proven track record of successful delivery of this event, ensuring they meet their outcomes within budget.

The Trust is currently one of the only organisations providing events within their target community.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Whether it is through learning, participating, or supporting whānau and friends, we believe that being involved brings a greater sense of purpose and belonging to individuals.

We would expect the Hauora of our participants to be improved in at least one aspect of health. That can be either a combination of the physical, mental, spiritual or social dimensions.

We expect to see an increase in participation and more volunteers who will be upskilled in different roles which will lead to increased community engagement.

Staff Assessment

South Island Tau Tag Football aims to grow Tag Football in Christchurch by offering inclusive opportunities for all skill levels. They mainly play at Bromley Park, Linfield or Linwood Park. Tag Football is a non-contact sport with similarities to Rugby League, Touch, and Rippa Rugby and includes grades for Tamariki and Rangatahi, men, women, and mixed teams.

The group is seeking funding for a 10-week programme in term 4 of 2025 that includes school outreach for skills clinics, a 6-week Tau Tag module, referee training, and a one-day tournament. The initiative promotes community connection, cultural inclusion, and well-being in a safe, whānau-based environment.

An estimated 380 participants will be supported by 20 volunteer coaches and managers contributing 400 hours, alongside part-time staff delivering clinics and referee training. The programme also celebrates Pasifika values and aims to connect families through sport, with many players participating in the Pacific Series Tournament during Canterbury Anniversary Weekend.

South Island Tau Tag is committed to providing the Pasifika community in Christchurch with the same sporting opportunities available in the North Island, including pathways to international tournaments. This need is highlighted by Ministry of Health data showing fewer than 50% of Pacific adults meet physical activity guidelines and rising unmet mental health needs.

The programme focuses on Tamariki and Rangatahi engagement, with 16 under-15 teams in 2024 and a goal of 20–22 teams in the upcoming season. Increased Tamariki and Rangatahi participation is expected to boost whānau involvement through coaching, managing, and refereeing. The adult open grade reached full capacity with 8 teams in the last tournament, and referee clinics delivered with this funding support will help expand the capacity for more teams in 2025.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

To continue the delivery of pounamu carving workshops that will be available for the community to engage with. This will include 10 wānanga over the course of the year, enabling 100 people to participate.

In addition, the organisation aims to grow an additional five carving facilitators who will be able to support and deliver the kaupapa.

The intention of this kaupapa is to authentically grow community-driven Māori carving workshops and wānanga with the community and from within the community.

Staff Assessment

Tūhono Taonga, Tūhono Tangata is an initiative that began at Haeata Community Campus in 2018 and has since established a base at the Climate Action Campus. The aim is to share Māori culture through a series of wānanga (educational sessions), using pounamu as a tool for engagement and holistic well-being. The programme goes beyond teaching the history and carving techniques of pounamu participants also learn about tikanga (customs) and the deep cultural significance of pounamu as taonga (treasure) for Māori.

Through hands-on crafting experiences, individuals not only shape physical pieces but also build connections with others and explore personal narratives. Tūhono Taonga focuses on the bonds formed through pounamu, while Tūhono Tangata highlights the empowerment that comes from fostering meaningful relationships.

The programme delivers its pounamu workshops via a mobile carving truck, allowing the organisation to travel to events and community spaces and making the workshops more accessible. By reconnecting individuals with their whakapapa and indigenous knowledge, the programme helps strengthen identity and repair disconnection from cultural roots. This connection empowers individuals to grow and thrive personally, as whānau, and as a wider community.

The carving workshops also aim to develop future facilitators within the kaupapa. Many of the facilitators are former participants who have become stewards of this knowledge, choosing to deepen their understanding of Toi Māori (Māori arts) and share it with others. These tuakana (senior participants) now play a key role in passing on Mātauranga Māori, helping others to connect and grow.

Tūhono Taonga, Tūhono Tangata is seeking funding support for operational costs to ensure the continued delivery of these workshops. The organisation currently has a pool of eight facilitators who, between them, work an average of 20 hours per week.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The programme strengthens Māori identity and well-being by reconnecting participants with whakapapa, tikanga, and Mātauranga Māori through hands-on pounamu carving workshops delivered in accessible community settings.

As the only mobile pounamu carving workshop in Ōtautahi, the programme uniquely brings cultural learning directly into communities, removing barriers to access and engaging people where they are.

Former participants are empowered to become facilitators and cultural stewards, ensuring long-term sustainability and intergenerational knowledge transfer within Māori communities.

Staff Assessment

Burwood Association Football Club Incorporated are based at Clare Park in Burwood. The club has been around for 55 years and cater for junior and senior players. With 289 members for the 2024 season, 203 junior and 86 senior members. The junior teams play in the Christchurch Junior Football leagues run by Mainland Football.

The club support their other operating expenses through a variety of pub charity grants and sponsorships from local businesses.

The club wants to prioritise their income towards coaches, gear and equipment with the aim to maintain the existing subscription cost to ensure the financial barrier to participating in sport for families with Tamariki is significant.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The programmes strongly aligns with the new Strengthening Communities Together Strategy and Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy

Providing funding assistance for their programmes will allow the Club to keep its activities affordable and accessible by breaking down any financial barriers to participation and direct their funds to other essential club expenses such as sporting equipment.

The club rely on a significant amount of volunteer support to run the training sessions and weekly games for all ages, totalling over 3,000 hours per season

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Over the next year, PIPS anticipates it will support more than 1,400 families, more than doubling the number assisted four years ago. They also expect over 3,500 visits to their drop-in centre.

Contribute over 1,000 volunteer hours throughout the year. With a small part-time staff of just 2FTE, supporting such a high number of families and visits wouldn't be possible without volunteers — from assisting families to tackling all the washing and essential behind-the-scenes tasks.

The project fosters a better connected and supported community where families find practical help, education, and emotional support during early parenting. Pips anticipate a reduction in hardship for families as a result.

Environmental sustainability is a key focus. Last year, PIPS prevented over nine-tonne of baby gear from landfill through recycling and reuse, and they are on track to increase this impact in the coming year. This effort supports families to access essential items affordably while contributing to a healthier environment.

Staff Assessment

PIPS (Pregnancy Infancy Parenting Support) provide a free, non-judgmental emotional and practical support for families during pregnancy and early parenting. At the heart of their service is a dignified, no-cost "shopping" experience where under-resourced whānau can choose essential baby and maternity items—removing the stigma of receiving a handout and promoting the dignity of choice. PIPS is a safe, inclusive space where whānau can talk openly about unplanned pregnancy, birth trauma, family harm, and socioeconomic stress. They serve a diverse range of families—including sole parents, young parents, foster carers, and those with limited support networks—providing connection, reducing isolation, and promoting mental wellbeing during a vulnerable life stage.

Working alongside well-child providers and other agencies, PIPS helps deliver wraparound care, aiming to reduce the number of families slipping through service gaps. Trained staff and volunteers offer tailored support, providing vital items such as clothing, nappies, safe sleep devices, prams, car capsules, and cots. Each interaction is also a chance to check in on wellbeing, identify any challenges, and connect whānau with additional support services.

In 2024/25, PIPS redistributed over 70,000 essential items to over 1,400 vulnerable families. Their free services also include breastfeeding clinics, parenting education, car seat fittings, peer support, and Infant and Child First Aid/CPR courses. With a growing number of clients from the East of Christchurch and increasing demand due to the rising cost of living, their resources are consistently stretched to try and meet the increased numbers coming through the door with volunteers now contributing over a third of service hours in the past year. By keeping their doors open and shelves stocked, PIPS continues to be the "village" many families need but don't have.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Funding the staff salaries and operational costs will demonstrate the Council's ongoing commitment to providing accessibility and support to an organisation which positively contributes to the safety and wellbeing of young people, their families and communities.

They offer a valuable and well utilised service that supports some of the most vulnerable and at-risk members of the community, while encouraging positive parenting and wellbeing.

They actively contributing to create a healthier environment for future generations through reducing the environmental impact of the industry, last year preventing over 9-tonne of items going into landfill and instead seeing these recycled and reused.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

To increase the number of youth learning brass instruments by continuing to tutor young people and work with local schools. Intergenerational connections foster a strong sense of community and belonging. Playing music in a band teaches discipline and improves brain function and encourages the sharing of skills.

Increase the number of events the band participates in during the year by continuing to support local events, joining with other groups to provide entertainment, providing free family concerts, and participating in local brass band competitions.

Increase the cultural diversity of the band by supporting MAP (Mutual Assistance Programme) students to play with us until the end of 2025. These musicians from all around the Pacific are in New Zealand for 12 months to study with the New Zealand Army Band and join the New Brighton Silver Band to gain skills. and share their love of music.

Improve the overall standard of musicianship for the band members.

Staff Assessment

The New Brighton Silver Band Incorporated (NBSB) was established in 1890 and is made up of a dedicated group of musicians. Based at Rāwhiti Domain in New Brighton, the band maintains a busy schedule of regular performances, including community concerts, gala days, ANZAC parades, Christmas parades, and carolling events. Their diverse repertoire caters to audiences of all ages, featuring popular music, classical works, marches, hymn tunes, and an expanding selection of original arrangements across a variety of styles.

The band currently comprises 37 registered members, a young learners' group of 20, a supporters' club, and an active committee. In 2024, NBSB launched a youth learners' group, with a core group of 10 participants attending lessons regularly during the school term.

NBSB is also working in partnership with a local school, supplying brass instruments for students learning through the school's music programme. These students are supported and encouraged to join the NBSB learners' programme once they reach the required skill level.

The band is now preparing for its next major focus: the 2025 Festival of Brass, which will take place in Christchurch from 2–9 July. The band is practicing intensively for this event. Brass band competitions play a key role in maintaining high musical standards, and the street march a public favourite is one of the highlights in which the band will compete.

In 2025, NBSB will once again host the Army Band Mutual Assistance Programme (MAP), welcoming students from across the Pacific to study with the New Zealand Army Band. The year 2025 also marks a significant milestone for NBSB its 140th anniversary which will be celebrated with a commemorative event.

NBSB is currently seeking funding to support operational costs, including administration, insurance, equipment, power, and maintenance.

Rationale for staff recommendation

NBSB support local events, such as New Brighton ANZAC day, Christmas parades, carolling at supermarkets and other places and spaces.

NBSB offers learning opportunities accessible to individuals of all ages, thereby minimising barriers to learning. This is achieved by providing access to musical instruments and free tuition for young learners in the group to help grow their skills.

This project supports New Brighton Safety Initiatives in the Community Board Plan by activating Rawhiti Domain, aligning with CPTED recommendations from the 2025 report.

Increased Participation and Programme Delivery

With access to new gear, we aim to maintain and grow our weekly classes, supporting 30 regular participants and delivering 50 sessions annually. This will help us meet growing demand and ensure safe, high-quality training for all.

Improved Participant Outcomes

Participants will benefit from improved fitness, confidence, and discipline. We track progress through attendance, grading achievements, and feedback. The new gear will allow more people to participate fully, especially those who cannot afford their own equipment.

Enhanced Diversity and Community Engagement

We aim to increase diversity in our classes by continuing to engage Pacific and underrepresented communities. We also expect to grow our volunteer base and strengthen community ties through inclusive events and outreach.

These outcomes will be measured through attendance records, volunteer involvement, grading milestones, and participant feedback.

Staff Assessment

Kiwistyle Kickboxing New Brighton is a grassroots, community-led kickboxing programme based at St Faiths Church Hall, who provide koha-based classes for youth and families aged 13 and up, with a strong focus on Pacific peoples and underrepresented communities.

The groups kaupapa is grounded in whanaungatanga (connection), manaakitanga (care), and hauora (wellbeing).

Classes promote physical fitness, mental resilience, and cultural pride. We currently support 30 regular participants and aim to continue grow to 50 members with improved equipment. The group host inclusive grading ceremonies and whānau-friendly events that celebrate progress and build community.

This funding will directly support the groups ability to remove financial barriers, increase participation, and provide a safe, inclusive space for youth to thrive. With no other community-led kickboxing programme in New Brighton, Kiwistyle fills a unique role in New Brighton.

They have been operating for the past year with a koha payment, however it is not enforced but is purely a gift from families wanting to donate to the support the groups expenses (hall hire and equipment).

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project aligns with the Strengthening Communities Together (Pillar 1 and 2) and Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy Community-led initiative run by volunteers with a focus on connectivity and well-being through the delivery of kick boxing, the members shape the culture and kaupapa of the club

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

The project seeks to significantly increase community participation and volunteer involvement across its programmes and events. Growth in engagement will be supported through initiatives such as participation in local markets, distribution of community newsletters, information-sharing events, and collaboration with Christchurch City Council. The group aims to see at least 100 predator traps actively maintained by local residents, increasing numbers of volunteers inducted to support public space trapping particularly through well-attended induction workshops and growing interest from neighbouring suburbs seeking advice and support to establish their own predator-free communities.

The long-term vision is to create a thriving nature corridor across the New Brighton peninsula, connecting Banks Peninsula to Travis Wetland. This corridor will serve as a vital ecological pathway, supporting biodiversity and enabling the safe movement of native species through the area.

Through the targeted removal of predators, the project aims to restore native species populations and improve overall ecosystem health. The goal is to see the community once again thriving with native birds, insects, and plant life, creating a richer natural environment and a deeper connection between people and place.

Staff Assessment

Predator Free New Brighton (PFNB) is a community-led initiative currently operating under the umbrella of the New Brighton Project. Focused on protecting and restoring the local ecosystem in New Brighton, Christchurch, PFNB's mission is to enhance biodiversity and promote a healthy, predator-free environment through collaboration, education, and hands-on action.

PFNB works closely with local residents, schools, and community groups to implement effective trapping and monitoring systems, restore native habitats, and build public awareness around conservation. The project aims to reduce predator numbers through targeted trapping programmes, engage the community through education and volunteer opportunities, and enhance local green spaces to support native flora and fauna.

PFNB's operational area stretches from the end of the Spit to Bottle Lake Forest, and up the river to Bower Park. Current trapping takes place in the Avon Estuary, the New Brighton Dunes, leased land around the Rawhiti Domain Golf Course, and parts of the red zone. PFNB holds two partnership agreements with Christchurch City Council for these areas, with Council rangers providing support through bait and trap replacements.

Through collective action, PFNB seeks to make a measurable impact on the environment while fostering a more resilient and connected community.

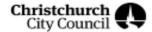
PFNB is seeking funding to support wages for its Predator Free New Brighton / Coastal Kaitiaki Coordinator, who works an average of 3–5 hours per day. This role is vital to maintaining programme coordination, expanding volunteer capacity, and continuing to deliver meaningful conservation outcomes.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Delivers measurable environmental impact by reducing predator numbers, restoring native habitats, and enhancing biodiversity across key ecological areas in the Coastal area, in partnership with local communities and Christchurch City Council.

This project aligns with the Community Board Plan by supporting the priority of enhancing environmental wellbeing, specifically through the protection and restoration of the Avon-Heathcote Estuary Ihutai.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

An increasing numbers of new juniors players are achieving interclub and tournament successes. The club have year on year increasing successes in all junior age groups - and have one of the greatest numbers of junior players in Canterbury.

The club have the specific aim of keeping youth from disadvantaged regions engaged in tennis.

The club fielded 13 junior interclub teams for 2024/2025 and want to increase this number in the 2025/26 season in all levels of play.

Promote and support whanau to participate and volunteer within the Club on the Committee or in other roles.

Staff Assessment

South New Brighton Tennis Club Incorporated (SBT) was established in 1929, providing the local community with opportunities to engage in tennis. Situated within the South New Brighton Domain, the club has five tennis courts, a volley court, and modern clubroom facilities. In 2023, SBT has 184 members, with 67 being seniors, 115 juniors and 6 social players.

SBT is dedicated to making tennis accessible to children and young people by mitigating financial barriers through low membership costs. The junior members get the opportunity to partake in the Tennis NZ Hotshots, helping them learn the sport through play, using modified equipment (lighter rackets and modified balls). This allows the children to learn at a pace that suits them. By removing financial barriers for families, SBT encourages participation, fostering physical and mental well-being while encouraging the development of social connections within the community. The club prioritises maintaining low membership fees to ensure everyone has the opportunity to partake.

SBT has one of the lowest membership fees of all Canterbury tennis clubs, plus a range of membership types and payment options for families with limited resources. Club members have even donated memberships.

SBT provide clothing, racquets, shoes and equipment to new junior players to promote access and the club coach provides starter lessons free of charge. The club actively fundraise for juniors to attend tournaments including travel and accommodation.

The Club are proud to have 4 generations of tennis players actively playing, celebrating intergenerational play and lifelong participation in sport. They integrate with school programmes, physical education programmes, youth groups, community groups and ECSRS sports and the camping ground.

SBT also field better resourced but smaller clubs' junior players from Shirley, Burwood, Redcliff, Edgeware regions in teams to facilitate smaller clubs with insufficient numbers to play interclub and join club social activities.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The application aligns strongly with the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy and Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy.

Encourages children to have a go at tennis in a safe welcoming environment.

Provides a supportive environment where children can feel that they are valued and included, which results in ongoing participation.

Welcome new members and are committed to ensuring that everyone has a fair chance to enjoy some fun in the sun while experiencing the joy of outdoor bowls.

Staff Assessment

Woolston Park Bowling Club has been established since 1938 and is a very successful medium-sized club in Christchurch. The Club have hosted National and Canterbury events this year because of the quality of the work of the greenkeeper. The Club would like to expand on these opportunities, so are prioritising retaining the greenkeeper.

The Club do not want to raise the membership subscription costs further so are looking at alternatives options to top up their income. First year members are free and the club have spare sets of bowls for new members to use. The club have had the current greenkeeper for coming up 2 years and in this time they have improved the green to such a high standard that earlier in 2025, the club were allocated National events and the Bowls Canterbury Champion of Champion finals. This would not have been possible without the hard work of the greenkeeper.

The Club have been hosting community evenings featuring Corporate Bowls every Friday night for ten weeks throughout the year. These events not only bring people together but also offer a welcoming space for newcomers to try bowls in a relaxed, social setting and for current members to share their passion for the sport. Additionally, the club partners with local schools to support youth sports activities. These collaborations provide young people with opportunities to engage in physical activity, learn new skills, and feel a sense of inclusion and support from the wider community.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

SeniorNet New Brighton enables its members to use computers, laptops, and mobile phones more effectively. Members are able to conduct business and banking online, and stay connected with friends and whānau through emails, text messages, Facebook, and other digital platforms—reducing feelings of loneliness and isolation. The group supports between 60 and 80 members and is run entirely by volunteers, operating four days each week.

Staff Assessment

SeniorNet New Zealand is a national organisation that specialises in computer skills training for seniors aged fifty and over. SeniorNet offers a wide range of training programmes to suit the needs of participants—ranging from beginners to confident users looking to upskill. SeniorNet provides one-on-one tutorials to help older citizens understand and work with their computers and devices. These sessions make everyday tasks such as online banking, shopping, and digital communication with whānau and friends more achievable and easier to manage.

As a result, participants are better able to communicate online, are less socially isolated, can manage day to day things online, are more informed about their communities, and are less likely to fall victim to scams. SeniorNet New Brighton was established in 2001 and operates four days a week from 10am to 12 noon, with additional sessions available by appointment on Fridays. Based at the New Brighton Club on Marine Parade, the group currently has 80 members.

Membership costs \$30 per year, and course fees are \$10 per day. The centre is entirely volunteer-run—volunteers organise and tutor all sessions and workshops.

Training courses cover a range of topics, including an introduction to computers, working with files and folders, computer maintenance, email, internet use, and Windows. Workshops also cover using a tablet, photo imaging and digital photography, social media, TradeMe, smartphones, iPhones, and iPads.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Funding this project supports digital inclusion and social isolation for older adults. Social isolation caused by the digital gap is a significant issue which this project is directly aiming to address.

The project is entirely volunteer-run, delivering high-impact outcomes for 60–80 local members through affordable training while also supporting those who are volunteering with providing

Once students are able to use their devices to a larger extent, they contribute their skills to use in other groups that they participate in, expanding the reach of this program outside of just the one-on-one classes.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

We hope that the funding given will assist us to keep our equipment up to date & fit for purpose, and Patrollers equiped for the voluntary work they do.

Technology is also a tool we use on every shift so up to date & effective phones/radios/IPads for communication are an essential part of our day to day running of our organisation.

Staff Assessment

The Burwood Pegasus Community Watch provides regular patrols across the east of Christchurch. These are organised and operated by over 30 local volunteers, with the Watch currently running 2–3 patrols per day, 7 days per week, covering Prestons, New Brighton, Burwood, Aranui, and parts of Linwood. A standard patrol consists of 2 volunteers and lasts 2–3 hours. Each patrol caters to the needs of the local area, often increasing presence in certain locations and times based on gathered information, patrolling where and when it best supports Police and community.

The Watch works in partnership with other organisations to reduce crime and harm through the active presence of trained patrollers. A close working relationship with NZ Police sees the Watch act as extra eyes and ears through intelligence gathering, sharing, and observation to assist Police and other agencies in building safer communities.

With large red-zoned areas within patrol boundaries, these can attract unwanted activities such as graffiti. The Watch works closely with the CCC Graffiti Team to identify hotspots, supporting graffiti removal using the Snap Send Solve app. Additionally, they highlight other issues during patrols, including dumped rubbish, shopping trolleys, and waste furniture like mattresses, allowing Council to find a resolution.

Recently, the Watch has increased its presence in the wider community through promotion and marketing, leading to more volunteer sign-ups. Several new members have joined, boosting capacity and easing the workload on long-serving members.

The committee organises regular volunteer recognition events to thank members for their time, ensuring all feel valued and can socialise with others.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The application aligns with several of the Community Safety Priorities within the Waitai Coastal-Burwood-Linwood Community Board Plan.

These patrols are a regular presence in the community which help to support people feeling safe in their own neighbourhoods.

This is the main service provider of its kind in the Waitai Community Board Area.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Weekly Support Programme: A structured weekly programme is provided for up to six local children at a time.

Quality Mentoring and Support: Two paid staff and up to four volunteers deliver tailored mentoring and support to participating children.

Termly Intake: A new group of children is enrolled each term, allowing for four programme cycles annually and expanding the programme's reach.

Community and Family Engagement: Staff and volunteers actively engage with parents and caregivers to build community connections and better understand each child's background and needs.

Staff Assessment

The Palace, run by the South City Youth Trust, is an afterschool programme in Aranui designed for Tamariki aged 5 to 11 who are referred by the Haeata Community Campus or social workers. Operating since 2008 and under the Trust's oversight since 2015, it provides a safe, nurturing environment focused on supporting children facing social challenges. The programme aims to show the value of education and encourage children to stay engaged in the school system.

The Palace engages with at risk Tamariki early to prevent negative behaviours from becoming entrenched and continuing into adulthood. The programme offers significant one-on-one mentoring delivered by part-time youth workers and volunteers who run four structured programmes annually, one per term. These programmes are organised by age and gender, such as five- to seven-year-old girls meeting for five weeks, followed by boys in the same age group. Sessions run for 2.5 hours on Friday afternoons and include a variety of life skills activities like baking, gardening, sewing, scrapbooking, music, and sports.

Children are encouraged to develop social skills and friendships through special events, camps, and holiday programmes, and they actively participate in preparing and sharing meals. The programme empowers children to dream big, recognize the importance of continuing education, and build on their talents and passions for future success.

In addition to supporting children, The Palace collaborates closely with parents and local organisations to enhance family stability and life skills, aiming to break cycles of dependence by helping families access employment opportunities. By investing in early intervention, the Trust fosters positive development that enables Tamariki to contribute meaningfully to their whānau, community, and their own futures.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The Palace continues to provide a safe a space for tamariki especially those at risk, providing them with experiences and key life skills that will be impactful far beyond their involvement in the programme.

The work of the trust extends beyond the support of tamariki and works with the families supporting them into paid work breaking the benefit cycle.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

To keep younger tamariki in the community engaged in sport by providing quality coaching and management, access to equipment like balls, and a reliable indoor space to train and connect regardless of the weather.

Staff Assessment

Parklands Christchurch United Softball Club (PCUSC) is based at Rawhiti Domain in New Brighton and has approximately 250 members. This includes mixed Teeball for four to six-year-olds, Teeball for six to nine-year-olds, and progresses through the grades to Little League, Junior League, Seniors, Mixed Social, and Premiers.

PCUSC is a member of Eastern Community Sports and Recreation Incorporated, which gives teams priority access to both the indoor training facility and the Eastern Canopy when required. The club plays between three and five games per week during the summer season, alongside regular team training sessions.

PCUSC is currently dedicating time and effort to supporting junior players, helping them stay engaged in the sport by supplying equipment such as balls and using the Eastern Hub for off-season and pre-season training. However, the costs associated with these efforts have become increasingly difficult to sustain and are not something the club wishes to pass on to children and their families.

Additional funding support would help PCUSC continue to provide opportunities for young people to stay active and connected through sport while keeping fees low. With financial assistance, the club can maintain its off-season and pre-season training programmes ensuring junior players remain engaged, focused, and part of a team environment.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The grant will have a direct impact by providing the support needed for participation in grassroots sport.

This project aligns with New Brighton Safety Initiatives in the Waitai Community Board Plan by supporting Rawhiti Domain to be more welcoming and safer. It activates the space in line with CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) recommendations outlined in the 2025 report.

Reduce financial barriers so more tamariki and rangatahi can participate in rugby league. By subsidising fees and providing gear, whānau facing hardship can still be involved. This boosts physical activity, social connection, and creates a sense of belonging for players and their families.

Providing essential equipment to coaches will make training safer, more engaging, and effective, helping tamariki develop confidence and skills while enjoying the game.

Provide whānau events like the pre-season Have-a-Go Day and mid-season Celebration will bring the community together in a positive, welcoming space. These events encourage whānau to connect, promote the value of sport, and support active involvement in tamariki's activities. Engaged whānau contribute to better outcomes for tamariki and a stronger, united community.

The club will be an inclusive, supportive environment where tamariki thrive and whānau feel welcomed. Empowered coaches and volunteers will build strong leadership and a sustainable future for the club.

Improve physical health, social wellbeing, and emotional confidence for tamariki and rangatahi through accessible sport and community connection.

Staff Assessment

Lions Community Sports & Education Trust, established in 2016, is a registered charity supporting Rugby League, Basketball, Athletics, and Dance clubs. This application seeks funding for operating costs of the Lions Rugby League Club's 2026 season, including subsidised registration fees for junior players, training and game equipment, and two whānau events—a pre-season "have-a-go" day and a mid-season celebration. These events foster whanaungatanga and strengthen community connections.

Their vision is to grow a club where tamariki thrive, whānau feel supported, and rugby league remains a joyful part of our community. They aim to keep membership costs low to remove financial barriers, especially for large families. Player numbers have grown from 79 in 2023 to 131 in 2025, reflecting the club's welcoming environment. Whānau consistently highlight the importance of subsidies, quality coaching, and inclusive events. While faith-based, 74.1% of members and many volunteers are not affiliated with the church, showing broad community appeal.

The Club maintain strong local partnerships, including:

Hauora Tribe, a whānau-centred gym on Wainoni Road,

Woolston Rugby League Club, collaborating on our 12s team,

Canterbury Rugby League, providing coaching clinics and representative pathways for rangatahi.

In 2024, Te Kiwai funding from Te Pūtahitanga enabled full payment of subs. However, with its cessation in early 2025, the Club are reporting a significant drop in sub payments. To ease financial pressure on whānau, the Club are now offer weekly payment options for subs and gear.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Alignment with the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy People pillar; Build, nurture and strengthen relationships with Pacific communities and Support groups involved in providing access to arts, culture, heritage, recreation, and those who care for the environment.

Providing funding assistance for their programmes will allow the trust to keep its membership costs affordable and accessible by breaking down any financial barriers to participation.

This project builds stronger whānau involvement, and supports positive outcomes for tamariki helping create a healthier, more connected hapori.

Staff Assessment

Adventure Specialties Trust are a national organisation and have an office based in Ōtautahi at 71 Bamford Street in Woolston. The Trust offer transformative programmes specialising in outdoor adventure and mental health support. They work with disadvantaged groups, collaborating with schools, alternative education centres, and community organisations. Employing skilled outdoor instructors and qualified mental health professionals, the Trust provides safe, therapeutic activities designed to build resilience, self-worth, and community connection.

The Trust are looking to introduce their Mums on the Move to Ōtautahi. The programme supports local mothers to overcome feelings of isolation and get outside and active for their mental and physical wellbeing using Te Whare Tapa Whā, Māori model of holistic wellbeing. Each session, around 8-10 local Mums are taken on a local adventure, returning in time for school pick up. Weaving well-being themes into fun and safe physical activities which facilitate and encourage team bonding, skills development the sessions offer opportunities for outdoor adventures introducing participants to new and exciting ways to be physically active in their local area. They are taught introductory skills for active recreation such as day walks, cycling, kayaking or surfing and encouraging ongoing participation. The aim is that the Mums feel healthier, more energetic, motivated and physically capable of pursuing activities that bring joy, connection and satisfaction to their days and hopefully are inspired to then recreate their adventures with their own whānau.

Adventure Specialities Trust have successfully run Mums on the Move programmes in Auckland and are seeking funding to trial the programme in Ōtautahi, utilising the abundant range of recreational opportunities in the Waitai Community Board area.

Rationale for staff recommendation

In the context of increasing statistics of suicide, disengaged youth, obesity, and psychological distress in adults, Adventure Specialities Trust aims to respond to the needs of the community by providing outdoor adventure programmes that facilitate holistic development through positive experiences supporting personal development and mental health, regardless of economic, physical or social barriers.

To help achieve this outcome, Adventure Specialities Trust propose to introduce their Mums on the Move programme, connecting with a group of Mums who are facing challenges in their personal and family lives, to learn about the places and spaces of their local area, develop a sense of belonging and connection to whenua and to their communities.

Adventure Specialities Trust regularly attend the Woolston Well-Being Network hui, developing collaborations with the local groups and kura including Ngutuawa and YouthTown. They intend to continue to work through the various local networks in order to connect participants to the local groups offering opportunities for active recreation, so they can continue to engage in programmes and recreate some the experiences with their own tamariki and whānau, leading healthy active lifestyles.

Staff Assessment

The Brighton Gallery Trust (the Trust) was established in 2000 by a group of local artists. The Trust operates the Brighton Gallery, located at Shop 2 Carnaby Lane in Brighton Mall. The Gallery is open seven days a week for anyone to visit, view the art, or participate in classes.

The Trust's mission is to foster creativity, self-expression, and connection among community members, regardless of background or experience. The Gallery serves as the physical space where the Trust delivers its programmes, designed to encourage artistic exploration, build confidence, and promote wellbeing. By bringing people together through art, the Trust aims to strengthen community bonds, celebrate diversity, and inspire a lifelong appreciation for the arts. The Trust is seeking funding for operational costs to continue delivering its valuable community art programmes.

One key initiative, the Community Art Classes project, offers accessible, inclusive, and engaging art education for individuals of all ages and skill levels. This project provides a series of hands-on workshops and classes, led by local artists and educators, introducing participants to a range of artistic mediums such as painting, drawing, handicrafts, and mixed media, with a focus on recycling and sustainability. Classes are held fortnightly at the New Brighton Gallery, with materials provided. Fees are based on participants' ability to pay, and there is no cost for Community Services Card and Gold Card holders. As the programme grows, quarterly exhibitions will be held at the Gallery at no cost to participants. Additionally, the Trust supports local artists by selling artwork displayed in the Gallery. This generates a small income for the Trust and commissions for the artists.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The Trust are working towards operating with a social enterprise model, with art sales, commissions, lessons and exhibitions providing income to offset their costs. As they currently rent a space in the mall however, the funding they are applying for is essential to keep the Gallery open for the community. To cover operational costs that enable the Brighton Gallery Trust to provide free or low-cost workshops, exhibitions, and a community arts space that benefits both participants and local artists through engagement and income opportunities.

Being based in the mall the gallery activates an area of the street and thoroughfare which contributes to the Community Board Plan priority; New Brighton Mall, supporting the Gallery to occupy and enliven a premises that may otherwise be left vacant.

The Trust is entering a new phase of development, with fresh trustees bringing a new focus. While the Trust has previously faced financial challenges, it is now actively working toward long-term sustainability through improved governance, strategic planning, and strengthened community engagement.

Stitch-O-Mat provides a welcoming space where whānau can learn to sew, mend clothing, and repurpose donated textiles that would otherwise go to landfill — promoting environmental awareness and circular practices. Funding will enable the Trust to continue offering low-cost workshops, support local volunteers, and maintain a space where everyone feels they belong.

Expected outcomes include increased social connection, reduced social isolation, enhanced self-reliance through practical skills, and measurable environmental impact through fabric diversion. This mahi strengthens community wellbeing, fosters belonging, and supports a more sustainable and connected Christchurch.

Staff Assessment

Stitch-O-Mat is a not-for-profit organisation that has been operating for eight years. Based at Shop 4, Carnaby Lane in Surfside Mall, New Brighton, it provides a welcoming community sewing room, equipped with machines, tools, materials, and expertise for people to learn, share, and participate in sewing and textile-based projects. The space is open for drop-in sessions from 10am to 2pm on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays; 7pm to 9pm on Tuesdays; and 1pm to 4pm on Sundays.

Stitch-O-Mat's kaupapa is a commitment to empowering people of all ages, backgrounds, and abilities to connect, create, and learn through sewing, mending, and textile arts. Focused on environmental sustainability, the organisation rescues fabric and textile waste destined for landfill and transforms it into meaningful, community-driven projects. Stitch-O-Mat has contributed to wider community initiatives, including sewing all the bags for the Welcome Bags project delivered by the New Brighton Project a collaboration that reflects their strong community ties. This mahi not only diverts waste but also strengthens resilience, fosters skill development, and builds social cohesion across diverse groups.

With continued support, Stitch-O-Mat will further nurture creativity, environmental responsibility, and a sense of belonging. Funding will enable Stitch-O-Mat to keep offering low-cost workshops, support local volunteers, and maintain a space where all feel welcome. Since moving to its current premises, Stitch-O-Mat has seen a marked increase in foot traffic and community participation, reflecting both the accessibility of the space and the growing demand for its kaupapa. This growth affirms the vital role Stitch-O-Mat plays in fostering community connection, resilience, and environmental awareness. In addition to regular drop-in sessions, Stitch-O-Mat offers a Learn-to-Sew class and sustainability workshops. Participants can bring their own projects or contribute to Stitch-O-Mat's community initiatives, such as making Veggie Co-op bags or costumes for the Children's Ward at Christchurch Hospital.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Stitch-O-Mat provides a place where participants feel welcomed, safe and are able to relax and connect with others, helping to promote community wellbeing by providing an affordable and accessible community space for people to learn and connect. The project helps support vulnerable and isolated tangata, particularly those with disabilities as a safe and welcoming space addressing a key social development issue of social isolation.

Stitch O Mat delivers measurable environmental and social outcomes through fabric diversion and sustainable practices. Their work transforms textile waste into community assets, diverts materials from landfill, and supports local initiatives such as the Welcome Bags project and hospital donations. Continued funding will sustain this impact and meet increasing community demand, as shown by their recent growth in participation.

Stitch-O-Mat, located in the heart of Brighton Mall, plays a vital role in activating the space by drawing consistent foot traffic, hosting inclusive community programmes, and providing a visible, welcoming hub. This encourages people to visit and spend time in the area, directly supporting the objectives of the Waitai Community Board Plan for New Brighton Mall.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Connectedness: Reducing incidences of isolation and loneliness by connecting with friends, making new friends, connecting with or discovering relatives, connecting with social services that can provide the services they need, connecting with activities and enjoyment by listening and watching the entertainment or engaging with karaoke. Leaving the house to attend the event.

Access to Services: A number of Social Services volunteer their time at the lunch as servers so kaumatua get access to these people for support. Our own organisation offers advocacy and navigation of services to kaumatua. For example advocating and navigating with WINZ Seniors or Kainga Ora, with lawyers when completing wills or advocacy with assessment and entry into rest-homes, finding appropriate health support and or equipment and connecting to others.

Connection to Te Ao Māori: Often our kaumatua have been living away from their home town for many years and have become disconnected. The kaumatua lunch offers reconnection to Te Ao Māori and cultural practices such as karakia, waiata, te reo tikanga and most importantly whakawhānaungatanga, with new and old friends.

Staff Assessment

Te Puna Oranga (TPO) has been in operation for over 40 years. TPO provide a range of services for Māori Whanau (in particular women and children) living with or suffering from family violence, youth criminal offending, alcohol and substance abuse. TPO collaborates with many other groups but remain one of a small number of agencies who offer a Kaupapa Māori counselling service to the community. Around 90% of their clients are Māori but their services extend to everyone regardless of their ethnicity.

The kaumatua lunch, held at the Ngā Hau e Whā National Marae, was initially developed to provide a sense of community and connection for elderly and vulnerable tangata in the East of Ōtautahi. Offering a hearty roast meal and dessert with unlimited cups of tea and coffee, juice and water the lunches also feature live entertainment and karaoke. Attended by up to 300 people monthly who predominantly live in the East of Christchurch, it is an event that participants can look forward to and provides some excitement and sense of purpose for a day. It is an opportunity to see old friends and reconnect with Te Ao Māori.

The Kaumatua lunch also helps participants to connect with a range of social services who volunteer on the day. Te Puna Oranga provide transport to those who need it ensuring the events are fully accessible for those who cannot make their own way there. Valet parking is provided at the marae when the weather is poor. A group of volunteers are ready to wait on the elderly to manaaki and support to ensure their experience is enjoyable.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project strongly aligns to the Te Pou Tuatahi, Te Tangata; Objective 1.7 Work with others to reduce loneliness and social isolation, with particular focus on intergenerational approaches.

Many elderly tangata are living away from their birthplace, their tamariki have grown and have moved away and they have few or no visitors or support. These factors all compound and lead to a loss of connection to whenua ad whānau and a decline of their sense of belonging and purpose.

The Kaumatua lunches, held at the Ngā Hau e Whā National Marae, aim to reduce isolation and loneliness offering an opportunity to connect, engage with services, listen and watch entertainment and enjoy a meal with others.

The projects demonstrates high quality and efficient collaboration with support from He Waka Tapu, Depression Support Network, Te Whare Hauora and Te Runanga o Ngā Maata Waka as well as whānau and friends of Te Puna Oranga to meet the needs of the community while continuing to ensure the community has a voice in the structure and implementation of the project.

Students will benefit from increased leadership and discipline, increased skills in communication, self-management, problem solving, teamwork and courage, strengthening their kapa haka and cultural competency.

Decrease in truancy from disengaged students.

Improved health and wellbeing of tamariki and whānau by fostering a sense of togetherness by sharing and celebrating our culture through arts, culture and heritage activities.

Staff Assessment

Te Waka Unua are located on Ferry Road next to Woolston Park and provide a school learning community for years one to eight. The school provide bilingual learning programmes in Māori and Samoan and offer multiple opportunities to participate in kapa haka and Pasifika performance groups, beyond their core curriculum.

Interest in kapa haka among students and their whānau has grown considerably. This year 100 tamariki trialled for 40 spots. The school employ a haka tutor all the students have weekly haka sessions. Last year Te Waka Unua was represented by three groups of 40, competing at the regional primary school competition. One of the groups qualified for the national competition in Tauranga this November.

Te Waka Unua are applying for funding to support their Connecting Community Through Culture project which, although has the focus on the pinnacle of the National Kapa Haka competition, its kaupapa has more long-term goals, centred around building capacity, inspiring more tamariki and their whānau to get involved, to learn about their local history, pūrakau (stories) and develop their knowledge of te reo Māori and tikanga.

There are 40 students, 6 staff members and 15 volunteers consistently involved in the project. As a whole they are engaged in creating and developing everything they need for cultural learning and developing performances drawing on their own knowledge, skills and experience. Whānau write and teach waiata and cook for the tamariki during weekend practises. Elders are invited in to share pūrakau, speaking to the history and ancestry of the whenua and offer guidance on tikanga. The volunteers also help with fundraising, sewing costumes, the clean-up and preparation for practises, engaging more community members, transport and simply being present as role models for the tamariki.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project aims to instil pride in identity, connecting ākonga (students) with each other and connecting their whānau to the school community. Using Māori performing arts and te Reo Māori as a focus to bring together parents, whānau and elders, Te Waka Unua are providing a space for community to connect, participate and access quality cultural learning.

Many tamariki feel disenfranchised and removed from their whakapapa and struggle to understand their identity. Through facilitating opportunities for community to share and learn about local history, pūrakau, waiata, te reo Māori and tikanga, the group are helping to foster connection with the whenua and culture, fostering a sense of pride and belonging to Eastern Ōtautahi.

Building a strong sense of identity helps to repair the disconnection with cultural identity that has eroded over time. This connection enables tamariki who have disengaged from education to explore and strengthen their own sense of empowerment and whakamana to learn and grow as an individual. This project strongly aligns with Te Haumako Te Whitingia Strengthening Communities Te Pou Tuatahi: Te Tangata, Objective 1.1: Develop and enhance relationships with tangata whenua via mana whenua and Te Hononga.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Growing New Brighton is a community initiative focused on delivering long-term environmental, educational, and social benefits for the New Brighton area by involving tamariki, schools, families, and volunteers in gardening, creative workshops, and public space enhancements.

The project aims to increase knowledge of sustainable gardening and native plants, boost community pride and mental wellbeing, and empower young people through hands-on learning and leadership opportunities.

By fostering ongoing volunteerism and providing inclusive, accessible programmes, Growing New Brighton strengthens community connections and contributes to a greener, more connected village where residents feel a sense of ownership and belonging.

Staff Assessment

Launched in March 2024, Growing New Brighton (GNB) is a community-led initiative currently working under the umbrella of the New Brighton Project. Its mission is to make New Brighton greener and more connected through environmental education, youth engagement, and inclusive, hands-on programmes. GNB offers free and low-cost activities that promote wellbeing, sustainability, and creativity. Key programmes include the After School Gardening Club, nature-based workshops with Rāwhiti School, Beach Tots, inclusive sessions with Recreate NZ, and creative activations at the 105 Collective Make Station. Volunteers and local youth help maintain seasonal community planters throughout the CBD, supported by educational signage that encourages learning and interaction.

The initiative aims to expand its programmes in 2024/202 strengthening school partnerships, involving local artists and educators, introducing more edible and medicinal planting, and growing its volunteer base to ensure long-term sustainability. Through these efforts, GNB delivers environmental, educational, and social benefits to the New Brighton community. Expected outcomes include increased knowledge of native and sustainable planting, enhanced wellbeing through nature-based and creative activities, and stronger community connections through accessible, inclusive programming. The project empowers young people, promotes local pride, and fosters a sense of ownership in shared spaces.

In its first year, GNB delivered approximately 120 activities. These include 36 creative workshops involving around 144 participants, 40 after-school gardening sessions reaching 280 children, and 10 market events attracting over 500 attendees. Toddler groups and Recreate NZ sessions account for a further 264 participants, while events like the Teddy Bears' Picnic brought together 80 locals.

Rationale for staff recommendation

With a focus on beautifying Brighton Mall, GNB supports the board plan under the New Brighton Mall Priority as it aims to improve public perceptions of the mall.

Growing New Brighton delivers free and low cost, inclusive, hands-on environmental and creative programmes that strengthen wellbeing, empowers young people, and fosters community pride through education and sustainability.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Youth Engagement: A weekly Youth Centre session every Friday from 7–9pm provides a safe, consistent space for high school-aged youth to connect and engage.

Community Access and Support: A community drop-in service operates three days per week from 10am–1pm, offering accessible support and connection for all community members.

Early Childhood Support: A free community playgroup runs one morning per week from 10:30am–12pm, supporting families with young children.

Health and Wellbeing Promotion: Sports and recreation programmes are offered throughout the week to promote physical activity and social connection.

Community Facility Access: Legacy Community Centre provides its space to various community groups seven days a week, supporting a wide range of local initiatives.

Community Reach: On average, 65 youth and over 170 adults participate in programmes at the centre each week, demonstrating strong and consistent community engagement.

Staff Assessment

The Burwood Community Church Trust Inc (BCCT) located on Basset Street has undergone major reconstruction over the last 5 years and is becoming a vibrant hub of activity in the Burwood ward. In a community where youth-focused services out of the school curriculum are limited, BCCT plays a key role by offering diverse programmes that support personal development, social engagement, and a sense of belonging.

At the core of BCCT's work with young people in the community is Legacy Youth, a comprehensive programme supporting rangatahi aged 10 to 29. This includes a drop-in youth centre, regular programmes, camps, one-on-one mentoring, and leadership development opportunities. These programmes have seen steady growth in recent years putting increased demand on the resources that BCCT has to support the number of Youth attending their programmes.

Legacy Community Centre operates as a free drop-in space three days a week during school terms, offering social sport, dance fitness, playgroups, and facilities for external group use. Community workers coordinate these efforts, offering guidance, advocacy, and practical support. The trust also has 24/7 Youth workers in several local schools that included both Chisnallwood Intermediate and Avonside Girls. These Youth Workers support students in a number of ways both in and out of the school environment, particularly those facing anxiety, isolation, or challenging home environments.

With around 65 young people engaged weekly, the programmes are addressing growing needs around loneliness, mental health, and social disconnection. The centre also provides space for Pasifika groups and others seeking accessible venues for cultural and recreational activities that are in limited supply within the Burwood Ward.

BCCT's consistent growth and community feedback affirm the value of its programmes. By offering a modern, inclusive facility and welcoming environment, the centre fosters belonging, encourages participation, and strengthens the social fabric of the local area.

Rationale for staff recommendation

BCCT provide a valuable service for Rangatahi who are particularly vulnerable and lack alternative options in the local area. Offering a safe and supportive space where Rangatahi cam feel valued and included

Their services will strengthen the connectedness in the community, enhancing life, health, well-being, and the sense of belonging.

The project has expanded in response to community need and is delivered in a culturally appropriate way.

The expected outcomes of the project is to provide New Brighton Netball Club with quality equipment for the ongoing progression of the club, including developing players skills and enjoyment and easy for coaches with the right equipment.

Staff Assessment

New Brighton Netball Club Incorporated (NBNC) Is the only netball club in New Brighton. The club is committed to encouraging the community, particularly young people, to take part in netball. The junior section at NBNC is very strong, with the goal that the young players continue to grow and pass on their enthusiasm and expertise for recreational and competitive netball on to the next generation. The club prides itself in providing the opportunity for all ages and abilities to participate in netball, whether its for fun, to get out and meet new people, or to compete.

The club relies heavily on fundraising and local support to provide members with uniforms, playing equipment and court hire for training sessions.

NBNC is committed to keeping player fees as low as possible to make netball accessible and enjoyed by all members of the community. By eliminating the financial barrier to participation and encouraging participation helps to improve player's physical, mental, and social networks and community spirit.

The Club ran a preseason have a go skills session at the Eastern Canopy in March for new participants and existing members from years 3 to 10 with funding from the Koru Fund and volunteer coaches running the session. This event saw 20 new junior members with total number for the 2025 season at 140 members, comprising of 17 teams entered in the Christchurch Netball Centre competition with 91 junior players, and 50 senior players playing on Wednesday evenings and Saturday at Hagley Park and Nga Puna Wai.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The application strongly aligns with the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy, in particular, Pillars 1 and 2 and the Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy.

Providing funding assistance for netball equipment will allow NBNC to keep subscriptions affordable and accessible by breaking down any financial barriers to participation.

They are a founding member of ECSR and work collaboratively to bring quality netball experiences and facilities to the local community.

We are still a newly developing club and looking at smart ways to use any funds to upskil and grow our village.

Staff Assessment

Premiere Equipe Judo Club are based at 10 Newton Street Bromley, having just moved from their previous location to a larger space having experienced steady growth in membership. The Club was established five years ago and became an Incorporated Society in 2022. What started as just a few adults training has grown to over sixty tamariki and around forty adults participating in their programmes. Several of the club's students are considered at risk rangatahi and through teaching Judo, Premiere Equipe are able to help their students learn about setting goals, sacrifice for achievement and overcoming adversity. The Club have a successful senior program with around six of their members representing Aotearoa in Judo at the Olympics and Commonwealth Games supported by the club. These black belts give back to the Club give through coaching and training the lower ranks and providing positive roles models for the younger students.

This is the first time the Club have applied to the Strengthening Communities Fund. This is due to positive the growth in membership at the club, therefore they are now looking for support towards the increase in their operating expenses. After seeing their numbers start to grow the Club took the initiative to enhance their administrational and governance capacity and proactively sought and achieved Incorporated Society status. They are run entirely by volunteers many of whom are the parents of tamariki who train and have ended up joining themselves as members, while also providing support in operational and administrative roles

Rationale for staff recommendation

Premiere Equipe Judo are a community-based club providing accessible and affordable opportunities for participants to learn a martial art and develop healthy lifestyle habits.

The club aim to use sport as a tool to develop social capital, with their member learning transferable life skills and for many of their rangatahi, having access to opportunities they have never had open to them.

Premiere Equipe aims to create a safe hub for tamariki and whānau/families to see positive change and impact in the Bromley community through investing in people.

Staff Assessment

It Takes a Village Hub NZ (ITAV) provides essential items to families with children in the local community through its Baby and Toddler Bundle programme. These tailored bundles may include clothing, bedding, feeding items, toiletries, toys, books, and other necessities. Approximately 70% of the bundle contents are high-quality, second-hand items generously donated by the community. Each item is carefully checked and quality controlled. On average, ITAV supports 100 to 125 families each month, responding to a wide range of needs.

Many of the families who engage with ITAV are struggling with the rising cost of living and living week to week. Their already fragile financial position can be tipped over the edge by an unexpected bill, reduced working hours, or increasing costs of essentials. By providing free Baby and Toddler Bundles, ITAV helps parents meet their children's basic needs and avoid going into debt for essential items.

Recipient surveys show that 30% of packs are received by those identifying as Māori, 6% as Pasifika, 30% as NZ European, with the remainder spread across other ethnicities or not specified. Notably, the proportion of Māori and Pasifika recipients has been steadily increasing over the past 24 months. The majority of families supported come from the Coastal and Linwood ward areas.

Requests are received directly from families or through referrals from local community groups, social workers, and Oranga Tamariki, ensuring support reaches the most vulnerable.

ITAV is seeking funding to support wages for its full-time Project Coordinator, who is essential to the delivery of this mahi. This role oversees daily operations, coordinates the 14 dedicated volunteers, processes referrals, manages community donations, and ensures families receive the support they need in a timely and respectful way.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Addresses urgent needs of vulnerable families; ITAV supports 100–125 families each month with essential baby and toddler items, helping to ease the financial pressure caused by the rising cost of living and preventing families from going into debt for basic necessities.

Maximises community impact through volunteering and reuse; With 70% of bundle items donated and 14 active volunteers, ITAV operates a cost-effective, environmentally conscious model that builds community resilience and ensures support reaches those most in need.

This project supports the New Brighton Safety Initiatives outlined in the Community Board Plan by providing essential support services to marginalised and vulnerable tangata and their whānau in New Brighton and the surrounding areas.

Staff Assessment

Ki Te Tihi The Loft Charitable Trust is a community hub based upstairs in Eastgate Mall providing a space for collaborative partnership between health, social, and community organisations including Aviva, Christchurch Resettlement Services, Citizens Advice Bureau, Community Law Canterbury, Kingdom Resources, Link People, Pathways, Plunket, Problem Gambling Foundation, Enliven East Christchurch Kaumātua Services, Asian Family Services, Enabling Good Lives, Kidz need Dadz, Aviva Goodloans, Comcare Trust, Anglican Advocacy and the Ministry of Justice.

The Loft are applying for support towards the wages of one of their Kaitūhono Hapori Community Connectors roles. These kaimahi provide Social Emergency Response Service (SERS), connecting individuals and whānau with the support, advice and resources they need to thrive. They specialise in guiding people through life's challenges by offering tailored support, simplifying access to critical services and a safe place to drop-in, kōrero and connect. The service is designed to ensure that whai ora and their whānau are connected to the services, resources and support they need to attain long- term wellbeing.

The Connectors greet whai ora, encourage them to tell their story and assess their needs after which they can refer them to the appropriate services. Their role is to provide an immediate and integrated response to complex individual and whānau needs, providing practical support that is welcoming, relationship-centred and mana-enhancing. People come to The Loft with a host of challenging issues including family violence, child health and safety, addictions, housing, financial, employment, and mental health. Through partnerships with other agencies, the Connectors endeavour to reduce multiple barriers (including financial, emotional, physical and geographical) that commonly restrict access to multiple services and supports. The Connectors are also active in the community, attending network meetings and liaising with other community organisations, collaborating on projects as well as delivering their own community education and networking events.

Rationale for staff recommendation

This project has strong alignment with the Te Haumako Te Whitingia Strengthening Communities Together Strategy, particularly People, Participation and Preparedness and the Equity and Wellbeing Policy.

The Loft/Ki te Tihi Trust is a shared workspace for a range of health and social service providers. By bringing services together under one roof, the Trust aim to make it simpler for people to find help, connect with the right support, and improve their wellbeing.

The Community Connector role provides critical and essential assistance to vulnerable, at-risk people and families in crisis, providing immediate and where appropriate, integrated response to complex individual and whānau needs.

The need for these types of services is increasing due to economic stressors and unexpected events that are destabilising for people and their whānau.

These outcomes support positive decision-making and lead to stronger long-term outcomes for young people and their communities.

Staff Assessment

Epic Sports Trust (Epic) is a charitable trust established in 2021 with the primary objective of changing the lives of tamariki and rangatahi by fostering a sense of value, belonging, and self-worth.

Epic is seeking funding to support its initiatives to cover the cost of coaching wages for its 5 Get Active Sports and Get Active Hip Hop programmes catering for approximately 90 young people per week in the Linwood area. Sessions are held in local parks, Bromley community centre, and Bromley school. Both programmes provide opportunities for young people aged five to 16 to participate in various sports and recreation activities. The Active Sports programme includes activities like invasion games, soccer, netball, touch rugby, hockey, and basketball. The Hip Hop programme creates a safe place where young people can express their creativity. Epic employs skilled part-time coaches and instructors to deliver these programmes that aim to empower young individuals in their lives. The programmes include sessions conducted within schools as extra-curricular activities and community-based sessions after school.

Epic strongly focuses on collaborating with other organisations to achieve the best outcomes for participants. Through these partnerships, Epic aims to eliminate the financial barriers by providing free access to sports and dance experiences.

Young people in the Linwood area face significant challenges, including social isolation, and limited access to affordable, positive activities outside of school. Many whanau cannot afford sport or dance opportunities due to cost, transport, or equipment barriers. Feedback from teachers, youth workers, parents, and programme participants has consistently highlighted these issues. Youth report feeling disconnected, unsupported, and are lacking hope. The Epic programme directly addresses these needs by offering free, accessible sessions in familiar, safe community spaces, providing connection, belonging, support, encouragement, and inspiration.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project aligns strongly with the Te-Haumako-Te Whitingia-Strengthening Communities Together Strategy.

This project supports a community organisation working in predominantly lower socioeconomic areas, reducing barriers for young people to participate in sport and recreation through its free community sessions.

The organisation is fiscally responsible with a proven track record of delivery, ensuring they meet their outcomes within budget.

Burwood Park Tennis Club was established in 1934 and is located on Burwood Park South, Cresswell Avenue offering year-round social and competitive tennis, their facilities include clubrooms, four plexipave hard courts with lights for night tennis and three astroturf courts. The Club is affiliated to Tennis Canterbury. The Club is now back to its pre-quake membership level of 300+ members, with a good balance of junior and seniors participating in both social and competitive tennis formats. They are an inclusive club, supportive of the wider community, enjoying and encouraging participation with the recent installation of the pay to play court access system. The Club are community focused with collaborations with local groups offering the Clubrooms for meeting for low cost/free use.

The Club are seeking support with the operating costs for the delivery of the Junior Hot Shots programme coaching costs and running four coach development workshops for junior and senior coaches.

The coaching programmes for both junior and senior members and prospective members is growing rapidly. The Club have coaching events on Saturday mornings and Saturday afternoons along with new programmes on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings. A key element of delivery the JHSP is well trained and reliable coaching. The Club is committed to retaining and recognising the contributions of rangatahi members by providing the opportunity to be actively involved in organising and leading the Saturday morning Junior Hot Shots programme (tamariki aged 3-11 years) and also to be involved in the adult 'three for free' introductory beginner lessons. It has been proven that keeping rangatahi involved in tennis and developing their interpersonal skills with community members of all ages, ethnicities and backgrounds is absolutely invaluable in their personal development and future prospects. The Club recognise that they are competing against other part time paid employment.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project aligns to a nationally proven programme (Hot Shots) which provide a participant pathway introducing children to the game concepts .

Staff Assessment

Richmond Keas Softball Club (RKS) is a family-friendly softball club based at Linfield Park in Linwood. The club's purpose is to support people to participate in softball and enjoy all the social, mental, and physical benefits that come from being involved in sport. The Club is experiencing steady growth within all age groups of the membership. They cater for all age groups and abilities; including Mixed T-Ball, Junior Softball (U11-U23 Boys & Girls), U7-U18 Play Saturday, U23 Play Monday Night, Senior Open Grade Softball (Men's, Women's & Mixed), and Premier Men.

The pre-season training for juniors and youth is a new initiative to engage players in term 4 prior to the season commencement utilising the canopy in Rawhiti Domain to build fitness and team skills prior to team training. This project involves a significant amount of volunteer hours to co-ordinate and run this programme.

The Club draw junior players from the greater Linwood area including Whitau School, Linwood Avenue School, Bromley School, Te Waka Unua School, Te Aratai College, and Avonside Girls High School.

RKS addresses barriers to participation with funding assistance to keep subscriptions low and provide players with local facilities, uniforms, and equipment. The club is committed to providing young people with the opportunity to participate in softball. The Club are proactive about retaining current members and encourage others to take up the sport.

St Lukes Samoan Assembly of God operating as Christ City Church is a registered charity located on St Lukes Street in Woolston. The Church has had a complete refurbishment of its facilities church, hall and meeting spaces including installing a new sealed carpark with marked volleyball and basketball

The Church provides religious services and activities but also have a programme plan to deliver a variety of services for church and local community including community kai, after school programme and the music programmes.

They are proposing to run the programme the Eastside Active Community Program from October 2025 to April 2026, offering free fitness classes and social sports sessions twice a week, welcoming people of all ages, backgrounds, and abilities using the on-site facilities: a large indoor hall and outdoor volleyball and basketball court.

The purpose of the programme is to make it easy for people of all ages to be active by offering free fitness classes for the extended whanau with fun social sports, games and fitness options. They are intending to seek participants feedback about their experience of the programme to ensure they are meeting the intended target audience of Pasifika families and people from low-income communities.

The need the initiative is addressing comes from a 2023 study indicating that Pasifika young adults in Aotearoa New Zealand are less likely to meet physical activity guidelines compared to their European counterparts, especially among women and those living in areas with high social deprivation. (Wilson, O.W.A., Smith, M., Duncan, S. et al. Differences in physical activity participation among young adults in Aotearoa New Zealand. BMC Public Health 23, 150 (2023)).

Furthermore, National health surveys show that 65% of Pasifika adults are classified as obese, and 22.3% reported not visiting a GP due to cost, which may contribute to lower physical activity levels. (Ministry of Health, Explorer indicator).

They have an aim to fulfil every need and request for a quality performance gymnastics club in the South Island and New Zealand. At the same time, they strive to build a strong foundation through collaboration, serving the community with challenging and enjoyable gymnastics sessions for people of all ages, abilities, and fitness levels.

By securing this funding, the club will have more resources available to contribute towards their other operating costs and avoid fee increases for their existing recreational and competitive members. The club pride themselves on catering to the community by providing classes for Preschool-aged children, Primary and High Schools; Recreational Classes for 5-13 year old children, Xtreme Teen Classes 14+ years, Adults 16+ age group, Senior Adults aged 55+, Pre-Natal Classes for Mums and Dads-to-be, Physically/Mentally Disadvantaged, Community Sports Teams, and Non-Profit Organisations.

Since securing our new swimming coach we have begun restructuring and rebuilding a committee of volunteers to move forward with renewed focus and vigour to deliver swim programs for our members.

We have begun connecting with the multitude of Surf Life Saving Clubs, Schools and Sports Teams on the eastern side of Christchurch that will benefit from our quality swim programs catering for fitness, fun and competition.

Success here would be reflected in our membership increasing, our members increasing their fitness and wellness and enjoying the social aspect of competing in a team that brings camaraderie and enjoyment to the Taiora QEII swim complex.

Staff Assessment

QEII Swim Club Incorporated (the club) originated at the previous QEII Sport and Recreation Centre. Based at the QEII Taiora Swim Complex, the club has been a cornerstone of Christchurch's eastern swim community since 1966 and has maintained strong ties to the QEII Swim complex since the 1974 Commonwealth Games, originally held at the historic QEII Swimming Pool. They have a membership of 44 swimmers with at least half of this number swim training to compete for their Surf Life Saving Club. The Club objectives are to promote the sport of swimming and provide swim coaching services to Club members. The age demographic for the Club's swimmers is 9-25.

The squad programme provides not only a pathway for competitive swimmers but also builds swimming skills for fitness and also for swimmers taking part in water polo, surf lifesaving and triathlon. The Club numbers have dropped in the last year from 80 to 66, this has been due to 'cost of living' impacts on families and an increased in the cost to participate. The Club also lost a large number of their sports squad (a mix of fitness, tri and surf swimmers) when Wharenui Pool in conjunction with TRI Canterbury started a training squad at Wharenui pool. The Club hold regular Club nights to provide opportunities to connect and promote competitive swimming to recently graduated Learn to Swim swimmers. The Club still has capacity to grow their membership and is able to cater for up to 100 squad swimmers as well as the surf/tri squad.

Like many community-based swimming clubs, the club has navigated both prosperous and challenging periods, including earthquake-related disruptions and relocations. Currently in a phase of rebuilding, the club has secured an experienced and highly skilled swim coach with 12 years of expertise in the Canterbury region. The club is dedicated to supporting and strengthening the swimming community on Christchurch's eastern side.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project aligns with the Strengthening Community Together Strategy and Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy This is the only swim club located on the eastern side of Christchurch

The Club caters for a wide variety of needs given it's location and history including surf life saving clubs and two high schools adjacent
The Club are working closely with Taiora Learn to Swim programme staff to develop stronger pathways from Learn to Swim programmes through to club
membership.

Introduce children to the game of golf and encourage them to consider either becoming a member and/or taking up some further coaching.

Staff Assessment

Waimairi Beach Golf Club enjoys a strong reputation as a professional, friendly club welcoming players of all abilities. The newly renovated course boasts a links style 18 hole layout, a driving range, two practice putting greens and a modern accessible club house. With these upgrades to their facilities, sound governance and management the club are in a strong position with their membership. The club have been running a junior golf programme in local schools since 2023 initially at Rawhiti and Parkview Parua. The support for this programme to continue from the pupils and schools is strong. The club are eager to expand their reach and impact to additional schools this summer.

The coaching sessions will be delivered by the Clubs golf professional using specialised SNAG (Starting New At Golf) equipment specifically designed to make learning golf fun and accessible, especially for larger groups of junior beginners. They are committed to providing these sessions free of charge to both the students and the schools involved, ensuring that financial barriers don't hinder access to this exciting opportunity. In addition to the introductory coaching sessions, the club are looking to offer a sponsored pathway for 30 junior golfers who show interest and promise in the sport. This pathway includes:

(A) An initial Junior Shoot/Par golf academy programme at the Club, consisting of eight 30-minute coaching lessons for all participants. This programme provides foundational golfing skills to get them started.

(B) A 50% subsidised coaching programme for up to 30 juniors to participate in our Golfway Program. This programme serves as an introductory course for beginners, offering them the chance to develop skills to progress in the Development Pathway programme, which includes various coaching opportunities tailored to their abilities and aspirations.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project aligns strongly with the Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy Goal 1 - Facilities and Environment and Goal 5 - Promising & Talented Performers

Offering financial support for their projects will ensure their programmes remain affordable and accessible. This will help reduce financial barriers that might prevent tamariki from participating.

The programme aims to introduce children and youth who may not otherwise have the chance to play golf, allowing them to develop life-long skills associated with sports participation.

Staff Assessment

Shirley Tennis Club Incorporated (STC) was formed in 1925 and has been located at Richmond Park for 99 years. The Club has five synthetic grass courts and four synpave hardcourts. Floodlights have been installed on four hard courts and two synthetic grass courts, allowing for play all year round. STC provides a range of coaching, training, and membership options for junior and senior players to get involved in the sport. STC prides itself on offering multiple opportunities for its members to enjoy the sport at every level of the game.

In July 2023, STC successfully implemented a pre-season school coaching programme, provided free of charge to five local schools, resulting in a notable increase in junior membership from 40 to 90. Collaboration with schools enabled children unfamiliar with tennis to enhance their skills and enjoyment of the sport. Securing funding will ensure continued provision of this beneficial programme to schools and students (letters of support provided with the application from Marshlands, Queenspark and Waitākiri schools.

Recognising that for some families, equipment and subscriptions are barriers to playing tennis. STC would like to run the initiative for the 2025 preseason school coaching programme as well as offering a new racket to 50 new juniors who signed up for memberships.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The tennis programme aligns strongly with the Te-Haumako-Te Whitingia-Strengthening Communities Together Strategy and the Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy Goal 1 - Facilities and Environment and Goal 2 - Availability and Accessibility and the Equity and Inclusion Policy.

The tennis programme takes a community recreation approach targeting grassroots participation and is increasing the capacity of the Club to deliver quality recreation experiences for their community.

Research indicates that participating in sports increases physical health, social connections, and mental wellness and helps people obtain life skills like discipline and resilience. These benefits help build healthier communities by promoting social unity and a sense of belonging.

The tennis programme provides a grass-roots safe environment to encourage children to participate and experience the benefits of sports. STC is fiscally responsible and has a proven track record of delivery, ensuring they meet their outcomes within budget.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

Tamariki at the Centre will have access to outdoor play equipment which provides ageappropriate safe, yet engaging challenges for children to slide, climb, balance and swing.

The equipment promotes physical activity helping to enhance physical and mental health. Being active reduces the risk of obesity, diabetes, heart diseases later in life, and depression. By being able to provide outdoor play equipment the Centre can facilitate and encourage more physical and outside play enhancing the well-being of tamariki and their whānau.

Tamariki develop as they challenge themselves, taking risks around speed, height, and tests of strength. This motivates further learning as tamariki build an image of themselves as courageous, confident, exploratory, and successful.

Staff Assessment

Kimihia Early Learning Trust are based at Te Aratai College site, operating a community based, not-for-profit early childhood centre specialising in nursery, toddlers and pre-school age groups. Their aim is to provide high-quality care and fun learning to support children's playing, imagining, inventing and experimenting and creativity. They work with whānau to enhance their well-being, recognising that tamariki do well when their whānau are well and their pressures are eased. To do this, the Centre provides healthy meals which include morning and afternoon teas and lunches every day. They also provide whānau food support where required and offer free sponsorship and hardship support.

The Trust are seeking funding towards the costs of purchasing some new resources for outdoor spaces, for under 2's and over 2s tamariki learning spaces to create a holistic learning environment and help to enhance participants physical wellbeing. After evaluating their current resources, The Trust identified the need for some more physically challenging equipment and propose purchasing a set of equipment which includes boxes, overhead bars, rope walk bridge, steps, a rock wall, scaling wall and a wide slide. This set would encourage and facilitate age-appropriate challenges which combine climbing, balancing and sliding, along with social and cooperative play with scalable options.

Kimihia report that most of their participants are from low socio-economic backgrounds, with some of them living in transitional homes or motels. Many are living in housing which does not offer space for outdoor play, and whānau are often unable to afford play equipment to allow for outdoor physical literacy learning. The Trust aim to bridge this gap by providing equipment for their participant to use so they don't miss out on the opportunity to learn physical literacy skills during the critical stages of development.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Most of the tamariki that attend Kimihia Early Learning Centre are from low socio-economic backgrounds, with some of them living in transitional homes or motels and subsequently little or no access to outdoor play equipment at home.

Kimihia Early Learning Centre aims to provide a holistic learning environment with opportunities for outdoor active learning and play, giving those who do not have access to outdoor play at home opportunities to develop physical literacy skills and exposure to safe yet challenging active play.

The Trust aims to keep their fees as low as possible and supports whānau to accessing the different subsidies available to ensure that they can be as inclusive and accessible as possible for the community where they are based. A grant towards some additional play equipment would allow the Centre to enhance their outdoor space to create an environment that supports fine motor and physical literacy skills.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

The organisation is seeking to increase the curators' hours to enable them to begin the substantial task of uploading photos and stories to the website. Expanding this work will help create a comprehensive online resource for public reference and safeguard the organisation's history in the event that something happens to the building. It would also provide schools with greater access to valuable historical materials.

Staff Assessment

The New Brighton & District Historical Society & Museum Incorporated is seeking funding to support the wages of its Curator. The Curator currently works 10 hours per week; however, due to an increased workload, the Museum wishes to extend this to 15 hours per week. In addition, the Museum is applying for support to help cover its rates.

The Curator's role includes collecting and preserving photographs, written materials, oral histories, and digital records relevant to New Brighton and the surrounding districts. These materials are displayed at the museum, archived on-site, and preserved digitally for public access online. This work involves researching historical documents, conducting interviews with local residents, and collaborating with community groups and businesses.

Expanding the Curator's hours will help maintain a comprehensive online archive, support the ongoing development of the Museum's website, and ensure the continuity of access to historical resources. This also enables schools and educators to benefit from the Museum's resources. Alongside the Curator, the Museum is supported by a dedicated team of volunteers.

Located at 8 Hardy Street, New Brighton, the Museum is open daily for visitors—on Mondays from 10am to 12 noon, and again in the afternoon from 1pm to 3pm for an Old Time Classic Movie screening with a cuppa and biscuit available for a \$2 donation; from Tuesday to Sunday, it is open from 1pm to 3pm or by prior arrangement. In addition to its exhibits and displays, the Museum hosts a weekly Golden Oldies Movie afternoon, typically attended by around 30 people, where participants enjoy a film, refreshments, and contribute special interest articles to The Wave, the local newsletter.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The Museum received \$26,000 from the Better Off Fund in 2024 to cover wage costs for two years. The group have not yet explored alternative funding opportunities for an increase in the wages. Relying solely on Council funding is not considered best practice, as it can limit financial sustainability and resilience. Diversifying funding sources would strengthen the group's long-term viability and reduce dependence on a single funding stream.

The Museum is exploring a rates remission for community groups to reduce these specific costs.

Staff Assessment

The Linfield Cultural, Recreational & Sports Club Incorporated ("Linfield") was formed in 2001 with the goal "to provide the opportunity for young people to participate in sport and cultural activities in the East of Christchurch". The hub is based on based at Kearney's Road and serves as an administration base for individual sports and community groups servicing approx 1,500 members in four Clubs; Coastal Spirit Football Club, Richmond Keas Softball, Linwood Rugby, and Linwood Squash Club as well as Tamai Sports. Linfield Sports Inc specialises in providing administrative duties and financial management and planning for sport and community clubs.

The programme would be run once per week over three weeks, after school for up to 40 year 9 and 10 tane from Te Aratai College and Shirley Boys' High. The programme focuses on both physical and mental wellbeing, providing specialised rugby skills and strength and conditioning sessions, followed by shared kai and a mental wellbeing workshop. The programme will utilise the Linfield Gym and the playing fields. The programme is about providing a wrap-around space to encourage non-participating youth to become involved through a player-centred approach to build their confidence and self-esteem

The programme will be followed by the Linwood Rugby Club's Tane Mahuta 7's 'have a go' festival day which is aimed at high school boys years 9 and 10 and runs towards the end of November. The Tane Mahuta 7's Festival has been operating for ?? years and is supported with funding from Rata Foundation and MSD's Pasifika Proud.

This pilot programme has the potential to become an annual lead-in to the Tane Mahuta Festival. Relationships built with NZ Rugby, local schools, and health providers will help embed this as a sustainable pre-season model for Tane in eastern Christchurch.

Rationale for staff recommendation

The project aligns strongly with the Strengthening Communities Together Strategy.

The organisation is fiscally responsible with a proven track record of delivery, ensuring they meet their outcomes within budget.

Staff Assessment

This application is recommended as a Priority 4 as it there was insufficient information provided by applicant to be able to provide a recommendation.

Rebuild, Repair, Respect are seeking funding towards operational costs for a Linwood Community Safety project. Costs applied for include salary and wages, equipment, materials, volunteer recognition and administration. The group are currently working towards establishing as a Charitable Trust and preparing all the associated documents, policies and procedures that are required as part of that process.

The Linwood Community Safety Project aims to identify, document and repair unsafe historical sites in Linwood. The applicant references Linwood Cemetery as a particular site of historical significance to Ōtautahi with a number of long standing hazards due to earthquake damage which have the potential to cause harm to the public. The project aims to alert the public to the hazards and expediate solutions for repairing and conserving historical sites like Linwood and other cemeteries in the Community Board area.

Rationale for staff recommendation

There was insufficient information provided by applicant to be able to provide a recommendation.

Staff were unable to obtain any further details on Rebuild Repair Respect as an organisation and it was unclear if the group has the appropriate governance and operational capability or capacity to deliver to the outcomes the project is looking to achieve.

- Be able to commit to collaboration and partnering, where appropriate.
- Groups receiving Council funding at a metropolitan level may only apply for local funding if the project is specifically local and no portion of it has been funded at the metropolitan level.

Note: Recreation and sporting clubs/organisations do not have to be affiliated to a national sporting organisation to be eligible to apply however in alignment with the Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy we would encourage you to affiliate.

Actively remove common barriers to participation (like cost and transport) and connect taiohi with wraparound services, youth workers, and local mentors—supporting holistic wellbeing and long-term positive outcomes.

Staff Assessment

This application is recommended as a Priority One due to its alignment to Council outcomes and priorities as well as the significant depth and impact on the community.

YCD are looking to deliver four impactful events that give taiohi and whānau the opportunity to connect, participate, and thrive in their own communities.

The House of Hoopz is a streetball competition held across Ōtautahi run by Youth and Cultural Development (YCD). These events provide an opportunity for young people who aren't involved in normal weekly competitions and an opportunity to get involved in basketball on street courts. The events attracted hundreds of participants and spectators from across communities to enjoy the action. The event sees local Rangatahi enter teams across each competition round, which are held all over the city. Winners from these suburban tournaments then participate in the final which will be held in New Brighton. Alongside the 3x3 games, the event hosts a 'dunk' contest as well as a three-point competition, with prizes on offer for winners in each of the categories.

Earlier this year, YCD trialled their first FRESH Movie Night in Wainoni Park which drew close to 1,000 whānau. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with community members asking for more events like it to support connection, wellbeing, and local pride. These gatherings continue to meet the needs of the community not just providing recreation opportunities, but for building positive, engaged communities.

At all events YCD run a free BBQ for all those in attendance as well as free haircuts and braids from local Barbers who set up on site at the events. Funding is being sought to cover the costs associated with running the three House of Hoopz events within the Waitai Coastal-Burwood-Linwood Community Ward area and the Outdoor Movie in Aranui.
