4.1 Cycling priorities in the Community Board area

4.2 Halswell Mataī, ANZAC and Digitalisation Projects

David Hawke, Treasurer and Adele Geradts, Secretary addressed the Board on behalf of the Halswell Residents' Association. They provided an update on the Halswell Mataī Project, the ANZAC Project and a current Association project digitalising local records.

5.2 Wigram Road and Hayton Road Intersection Layout Updates

Cody Cooper, local resident addressed the Board in relation to the Wigram Road and Hayton Road Intersection Layout Updates Report (Item 12 of these minutes refers).

Mr Cooper indicated that he considered the Wigram Hayton intersection layout should include a path on the south side of Wigram Road for cyclists and pedestrians. He considers that this should be incorporated in the current intersection works.

5.3 Wycola Skate Park Renewal - Design Approval

James Harris, Manager and Community Youth Worker addressed the Board on behalf of Community Development Network Trust in relation to the Wycola Skate Park Renewal – Design Approval Report (Item 16 of these minutes refers).

Mr Harris is supportive of the design for the renewed skatepark and considers that removal of the skate bowl is warranted. He would like to see the current set of swings retained if possible.

5.1 Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area

Karolin Potter, local resident addressed the Board in relation to the Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area Report (Item 7 of these minutes refers).

Ms Potter outlined the uniqueness of the Halswell Quarry Park and the appeal of its openness. She is opposed the proposal to fence the dog exercise area. She suggests that other options be explored to encourage dog owners to assume responsibility to avoid conflict with other park users, including specific signage.

5.4 Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area

Pam Morgan, local resident addressed the Board in relation to the Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area Report (Item 7 of these minutes refers).

Ms Morgan advised that she considers that the Halswell Quarry Park currently serves its intended purpose of a passive recreation reserve and wildlife area that caters to all users. In her opinion, fencing a major area of the park is an extreme measure to address the nuisance caused by some irresponsible dog owners.

Following questions from members, the Chairperson thanked Ms Morgan for her presentation.

5.5 Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area

Kate Ody, local resident addressed the Board in relation to the Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area Report (Item 7 of these minutes refers).

Ms Ody opposes the proposal to fence the dog exercise area and queried how effective this would be to address the concerns related to dogs in the quarry.

Following questions from members, the Chairperson thanked Ms Ody for her presentation.

Tyla Harrison-Hunt joined the audio/visual link to the meeting at 5.35pm during Item 5.5.

5.6 Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area

Gareth Popplestone, local resident addressed the Board in relation to the Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area Report (Item 7 of these minutes refers).

Mr Popplestone showed a map indicating a possible alternative bike track to avoid adverse interactions between cyclists and dogs. He is supportive of the accessible paths and dog wash station proposal but opposed to the proposed fencing of the dog exercise area.

Ken Austin, local resident addressed the Board in relation to the Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area Report (Item 7 of these minutes refers).

Mr Austin expressed concern that the proposal will result in spending money without proof of a problem. He considers that dogs in the quarry should be on lead to avoid conflict with other park users, particularly children.

5.9 Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area

Paul O'Connor, local resident addressed the Board in relation to the Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area Report (Item 7 of these minutes refers).

Mr O'Connor said he is concerned at the lack of enforcement of dog control, particularly in areas of the quarry outside of the dog exercise area where dogs should be on lead. He considers that the quarry is a unique area and wishes to see its farm like character retained.

Following questions from members, the Chairperson thanked Mr O'Connor for his presentation.

7. Halswell Quarry Dog Exercise Area

Community Board Consideration

Staff in attendance spoke to the accompanying report. They advised that the proposal to fence the dog exercise area was in an effort to address the issues of extreme fouling of the park and adverse interactions between uncontrolled dogs and other park users. These issues occur despite staff efforts to make dog owners aware of their responsibilities and adversely affect the experience of many park users.

The Board also took into consideration the deputations from Karolin Potter, Pam Morgan, Kate Ody, Gareth Popplestone, Ken Austin and Paul O'Connor (Items 5.1, 5.4, 5.5, 5.6, 5.7 and 5.9 refer).

1. Purpose and Origin of the Report Te Pūtake Pūrongo

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is for the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board to approve the proposed road name at 33 Sutherlands Road, Halswell.
- 1.2 The report is staff-generated resulting from a naming request received from the developer.

2. Officer Recommendations Ngā Tūtohu

That the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board:

- 1. Receives the information in the Proposed Road Names 33 Sutherlands Road, Halswell Report.
- 2. Notes that the decision in this report is assessed as low significance based on the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.
- 3. Approves the following new road name for 33 Sutherlands Road (RMA/2024/2469)
 - a. Road 1 Greystone Close

3. Detail Te Whakamahuki

Introduction Te Whakatkinga

- 3.1 A road naming request has been submitted by Davis Ogilvie Ltd on behalf of the developer. A preferred name and alternative names have been put forward for the road.
- 3.2 The recommended road name has been checked against existing road names in Christchurch and bordering districts, for duplication, alternative spelling, or other similarities in spelling or pronunciation to avoid the potential for confusion. The proposed name is considered sufficiently different to existing road names.
- 3.3 The recommended road name has been checked against the Council's Naming Policy dated 15 November 2023 and is considered to be consistent with this policy. The specific criteria for assessing a name from clause 2 is set out below.
 - 3.3.1 A traditional or Māori name which is acceptable to the Rūnanga or Iwi; this may be a name reflecting the physical characteristics of an area, an activity or event associated with the area or of a notable ancestor.
 - 3.3.2 A feature of historical, social, cultural, environmental or physical importance in the area (e.g., Carlton Mill Road or Carlton Mill Reserve*).
 - 3.3.3 The name of a notable family, person or event associated with the locality or with the wider Christchurch area.
 - 3.3.4 A name in recognition of a person's service. This can be for community service, conservation, sport, the arts, science and research or other sphere of activity.



- 3.3.5 Consistency with a common or established theme for naming in a subdivision or locality.
- 3.3.6 A name that reflects the diverse cultures and communities of the locality or of Christchurch generally.
- 3.3.7 The name of an event or activity strongly associated with the immediate location including an informal name for the area that is (or was historically) in common usage.
- 3.3.8 A name associated with a person, event or activity of significance to Christchurch including names associated with people, events, or places of national and international significance.
- 3.4 The criteria for names that are not suitable for approval from clause 6 are set out below.
 - 3.4.1 Names of people, flora, fauna or geographical features not associated with the area, e.g., names of native trees which are not present in the area or views that cannot be identified, except where the name continues a current naming theme in the locality.
 - 3.4.2 Currently trading commercial organisations except for sponsorship names for facilities and leased parks.
 - 3.4.3 Anagrams, amalgamations or derivatives of people's names.
 - 3.4.4 Names of living persons.
 - 3.4.5 Names related to the developer of a subdivision.
 - 3.4.6 Name of a person, club or organisation associated with a privately owned building on Council land, where the club or organisation does not hold the ground lease for the building.
 - 3.4.7 Names for roads which may cause confusion because they are associated with another geographical location or feature e.g., Parklands Drive which is not located in the Parklands suburb.
- 3.5 The recommended road name has also been checked against the Australia and New Zealand Standard AS/NZA 4819:2011 Rural and Urban Addressing. The name is considered to be consistent with the Standard.
- 3.6 Under the Roads and Right-of-Way Naming Policy, the name considered must be requested by the developer. There is no ability to consider alternative names without first checking whether there are any duplications or similarities with other road and right-of-way names.
- 3.7 Consultation has been undertaken with Land Information New Zealand who have raised no concerns with the proposed name.
- 3.8 Consultation under the policy with rūnanga is not required because the road to be named is not a collector road and/or site(s) of significance under the District Plan (clause 3 of the Naming Policy).
- 3.9 No addresses of neighbouring properties are affected by the proposed road naming (clause 12.2 of the Naming Policy).
- 3.10 The name requested has been accompanied by an explanation of the background of the name, which is summarised below.

Assessment of Significance and Engagement Te Aromatawai Whakahirahira

3.11 The decisions in this report are assessed as low significance based on the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.



- 3.12 The level of significance was determined by the number of people affected and/or with an interest.
- 3.13 Due to the assessment of low significance, no further community engagement and consultation is required.

Proposed Names

- 3.14 The proposed roads are shown in **Attachment A**.
- 3.15 The proposed name and alternative names are themed for the local environment.
- 3.16 Road 1 Greystone Close
- 3.17 The name Greystone relates to the quarrying heritage of the locality and in particular the grey toned basalt rock which Halswell Quarry is renowned for.

Alternative Names

- 3.18 <u>Fernleigh Close</u> Fernleigh means "fern field" or "fern clearing". It is derived from the Old English words fearn (fern) and leah (woodland clearing or meadow), and refers to the precolonial native vegetative cover common to the locality.
- 3.19 <u>Ashlar Close</u> Ashlar is the masonry technique of dressing stone into rectangular blocks a signature use of Halswell stone in Christchurch's heritage architecture.
- 3.20 The proposed and alternative names are considered to be consistent with the policy.
- 3.21 Notwithstanding, the discretion lies with the Community Board to approve any of the above name options, including the alternative names.



1. Purpose and Origin of the Report Te Pūtake Pūrongo

- 1.1 For the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board to approve the installation of P30 parking restrictions along the south side of the road outside 249-251 Riccarton Road in accordance with Attachment A.
- 1.2 This report has been written in response to a request from a local business located at this address.
- 1.3 These measures have been requested to improve access for customers at this location.

2. Officer Recommendations Ngā Tūtohu

That the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board:

- 1. Receives the information in the 249-251 Riccarton Road Proposed P30 Parking Restrictions Report.
- 2. Notes that the decision in this report are assessed as low significance based on the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.
- 3. Revokes any previous resolutions pertaining to traffic controls made pursuant to any bylaw to the extent that they are in conflict with the parking or stopping restrictions described in resolutions 4 5 below.
- 4. Approves that, in accordance with Clause 7 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, the parking of vehicles be restricted to a maximum period of 30 minutes between 8:00am and 4:30pm, on the southern side of Riccarton Road, commencing at a point 7 metres west of its intersection with Wharenui Road and extending in a westerly direction for a distance of 45 metres as detailed on Attachment A, drawing TG150137, dated 31/7/2025 to the report on the meeting agenda.
- 5. Approves that in accordance with Clause 7 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017, the stopping of vehicles be prohibited between 4:30pm and 6:00pm, on the southern side of Riccarton Road, commencing at a point 7 metres west of its intersection with Wharenui Road and extending in a westerly direction for a distance of 45 metres as detailed on Attachment A, drawing TG150137, dated 31/7/2025 to the report on the meeting agenda.



6. Approves that these resolutions take effect when signage and/or road markings that evidence the restrictions described in 3, 4 and 5 are in place (or removed in the case of revocations).

3. Executive Summary Te Whakarāpopoto Matua

- 3.1 A business owner at 249 Riccarton Road, has requested time-restricted parking outside their premises. Their customers were experiencing difficulties finding parking near the shops. The parking spaces predominantly serve takeaway restaurants.
- 3.2 The recommended option is to install P30 parking restrictions in accordance with Attachment A. This will help increase parking turnover and increase the likelihood of a parking space being available.
- 3.3 All business owners are in favour of the recommended option to install the P30 parking restrictions.

4. Background/Context Te Horopaki

- 4.1 Council received a request from a business owner to investigate providing short-term parking at the frontage of the businesses that are mainly restaurants, dairy and takeaway. A site visit was conducted on a weekday Wednesday 12 February 2025 around 12:00pm and 4:30pm, and the findings were communicated to the requester.
- 4.2 Although there are 17 off-street parking spaces at the rear of the premises, 13 of the parking spaces are for the tenants that occupy 4 Wharenui Road, but only 4 parking spaces are for the customer parking only, as stated on the wall sign. The rear parking spaces are heavily used and mostly used by visitors or customers that require longer term parking.
- 4.3 Council staff observed that the spaces in front of the businesses on Riccarton Road were frequently occupied.
- 4.4 There are existing No stopping restrictions between 4:30pm and 6:00pm in front of 249-253 Riccarton Road. This restriction enables two lanes of westbound traffic to pass through the signalised intersection and merge into one lane during the evening peak travel period.
- 4.5 A proposal was developed at the beginning of 2025 and consulted on in early February 2025.
- 4.6 Originally, staff presented a P10 option, but most business owners preferred P30 short stay parking spaces between 8:00am and 4:30pm.
- 4.7 Business owners also asked if it was possible to remove the existing no stopping restriction between 4:30pm and 6:00pm.
- 4.8 Staff checked video camera footage and noted that most westbound through traffic uses the right lane. Most westbound through traffic on the left lane complete their merge into the single lane just before they reach 253 Riccarton Road. However, as a safety precaution, the existing no stopping restriction from 4:30pm to 6:00pm will be retained.
- 4.9 Staff consider the request to install a P30 time-limit to be reasonable as this would enable higher turnover of parking outside the local shops. This would in turn support businesses to operate effectively. Staff are satisfied that the effect of any displaced unrestricted parking is minimal.
- 4.10 Staff reconsulted with the business owners on the new proposal as per Attachment A. All business owners were satisfied with the new proposal.



4.11 If approved, the recommendations will be implemented within the current financial year (generally around four weeks after the contractor receives the request, but this is subject to other factors such as Contractor resourcing and prioritisation beyond Council's control).

Options Considered Ngā Kōwhiringa Whaiwhakaaro

- 4.12 The following reasonably practicable options were considered and are assessed in this report:
 - 4.12.1 Install P30 8:00am to 4:30pm time restricted parking and retain existing 4:30pm to 6:00pm no stopping restriction as per **Attachment A**.
 - 4.12.2 Do nothing and leave the parking as unrestricted.
- 4.13 The following options were considered but ruled out:
 - 4.13.1 Install P10 8:00am to 4:30pm time restricted parking A P10 time-limit is not suitable for customers and the nearby land use of food and hospitality.
 - 4.13.2 Install P30 8:00am to 4:30pm time restricted parking outside No. 249 and 251 Riccarton Road, and partially remove 4:30 to 6pm no stopping restriction outside No. 253 Riccarton Road.

Options Descriptions Ngā Kōwhiringa

4.14 **Preferred Option:** Install P30 8:00am to 4:30pm time restricted parking and retain existing No Parking 4:30pm to 6:00pm restrictions in accordance with **Attachment A**.

4.14.1 Option Advantages

- Addresses the local business owner's request to increase parking turnover spaces outside their shops.
- Deters all-day unrestricted commuter parking adjacent to local shops.

4.14.2 Option Disadvantages

- Introduces time restrictions on six parking spaces that are currently unrestricted.
- 4.15 **Alternative Option 1:** Maintain the status quo do nothing and leave the parking spaces unrestricted.

4.15.1 Option Advantages

 Retain six existing unrestricted (between the hours of 8am and 4:30pm) parking spaces.

4.15.2 Option Disadvantages

- Does not address local business requests to provide short-term parking in front of their shops and improve access to their businesses.
- May suppress the economic opportunity of people wanting to access the shops by vehicle as there would be less opportunity for parking turnover.

 - 6.2.3 The installation of any signs and/or markings associated with traffic control devices must comply with the Land Transport Rule: Traffic Control Devices 2004.

 - 6.3.1 There is no other legal context, issue, or implication relevant to this decision.
 - 6.3.2 This specific report has not been reviewed and approved by the Legal Services Unit however the report has been written using a general approach previously approved of by the Legal Services Unit, and the recommendations are consistent with the policy and legislative framework outlined in this report.

- 6.13 The decision does not involve a significant decision concerning ancestral land or a body of water or other elements of intrinsic value, therefore this decision does not specifically impact Mana Whenua, their culture and traditions.
- 6.14 The decision does not involve a matter of interest to Mana Whenua and will not impact on our agreed partnership priorities with Ngā Papatipu Rūnanga.
- 6.15 The decision includes minor work which is contained within the roadway.

6.16 This is a minor proposal that is principally intended to address parking concerns at this location. Due to the minor nature of the works, it is not expected to have any impact towards adaption to the impacts of climate change or emissions reductions.



SECTION SIX: STAFF ASSESSMENT

TWA began 35 years ago aiming to address the social needs of individuals, children and families in the Hornby community. Alongside facilitating various community activities, they provide professional counselling services, social workers in schools, Oscar childcare programmes and a Community Support Worker who provides immediate short-term assistance to those seeking it, as well as welcoming new residents to the area.

Alongside their regular mahi, they have continued developing the Longitude Whānau Support project which aims to address the long-term, intergenerational challenges facing their community through long-term support and increased opportunities for local tamariki and their whānau.

The greater Hornby community is home to several high social deprivation communities, including Hei Hei and Broomfield. Many whānau, many sole mothers with children, living in these communities struggle to provide their children with fresh fruit and vegetables. The proposed initiative enables whānau to access affordable produce, learn how to grow produce, develop skills and create an effective future pathway for them and their children towards independence – including future study, training and employment.

In 2023, Te Whare Awhero embarked on several food security initiatives, including assisting families with establishing backyard gardens, supporting the Gilberthorpe School vegetable garden project, and launching a community vegetable support group.

Today (2025), they've identified expanding their food security operations as a key way of supporting the most vulnerable whānau in their community to deal with rising food costs in the short term, grow towards interdependence in the medium term and be able to manage environmental changes over the longer term.

They are now fund raising for this expanded operation involving exploring the establishment of a local Urban Farm in Hornby, alongside a food sharing co-op. **These two inter supportive initiatives aim to:**

- Enhance food security for vulnerable whānau in their community through a food sharing co-op (Food Together) increasing access to affordable and healthy fresh fruit & vegetables
- Support whānau to grow their own vegetables through continuing establishment of backyard pop-up gardens and education
- Grow fresh fruit & vegetables to support better community access at affordable prices through the establishment of the Hornby Urban Farm (HUF)
- Support local schools to provide opportunities for students to experience and learn about the value of growing their own vegetables

The space behind Hornby High School, formerly dedicated to horticultural instruction, presents numerous opportunities for creating an urban farm. Spanning a substantial area, it features 50+ established fruit trees, a variety of fruiting plants, and multiple buildings and propagation areas. The buildings, while aging, are currently functional with ongoing maintenance.

Hornby High School has pledged to collaborate with TWA to establish an urban farm in this area. Situated at the rear of the school, the land is less suitable for traditional educational activities, presenting an ideal opportunity to engage with the broader community. This partnership also creates possibilities for



resource sharing and involving students from both Hornby High and neighbouring Hornby Primary School.

These initiatives aim to foster food security, educational opportunities, community engagement, and environmental stewardship within the Hornby area and would sit alongside their existing backyard popup veggie garden program, school veggies group and community veggie support groups.

Outcomes that will be achieved through this project

A greater connection between Ilam School, its current, past and future students and families, and the local community. Ilam School has a particularly prominent multicultural social environment, and through that already has good relationships with community groups and organisations, including the adjacent University of Canterbury. The 75th jubilee celebrations are intended to strengthen these relationships, and include bringing school alumni from all over the country back to the local area for the weekend of celebrations. By highlighting the rich heritage of the school and connections to the local community in the past, the celebrations intend to foster opportunities for future potential connections.

For local people, the celebrations will instill a sense of pride in the school and the role it plays in the local community.

Staff Assessment

Ilam Primary School, located on Ilam Road, adjacent to the University of Canterbury, will be holding the school's 75th Jubilee on the weekend of October 31st and November 1st. The celebrations will comprise of a number of events, some of them within school time and some outside of school time involving ex-pupils and members of the local community who have been connected with the school. This includes a morning tea, community picnic and an evening event. The pupils will be contributing to the events, showcasing their talents in various ways.

The school's Board of Trustees is seeking financial assistance towards two aspects of the jubilee celebrations.

They are seeking funding towards the cost of a professional photographer to capture images from the event. While they could utilise school staff and/or volunteers using a professional photographer will enable staff and volunteers to fully enjoy the celebrations. A professional photographer is also more adept at capturing special moments.

The evening event will be held at Ilam Homestead across the road from the school. A contribution towards the venue hire is sought. A jubilee celebration is an opportunity for the school to celebrate it's past, present and future.

Rationale for staff recommendation

Staff are recommending funding the photographer costs and not the venue hire. The venue hire is for a ticketed event and hire should be factored into ticket costs.

The project meets Council's Te-Haumako-Te Whitingia- Strengthening Communities Together Strategy, in particular the people, place and participation pillars. A jubilee celebration adds to the school's identity and place in a local community. It also meets Council's Our Heritage, Our Taonga - Heritage Strategy through celebrating the school's history and heritage.

3.1.3 Summer with your neighbours



Summer with your neighbours is about bringing people closer together and celebrating the unique and diverse mix of each neighbourhood.

The Board decided to extend the application timeframe at its 14 August 2025 meeting. Applications can now be submitted for gatherings in the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board area until 26 March 2026. An application form is available on the Christchurch City Council website.

3.1.4 Upper Riccarton War Memorial Park Opening

The Upper Riccarton War Memorial Park was officially opened on Saturday 16 August. Located where the Upper Riccarton War Memorial Library once stood, the park has been designed to retain a sense of remembrance for those who have given their lives in service for the country. Features from the library have been integrated into the park with some of the building's bricks and the book returns slot forming a low wall at the Riccarton Road entrance. The former library's sign and foundation stone are also a part of the reserve along with a memorial plaque containing the 38 names of soldiers in the area whose lives were lost in the two World Wars.



On the western wall a mural has been created by mural artist Decypher depicting a bookcase with war memorabilia, Kiwiana artefacts and relevant books. Among the 70 plus people present at the opening were the great niece and nephew of one of the 38 soldiers and families of some of the Library's life members.

The Upper Riccarton War Memorial Library buildings were offered to Council after the earthquake damaged main building was deemed to be unable to be repaired by the Trust. Council accepted the building at a meeting on 10 February 2022 and later resolved to demolish the building and place a reserve on the site.



3.1.5 Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Picnic Kit and Sports Kit

The Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Governance Team continues to have a community picnic kit and sports kit available to borrow free of charge for community gatherings.

The picnic kit, popular with Summer with your neighbours event organisers, consists of four serving bowls and reusable plates, cups and cutlery for 60 people.

The sports kit consists of a variety of items, including tennis rackets, bats, and balls.

3.2.4 Youth Development Fund Report

Youth Development Fund recipient, Medha Baadkar was honoured to be one of just three students from New Zealand selected to attend the 2025 Youth Australian and New Zealand Association for the Advancement of Science Conference, held in Melbourne, Australia. This forum brought together 40 science students from across Australia and New Zealand to explore a range of scientific fields and learn from passionate researchers.

Highlights included learning from experts like biomedical animator Drew Barry and Dr Kenneth Winkel, who shared how he combined his environmental passion with medicine through venom and toxin research.

Medha returned with strengthened skills in critical thinking, communication, and collaboration, and is grateful to have received support from the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board.

• Student Volunteer Army Recruitment Initiative

An initiative by the Student Volunteer Army to increase University of Canterbury students volunteering led to students assisting community organisations such as the Church Corner Toy Library and Riccarton Community Garden. At the Toy Library, toys were cleaned and rebagged while general winter clean up tasks were undertaken at the Riccarton Community Garden in Dilworth Street.

Riccarton Tool Shed opening

The Riccarton Tool Shed was officially opened on 2 September. Located within the Riccarton Baptist Church complex at 80 Rattray Street, the Riccarton Tool Shed has been modelled on the successful Shirley Toolshed and will be open on Saturday mornings. The project has been initiated by Oak Development Trust and will eventually offer more than 200 tools and household items for community members to borrow for personal use. An annual membership to the not-for-profit co-operative will enable members to borrow items from outdoor tools to home maintenance equipment through to children's birthday party supplies.



Welcoming Week at Halswell Community Hub

Welcoming Week is being held from 5 to 14 September across Ōtautahi Christchurch. This annual celebration highlights the diversity of our city, connects newcomers with local resources, and fosters a sense of belonging in our communities. Halswell Community Hub hosted a morning tea and information session, sharing information about local Council and practical ways that community members can get involved in decision-making. The session also showcased the resources, services and activities that are available at the Halswell Community Hub.









Huritini Student Council

This year, school student representatives from the Huritini Student Council, which meets once a term, have come together to begin planning a community trail that will celebrate the Halswell Ward. The trail aims to highlight the area's cultural heritage, environmental features, and historical sites. Students have been actively investigating potential locations and learning about the stories behind them. The next phase of the project will involve developing a set of criteria to guide site selection, with the goal of creating a meaningful and inclusive trail that reflects the diverse character of the Halswell community.



3.3.2 Council Engagement and Consultation.

Cashmere / Sutherlands / Hoon Hay Valley Road speed limit changes
 Consultation on proposals to lower the speed on Cashmere Road, Sutherlands
 Road, and Hoon Hay Valley Road was open from 4 July 2025 to 18 August 2025.

The Board lodged a submission on the proposals (refer to **Attachment D**).

4. Advice Provided to the Community Board Ngā Kupu Tohutohu ka hoatu ki te Poari Hapori

4.1 William Brittan Drive / Milns Road / Kearns Drive intersection

At its 15 May 2025 meeting the Board noted concerns that the agapanthus plants on William Brittan Avenue affect visibility at the William Brittan Drive / Milns Road / Kearns Drive intersection.

Staff have advised that the plants have been trimmed back, with no current plans for full removal. During the flowering season, the contractor will visit the garden fortnightly and deadhead the agapanthus on the roadside to maintain safe access. A monitoring plan is being scheduled to track future growth. As potential changes to the intersection may impact the wider landscape, staff will continue to observe and respond to any forthcoming decisions.

4.2 Wigram Road artificial turf sports field consultation and development

Staff have provided updates on the following requests the Board approved at its 13 March 2025 meeting in relation to the Wigram Road artificial turf sports field consultation and development report:

• 4. Staff advice on any proposals for improving playing surfaces at Halswell Domain to ensure availability for year-round usage.

Staff have advised Halswell Domain has been confirmed by Mainland Football as the priority for football sports field upgrading for FY25/26. Design work is currently underway to improve the drainage of the football fields.

• 5. Advice on the number of intended artificial turfs in the south-west area as part of the Sport Field Network Plan, noting the extensive growth and demand in the south-west area and usage from surrounding Selwyn residents.

This is in progress. Beyond the approved site at Wigram Road for two artificial turf sports fields, a whole-of-city investigation is currently underway for the remaining five artificial turf sports hubs identified in the Sports Field Network Plan but it is not specifically geared to increasing the number of intended artificial turfs in the south-west as this is a city-wide project.

• 6. Staff advice on the updating of the master plan for the wider Ngā Puna Wai facility and surrounding roads, noting the significant changes to the facility since opening.

This is only in the early stages of completion. Discussion is currently underway between Parks and Recreation, Sports & Events.



1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1. The Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board ("the Board") appreciates the opportunity to make a submission on the proposals for Cashmere / Sutherlands / Hoon Hay Valley Road speed limit changes ("the proposals"
- 1.2. The Board wishes to be heard in support of its submission.

2. SUBMISSION

Sutherlands Road

- 2.1. The Board does not support the proposal to reduce the current 60 kilometres per hour speed limit on Sutherlands Road to a speed limit of 40 kilometres per hour.
- 2.2. The Board would support a reduction of the speed limit to 50 kilometres per hour and encourages the Council to prioritise the installation of footpaths along Sutherlands Road as it considers that this is necessary to significantly improve pedestrian safety.

Cashmere Road (from near Halswell Quarry to near Saddle Vale Rise)

- 2.3. The Board does **not support** the proposal to reduce the current 60 kilometres per hour speed limit on Cashmere Road (from near Halswell Quarry to near Saddle Vale Rise) to a speed limit of 40 kilometres per hour.
- 2.4. The Board would support a reduction of the speed limit to 50 kilometres per hour and encourages the Council to prioritise the installation of footpaths along Cashmere Road (from near Halswell Quarry to near Saddle Vale Rise) as it considers that this is necessary to significantly improve pedestrian safety.

Hoon Hay Valley Road

2.5. The Board supports the proposal to reduce the current 60 kilometres per hour speed limit on Hoon Hay Valley Road to 50 kilometres per hour and encourages the Council to prioritise the installation of footpaths along this road as it considers that this is necessary to significantly improve pedestrian safety.



Cashmere Road (from Sutherlands Road to Happy Home Road)

2.6. The Board supports the proposal to reduce the current 60 kilometres per hour speed limit on Cashmere Road (from Sutherlands Road to Happy Home Road) to 50 kilometres per hour and encourages the Council to prioritise the installation of footpaths along this road as it considers that this is necessary to significantly improve pedestrian safety.

Missing Footpaths

- 2.7. The Board considers that the reduction of speed limits proposed to improve pedestrian safety on these roads is a poor substitute for installation of missing footpaths and urges the Council to prioritise installation of footpaths along these stretches of road as it considers that this is required for pedestrian safety in the vicinity.
- 2.8. The Board notes that parts of Sutherlands Road and Cashmere Road are included in the draft New Footpaths programme but are currently not prioritised in the top 15. The Board urges the Council to reprioritise these roads to within the top 15 so that new footpaths can be constructed within the first 2 years (Financial years 26-27).
- 2.9. The Board notes that early installation of footpaths along these stretches of road would avoid the double costs of changes to the speed limits now and again after construction of the paths.

3. CONCLUSION

- 3.1. The Board requests that the Council takes into consideration the above submission on the Proposals.
- 3.2. The Board wishes to be heard in support of its submission.

New Footpaths Programme

1. Purpose of this Memo Te take o tēnei Pānui

- 1.1 This memo is to update board members regarding the new footpath prioritisation process and draft New Footpaths programme (available as **Attachment A**).
- 1.2 This follows from a Council information session held 15th July to brief elected members on the new programme (presentation available as **Attachment B**). This memo also responds to questions raised at the information session, including:
 - 1.2.1 Provide full details of assessment criteria
 - 1.2.2 Details of how works have been identified
 - 1.2.3 How works are likely to be programmed and aligned with other Council works
 - 1.2.4 More clarity regarding the issues with Main South Road and the future area plans.
- 1.3 Staff are seeking feedback from the community boards ahead of taking the programme to Council for final approval to proceed to design and delivery for the sites identified for FY26 & FY27.
 - 1.3.1 Any feedback should be sent to staff through Board Advisors before close of business 18th August. The next steps will then be to process any feedback and present the final programme to full Council within this current term.
- 1.4 The information in this memo is not confidential and can be made public.

2. Update He Pānui

Background

- 2.1 While new footpaths for some individual sites have been included in previous Long Term Plans, this is the first time funding has been made available to pro-actively identify and deliver new footpath links to connect the existing network
 - 2.1.1 \$20.5m was made available over the Long Term Plan period 2024-2034
 - \$3.5 in the first 3 years (FY25-27)
 - \$17m in the remaining 7 years (FY28-34)

- 2.1.2 The intent of the programme is considered to be limited to construction of new, permanent footpath sections in areas where it is considered unlikely that it would not be delivered by some other method.
- 2.2 Staff are seeking to approve the list of sites for delivery within the first 3 years of the LTP (FY25-27).
 - 2.2.1 Assuming the prioritisation logic is approved by Council, the sites for the next 3 years (FY28-30) will be identified and agreed as part of the next LTP planning cycle.

Candidate Site Identification

- 2.3 Staff started by identifying a long list of sites which could be good candidates for a new footpath
 - 2.3.1 Potential candidates were collated from area engineers, internal and external requests, community boards, and Council resolutions. Staff have not kept records of the source of each potential candidate site: even if this had been kept it may not be instructive, as in many cases sites have been raised through multiple sources.
 - 2.3.2 The following situations have been excluded from consideration, as they are not considered to be in line with the intent of the programme, or would not offer value for money:
 - Maintenance of existing assets
 - Provision of shared facilities
 - Sites that are already on Council's capital programme
 - Sites that are expected to have frontage footpaths installed within 5 years as part of developments
 - Interim solutions: unsealed or other solutions with a short asset life
 - Pedestrian crossings or other infrastructure not directly associated with the construction of new footpaths

Assessment & Prioritisation of Candidates

- 2.4 In order to optimise the spend and ensure that limited resources are allocated effectively, a method was developed to score and rank candidate sites.
 - 2.4.1 The scoring mechanism attempted to answer three key questions:
 - How is community safety impacted by the lack of a footpath?
 - What is the likely demand and need for a footpath in that location?
 - Project feasibility: how hard and/or expensive it will be to build a footpath?
 - 2.4.2 A number of measures were used to assess each site. The measures mostly use objective, publicly available data sources. This ensures that any additional candidates could be easily ranked against the existing programme in a consistent manner.
 - 2.4.3 Noting that some criteria are considered more important than others, a weighting was then applied to give each candidate site an overall score, and therefore ranking.
- 2.5 The criteria used to assess each footpath segment, with the assigned weighting, are described below:
 - 2.5.1 **Safety (risk)** 60% Weighting

This is the highest priority criterion, and attempts to identify segments where walking presents the greatest safety risks. It considers:

- Type of street (e.g. local road or urban connector); The One Network Framework outlines
 the functional hierarchy of the roading network, likely combination of vehicle types and
 associated levels of service for active modes within those roading corridors.
- Operating speeds of vehicles; The posted speeds of the roads are used to gauge the risk to pedestrians in the corridor.
- Traffic volumes; The number of vehicles and associated collective risk is incorporated into this risk assessment

2.5.2 **Population and Destinations** – 15% Weighting

This ensures that population and destination analysis directs investment to areas with greater community need to access facilities by foot. This considers:

- Resident population density within 1km walking catchment of the candidate footpath section as taken from the census data.
- Proximity to key destinations within 1 km; schools, employment areas, supermarket, health facilities, open spaces, retirement villages, and bus stops. Destinations were noted, tallied and a combined destination score given.

2.5.3 **Deliverability** – 25% Weighting

This seeks to ensure that the level of complexity and likely cost is considered when selecting sites. While this is more subjective than many of the other measures, it is based on technical input from engineering staff. Factors that are considered include:

- · Elevation and levels
- Existing kerb and channel
- Stormwater and drainage issues
- Known services along the corridor
- Available corridor width
- · Proximity to streams
- Other constraints
- 2.6 In regard to the 'other constraints', for many of the candidates this included consideration of design and engineering challenges. For some candidates other delivery constraints involved interagency and other infrastructure dependencies to assist in the next stage of programme design.

Next Steps

- 2.7 Once the individual sites have been confirmed and scheme designed completed, as with any Council capital projects all endeavours will be made to co-ordinate with any other roading, parks or other projects in the vicinity scheduled by Council or external agencies.
- 2.8 The prioritisation method and resulting programme has been established from a candidate list, through a rigorous, evidence-based approach. As a final step toward Council endorsement of the programme, staff are providing the opportunity for community boards to provide feedback.

- 2.9 Any feedback should be sent to staff through Board Advisors before close of business 18th August. Staff will then process any feedback, make changes as are deemed necessary, and present a recommended programme to Council for approval within this current term.
- 2.10 Once Council approval is received the programme will be assigned to project managers where the programme will proceed to design and delivery stage. As part of the normal delivery process the board will be invited to exercise their delegated authority in approving changes. It is anticipated, based on early rough cost estimates and board approval, that 15 candidates could be delivered within the first 2 years (FY26-27).

Main South Road, Hornby

- 2.11 Staff have recommended not including the Main South Road candidate between Woolworths and the Hub, Hornby and have therefore specifically excluded this from the prioritisation at this time.
 - 2.11.1 This has an extremely high level of complexity (and likely cost) due to the complex interface with KiwiRail and NZTA, and property issues. It is likely that it will create significant controversy due to impacts on the State Highway caused by changes to traffic signal phasing.
 - 2.11.2 Staff have previously given advice around this during the Annual Plan process. Likely estimate to completion is around 5-10 years and \$5m+, although this has a high level of uncertainty. It may not be possible to install a crossing in this location, due to the interaction with other organisation's assets.
 - 2.11.3 NZTA are leading a review of the form and function of this area, with input from Council staff as part of NZTAs' Hornby Access Investigations noting that this intersection has also been identified as the likely terminus of a future Turn-Up-And-Go service.
 - 2.11.4 There is therefore a high risk that any changes made may not be consistent with the longer-term plans for the area, so a new footpath may not achieve the planned asset life.

3. Conclusion Whakakapinga

- 3.1 This report provides a summary explanation of the prioritisation methodology developed to establish a new footpath programme and provides the prioritised list of candidates. As a final step toward Council endorsement of the programme, staff are providing the opportunity for community boards to provide feedback to staff through Board Advisors before close of business 18th August.
- 3.2 The next steps will be to incorporate any feedback to ensure the programme can go to full Council within this current term before proceeding to the design and delivery stage.
- 3.3 Once Council approval is received the programme will be assigned to project managers where the programme will proceed to design and delivery stage. As part of the normal delivery process the board will be invited to exercise their delegated authority in approving changes to the road network.
- 3.4 It is anticipated, based on early rough cost estimates and board approval, that 15 candidates could be delivered within the first 2 years (FY26-27).


