### 3. Background

#### Introduction 3.1

Trees play an integral part in reinforcing our identity as the Garden City, a reputation which many Christchurch residents pride themselves on. As well as their aesthetic values, trees also

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provide a range of other essential environmental, economic and social community benefits. With the current challenges being faced through climate change, the vital role which trees play in sequesting carbon, cooling through shade and managing stormwater has never been more important. Christchurch City Council understands the need to take a leadership role in the management of trees to ensure that the many benefits provided by such a vital resource are maintained for future generations. Through proactive management of trees on public land these benefits can be maximised and retained for the future.

The Council are currently developing an Urban Forest Plan which will address the strategic planning of our urban forest. Our Tree Policy will align with the Urban Forest Plan and should be read in conjunction with it once this is in place.

#### 3.2 Purpose

This policy provides guidance for the planting, protection, maintenance and removal of trees on land we own and look after. It aims to help manage trees to meet community aspirations, service requests and provide clarity for decision making while maintaining consistency in the approaches taken by us and our contractors.

#### 3.3 Policy Statement

The principle objective of this policy is to provide consistency and clarity in decision making when maintaining, planting, removing and working around trees.

#### 3.4 Policy Scope

This policy includes all trees on land the Council owns and looks after, including parks, reserves, roads and other public spaces.

#### The following activities are included in this policy:

**Planting** 

Maintenance

Protection during construction or earthworks

Removal

#### This policy *does not* include trees located in the following areas:

On private land

On state highway land

Public land not owned or looked after by the Council

#### Other areas which are *not* included in this policy:

Native revegetation or regeneration

Plantation forestry

Riccarton Bush

### 3. Background

#### 3.1 Introduction

The Council wants to support the network of community centres and halls across Christchurch city and Banks Peninsula so these spaces are well used, and people come together there for lots of different activities.

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Community spaces are where people come together, building resilience and creating an active sense of community through engaging with each other and sharing experiences.

#### 3.2 The Plan

The Community Facilities Network Plan maps out Council-owned and community-owned facilities across the city. **View the maps. (external link)** 

It will give us a snapshot of what we have across the city, looking at the network as a whole. It shows there is a comprehensive network of community facilities across the city, with no significant gaps.

By understanding where these spaces are and what each can offer, we can work with the community to make the most of each facility in the network, and identify and support opportunities for the community to activate, operate or own facilities.

<u>Information within the Plan [PDF, 1.9 MB]</u> also helps support decisions about any proposed changes or developments to Council facilities within the network.

Any recommendations and decisions on individual Council facilities (such as building a new facility, changing usage or potential sale) will be made through robust and transparent Community Board, Annual Plan and Long Term Plan processes, with appropriate engagement and consultation sitting alongside.

The development of a Community Facilities Network Plan is part of <u>Council's wider</u> <u>Strengthening Communities Strategy</u>, which is currently being refreshed.

### 4. Emerging Conclusions

To get the Plan to this point, we have surveyed representatives of groups operating Council facilities and generated discussion with community representatives to gather their thoughts and experiences about running and using community facilities across the city.

#### The Community Facilities Network Plan [PDF, 1.9 MB]

Bringing together this feedback, and other data and information including the findings of a **Global Leisure Group Report [PDF, 2.6 MB]**, four main conclusions have emerged. We're now asking for any further feedback that could help us shape the plan before it is approved by the Council.

#### The four main emerging conclusions:

#### The scope of the network

There is a comprehensive existing network of Council and community-owned facilities across Christchurch and Banks Peninsula, with no significant geographic gaps in the network.

Future opportunities are likely to arise from changing needs, trends and demographics. It's important to note that the Plan will be continually updated to reflect these changes. Changes to level of service (such as new facilities) will continue to go through Annual Plan and Long Term Plan processes.

## <u>Preference for community groups to activate, operate, and where appropriate, own facilities</u>

The Council will deliver greater value to the community facilities network by continuing to support community operation and activation of its existing facilities. Supporting communities

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to make the most of what we have is preferable to developing new under used facilities. By having greater community involvement at all levels, facilities can be better used. Community Boards have the delegation to steer and approve community partnerships.

#### **Prioritising resources to maintain facilities**

There is limited budget available, so maintenance of existing community facilities is a priority, even over the development of new facilities. This means non-essential areas such as planning, partner relationships, activation and development can only be carried out with remaining funds. Any changes to the community facilities provided by Council will be decided through the Annual Plan or Long Term Plan.

#### Approve a process to inform any changes to the network

To meet our objective of a well-used network of community facilities across our city, we need a clear, standardised decision-making process for any changes to the network, such as adding, removing or repurposing facilities.

#### To realise an opportunity for a new facility

The opportunity should be community informed, led and developed, with a willing and able partner organisation. There needs to be a defined and demonstrated need, with a sustainable long-term future, and all partners confirm the resources needed. Feasibility needs to be established, followed by a business case that details how the facility will be sustainably operated. The Council's long-term role should be clarified upfront.

#### • Before a facility is identified as no longer required

A lack of, or changing need must be established, with any relevant issues about the condition of the facility identified. There must be a lack of suitable partner organisations willing and able to sustainably retain the facility, and consideration of how, or if, services can be provided by other facilities in the area. A future use or other courses of action for the building needs to be identified at this time.
