TERMS OF REFERENCE

2 December 2019

1. Name of Committee

The Committee will be known as the "Akaroa Museum Advisory Committee".

2. Status of Committee

The Committee will be a committee of the Banks Peninsula Community Board.

3. Purpose of Committee

The purpose of the Committee is to provide advice to the Community Board on the strategic issues facing the Museum and the matters arising from them.

4. Responsibilities

Responsibilities of the Committee are:

- To provide advice on the Museum's aims, objectives and policies and its role in the community.
- To provide a local link with the Museum's stakeholders including Friends of the Akaroa Museum, local Rūnanga and the wider community.
- To assist in obtaining local support and financial resources necessary to achieve the Museum's aims.

5. Composition of Committee

- The two Akaroa subdivision members of the Banks Peninsula Community Board
- Two representatives from the Friends of Akaroa Museum¹
- One community representative ²
- One representative from Ōnuku Rūnanga

¹ The Friends of Akaroa Museum representatives to be appointed by that group.

² The position of community representative will be publicly advertised, seeking expressions of interest.

In addition, a liaison member should be appointed from each of the Wairewa and Koukourārata Rūnanga, to attend meetings when matters of significance to their rohe (district) are being discussed.

The Community Board will appoint the Chairman of the Committee.

6. Term of Committee

The Committee will be discharged three months from the coming into office of the members of the community board, elected or appointed at, or following each triennial general election.

7. Administration

The Committee shall meet quarterly, or as required, and report to the Banks Peninsula Community Board following each Committee meeting.

A schedule of quarterly Committee meetings will be adopted annually.

As a committee of the Community Board the Committee shall be bound by the various Acts and Regulations governing the operation of a Local Authority and shall also be subject to the Council's Standing Orders.

The Akaroa Museum Advisory Committee will be assisted by the Museum Director and Community Board support staff.

8. Remuneration of Committee Members

Committee members will not be eligible to claim the Council's approved allowances for attendance at meetings.



Visitor numbers

In this year of closed borders, and with international visitors usually making up to 60% of the Museum's visitor total, this year was never going to be normal. The months of October, November and December showed just how large that gap could be. January however was boosted by a surge in domestic travel, bringing the total for that month almost up to last year's level.

For the year to the end of January, visitor numbers were 25% down compared to the same period last year, a surprisingly good result.



Pop-up Penguins

Between December and January the Museum hosted two of the painted pop-up penguins that were part of a city-wide penguin trail. Both had been decorated by local schools so were expected to attract a local audience. However, hundreds of people made the trip from Christchurch to Akaroa to scan the codes on our penguins and complete the trail, providing another boost to visitor numbers.

Visitor Survey

Akaroa Museum has again participated in the national visitor survey, coordinated by Museums Aotearoa. Over a period of a week in late February, the Museum conducted exit surveys with almost 100 visitors, gathering information about their visit experience, exhibition highlights, suggestions for improvements and demographic data. The Friends of the Museum helped with conducting the interviews, rostered on for 2-3 hours each over the course of the week, providing invaluable assistance to the already-stretched customer service staff.

#.2 EXHIBITIONS

Temporary exhibitions

Taking advantage of an offer of the temporary loan of a set of large framed photographs of cocksfoot grass-seed harvesting, the Museum's summer exhibition was focused on this industry

which was once so important to Banks Peninsula.

From the end of March the Museum will be helping the Comte de Paris Descendants Group to celebrate the 180th Anniversary of the arrival of the *Comte de Paris* in Akaroa. This anniversary actually fell in 2020 but events were cancelled due to the Covid lockdown. An exhibition about the first French and German families to settle in Akaroa, and their descendants, opens on Friday 26 March.

#.3 COLLECTIONS

Recent acquisitions

Notable recent acquisitions have included almost 150 historic photographs, collected in two separate accessions from the same source, a Lelievre family descendant. Original photographs form an important part of Akaroa Museum's collection, being a valuable resource for both researchers and Museum staff alike. This collection includes a number of images from the first World War, from Egypt and Gallipoli, where Jules Lelievre served. The collection also includes some photographs not previously seen by Museum staff, of early Akaroa homes and individuals.

#.4 EVENTS, COLLABORATIONS AND CONTRIBUTIONS

Friends of Akaroa Museum fundraising

Since the last meeting of the Advisory Committee, the Friends of the Museum have been very actively fundraising, first with the House and Garden Tour in November, followed by the annual Antique Fair early in January. The Museum benefits in many ways from the Friends' active support, not only financially. The Friends are strong champions of the Museum locally and help to keep the Museum's profile high in the community.

Collaboration with Okains Bay Museum

Just prior to the summer season, Akaroa Museum and Okains Bay Museum produced a combined brochure promoting both institutions. This has been widely distributed.

Arts Council event in Court House

The Akaroa Community Arts Council will be using the Court House as a venue for the first in a series of talks, Artistic Controversies. Tonight Dr Mark Stocker will talk on the subject of colonial statues in Aotearoa – should they stay or should they go. Although a wonderful heritage interior, the Court House has a capacity of only 50 so events held there sell out fast.

#.5 LONG TERM PLAN

Long Term Plan

Council's Long Term Plan has now been finalised and is out for public consultation. It contains significant change for the Museum, with a 10% cut to operational costs beginning in year 2 of the plan, 2022/23. Finding this level of savings in the operational budget, while retaining current levels of service, will be a challenge.

A. ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

1. Inside Out Akaroa House and Garden Tour 2020

The 2020 Inside Out Akaroa House and Garden Tour took place on the weekend of 28-29 November. It was our most successful year ever with over 680 tickets sold, raising \$8460.19 for FOAM. As always, the Tour has benefitted from the huge support from **Liz Haylock**, **Graeme Curry** and colleagues volunteering their time within and outside FOAM, particularly **Suz Wyborne** from Akaroa District Promotions, as well as the gracious support and hard work of 13 property owners – enthusiastic gardeners all – and over 70 volunteer gatekeepers, without whom we couldn't undertake such an enterprise. Everyone involved appeared to enjoy themselves and the positive feedback from garden visitors. We have learned some useful lessons from this edition of the Tour, which will be incorporated into our next edition in 2022.

2. FOAM Christmas Dinner and Antiques Fair

The FOAM Christmas Dinner was held on 04 December 2020. It was a lovely evening of feasting and recollecting an unusual and challenging year, all in the finest FOAM spirit. As always, FOAM acknowledges its culinary debt to **Jo Dwyer**, and all the volunteers who set up and cleaned up.

The FOAM Antiques Fair took place on 2-3 January 2021 at the Gaiety, and was again a much-enjoyed success, raising \$3431.20. Feedback from the antiques vendors involved was uniformly positive and we continue to be grateful for their continued support. Our continued success with the annual Fair would not be possible without the great support of **Liz Haylock, Nigel Harrison, Cheryl Jenkins, Victoria Andrews, John Harding** and many others – most grateful thanks to them all.

3. 2021 National Museum Visitor Survey

As in previous years, FOAM volunteers have supported Akaroa Museum staff with conducting interviews of museum visitors during the week of 22-26 February 2021.
