### 1. Purpose of Report / Te Pūtake Pūrongo

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is for the Waipapa/Papanui-Innes Community Board to approve the proposed road names at 8 Blakes Road, Belfast.
- 1.2 This report is staff generated resulting from a naming request received from the subdivision developer.

### 2. Officer Recommendations / Ngā Tūtohu

That the Waipapa/Papanui-Innes Community Board resolve to:

1. Approve the following new road names for 8 Blakes Road (RMA/2021/505)
  - a. Road 12 - Borthwick Street
  - b. Road 5 - Arapawa Street

### 3. Background / Te Horopaki

#### Introduction / Te Whakatkinga

- 3.1 Road naming requests have been submitted by Harrison Grierson Consultants on behalf of the developer, for the subdivision of 8 Blakes Road (RMA/2021/505). A preferred name and alternative names, have been put forward by the developer for each road.
- 3.2 The recommended road names have been checked against existing road names in Christchurch and bordering districts, for duplication, alternative spelling, or other similarities in spelling or pronunciation to avoid the potential for confusion. The proposed names are considered sufficiently different to existing road names.
- 3.3 The recommended road names have been checked against the Council's Roads and Right-of-Way Naming Policy dated 2 November 1993 and are considered to be consistent with this policy except as outlined below.
- 3.4 The recommended road names have also been checked against the Australia and New Zealand Standard AS/NZS 4819:2011 Rural and Urban Addressing. The names are considered to be consistent with the Standard unless otherwise stated below.
- 3.5 Under the Roads and Right-of-Way Naming Policy, the names considered must be requested by the developer. There is not an ability to consider alternative names without first checking whether there are any duplications or similarities with other road and right-of-way names.
- 3.6 Consultation has been undertaken with Land Information New Zealand who have raised no concerns with the proposed road names.
- 3.7 The names requested have been accompanied by an explanation of the background to the names, which is summarised below, along with correspondence with the applicant.

### Assessment of Significance and Engagement / Te Aromatawai Whakahirahira

- 3.8 The decision in this report is of low significance in relation to the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.
- 3.9 The level of significance was determined by the number of people affected and/or with an interest.
- 3.10 Due to the assessment of low significance, no further community engagement and consultation is required.

### Proposed Names

- 3.11 The proposed roads are shown in **Attachment A**.
- 3.12 The proposed options are related to the historic use of the site as a meat processing plant and Spring Grove farm.
- 3.13 Road 12 - Preferred name: Borthwick Street
- 3.14 Thomas Borthwick & Sons was a meat processing and export company established in 1895. They operated meatworks all over New Zealand, including in Christchurch in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century.
- 3.15 Road 5 - Preferred name: Arapawa Street
- 3.16 Arapawa is a breed of sheep found primarily on Arapaoa Island in the Marlborough Sounds. They are likely descendants of merino strains from Australia and have probably been isolated since they were introduced in 1867. This breed is raised primarily for wool.

### Alternative Names

- 3.17 Herdwick Street – Herdwick is a breed of sheep native to the Lake District in North West England. They are dual-purpose breed, producing strongly flavoured lamb and mutton and a coarse, grey wool.
- 3.18 *Note: LINZ have suggested that this sounds similar to Hardwicke Street in Sumner and have left it to Council to make a final call on this. Council Officers are supportive of this name on the basis that it is sufficiently different in sound and geographical location so it does not cause undue confusion.*
- 3.19 Dewhurst Street – J H Dewhurst Ltd were retail butchers in most British high streets in the 20<sup>th</sup> century and sold imported lamb from New Zealand. They were founded in 1897 and are linked to the meat processing industry in the southern hemisphere.

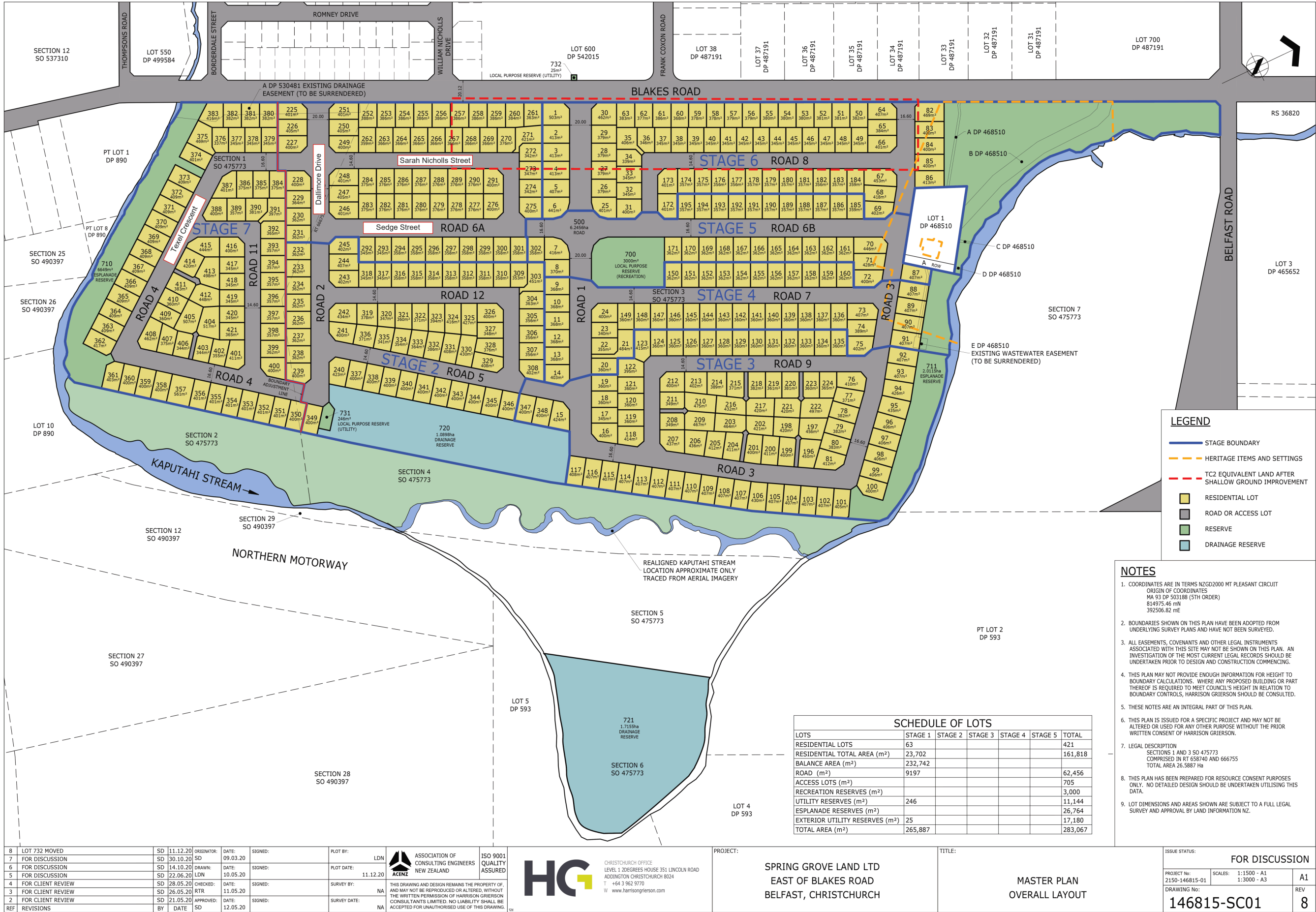

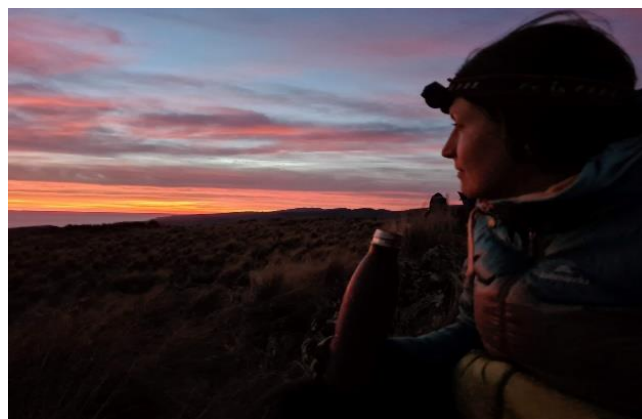

- **The Christchurch Walking Festival – Saturday 17 April to Sunday 2 May 2021**

The Walking Festival 2021 kicked off on Saturday 17 April running through the school holidays until the 2<sup>nd</sup> of May. There were over 50 walks to choose from in the Christchurch, Selwyn and Waimakariri districts. These walks ran at various times, targeting all ages and interests.



The objectives of the Festival are: Exploration, Discovery/Learning and Connection

- Hapori: Developing community well-being.
- Whenua: People are connected and feel a sense of belonging to their local place, to Ōtautahi and surrounding districts.
- Whānau: Our stakeholders and partners are supported to provide recreational opportunities.
- Te Ara: Provide pathways for people to continue to walk regularly.



This is the first time the Festival has been held in the April school holidays and the walks were fortunate to have excellent weather conditions for walking.

The Festival saw the return of the very popular Dogs Day Out, Gruffalo, Going on a Bear Hunt and the Generation Game.

The Festival is only possible due to the contributions of over 30 event partners who provide a great range of walks each year. All walks are free although some walks may charge for transport costs.

There was one walk in the Papanui-Innes ward area which was “Going on a Bear Hunt”. This walk was very well attended with 500 children and parents. This event was organised in partnership with the Shirley Community Trust.





- ANZAC Day Memorial Services – Belfast and Papanui**

On Sunday 25 April Emma Norrish and Simon Britten attended the Belfast ANZAC Service at the Sheldon Park Cenotaph, where a wreath was laid on behalf of the Board. Run by Belfast/Kaiapoi Rotary, the Belfast Community Network, and Belfast Bowling Club, the service was well-attended by both young and old, and included a roll call of those locals who went to, but did not return from both world wars



Later in the morning, Emma Norrish and Mike Davidson attended the Papanui RSA's ANZAC Parade and Service. As always, there was a large crowd in attendance, with a number of veterans, defence force representatives, and other community representatives present. Speeches were made, anthems were sung, wreaths and



poppies were laid, the last post rang out, and moments of reflection were had by all. It would appear that people missed being able to gather to





mark ANZAC Day last year due to the lockdown and made up for it by turning up in large numbers to our local services this year.

- **Styx River Site Visit**

On Wednesday 5 May 2021 members of the Papanui-Innes and Coastal-Burwood Community Boards went on a guided bus tour of part of the Styx River and its reserves and walkway.



This enabled members to see the progress that has been made with the walkway and native plantings to enhance Christchurch's urban regeneration corridors.
