

4. Public Forum Te Huinga Whānui

Part B

4.1 Greater Hornby Residents' Association

Ross Houliston, representative from the Greater Hornby Residents' Association, addressed the Board regarding local issues in the greater Hornby area.

Mr Houliston noted there has been a positive community response to the suggestion of a right turning traffic light arrow at the Amyes and Shands Road intersection. It was further recommended that right turning lights be investigated for Waterloo Road at Carmen Road. Another area of concern is the current state of centre road plots on Carmen Road to the Sockburn roundabout.



Mr Houliston provided an update regarding signage for Denton Park and the Denton Memorial, which is in the process of being designed.

Mr Houliston spoke about various concerns regarding quarrying in the area. Concerns include traffic volumes associated with trucks using Roberts and Pound Roads and dust levels in the vicinity of Pound Road. The angle of bunding and proximity to the boundary fences in the area was also noted as a concern.

Mr Houliston noted the recent removal of rubbish bins in Denton Park, and replacement with the newly installed smart bin. He considers that the new bin has been placed some distance from the main source of deposited rubbish which is between the Oval and the Rugby Clubrooms. The Association would like to see the bin moved to a more accessible location.

After questions from members, the Chairperson thanked Ross Houliston for his presentation.

Approves, pursuant to Part 4 Clause 27 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017 and Land Transport Rule: Setting of Speed Limits 2017, that the speed limits on Chalmers Street be revoked and set generally as identified in Attachment A to the staff report on the agenda for the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board meeting 29 June 2021 and detailed below (including resultant changes made to the Christchurch City Council Register of Speed Limits and associated Speed Limit Maps).

- Topics from a recent Templeton Residents' Association meeting included the community garden and orchard, a proposal for a walking school bus, a community safety meeting scheduled for next month and a successful coffee meet up the association organised to connect with local residents, and a Roydon Quarry appeal update.
- A further report on options to reduce speed on Richmond Avenue/John Paterson Drive is still awaited.
- The requested meeting with staff and Waka Kotahi regarding Halswell Junction road signage is still to be scheduled.
- Lochee Road residents have expressed concern regarding the new cycleway's impact on the width of the road.
- Long Term Plan Funding has been allocated for the Riccarton Bus Lounges and Mobile Libraries to continue and Strengthening Communities Funding will remain the same. The submissions made regarding these projects was acknowledged.
- Yaldhurst Memorial Hall.
- Halswell Go Kart Club is to remain at the current site with funding now to be used to move the track towards the motorway.
- The Chief Executive's Office is progressing a planning team looking at growth in Halswell.
- A meeting was recently held regarding ongoing stormwater issues in Halswell.



- Residents have expressed interest in a dog park in Templeton.
- There is ongoing concern regarding the condition of the Denton Park carpark.
- The Board wishes to liaise with Waka Kotahi regularly to discuss local matters.

13.1 Halswell Stormwater Retention Systems

The Board noted the number of proposed housing developments in Halswell and discussed possible stormwater issues associated with new developments.

The Board agreed to request a briefing from staff on stormwater management in Halswell.

13.2 Meeting with School Principals

The Board discussed the benefits of hosting a meeting with school principals as an opportunity to connect and discuss local issues.

The Board agreed to request staff to organise a Board hosted meeting with local school principals.

13.3 Springs Road Footpath Extension

The Board discussed local concern regarding difficult pedestrian access on Springs Road, from Halswell Junction Road towards Boston Avenue.

The Board agreed to request staff advice on an extension of the footpath on Springs Road, from Halswell Junction Road towards Boston Avenue.

13.4 Denton Park and Westlake Reserve Smart Bins Relocation

The Board discussed the recent removal of rubbish bins in Denton Park and Westlake Reserve and the replacement with smart bins, noting that the new bins are not located in the best position. It was also noted that the clearing of the smart bin at Westlake Reserve seems to have resulted in damage to an area of grass.

The Board agreed to request staff advice regarding possible relocation of the smart bins in Denton Park and Westlake Reserve.

13.5 Amyes and Shands Road Intersection Traffic Lights

The Board discussed the community support for installation of a right turning arrow on traffic lights at the Amyes and Shands Roads intersection to alleviate long wait times for turning vehicles. The possibility of installing no stopping lines on a section of Amyes Road to allow for two traffic lanes approaching the intersection was also discussed.

The Board agreed to request staff to provide advice regarding the possibility of the installation of a green turning arrow traffic light, turning from Amyes Road onto Shands Road intersection and the installation of no stopping lines on Amyes Road approaching the intersection.

Purpose of the Report Te Pūtake Pūrongo

- The purpose of this report is seek a decision as to whether to grant an easement over a Recreation Reserve, being Hornby Domain, or not. This report has been written following a request from the Hornby Bowls Club (HBC), and Enable Services Limited (ESL), to provide for the HBC to connect to the fibre network.
- The decision in this report is of low significance in relation to the Christchurch City Council's 1.2 Significance and Engagement Policy. The level of significance was determined by completing the Significance and Engagement Policy Matrix and supported by:
 - 1.2.1 The infrastructure will be underground, and the public's ability to enjoy the reserve will not be adversely impacted.
 - 1.2.2 To a layperson there would be no noticeable change to the land outside of the construction period.

2. Officer Recommendations Ngā Tūtohu

That the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board:

- Recommends that the Chief Executive acting as the Minister of Conservation's delegate, 1. consents to the granting of the easements to Enable Services Limited for the right to convey telecommunications and computer media as outlined in the Officer report on the agenda for the Board meeting 13 July 2021.
- 2. Subject to the consent of the Minister of Conservation, approves the grant of the easements pursuant to Section 48 of the Reserves Act 1977 to:
 - Enable Services Limited for the rights to convey telecommunications and computer media over the part of Hornby Domain at 531 Main South Road, Hornby, legally described as Reserve 4146, held within Record of Title CB244/101 shown approximately on the plan at Attachment A to the Officer report on the agenda for the Board meeting 13 July 2021, or such other areas as defined by survey of the infrastructure.
- 3. Authorises the Property Consultancy Manager, if the easements are granted with the consent of the Minister of Conservation, to finalise documentation to implement the easement.

3. Reason for Report Recommendations Ngā Take mō te Whakatau

- To enable HBC to connect to the fibre network. 3.1
- In order for HBC to connect to the fibre network, an easement is gross in favour of ESL is 3.2 required to be granted across part of Hornby Domain to enable legal connectivity to the network.



3.3 ESL will also pay for the acquisition of the property right, this will be determined by an independent registered valuer: which will be instructed if the easement is approved by Council.

4. Alternative Options Considered Etahi atu Kowhiringa

- 4.1 To not grant the easement.
- 4.2 Not granting the easement will mean that HBC is unable to connect to the fibre network, and will have to continue to rely on the existing copper network in time this will mean that no connectivity is provided as the copper network is gradually being phased out nationwide.
- 4.3 This will have an obvious disadvantage to the HBC, conversely it will mean that Hornby Domain is not encumbered by an easement.

5. Detail Te Whakamahuki

- 5.1 The proposed easement corridor is shown generally in accordance with the plan included as **Attachment A.**
- 5.2 The Reserves Act 1977 (the Act) requires that any easement granted over any reserve requires public consultation unless the provisions of section 48(3) of the Act are met these provisions are that the easement does not materially alter the reserve or permanently affect the rights of the public.
 - 5.2.1 As the infrastructure contained within the easement corridor will be in ground the provisions of s48(3) are met and accordingly public consultation is not required.
- 5.3 The decision affects the following ward/Community Board area:
 - 5.3.1 Hornby ward and Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board
- 5.4 A consideration was given to utilising the legal road corridor north of where the infrastructure enters the land, however due to other infrastructure in existence this option was considered viable.

6. Policy Framework Implications Ngā Hīraunga ā- Kaupapa here

Strategic Alignment Te Rautaki Tīaroaro

- 6.1 The proposed easement will grant ESL rights over the land for the purpose of the easement.

 This will enable Hornby Bowls Club to have fit-for-purpose recreation and sporting facilities.
- 6.2 This report supports the <u>Council's Long Term Plan (2018 2028)</u>:
 - 6.2.1 Activity: Recreation, Sport, Community Arts & Events
 - Level of Service: 7.0.1.6 Provide citizens access to fit-for-purpose recreation and sporting facilities. - 13 leased recreation and sporting facilities are available for community use.

Policy Consistency Te Whai Kaupapa here

6.3 The decision is consistent with the Council's Plans and Policies.

Impact on Mana Whenua Ngā Whai Take Mana Whenua

6.4 The decision does not involve a significant decision in relation to ancestral land or a body of water or other elements of intrinsic value, therefore this decision does not specifically impact Mana Whenua, their culture and traditions.



6.5 This is because the decision being made is not considered significant due to the infrastructure being in ground and the ability for people to enjoy the reserve is not being impacted.

Climate Change Impact Considerations Ngā Whai Whakaaro mā te Āhuarangi

- 6.6 There is minimal impacts pertaining to climate change in relation to this decision.
- 6.7 The infrastructure is under ground, and any climate change effects that may occur are unlikely to impact the infrastructure, in the short, medium, or long term.

- 7.1 Cost to Implement applicant funded

8. Legal Implications Ngā Hīraunga ā-Ture

Statutory power to undertake proposals in the report Te Manatū Whakahaere Kaupapa

- 8.1 The Community Board holds the delegation to authorise the granting of easements over reserve land that is vested in the local territorial authority.
- 8.2 The Council's Chief Executive holds the delegation to authorise the Minister of Conservation's consent, as is required to grant easements under Section 48 (1) of the Reserves Act 1977.
- 8.3 Section 48(1) of the Reserves Act 1977 ("the Act") provides that the administering body (Council), with the consent of the Minister of Conservation, may grant easements for an electrical installation.
- 8.4 Under section 48(2) of the Act, it is necessary for the Council to publicly notify its intention to grant an easement except where the reserve is unlikely to be materially altered or permanently damaged, and the rights of the public in respect of the reserve are unlikely to be permanently affected (section 48(3) of the Act).
- 8.5 As the infrastructure to be covered by the easement is under ground the rights of the public will not be materially or permanent affected, and therefore no public notification is required.

Other Legal Implications Etahi atu Hīraunga-ā-Ture

- 8.6 There is a legal context, issue or implication relevant to this decision.
- 8.7 This report has not been reviewed and approved by the Legal Services Unit.
- 8.8 The legal consideration is the easement registration documentation.



1. Purpose of the Report Te Pūtake Pūrongo

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is for the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board to consider the approval of No Stopping restrictions on a part of Witham Street, Glenora Place and Dunstan Crescent in Hornby.
- 1.2 This report has been written in response to a request from local residents to investigate the effect of parked vehicles upon the safety at the intersections at this location.
- 1.3 The decisions in this report are of low significance in relation to the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy. The level of significance was determined by the low level of impact and low number of people affected by the recommended decision.
- 1.4 The community engagement and consultation outlined in this report reflect the assessment.
- 1.5 The recommended option is to install the No Stopping restrictions on Witham Street, Glenora Place and Dunstan Crescent in accordance with **Attachment A**. A location plan is shown in **Attachment B**.
- 1.6 These measures have been requested to:
 - Improve the safety of drivers turning into and out of Glenora Place and Dunstan Crescent by preventing them from being forced to drive along the middle of the road.
 - Improve the safety of pedestrians using the informal crossing facility across Glenora Place and Dunstan Crescent.
 - Improve the sight line for drivers turning out of Glenora Place and Dunstan Crescent.
 - Assist larger vehicles such as rubbish trucks and delivery vehicles to ensure they can proceed safely around the intersections.

2. Officer Recommendations Ngā Tūtohu

That the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board pursuant to clause 7 of the 2017 Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw:

Witham Street/Glenora Place

- 1. Approves that the stopping of vehicles be prohibited at any time on the north east side of Witham Street commencing at its intersection with Glenora Place and extending to the north east for a distance of 10 metres.
- 2. Approves that the stopping of vehicles be prohibited at any time on the north west side of Witham Street commencing at its intersection with Glenora Place and extending to the south west for a distance of 10 metres.
- 3. Approves that the stopping of vehicles be prohibited at any time on the north east side of Glenora Place commencing at its intersection with Witham Street and extending to the north west for a distance of 10 metres.



4. Approves that the stopping of vehicles be prohibited at any time on the south west side of Glenora Place commencing at its intersection with Witham Street and extending to the north west for a distance of 10 metres.

Witham Street/Dunstan Crescent

- 5. Approves that the stopping of vehicles be prohibited at any time on the north east side of Witham Street commencing at its intersection with Dunstan Crescent and extending to the north east for a distance of 10 metres.
- 6. Approves that the stopping of vehicles be prohibited at any time on the north west side of Witham Street commencing at its intersection with Dunstan Crescent and extending to the south west for a distance of 10 metres.
- 7. Approves that the stopping of vehicles be prohibited at any time on the north east side of Dunstan Crescent commencing at its intersection with Witham Street and extending to the north west for a distance of 10 metres.
- 8. Approves that the stopping of vehicles be prohibited at any time on the south west side of Dunstan Crescent commencing at its intersection with Witham Street and extending to the north west for a distance of 10 metres.
- 9. Revokes any previous resolutions pertaining to traffic controls made pursuant to any bylaw to the extent that they are in conflict with the traffic controls described in resolutions 1-8 above.
- 10. Approves that these resolutions take effect when the road markings that evidence the restrictions described in the staff report are in place (or removed in the case of revocations).

3. Reason for Report Recommendations Ngā Take mō te Whakatau

- 3.1 Safety concerns have been raised by several residents of Witham Street, concerning parking activity at the intersections with Glenora Place and Dunstan Crescent.
- 3.2 The recommendations will reduce the risk of a collision between drivers approaching the intersections by improving their intervisibility and reducing their need to drive along the middle of the road. There are also benefits to pedestrians crossing Glenora Place and Dunstan Crescent, who will also have improved intervisibility with drivers turning at the intersections.

4. Alternative Options Considered Etahi atu Kōwhiringa

Maintain the status quo

- 4.1 The advantages of this option include:
 - 4.1.1 None identified.
- 4.2 The disadvantages of the option include:
 - 4.2.1 Does not address resident concerns about safety at these intersections.

5. Detail Te Whakamahuki

- 5.1 Local residents referred to high levels of parking demand that occur on match days at Branston Park, which is located adjacent to Witham Street. The parking activity often occurs at locations that affect the safety of other drivers and pedestrians.
- 5.2 In particular, problems were highlighted at the two intersections of Witham Street with Glenora Place and Dunstan Crescent. These intersections are uncontrolled and lack any parking restrictions.



- 5.3 Staff visited the site and observed the parking activity on match days. There were numerous examples of inconsiderate parking along the kerb radii, across the pedestrian crossing points and sometimes at wayward angles near the intersections and extending into the road.
- 5.4 Staff checked the NZTA Crash Analysis Database, which did not show any recorded crashes at these intersections. However staff consider that there are potential risks to drivers and pedestrians at this location.
- 5.5 The proposed no stopping will result in, technically, only 3-4 spaces being removed and displaced elsewhere on Witham Street, Glenora Place and Dunstan Crescent. It is considered that this requires an additional walk time of only a few more minutes. The parking at these locations only occurs occasionally, during match days at Branston Park and is already illegally within 6 metres of the intersections, so the loss of spaces is considered to be insignificant.
- 5.6 Staff consider that the recommendations in this report will help achieve the desired community outcome of a safer environment.
- 5.7 Approval is required by the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board.
- 5.8 If approved, the recommendations will be implemented within the financial year.

Community Views and Preferences

- 5.9 Affected property owners and residents on Witham Street (18-34), Glenora Place (2-6) and Dunstan Crescent (37-52) and the Greater Hornby Residents' Association were contacted by letter and invited to comment.
- 5.10 Five submissions were received from property owners and tenants who all supported the proposal.
- 5.11 The Team Leader Parking Compliance supports the preferred option.
- 5.12 The do nothing option is inconsistent with the original request and subsequent community support to improve road safety.

6. Policy Framework Implications Ngā Hīraunga ā- Kaupapa here

Strategic Alignment Te Rautaki Tīaroaro

- 6.1 Council's strategic priorities have been considered in formulating the recommendations in this report, however this area of work is not specifically covered by an identified priority.
- 6.2 The recommendations in this report are also consistent with the anticipated outcomes of the Traffic Safety & Efficiency Service Plan in the Councils Long Term Plan (2018 2028)

Policy Consistency Te Whai Kaupapa here

6.3 The recommendations in this report are consistent with the <u>Christchurch Suburban Parking Policy</u>.

Impact on Mana Whenua Ngā Whai Take Mana Whenua

6.4 The effects of this proposal upon Mana Whenua are expected to be insignificant.

Climate Change Impact Considerations Ngā Whai Whakaaro mā te Āhuarangi

6.5 This proposal does not have any significant effect upon carbon emissions and Climate Change.

Accessibility Considerations Ngā Whai Whakaaro mā te Hunga Hauā

6.6 This proposal improves the accessibility of pedestrians using the crossing at the intersections.



7. Resource Implications Ngā Hīraunga Rauemi

- 7.1 Cost to Implement approximately \$200 for the new line markings and \$750 for producing the report.
- 7.2 Maintenance/Ongoing costs approximately \$200/year.

- 8.1 Part 1, Clauses 7 and 8 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017 provides Council with the authority to install parking restrictions by resolution.
- 8.2 The Community Boards have delegated authority from the Council to exercise the delegations as set out in the Register of Delegations. The list of delegations for the Community Boards includes the resolution of stopping restrictions and traffic control devices.
- 8.3 The installation of any signs and/or markings associated with traffic control devices must comply with the Land Transport Rule: Traffic Control Devices 2004.



4.2 Branston Park Play Space Renewal

Community consultation has been completed on the Branston Park Play Space Renewal project that will remove and replace all existing equipment. The new playground will remain in the general area where it is now and the basketball court will be renewed in its current location.



4.3 Chokebore Lodge

Necessary make safe and stabilisation works on Chokebore Lodge are almost complete with preparatory constructive elements for Cob works undertaken off site. Main contract works will recommence shortly after conclusion of detailed and technical reconciliation of Building and Resource Consenting requirements. Works are scheduled to be completed by February 2022.

4.4 Halswell Community Local Play Space Planned Renewals

A project to renew the play equipment in four local parks in Halswell (Shamrock Reserve, Wales Reserve, Westbrooke Reserve and Ridder Reserve) in underway.

Project staff provided an update to the Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board on 11 May and the proposed project approach was agreed.

4.5 Branston Park Play Space Renewal

Community consultation has been completed on the Branston Park Play Space Renewal project that will remove and replace all existing equipment. The new playground will remain in the general area where it is now and the basketball court will be renewed in its current location.

4.6 Hornby Roller Dome

The Hornby Roller Drome previously home to Christchurch Amateur Rolling Skate Club has surrendered its lease of the Canterbury Roller Dome in Hornby to the Christchurch City Council. Since this time the Ōtautahi Rollers who are a roller derby, speed skating, roller skating club that operates across the city and are really proactive and interested in making the roller drome their home. In the interim staff are working with the Ōtautahi Rollers to get them in the building in the short term. The facility is custom built for roller sports so Recreation and Sport unit would like to see it retained for that purpose.

The usual process for a permanent lease will take place once council have confirmed the lights are or aren't compliant, including public consultation where interested parties will have an opportunity to provide their ideas as well as approval from the Community Board.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1. The Waipuna Halswell-Hornby-Riccarton Community Board ("the Board") appreciates the opportunity to make a submission on the Council's Proposed Replacement Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021 ("the Bylaw").
- 1.2. This submission was compiled by the Board's Submissions Committee under the delegated authority granted by the Board.
- 1.3. The Board wishes to be heard in support of its submission.

2. SUBMISSION

- 2.1. The Board supports the general approach of the current bylaw, requiring that all freedom camping is in certified self-contained vehicles (with facilities on board) and providing some areas where freedom camping is prohibited entirely, and other areas where freedom camping is restricted to camping for up to two nights within any 30-day period.
- 2.2. The Board supports the updating the definition of "certified self-contained vehicle" to reflect an amendment to the Standard (NZS 5465:2001 A2) to ensure on-board toilets in camping vehicles are accessible when the bed is made up and provides for the certification to set out the number of occupants the vehicle is certified for. The Board notes that the standard sets the process and requirements for independent qualified assessors to certify camping vehicles and allows for self-containment to be demonstrated by the display of a warrant card.
- 2.3. The Board also supports the proposal to include an additional clause in the Bylaw to prohibit campers from setting up their camping vehicle or camping equipment in a way that limits the normal movement of vehicles or pedestrians, or otherwise blocks a thoroughfare. The Board

is aware that issues have arisen in the past due to the competing interests of campers and other users of public areas where freedom camping is allowed but which were not designed to accommodate camping.

- 2.4. The Board agrees with the proposal regarding the process for the Chief Executive to upon application temporarily waive or modify parts of the bylaw to enable camping for organised events in areas where such camping is not normally allowed. The Board notes that this was the intention of the current bylaw but that there is insufficient clarity in the existing provision to allow this.
- 2.5. The Board supports the proposal to make the current temporary ban freedom camping area at North Beach Car Park, New Brighton, a permanent ban from 7pm Fridays until 7pm Sundays, between 1 October and 1 May each year. The Board recognises that the car park is used for the surf lifesaving club and the community hall and provides access to the beach and park as well as being a popular freedom camping site. These sometimes competing interests need to be balanced. The Board considers that the proposed weekend prohibition of freedom camping over the period of the surf lifesaving season does this.
- 2.6. The Board supports the proposed new City Coastal Restricted Zone that allows camping in self-contained vehicles for up to four nights in any 30-day period, with no more than two nights in any place noting that the current prohibited areas within this zone will continue. The Board agrees that the proposed restrictions to limit the number of freedom campers remaining in the area for extended periods will provide better protection for the area while maintaining access to the area for all users of this popular area.
- 2.7. The Board accepts that changes are needed to the management of freedom camping at Te Nukutai o Tapoa Naval Point marine and recreation area in Lyttelton to improve access to the area by recreational, club and other users (such as the coast guard). The Board supports the proposal to limit the location and the number of parks where freedom camping can occur at the Naval Point site, enabling about 18 camping vehicles per night, as a means of balancing access for all users.
- 2.8. The Board supports the inclusion of an improved description and map of the prohibited area at Windsport Park, near the Avon-Heathcote Estuary / Te Ihutai.



3. CONCLUSION

3.1. The Board requests that the Council take into consideration the above submission on Proposed Replacement Freedom Camping Bylaw 2021.


