7. South New Brighton Park - South Brighton Tennis Club Lighting Application

 - a. The court lights are to be used on weekdays, Monday to Friday only, between the hours of 7.30am and 9.00pm. Usage to begin no more than one month prior to the date daylight saving finishes. Usage to end within one month after the date daylight saving begins.
 - b. If the tennis courts are not in use, the lights will be turned off.

7. Bower Avenue - Proposed Bus Stop Changes and No Stopping Restrictions

1. Purpose of the Report

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is for the Waitai Coastal-Burwood Community Board to consider the approval of upgrading the bus stop outside 215 and 217 Bower Avenue (Bus Stop ID: 20576) to the Council's current Construction Standard Specifications.
- 1.2 The report has been written in response to a request from a user of the bus stop to investigate the safety concerns posed by a deep-dish channel that runs along the western edge of Bower Avenue for the entire length of the bus stop, along with the difficulties for buses to pull close to the kerb.
- 1.3 The decisions in this report are of low significance in relation to the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy. The level of significance was determined by the low level of impact and low number of people affected by the decision.
- 1.4 The community engagement and consultation outlined in this report reflect the assessment.
- 1.5 The recommended option is to increase the length of the bus stop to 15m, paint No Stopping lines for 5 metres north of the bus stop and 12 metres south of the bus stop and move the existing bus stop sign and post further north in line with the bus stop markings as shown in **Attachment A**. This new design and the absence of parked vehicles close to the bus stop at this location would provide sufficient space for buses to pull over close to the kerb which would enable passengers to get off directly onto the footpath from the bus.

2. Officer Recommendations Ngā Tūtohu

That the Waitai Coastal-Burwood Community Board:

- 1. Pursuant to Clause 7 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017 approves:
 - a. That the stopping of vehicles is prohibited at all times on the west side of Bower Avenue commencing at a point 76 metres north of its intersection with Travis Road and extending in a southerly direction for a distance of 5 metres.
 - b. That a marked bus stop be installed on the west side of Bower Avenue commencing at a point approximately 71 metres north of its intersection with Travis Road, and extending in a southerly direction for a distance of 15 metres.
 - c. That the stopping of vehicles is prohibited at all times on the west side of Bower Avenue commencing at a point 56 metres north of its intersection with Travis Road and extending in a southerly direction for a distance of 12 metres.
- 2. Revoke any previous resolutions pertaining to traffic controls made pursuant to any bylaw to the extent that they are in conflict with the traffic controls described above.



3. That these resolutions take effect when the traffic control devices that evidence the restrictions described in the staff report are in place.

3. Reason for Report Recommendations Ngā Take mō te Whakatau

- 3.1 Safety concerns have been identified/raised regarding the deep dish channel that runs along the western side of Bower Avenue especially along the bus stop outside 215 and 217 Bower Avenue (Bus Stop ID: 20576). Implementing the noted recommendations will increase the ability for buses to stop close to the kerb. This would reduce the risk for passengers getting off a bus at that bus stop as passengers can step directly on the footpath.
- 3.2 The recommendations in this report will help to achieve the desired community outcome of a well-connected and accessible city through improved road safety.

4. Alternative Options Considered Etahi atu Kowhiringa

- 4.1 Maintain the status quo.
 - 4.1.1 The advantages of this option include:
 - Retains existing on-street parking spaces.
 - 4.1.2 The disadvantages of the option include:
 - Does not address the customers' requests, and identified concerns, related to the bus users' safety at this location.
- 4.2 Install bridge blocks over the gutter.
 - 4.2.1 The advantages of this option include:
 - Retains existing on-street parking spaces.
 - Appears to address the customer's request.
 - 4.2.2 The disadvantages of the option include:
 - Passengers still need to take a steep step while entering/exiting the bus.
 - Buses would still be unable to pull over close to the kerb and may continue to stop partly in the carriageway.

5. Detail Te Whakamahuki

- 5.1 The above mentioned bus stop is shorter than the Council's current Construction Standard Specifications. This, coupled with vehicles being parked very close to the bus stop makes it difficult for buses to pull over completely into the marked bus stop adjacent and close to the kerb. Hence, buses are forced to stop partly in the carriageway, in the way of many other vehicles.
- 5.2 After investigating the matter, staff acknowledge the customers' concerns and agree that there is a potential road safety issue present that could be addressed by adopting the recommendations in this report.
- 5.3 Approval is required by the Waitai Coastal-Burwood Community Board.
- 5.4 If approved, the recommendations will be implemented within the current financial year.

Community Views and Preferences

5.5 Owners and residents of the properties near the proposed changes were advised of the recommended option by letter.



- 5.6 One submission was received which was in support of the proposed changes.
- 5.7 The Team Leader Parking Compliance has no concerns with the preferred option.
- 5.8 The do nothing option is inconsistent with community requests to improve accessibility at this location.

6. Policy Framework Implications Ngā Hīraunga ā- Kaupapa here

Strategic Alignment Te Rautaki Tīaroaro

- 6.1 The Council's strategic priorities have been considered in formulating the recommendations in this report, however this area of work is not specifically covered by an identified priority.
- 6.2 The recommendations in this report are also consistent with the anticipated outcomes of the Traffic Safety and Efficiency Service Plan in the Councils Long Term Plan (2018 2028).

Policy Consistency Te Whai Kaupapa here

6.3 The recommendations in this report are consistent with the <u>Christchurch Suburban Parking Policy</u>.

Impact on Mana Whenua Ngā Whai Take Mana Whenua

6.4 The effects of this proposal upon Mana Whenua are expected to be insignificant.

Climate Change Impact Considerations Ngā Whai Whakaaro mā te Āhuarangi

6.5 This proposal does not have any significant effect upon carbon emissions and Climate Change.

Accessibility Considerations Ngā Whai Whakaaro mā te Hunga Hauā

6.6 This proposal does have a specific effect on accessibility for passengers who use the bus services at this location by allowing them to step in and out of buses easily and safely.

7. Resource Implications Ngā Hīraunga Rauemi

Capex/Opex Ngā Utu Whakahaere

- 7.1 Cost to Implement approximately \$3,200 and around \$750 for investigation and preparation of this report.
- 7.2 Maintenance/Ongoing costs Included under existing maintenance contracts approximately \$300 per annum.
- 7.3 Funding Source Traffic Operations, Capital Expenditure budget for bus stop, seating and shelter removals.

8. Legal Implications Ngā Hīraunga ā-Ture

Statutory power to undertake proposals in the report Te Manatū Whakahaere Kaupapa

- 8.1 Part 1, Clauses 7 and 8 of the Christchurch City Council Traffic and Parking Bylaw 2017 provides the Council with the authority to install parking restrictions by resolution.
- 8.2 Community Boards have delegated authority from the Council to exercise the delegations as set out in the Register of Delegations. The list of delegations for the Community Boards includes the resolution of stopping restrictions and traffic control devices.
- 8.3 The installation of any signs and/or markings associated with traffic control devices must comply with the Land Transport Rule: Traffic Control Devices 2004.



Other Legal Implications Etahi atu Hīraunga-ā-Ture

- 8.4 There is a legal context, issue or implication relevant to this decision.
- 8.5 This specific report has not been reviewed and approved by the Legal Services Unit however the report has been written using a general approach previously approved of by the Legal Services Unit, and the recommendations are consistent with the policy and legislative framework outlined in sections 8.1 to 8.3.

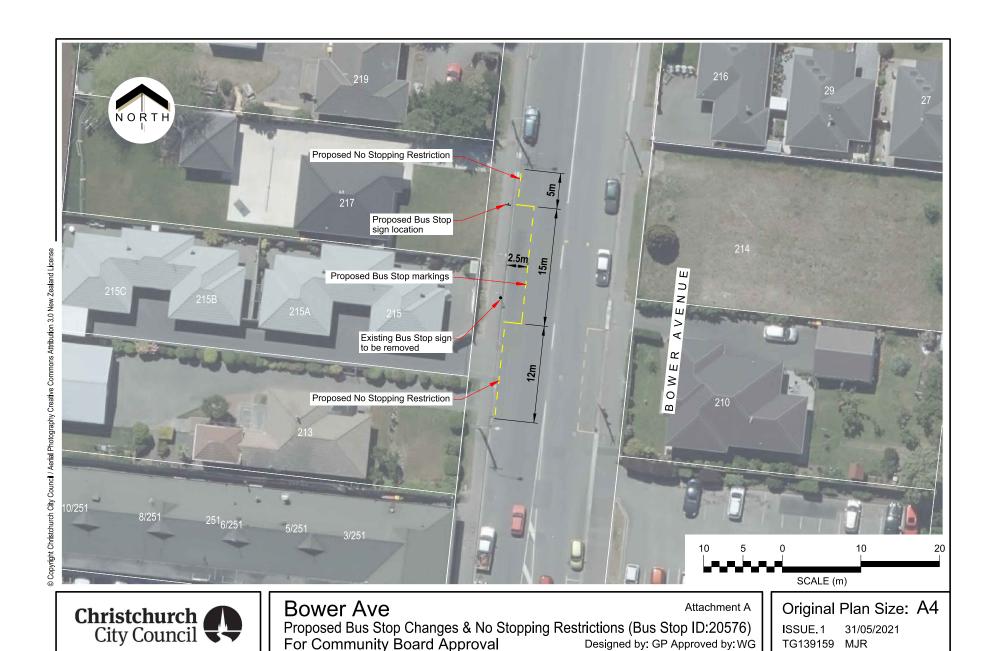

3. Key Points Ngā Take Matua

Strategic Alignment Te Rautaki Tīaroaro

As the name of the fund implies, the projects and organisations recommended for funding in this report align to the Council's commitment to achieving strong communities. In establishing the recommendations we were guided by the Strategic Framework, in particular the Strengthening Communities Strategy and its principles such as capacity building, diversity, participation and partnership.



Decision Making Authority Te Mana Whakatau

- 3.2 Approve the allocation of the local Strengthening Communities Fund for each community Board area.
- 3.3 Allocations must be consistent with any policies, standards or criteria adopted by the Council.

Assessment of Significance and Engagement Te Aromatawai Whakahirahira

- 3.4 The decisions in this report are of low significance in relation to the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.
- 3.5 The level of significance was determined by the number of people affected and/or with an interest.
- 3.6 Due to the assessment of low significance, no further community engagement and consultation is required.

Discussion Korerorero

- 3.7 The 2021-22 Strengthening Communities Fund opened on 8 March 2021 and closed on 12 April 2021.
- 3.8 A total of 68 applications were received, requesting a total of \$682,427.
- 3.9 The Waitai Coastal-Burwood Community Board has a total funding pool of \$440,927.
- 3.10 Staff have recommended a total of \$367,160 for the 2021-22 Strengthening Communities Fund (this includes \$104,000 of pre-committed multi-year funding), which would result in \$73,767 remaining for the 2021-22 Discretionary Response Fund (plus and carry-forward from the 2020-21 year which is currently being finalised).
- 3.11 In the 2020-21 funding round, the Board approved multi-year funding to the following organisations:
 - Aranui Community Trust (ACTIS) \$40,000
 - Youth Alive Trust \$30,000
 - Eastern Community Sport and Recreation Incorporated \$25,000
 - Burwood Day Care Centre for the Elderly Inc \$9,000
- 3.12 Staff are recommending two additional applications this year for multi-year funding:
 - New Brighton Community Gardens Trust
 - Wainoni Avonside Community Services Trust
- 3.13 Staff have assessed all applications received and made recommendations. Attached is a decision matrix, which includes organisational details, project details, financial information, a staff assessment and a priority ranking (refer **Attachment A**).
- 3.14 The Funding Outcomes and Priorities and Criteria for this fund are also attached (refer Attachment B).
- 3.15 A workshop was held with the Community Board on 12 July 2021 which provided an opportunity for Board members to ask questions and seek clarification on any of the projects or staff recommendations.
- 3.16 Community Boards have delegated authority from the Council to make final decisions on the Strengthening Communities Funding for their respective Board area. The Board's decisions will be actioned immediately following the decision meeting. All groups will then be informed of the decisions and funding agreements will be negotiated where relevant. All funding approved is for the period of 1 September to 30 August each year.



- 3.17 Grants will be paid out in September 2021 following the receipt of a signed funding agreement.
- 3.18 All successful applicants are required to complete an accountability form at the end of the funded period. A summary of this information will be provided to the Community Board.

Staff Assessment

This application is recommended as a Priority One due to the reach of their service within a vulnerable community,

Compassion Trust Financial Mentoring Services have been providing budget advice since October 2012. In the last 12 months they have provided financial mentoring services to over 250 clients, and dealt with a total client debt of over \$5,392,576.

Work includes immediate support for crisis situations such as power getting cut off, no accommodation and no food. Advice is given on the immediate crisis and action plans made for going forward. Client debt is addressed and payment plans are worked out with creditors. Education is also offered on how to address their situation, face the consequences of their decisions and work to clear their debt. This is a long commitment for the majority of

Older people access the service. This includes those coming into retirement, who do not have enough money to live on each week. They are at risk of losing their homes due to being unable to afford mortgage repayments due to job loss or being on benefits. There is a high level of stress in this group around debt which can affect health. Advisors work with local medical centres to ensure medical costs do not become a barrier.

People with mental health issues are assisted with debt issues that have occurred due to their vulnerability. Work is also done alongside young people, supporting them to live in a society of instant credit and the pitfalls they need to be aware off.

Assistance is given to meet the diversified needs of the community. 63% of clients were beneficiaries and 30% were working. Over 16% of clients were under 25 and over 36% under 35. 60% of clients sought advice in money management, 23% completed kiwi saver hardship applications and there is also demand around insolvency processes

- They will open their Drop-In Centre every Wednesday night for the community youth.
- They will take the young people they work with from Haeata Community College, Chisnallwood Intermediate, and young people from the Community Drop-In Centre, on camps to Karitane in Otago throughout 2021 and 2022.
- Youth workers mentor the young people in this community, and during the Stay Real programmes, and those who pop in to see them during the week, helping them through difficult times.

How Will Participants Be Better Off?

Participants of the Stay Real programmes will be provided with a safe space to belong, learn to trust, develop valuable life skills and have supportive people around them who will mentor them. Teachers regularly comment that participation in the Stay Real programme for example, has positively changed and impacted the youth from their schools, particularly acknowledging the growth of social skills and behaviour. The programme provides access to a wide range of activities they might not otherwise have access to. The impact of the programme will be continually measured through attendance records, participant self-evaluation forms and feedback from teachers and schools. The success of the Drop-In Centre as an engaging and safe place for youth to spend their time is evaluated through continual maintenance and growth of numbers.

Staff Assessment

This application is recommended as a Priority One due to the impact of the project, the long service provision of the project by the organisation and depth of the project.

Crossroads Youth With a Future Trust are seeking funding towards staff wages and operating costs for the delivery of three Stay Real programmes and their drop-in centre in Aranui. The Stay Real programmes operate in Haeata Community Campus, Chisnallwood Intermediate and they have a new community Stay Real programme for youth not in school.

Crossroads Youth with a Future Trust exists with the purpose of instilling hope in young people and their whānau, to help them develop positive attitudes towards themselves and others in the community. Working heavily with youth who are identified by their teachers as 'at risk' and who are displaying behavioural issues, the Trust run the Stay Real Programme, a 12 step programme which teaches social and life skills. Stay Real uses a similar strategy to AA to initiate change in each participant's life, build resilience and assist them in taking responsibility for their behaviour. Groups meet weekly to discuss relevant issues and participate in a range of activities for the duration of the year. At the conclusion of the year, each group goes on a camp with Crossroads staff. For the youth participating, Stay Real represents an opportunity to participate in activities they may never have had the opportunity to take part in before as well as build relationships with role models who build into their lives.

Every Wednesday night, Crossroads also open up their facilities in Aranui and host a Drop In Centre. The Drop In Centre provides a safe, drug and alcohol free space for young people to come, chat with staff and participate in a range of activities including table tennis and play station. Around 150 young people have been attending the Drop In Centre each month. Crossroads staff also have good relationships with youth throughout the community who they follow up with and mentor throughout the year.

Crossroads Youth with a Future Trust (Crossroads) own the premises they operate from on Hampshire Street in Aranui and have been providing their services to the community since 1998. The Stay Real programme differs from other Aranui youth programmes in that it works in depth with at risk youth or children in small groups providing long term support for them and often the family. Crossroads are one of the few groups to work closely with youth and families in Aranui belonging to or connected with gangs.

The volunteers learn how to live sustainably by learning how to grow from seeds or cutting, and taking produce and seedlings home. Volunteers also learn how to be organic with minimal cost Gardening has been recognized as one of the healthiest form of exercise and as such improves the volunteer's overall health. Connections are made between volunteers from many different backgrounds, which is beneficial for everyone. The group participates in the River of Flowers, Grow Show, hold educational programmes and provide the garden space to different community and craft groups. The magic truly happens when these groups interact.

Staff Assessment

This application is recommended as a Priority One due to its alignment to the Council outcomes and priorities as well as the significant depth, impact on the community and proven track record of the project.

The New Brighton Community Gardens Trust has been operating since 2005, its vision; 'a thriving garden which involves the community in providing a role model for growing organic food in a coastal and sandy environment'. People from greater Brighton, Aranui and Parklands frequent the garden. It is a welcoming and inclusive place for all people of all ages and abilities to interact, learn and work together, promoting healthy lifestyles, encouraging personal growth of individuals and a sense of belonging.

The garden is a community development project where people work together and build a sense of achievement through gardening, waste minimisation and social activities it encourages personal growth for individuals and a sense of belonging. People come to the garden to learn and work together to produce fresh organic produce and increase self-sufficiency by demonstrating gardening in sandy soils, composting and recycling to reduce waste to landfill.

In addition to providing food and a growing space, the skills learnt can help reduce poverty and social isolation. The spin off effects of garden activities include; enhancing community and neighbourhood safety through neighbourhood connections; providing community based programmes for the people in their backyard and a sense of belonging to the community. The garden also participates in community events.

The garden runs a 10 week propagating young gardeners programme which involves up to seven schools. Activities include cooking from the garden, planting and maintaining a garden and garden art. This project is run in collaboration with the Eastern Winter Sports Cluster. Students from Halswell Residential College and Ferndale School also come to the garden each week and pre-schools are frequent visitors. The garden provides community involvement based around sustainable gardening.

Around 3,600 people a year come to the garden, this includes individual visitors, volunteers and groups. They work with over 34 groups and agencies. Regular groups visiting include: referrals from the Department of Corrections, CCS Disability Action, mental health organisations (Depression Support Network), local groups (Te Waka Aroha), retirement homes and schools. There is also a process of cross referral with the garden referring people to the organisations above.

This is a busy community garden and an asset to the community. Volunteer numbers continue to increase and new programmes and ideas are put in to practice. Volunteers from the community garden also do some work in the sensory garden, situated at the back of the community garden. An adjoining gate connects the two gardens so people can enjoy both.

NBP's initiatives are integral to the feeling of community pride in the village and the sharing of celebration with visitors to our area. The community market provides a vital space for connection and celebration for locals. It fosters and supports young people by giving them opportunity to volunteer at the market. The radio station is already connecting new people in their hapori together and they look forward to seeing this grow as they proceed. Their mahi also provides much needed support for families in need through their blanket bank. This all aligns with their mission statement - To support New Brighton's growth as a diverse and inclusive community through celebration and engagement"

Staff Assessment

This application is recommended as a Priority One due to its alignment to the Council outcomes and priorities as well as the significant depth, impact on the community and proven track record of the project.

The New Brighton Project Incorporated has been operating since 1994, providing a range of activities and events that create opportunities for community to be engaged and involved. Their presence in the mall helps them to be visible and accessible to the community. The office is open 10am to 2pm Monday to Friday. It is an information hub where all are welcome to drop in and this helps keep them informed of community needs. They work with other local community groups to enhance the community and create more opportunities for engagement and to keep the community informed of public information bulletins and public consultation forums.

The Seaside Market is held 49 times a year and has 50 to 55 stalls. It attracts large visitor numbers to the mall, which in turn benefits the local business community. The market provides opportunities to showcase local music and entertainment acts and there is a free space available for use by community for fundraising and promotion. Themed market days include the Spring Gala and Talk Like a Pirate Day.

Annual events they organise include Christmas Parade, Open Mic Day and Talent Concert. They collaborate with local groups and individuals to partner with and support community initiatives. These include: I Love New Brighton, Our Bright Town Mural, New Brighton Outdoor Arts Festival, New Brighton Pump Track, Rockabilly Show & Shine and Duke Festival of Surfing.

They have a selection of large games and a bouncy castle which are well used at a range of community events and placed in the mall during school holidays. Welcome Packs containing a range of information are available for new residents

Community information goes out in two formats. A fortnightly e-newsletter and the monthly 'Wave' newsletter which is also available online. For a business there is \$20 charge to advertise and a donation/koha is requested to advertise activities were there is a cost to participate. There is no charge to community groups.

There is a meeting space on site for use by not for profit groups. Staff support has been given to help groups to realise their potential by assisting them with their social media presence and processes. They also offer the use of the guillotine, laminator, photocopier and design skills to groups and local business owners for a small, at cost, fee.

The Blanket Bank distributes donated bedding to people in need, working in collaboration with a range or organisations and agencies. It is also the local referral agent for the Community Energy Action Curtain Bank.

There are two Project Co-ordinators, employed for 28 hours each a week. The New Brighton Project provides a place to celebrate community and connect with local people. The coordinators provide up to date information and support to their hapori.

Due to their local knowledge and community profile they are regularly consulted with by groups or organisations involved in projects, activities or development plans for the New Brighton area. They are also advocates for the New Brighton Business area.

Subsides towards subscriptions will mitigate barriers to participate in sports. Affordable access to amateur sports will include more tamariki with fitness and increased mental and physical wellbeing.

Upskilling coaches and managers means they can provide better quality training sessions and player development, enhancing the enjoyment and increasing the likelihood that players will continue engaging with their sport and life a healthy active lifestyle.

Staff Assessment

This application is recommended as a Priority One due to its alignment to the Council outcomes and priorities as well as the significant depth, impact on the community and proven track record of the project.

Ōtautahi Sports Association (OSA) was established in 1988. It was set up initially to provide recreational opportunities for the influx of young Māori men and women to Christchurch from around the country in the 1950s. Starting off as a rugby club, OSA have since provided for a number of sports year round, including Rugby, Netball, Softball, Hockey, Basketball, Volleyball, Touch Rugby, golden Öldies Rugby, Hunting and Fishina.

OSA is committed to whanau hauora (family health and welling). They aim is to provide a safe and secure environment promoting sports health and recreation to the community of Ōtautahi. In recent years the Association has also seen a rise in the number of Pacific families participating in the sports they provide. Membership is now over 600 and they currently offer netball, rugby, softball, touch, basketball and Toa Waikura (Golden Oldies Rugby) providing sporting activities all year round for their members.

OSA provides Christchurch's lowest subscriptions for amateur sport to a range of ages from tamariki to pakeke (elderly). They continue to support their community on and off the field as a whānau, with whakawhānaungatanga activities and events to include extended whānau and the wider community all year round. These include promoting and facilitating healthy eating sharing fruit and vegetables from members own gardens and supporting their Kaumātua. Working closely with He Waka Tapu and Te Pā Rākaihautū school OSA recognise the importance in using their community reach to empower and connect vulnerable whānau.

OSA is seeking funding to support these whānau hauora services as they continue to grow in both membership and their reach. They wish to continue to offer to pay an affiliation fee discount of \$10 per tamariki in order to make their subscriptions lower. Having found that the fees are often a barrier to participation and would like to mitigate this in order to make sports as accessible as possible to their community.

The Association are also looking to provide a budget to contribute to the upskilling and training for all their coaches and management committee in order to grow the capability within the Club and capacity to develop. The Association have looked into several different relevant courses for the various sports they offer including the Netball New Zealand Community Coach Award Level 1, the Small Blacks and Rugby Smart Courses offered by Canterbury Rugby Union and the Sport Canterbury Grow Your Club workshops which are a series of educational modules focusing a number of different aspects of club development including funding, growing participation, culture and governance.

A support person to create and manage these projects and initiatives is integral to successful outcomes and opportunities for everyone. Ōtautāhi Sports Association wish to continue to employ their Kindred Club and Hauora Coordinator to oversee the running of all six Clubs, support their committees in fundraising and administration. The role also provides a structure for development for the Kindred Clubs to strengthen and create more opportunities that contribute to player performance and development, recognition of sporting excellence and celebration of Kindred Club events, milestones and volunteer contribution.

How Will Participants Be Better Off?

The Palace intent is for early intervention and prevention. To stop negative behaviours before problem patterns become entrenched and continue into adulthood.

It engages, mentors and engages participants to value education and the importance of school. Teaches participants life skills.

It empowers children and young people to use their skills, talents and passion to get into the workforce.

It encourages children and young people to dream big, to explore the city, and think globally.

Staff Assessment

This application is recommended as a Priority One due to close alignments with Council policies and wide reach of the project in the Aranui community.

The Palace provides a safe place for children. This programme works with the parents and works alongside local organisations to help families increase their life skills and family stability.

The programme is run by the South City Youth Trust. The Trust employs two part time youth workers who run four programmes for children aged between five to thirteen years old. Two programmes are run for a five week block and then rotated with the other two programmes for the next five weeks. Programmes are based on age and gender e.g. five to seven year old girls meet on a Friday from 3.30pm-6pm for five weeks and then the boys aged five to seven years will meet on a Friday from 3.30pm-6pm for the next five weeks. The youth workers are paid for the programme hours and work extra voluntary hours.

The programmes teach life skills such as baking, shopping, gardening, sewing, scrap booking, music, sport activities and encourage social skills and friendships with special events, camps and school holiday programs. The children are involved in "making" a meal which they share together as part of the programme. Children are encouraged to think and dream big to see beyond what they know, to see the benefit of continuing education and empower them to use their skills, talents and passion to get on in the world.

The youth workers interact with thirty to forty young people each week in the programme. They also have some one on one contact in the community maintaining the relationships with the children and their families outside of the programmes. This is the only programme of this type and for this age group operating in the Aranui area. Due to the structure of the programme, which is based on community identified need, it is not eligible to receive funding as an out of school care provider.

The trust believes by having involvement with the children at such a young age they can support the positive development of the children and their contribution to their community and their own lives as they mature.

How Will Participants Be Better Off?

By providing the services and facilities that people need within their community, (in many cases what they had prior to the earthquakes), they need to travel less to access them. This increases sustainability and helps save them money. The same applies for services that were not previously there, e.g. children's weekend film mornings.

The Hub is also planning to be a portal through which other services can be accessed.

Overall the larger reason that the communities will be better off is that by simply using the Hub, more people can connect through activities and events. As there are also informal meeting spaces (e.g. the Koha Kitchen/cafe), the bonds within the community itself will grow, increasing overall better wellbeing, resilience and sense of community.

Staff Assessment

This application is recommended as a Priority One due to its alignment to the Council outcomes and priorities as well as the significant depth, impact on the community and proven track record of the project.

In July 2016 a group of local people formed the trust to purchase, repair, strengthen and refit the building to develop a hub that promotes a diverse, connected, creative and strong local community. It was envisioned as a 7-day accessible community centre, ultimately with café, wellbeing centre and a range of activities being run in and from it, as well as being a gateway to other services and opportunities.

Five years on through the generosity of funding grants and local fundraising initiatives more than \$1.5million has been raised towards the cost of the project. The group received funding from the shovel ready projects fund for the build costs, this funding was not able to be used for operational expenditure. In the last three years many thousands of volunteer hours have been put in by the Trust Board to meet the myriad requirements associated with a building project. There have also been many community volunteer sessions, working bees and community events. During the building of the hub many local people have given their time, skills and knowledge to the project. Strengthening the community and making new friends and connections in the process.

The expectation is that the building will be completely rebuilt and refitted by September 2021. The next phase of the project is creating a community hub. Through consultation the community have indicated they want a diverse range of activities including, yoga, Pilates, chess, singing, martial arts, film shows, after school homework club, information sessions, concerts, counselling and children's activities. Additionally there will be a 'drop-in' element of people meeting in the koha kitchen or attending the wellness centre.

The hub will provide a gathering place for South Brighton and Southshore residents. It will help to reduce social isolation and provide an outward looking community based area for groups and individuals. In this community cocreated space, people can meet, improve their well-being and organise and participate in activities and they as a community own the space.

This application is for funding towards wages for a facility manager. Having a manager in place for when the building is complete is vitally important, it is this role that has responsibility for managing and activating the hub.

Access to free or low cost activities has enhanced social cohesiveness and connectivity in the community. Many people are still struggling with either earthquake related issues or more recently with the flow on effects of Covid-19. The provision of the services that WACST provides gives access and support to those who need it.

Staff Assessment

This application is recommended as a Priority One due to its alignment to the Council outcomes and priorities as well as the significant depth of the project, impact it has on the community, best-practice model and proven track record with the Council. Staff have recommended multi-year funding for this project which will provide certainty to

The Wainoni Avonside Community Services Trust (WACST) was established in 2001 with the support of the then Burwood Pegasus Community Board. It was a collaboration between the Wainoni Methodist Church and a group of residents keen to work on developing a community services programme for older people.

Over the next 12 months, WACST will continue to provide a wide range of activities and programmes that will increase the physical and mental wellbeing, participation, fun and social connectedness of older people for either a gold coin donation or free. Weekly activities and programmes include: Sit and Be Fit exercise classes, Tai Chi classes, crafts, board games, film afternoons, guest speakers, cooking demonstrations, a walking group, healthy living lectures, art class, line dancing, indoor bowls, low impact gym and Zumba fitness. Weekly attendances for classes have been around 220 people per week over the past year, a slight increase from previous years, highlighting the continued importance and value WACST has to the older people in the community. Classes and activities operate throughout the year with a four week recess for Christmas and New Year.

In addition to the weekly activities, a range of information sessions and courses are run in conjunction with Age Concern that provide an opportunity for older people in the community to access the information and advice they need. These courses help increase community engagement, participation and awareness. WACST will again this year hold a number of Healthy Living lectures by relevant specialists in their field. Examples of lectures held over the past 12 months include law, urology, continence, re-cycling, retirement living options, hearing, elder abuse, diabetes and arthritis education, sleeping issues and the Police talking about personal home & safety. Over the next 12 months, WACST will run a similar number of lectures.

Special occasions and events are also celebrated by the group such as silver anniversary's, birthdays, pamper days and speakers on current issues are also arranged. The premises are often used for public meetings and delivering information to the community such as meet the candidate sessions and for community fun days. Many participants are vulnerable or socially isolated and in times of difficulty or celebration have found comfort and support in the friends, Coordinator and programmes provided by Wainoni Avonside Community Services Trust.

Staff Assessment

This application is recommended as a Priority One due to its innovation, best practice model and its commitment to fostering a collaborative approach to achieving positive outcomes and responding to community need.

Youth Alive Trust have provided services in the greater Brighton community for 30 years. They have up to 500 participants per week engaging with the variety of services and programmes provided by a total of 17 staff (11.6 FT equivalent) plus seven contractors providing music tuition, counselling and 50 volunteers to run seven clubs for approximately 200 young people every week, support Rāwhiti Primary School with two youthworkers 20 hours per week and one youthworker at Shirley Boys High School (10 hours). They also run 13 separate holiday programmes throughout the year, take 130 young people to camps and provide a counsellor at Rāwhiti and New Brighton Catholic Schools one day per week.

The manager's role which they are seeking funding for is to manage staff, casual workers and interns, organising and managing programmes and events, training, publicity and marketing, working with other community organisations on wider projects, sourcing funding, reporting to the Board of Trustees, and working with young people directly in a variety of programmes. They are a community leader, and sit on local panels and advisory groups. The current manager has been working with Youth Alive Trust since 2004, and has seen it grow and develop substantially, through some very challenging years. The managers' role supports positive youthwork and community development.

Rata Foundation has supported the Managers salary for a number of years. The organisation has confirmed three year funding of \$55k from Rata from 2021-23. For the past few years there has been a funding shortfall for this role which has previously been made up from general donations, one-off grants or discretionary income. Those funding sources that had previously covered the shortfall are now being used to fund other projects in the organisation.

Youth Alive Trust work in a collaborative model and are part of networks including CYWC, 24-7, OSCAR, and Eastside Youthworkers. They also partner with other groups for events such as I Love Brighton, Easter Camp, EPIC Events and The Duke Festival of Surfing. They take the young people to local activities such as Blow Karting, Circus School, Community Garden, etc. They have infrastructure, procedures and volunteer support that enable them to respond quickly and positively to situations and new opportunities.

Youth Alive Trust practise model is the 'Five Ways to Wellbeing' in all their programmes. If all local young people were regularly practising these ways to wellbeing, this would have an impact on their mental, physical, emotional and spiritual health. This would have a flow on effect to reduce crime, increasing community participation, reduce the need for mental and physical health provision. These 5 ways fit into YAT programmes through... 1. Connect, me whakawhānaunga. Connecting young people with adult role models/youth workers/mentors. Creating a place of belonging. Connecting to people different to you, and creating new friendships. Connecting to a larger organisation with other support networks and connections to specialist agencies. 2. Give, tukua. Volunteers and mentors giving of their time through the youth programmes and community events. Young people serving on community service projects. 3. Take notice, me aro tonu. Self-reflecting during mentoring, small groups, counselling and Mana Ake sessions. Goal setting and celebrations once they've been achieved. Inspirational and spiritual talks that stimulate thoughts of who they are in their community and the wider world. Teaching and modelling of values. 4. Keep learning, me ako tonu. Opportunities for new experiences which may lead to lifelong passions, such as music lessons, sports training, crafts, cooking, camps and outdoor experiences. Building the community by training volunteers in leadership skills. 5. Be active, me kori tonu. Encouraging physical activities on youth programmes, such as sports, games, ice skating, table tennis, basketball, and Frisbee.

Staff Assessment

A-Town Boxing Gym is a safe and positive environment for young people to utilise in many different contexts. Whether it be regular gym use, personal development, stress relief or training for professional competitions. The goal setting and discipline learnt in the gym environment and through the Champion 4 Life programme helps tamariki in all areas of their life.

The Head Coach profiles each member as they are trained and informs them of expectations around progressing through to each level. The Head Coach keeps open communication with participants and parents/caregivers to ensure the participants are keeping on-track in other areas of their life.

The gym runs programmes with sessions on a Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday for two hours on each weekday and three hours on the Saturday. The Head Coach is contributing 20 voluntary hours each week.

A Town Boxing Gym has developed a programme called A Champion 4 Life which they have run at Haeata Campus since Term One 2017 during school hours. In July 2017 they trialled a Champion 4 Life Holiday programme with very positive results. In the last year they have been running the programme before school starting with a 20 minute run.

This application is to deliver the Champion 4 Life programme during the school term for tamariki at Haeata Campus and Chisnallwood Intermediate at their school sites. The local neighbourhood Police team continue to provide support to the Champion 4 Life programme including attending the graduation ceremony and have stated the value and success in the programme.

The Head Coach has been working in Aranui since 1999 and has a very unique way of working with young people and successful reputation. He also has the support of an additional boxing coach whilst at the schools as well as

How Will Participants Be Better Off?

The 30 or more volunteers find satisfaction and fulfilment by contributing their time. Some participants enhance their physical well-being (exercise groups, foot clinics, healthier eating from vege co-op and community lunch). All participants, especially those who live on their own, enhance their well-being through social interaction, informally over tea or coffee, or as part of a group, such as Friday afternoon music. For those with few links to family or neighbours, Te Waka Aroha offers welcome and acceptance, a place they feel at home. This is especially important for those on the margins by reason of isolation, unemployment, mental illness, addiction or homelessness.

CAMEO participants (mainly in their 80s, some in their 90s) enhance their physical, mental and social well-being from physical exercises appropriate to their age, from activities that provide mental stimulus, and from their enjoyment of being together. For some CAMEO is almost the only time in the week when they leave their home.

Staff Assessment

Te Waka Aroha began in 2011 as an earthquake recovery project. It has continued due to the need for a place where people from a variety of backgrounds can connect, interact and participate in a range of activities. The community lounge is open Monday to Friday from 10am to 4pm, 48 weeks a year. It is a place where those that attend feel welcome, comfortable and accepted.

There are two paid community workers who organise activities and coordinate volunteers at the lounge. Many of the people who come to the lounge are isolated, without family or friendship groups. Services are provided to meet their needs. Support is available to remove barriers and help people access what they need and where appropriate, referrals are made for specific services.

Weekly activities include a music group, exercise class, craft club, vegetable co-operative and a free community lunch. Every three weeks there is a foot clinic, which is always fully booked. The lounge is a place to socialise, join in activities, learn a new skill, eat a healthy meal, chat over a coffee and find an outlet for volunteers with a willingness to serve the community. Free computer and internet use is available.

CAMEO is a weekly elder care programme based at St Luke's, Church South Brighton. Around 12 people attend the weekly three hour session. The programme includes gentle physical exercises to music, activities to stimulate the mind, such as quizzes and topical discussions, board games and a nutritious afternoon tea. The majority of participants are in their eighties and some in their nineties. Most require transport to get to the session and some need special help to participate in activities.

They will be given opportunity to serve in programmes, initiate ideas and projects, as well as express creative ideas in arts, craft and media.

Programme participants will find a place of belonging.

Facility users will have stability in terms of long term access, affordable access and support in their operations. Thus supporting community development and helping community sector sustainability.

Staff Assessment

The Burwood Community Church Trust Inc (BCCT) provides youth groups, youth programmes, a community drop in and other programmes from their facility in Burwood.

There are very few community facilities in Burwood and the BCCT use theirs as a youth and community centre providing their services and programmes. They collaborate with other organisations and churches and are proactive in developing greater connectedness and partnerships in the east and throughout the city. Their facility is continuing to undergo changes to meet the needs of the communities they work with and they have developed a Legacy Community facility.

The BCCT Powerhouse Youth Ministries (PYM) aims to meet the needs of intermediate youth, high school aged youth, and young adults, supporting and developing them towards their individual and collective potential. They do this through youth programmes/groups, events, camps, a youth centre and a significant focus on youth mentoring and leadership development. They have also added their Legacy creative programme which is an arts and media

Powerhouse Youth Ministries (PYM) has a director who works two days a week and a lead youth worker working a further two days per week. All other roles are provided by volunteers. PYM programmes provide a safe alternative venue to school and home for youth to meet and are open to all in the community.

The 24/7 component runs in Mairehau High School and Avonside Girls High School, and of more recent times a youth worker is available at Chisnalwood Intermediate. Currently there is one youth worker in each school. Parents and relatives also contact PYM looking for a safe, fun, inexpensive place for their young people to socialise and develop in. PYM continue to find families are experiencing financial pressure and needing social activities for young people with social disorders. There are a growing number of young people presenting with social issues, anxiety and depression issues and challenging home circumstances.

BCCT are also looking for funding towards managing the Legacy Community Centre for community and youth programmes.

The BCCT also operates the Burwood Community Support project which provides social programmes, a community space and one on one support for people. This has a well-being focus and their LiVE - Community Centre (drop in) provides a range of activities for members of the community. These projects are currently funded elsewhere and a contribution towards them is not sought in this application.

Coastal Spirit is a football club based in the eastern suburbs of Christchurch, catering for male and female players from age 4 to 65 in beginners, social and elite players. The Club is based at fields on Cuthberts Green and Linfield with office space at Linfield Sports on Kearneys Road.

The Club has players of all ages playing in teams on Saturday's and Sunday's in Men's, Women's and Junior competitions.

They have player pathways firmly established by a full-time Football Development Manager, for performance or participation athletes, the club has an enviable record of turning out representative players.

The goal post replacement is due to regular vandalism, these get damaged or stolen. The goals are removed from the pitches at the end of training/games and locked together at the end of each field at Linfield Park and Cuthberts Green however they are accessible to the public. The goalposts are used by age groups from 8 years to seniors. The Club require 12 goal posts to provide for all the teams.

Coastal Spirit employ two full-time staff; a Football Development Officer who oversees and manages all football development in the Club and an operations Manager who oversees all administration, fundraising, tournament and volunteer management.

The Club have 14 Senior teams and over 45 Junior teams.

The Club has 26 volunteer referees, 16 ground and facility volunteers, 32 volunteer coaches, 18 volunteers on the game committee and a further 8 volunteers on the executive committee. The Club offers services to both their registered players and members in the community through their mini sessions and junior non-competitive teams, winter sport programme, after school hubs, and skill centres. They also provide a social summer football 5-a-side programme, participants do not have to join the Club to play in this programme.

How Will Participants Be Better Off?

Participants include Trustees, volunteers, crafters who learn skills and sell items, residents who attend Street BBQs, kids at hunts and Children's Day, residents who drop into the shop for a cuppa and chat, customers of the shop and local sales days.

All of these participants will benefit in many ways from DCCT activities. From an increased sense of community, the ability to take part in activities and make a positive difference, the ability to stay connected to upcoming local events and news, being able to supplement incomes, being able to get outdoors and experience the change from Residential Red Zone to Community Green Zone. Ultimately this is all about community connection and well-being.

Staff Assessment

The Dallington Community Cottage Trust was established around 20 years ago. For the past twelve years they have operated a community craft centre based in one of the shops at the Dallington Shopping Centre on McBratneys Road roundabout.

In the last few years the Dallington Community Cottage Trust have expanded the activities they have undertaken with and in the community. The organisation and the craft shop / drop in centre is fully run by community volunteers

The centre offers a base for local residents to work together in ways that foster their sense of community pride, identity, and unity. It provides social engagement to the post-earthquake affected community by running a number of community events including Community BBQ's for isolated groups (e.g. residents of Sutton Place).

The craft shop operates as a Drop-in Centre for over 265 days of the year for people to meet and chat over a cuppa, or learn new skills (like mosaics). Using the commission on craft sales for community events like Street BBQ's (seven carried out in the last 12 months) and children's events like the Dallington Easter Hunt (looking for stuffed toys hidden in bushes & getting Easter Eggs as a reward) and Christmas Hunt (200 Christmas decorations hidden in the bushes to find - each with a prize number) has been an easy way for community members to connect and get to know one another.

Craft classes are also run in the shop. A free book and jigsaw puzzle exchange is well utilized and there are also quarterly 'Garage Sales' at the shop that attract the local community. The Community Centre is open five days a week for five hours a day with around 40 volunteers helping to staff the centre.

Alongside the day to day operating of the Cottage is the work this group do to support other community initiatives. These include supporting Children's Day, promoting community resilience by holding a wellness event and providing a quarterly newsletter to local streets.

Rent is the main cost of the project as the running expenses for the organisation are paid for by commissions on sales of craft items in the Centre.

Staff Assessment

The Community Link Coordinator is the glue that brings together over 20 organisations to provide wellbeing support for the New Brighton community. The Coordinator doesn't run the programmes, nor do they specialise in offering individual support to community members, but they gather, they support, they promote, they help resource, they bring together, they introduce, they welcome, they inform, they protect and they celebrate.

Each week Grace Vineyard hosts TKA, the alternative education school in the sports gym. This group doesn't have any space for physical activity, and the cost of hiring council or private sports courts would be unaffordable, especially in the winter months. Grace Vineyard knows that physical activity is exactly what teenager's need at that point in the day, and learning the art of participation, winning and losing in a controlled environment with your tutors and peers is teaching social skills that will be used throughout life.

This community continues to be affected by poor mental health and the effects of last year's suicides are still being felt. They can react quickly, and connect with MHERC who are available to run two workshops for free for the community, from one of NZ's best presenters, on the topic of suicide prevention. If this type of workshops helps save one life, they feel their work is worth it.

 subscriptions to cover these essential purchases would negatively impact participation as families in the area still
 struggle and they do not want participation to drop.
- Supporting the Volunteer Coaches: All teams will have coaches who perform their roles in a voluntary capacity. They
 will ensure that their coaches are supported in their roles so they and the players enjoy their involvement and want to
 continue. Retention of coaches and developing a love of cricket in junior players is essential for the ongoing
 sustainability of the club and the local cricket scene to which they belong.
- Developing Cricket in Christchurch: They will foster the game of cricket within Christchurch and contribute to the future success of the local, regional and national cricket scene, enhancing the health and well-being of the community. The growth of cricket starts with encouraging children into the game and by supporting them at this grassroots level. They promote Canterbury Cricket and Yeah Girls programmes which encourage participation by girls 10-16 years, Canterbury Cricket and ECSR run holiday programmes for boys and girls and social six aside competitions.

How Will Participants Be Better Off?

Participation in some form of sport from an early age provides positive benefits to many aspects of life and opportunities to gain valuable life skills. Encouraging children into sport and retaining them in sport engages youth in meaningful activity that provides them with positive role models and a productive way to spend their time, boosts confidence and self-esteem, and provides lessons in goal setting, commitment, teamwork and cooperation.

This involvement in organised sport promotes healthy lifestyles through physical activity with the aim that they will continue playing sport as teenagers and into adulthood and that a lifelong interest in sport for recreation and competition will develop. They see this happening in their club where older children continue to play cricket when they transition to high school. Their adult players often continue to play well into their twilight years. They hope to see their former youth players return as adults and continuing playing for enjoyment and health.

Staff Assessment

New Brighton Cricket Club Incorporated (NBCC) provides opportunities for juniors (5-12 year old students) and adult members of the community to play cricket competitively and socially. The Club juniors play as part of the Christchurch Junior Cricket Association competitions on a Saturday morning which include Kiwi cricket, Super 8 and 2020. For the 2020-21 season the Club had 54 juniors and 35 senior players. The breakdown of junior players was: Phoenix 7 players (Age 5-6), Waves 8 players (Age 7-8), Giants 9 players (Age 7-9), Wizards 10 players (Age 10-11), Thunder 10 players (Age 9-11) and Dragons 10 players (Age 11-12).

The age brackets at NBCC are increasing because juniors progressing through the grades and choose to continue their cricket at NBCC instead of playing for school. NBCC are expecting similar if not more junior players for the 2021-22 season.

Club Subscription costs; junior player members \$60, adults (student) \$150 and adults \$250.

The Club purchase equipment for players to remove cost as a barrier to participation. NBCC do not want to increase member subscriptions to cover these essential purchases as they believe this would negatively impact participation as families in the area may struggle to cover any increase in costs. Instead The Club aim to secure grant funding for these essential equipment needs.

Securing funding to purchase balls, bats, helmets and first aid kits will ensure junior players and coaches are well equipped for the forthcoming playing season.

All teams have coaches who perform their roles in a voluntary capacity. The Club ensure that all coaches are supported in their roles so they and the players enjoy their involvement and want to continue. Retention of coaches and developing a love of cricket in the junior players is essential for the on-going sustainability of NBCC.

The Festival builds on the amazing camaraderie that already exists between surfers from all over the Te Waipounamu.

Staff Assessment

The Pier and Foreshore Society was established in 1963. They have a history of supporting the development of key projects in New Brighton.

One of these projects is The Duke Festival of Surfing which began in March 2016 with naming sponsorship from Ray White Real Estate. The 2022 festival will be held two weeks later than usual at the end of March 2022 due to the Surf Life Saving Championship occurring at New Brighton. The purpose of the festival is to celebrate the Duke, and promote surfing and the beach lifestyle enjoyed by New Brighton residents.

Events in the eight day festival include an opening event, free surf lessons for four local schools, an art exhibition, a three day surfing competition, a family friendly outdoor movie, opening and closing ceremony including a prize giving.

The wide variety of events, many of which are free, are designed to ensure community participation. Ensuring all parts of the festival are held in New Brighton promotes awareness of the suburb.

The organisers hire some specialist groups to assist with some activities i.e. judging the surf competition however the majority of the work is done by volunteers.

The aspects of the Festival which they are seeking financial support for is:

1) SURFING LESSONS - the free surfing lessons are offered to New Brighton Catholic, South New Brighton, Rāwhiti Schools and St James in Aranui. This is a collaborative effort with two Christchurch surf schools are offering surf lesson at a reduced rate for a total of 100 children aged 10-12 years, to experience surfing. The schools will select children who may not have the means or opportunities to access this experience normally. There is no charge to the children participating in this programme.

The reason for this event is to provide this opportunity for local children to build their love for the natural environment and the opportunities it offers them.

2) SURF MOVIE NIGHT - This is a free outdoor movie event held in the New Brighton amphitheatre accessible for all the community to attend. The first movie will be a 'family movie' and then after a short intermission there will be a classic surf movie. This is about creating fun and family friendly events in public spaces. This will also create an opportunity to promote the surfing competition aspect of the festival.

3) Skate Competition - this was a new event established for the 2021 Festival.

It was extremely popular and the organisers want to grow this for 2022 through a partnership with Cheapskates Skate Skool to organise this event. The event will be held on the basketball court at New Brighton. The event management fee includes provision of a halfpipe, planning, promotion, delivery, prizes, event co-ordination, judge's fees and sound system hire. There is no charge for skates to compete in the event.

A key aspect of the Festival which is the SURFING COMPETITION, which is a NZ and South Island sanctioned competition to entice all domestic surfers to attend. It has been carefully scheduled to ensure the best surf conditions. It also ties in well with other events on the surfing calendar, including the South Island Championships. The aim is to have entries from all over NZ, the competition has grown to become one of the largest surfing competition in New Zealand. Putting New Brighton on the surfing map will be a massive coup for the community.

Meeting the people who serve the surfing community with experience, coaching, mentoring, equipment and advice for those keen to try surfing or who are new to surfing

The focus of the Duke event on Malibu and youth riders ensures the event can 'keep it local' with the types of surf conditions required. There is a focus to work with local businesses including food vendors, and accommodation providers to ensure a good economic return for local businesses. The competition entry fees range from \$30 to \$60 per person. The Festival organisers have a management agreement for this aspect of the event to meet the requirements set for sanctioned competitions.

A new aspect of the 2021 Festival was a beach clean-up working together with the team from Sustainable Coastline over 30 bags of rubbish were collected including plastics which were then recycled into trophies. This is likely to occur again in 2022.

The festival is promoted through Facebook, local newspaper, radio and various websites. The group also had a float in the New Brighton Christmas parade.

Co-ordination of the Festival is done by 8 volunteers. Paid staff include the surf competition judges, skate competition coordinator and movie night contractors.

For the 2022 festival the organisers have prioritised which events would be held if funding targets are not achieved. They have stated that the first priority is the surf lessons, second; skate competition and third; the outdoor movie night.

PEEEP Trust provides a platform that delivers on-the-job training, support, encouragement, and camaraderie in a non-judgmental team learning environment. The programmes are offered to those who have been long term unemployed. Many of the participants suffer from mental health and other social isolation problems. PEEEP believes that every person can do something and encourages volunteers to try varying activities. Positive outcomes demonstrate that the programmes are successful and make a difference to people's lives.

During the programme workers are familiarised with a variety of work-places (within the confines of the contracts) and the tools or equipment that are required to complete the jobs assigned to them . Following demonstrations of safe-use (and all health and safety training requirements) workers get a hands-on experience with equipment.

Part of the on-the-job training is to demonstrate the challenges that can occur and how to work around them.

Staff Assessment

The purpose of the People Empowerment and Environmental Enhancement Programme (PEEEP) is to upskill, support and encourage the volunteers participating in the programme by involving them in community, horticultural and other environmental projects. To create a sense of individual self-sufficiency through education, training understanding and acceptance.

The core work of PEEEP is repairs and maintenance, through contracted work. Two contracts have been held for number of years. A graffiti removal contract which they have had with Council for 15 years and a beach ladder maintenance and dune stabilisation contract with Coast Care which they have had for 16 years. They also have contract with Enable and Spencerville Park. Some work is also done for individuals, families and community groups in need.

The volunteers who come to PEEEP are all marginalised due to mental and or physical health issues, isolation and lack of social skills or unemployment. The programme provides a structure and environment similar to a work situation, where they are taught basic life skills and responsibilities. Participants are referred to PEEEP from agencies they connect with including various supported employment agencies, Ministry of Social Development and Department of Corrections. The number of participants varies depending on referrals received from agencies. Currently there are seven volunteers.

Staff Assessment

Pregnancy Infancy Parenting Support (PIPS) are currently based at Te Kura Tawhito where they operate a drop in service four days a week. Their trained staff and volunteers are available to assist people with their individual needs. Clients engage with the service for a variety of reasons, needing baby clothes, needing friends or connections postpartum, for information and more. Each contact is an opportunity to check how things are going at home, identify any challenges they may be facing and find out which groups they are engaged with.

Many clients are new to Christchurch either from moving to be near family in pregnancy or from a migrant background. The majority of clients are from east Christchurch and the focus is on connecting them to locally based services and activities, such as the community garden, parks, Taiora: QEII and the library. PIPS provide assistance with practical items and an opportunity to inform, encourage, and support each person to grow the skills and connections needed to thrive during pregnancy and early parenting in their local community.

The experience of the group has been that many parents connect with them during the postpartum period as there is insufficient capacity in Postpartum Mental Health support for all but the highest needs. The group also states that they serve as a lifeline to many families on the margin to build a sense of community and belonging in the

Bumps & Bubs is a parenting support group, facilitated by the coordinator. It is designed to bring people together, encourage positive parenting, break isolation and promote positive well-being while getting to know other parents. It is held on alternate Tuesdays during term time 10.30am to 12pm.

The requested funding is for operational costs for projects, coordinator wages and volunteer recognition. In the last twelve months over a third of total service delivery hours have been undertaken by volunteers. This funding will help the group to continue to offer a safe space for community members to discuss complex emotional needs resulting from unplanned pregnancy, birth trauma, family harm, and other stress factors resulting from low socioeconomic factors. In doing this, PIPS supports the well-being of the community in one of the most vulnerable

This type of thoughtfulness and leadership is very much at the heart of why the 24/7 youth workers do what they do.

Staff Assessment

The Queenspark Community Trust was established in 1994 with the main purpose to create connected lives that thrive. They achieve this goal by offering a wide variety of programmes and services to cater to the diverse range of needs found in the local community.

The 24-7 Youth Work kaupapa is 'Being Local; Staying Committed'. This means working with all young people in their local community and building their local leadership. Being committed is about 24-7 youth workers building strong relationships and investing long term in young people and their community.

The 24-7 Youth Work model works in partnership with the schools to be available to pupils during non-curricular times on school grounds, and also stimulates school team and out of school sport and recreation participation. It is based on five outcomes that have been researched and refined: supporting students, building relationships, developing leadership, cultivating school spirit and integrating into out of school activities.

The Queenspark Community Trust believe their youth workers are positive role models, and the boys who are mentored by their youth workers will be more resilient individuals who are prepared to tackle life head on and show active leadership roles in the community.

The Trust has a high capacity to deliver the programmes and services and has demonstrated through many years an understanding of the needs of the community it serves.

Staff Assessment

The Spencer Park Surf Lifesaving Club Incorporated (Club) opened its new facility in January 2018. They have maintained the growth in membership which they experienced when the Club first re-opened and believe this success has been due to the Club Development programme. This programme focuses on managing the membership growth to ensure the new and existing members get the training and development they require. This project is taking a community recreation approach targeting grass roots participation, increasing the capacity of the Club to deliver quality recreation experiences for the members and the public.

The Club Development Co-ordinator works with all members of the Club to provide at least five training sessions per week through summer (October to April) with a planned programme split between beach/pool and

The key focus is to increase the number and skill of new members and up-skill existing lifeguards to become patrol captains, Inflatable Rescue Boat crew and Inflatable Rescue Boat drivers. This will include individualised programmes to meet developmental needs of club members, particularly those who are seeking to attain higher lifeguard qualifications. Sessions will include both the physical and theory aspects of lifeguard training.

The Club has found it increasingly difficult to get experienced lifeguard volunteers who have the required knowledge and skills to run their development programmes. The Lifeguard Development and Training Coordinator will ensure lifeguards are trained to carry out effective rescues and have an on-going programme of development. The Co-ordinator will also enable the Club's more competent lifeguards to compete on an equal platform at local, regional and national competitions. These competitions are centred on the quick response and rescue of patients, and allow the lifeguards to transfer skills learned during competition to live rescues. This application is considered by staff to present low risks for delivery and financial management.

The New Brighton Stitch-O-Mat operated by Stitch-O-Mat Charitable Trust is a community sewing facility which aims to provide the community with the opportunity to access sewing skills and resources, reduce social isolation, allow individuals to contribute to their community and promote sustainability.

How Will Participants Be Better Off?

Participants are better off on a number of levels. They acquire new skills, gain knowledge, make connections, and are given a platform to contribute on a community level which inspires a greater sense of belonging. The space provides an opportunity for greater social connection and for new friendships to bloom. Users benefit financially through cost saving in the ability to extend the life of their clothing via mending sessions and tutorials.

Participants in the project are better off via access to resources and support to develop skills in the area of sewing and textile arts. They are able to access this at little to no cost.

Participants also experience a sense of connection, whether this is simply through the day to day interactions they have at the facility or via contributing to community sewing projects, such as our 'Community Quilt' which now hangs in the New Brighton Library. This helps to reduce social isolation.

Participants are able to reduce their personal environmental impact and save money via repairing clothes or creating reusable items such as beeswax wraps, produce bags or sandwich bags.

Participants are able to create small business opportunities for themselves. The organisation find this is particularly true for young people who produce items to sell as fundraisers.

Participants have a sense of belonging to their hapori, they identify the facility as their place.

Staff Assessment

Stitch-O-Mat evolved out of an initiative to reduce plastic bag use during a 'Plastic Free July' event in 2017 it became a Charitable Trust in September 2018. It is an inclusive, affordable space that attracts a diverse range of people. They can participate in sustainability focused workshops, sew for community groups and organisations or develop individual projects and skills.

New Brighton Stitch-o-mat has been operating for the past 3 1/2 years based at Te Kura Tawhito site, they have recently relocated to the New Brighton Bin Inn shop.

The group received \$30,000 funding from the Council's Sustainability Fund towards wages in 2019. However are not able to apply for this funding again.

There are weekly sewing classes and drop in sessions. As people gain confidence they share the skills and knowledge acquired with others. Equipment and support is available to help people complete projects which they may not have the resources to do on their own. It is easily accessible in terms of parking and being on a bus route.

There is also opportunity for people to come together and work collaboratively on projects that contribute to the wider community. Such as 'Colour My World', a project working to create art packs for refugee children and 'Seeds of Love'. Following the mosque attacks on March 15, people came to sew hearts and quilts for those affected. They work with a range of groups which include but are not limited to St Faiths Vegetable Cooperative, Christchurch Hospital Children's Ward, Lion Breweries, Kilmarnock Enterprises, Birth Right, South New Brighton School, New Brighton Catholic School, New Brighton Community Pre-School, Rekindle, Grace Vineyard Church, New Brighton Project and Sustain South Brighton.

Drop in sessions are four hours long and regularly attended by at least ten people. Other activities include waste reduction education

The 2019/20 SCF accountability report from the group provided the following outcomes:

They worked with 1564 individuals directly (these are people who attended drop in sessions at Stitch-O-Mat). They additionally worked with a diverse range of community groups, education providers and organisations, including but not limited to New Brighton Play centre, South New Brighton School, New Brighton Project, Sustain South Brighton, Renew New Brighton, New Brighton Library, Sustainable Coastlines, New Brighton Community Pantry, Sustainable Ōtautahi, Christchurch City Council, Ōtautahi Weavers, Birthright and artist Ron Te Kawa.

During COVID Lockdown they produced a number of online tutorials and created a YouTube Channel as well as leasing their machines out to regular facility users so they did not sit unused for the duration of Lockdown. They also created a range of sewing packs which were distributed to families with children. They made 365 Reusable bags of various designs and descriptions as part of their 365 Bags Project, these went to Birthright as part of a Christmas pack for their users, New Brighton Project for Welcome Packs, Home and Family as a fundraiser and The National Weavers Hui for their Goodie bags. They diverted 734kg of textile waste from landfill which is the equivalent of 5% of Ōtautahi's annual textile waste. They held an additional 32 events outside of their regular opening hours.

Staff Assessment

Sustain South Brighton began in July 2015 as Te Waka Aroha South Brighton, operating under the umbrella of East Christchurch Anglican Parish. In September 2018 it became an independent trust. The South Brighton community has been without local gathering places since the 2011 earthquakes and the group has become a point of connection and resilience for the community. Meeting an identified need for people in the community to connect, learn, and celebrate the knowledge within the community.

Sustain South Brighton aims to provide the residents of South Brighton with information pertinent to them, to encourage community engagement via social events, workshops, learning exchanges and information sessions and to promote and support the progress of the suburb of South Brighton. They collaborate with the school, preschools, sports clubs and other community groups to develop a sense of connectedness within the community. The range of activities are designed to engage the community as a whole. They are also committed to providing emergency awareness and preparedness in South Brighton.

This funding application is for the community activator wage costs.

In the previous 12 months there have been 60 events. These include Food Truck Fridays, Crop Swaps, Working Bees, Beach Clean Ups and Art and Craft Workshops. They also maintain a focus on emergency awareness and

Common Ground has been a collaborative response of community organisations and mobile food operators to activate an empty section at the South Brighton roundabout. It is designed to enable and enhance resilience and well-being in these communities. It is a place for eating, meeting, learning, holding markets and sharing food and produce. There has been a positive community response to Common Ground as a gathering space for the South Brighton and Southshore communities.

The Bridge Street Trust Hub is due to open later in 2021, there will be opportunities for Sustain South Brighton to run programmes and events from this space working in partnership. Further work needs to be done to bring the vision of Sustain South Brighton and the Bridge Street Hub working collaboratively in this community.

How Will Participants Be Better Off?

By Te Kupenga engaging with a student for a long period time, staff and family can see the changes in their child. When a student moves on they can be better prepared by enrolling them with a youth coach and finding a youth guarantee course. Agencies that were attached to the student slowly decrease. Students make better choices for themselves and stop getting into trouble or handle situations differently. Parents are happier that their child is not offending and not getting into trouble and there is less stress in the home environment.

Staff Assessment

The aim at Te Kupenga o Aranui (Te Kupenga) is to create an alternative education programme that integrates academic, vocational, and social and life skills education to students who are not coping in mainstream education. Te Kupenga offer an approach that serves the needs, goals and aspirations of each individual student and their family.

They work with youth aged between 13½ to 15 years who have been removed from mainstream education and referred to their Alternative Education programme because of truancy and/or behavioural problems. Examples of issues youth may have include mental health, learning difficulties or home and social environment issues.

Te Kupenga receive government funding for the educational component of their service which includes some hours of classroom involvement by a youth worker. For the hours outside of this they must find additional funding. The former Burwood/Pegasus Community Board has supported Te Kupenga since they began in 1999 with funding towards the Youth Development Worker.

The Youth Development Worker helps to bridge the gap between school, whānau, staff and social agencies attached to the youth and their mainstream school which they attended. Building a relationship with the youth involved in the programme and their families helps to breakdown any barriers that prevent the youth from learning and gaining education. By having a close relationship with all the above, there is better support and mentoring of youth.

Examples of the type of work the Youth Development Worker does includes:

- Contacting parent's everyday if their child does not show up for school.
- Sometimes picking up or dropping off a student in order for the student to engage at school.
- Working alongside the student to build a rapport and in order to get to know the student, how they behave and interact in the classroom setting.
- Organise home visits before the start of each term to set meetings for Individual Education Plans as well as finding out how they behaved during the holidays and to help prepare them for the start of the following term. A home visit is also organised during the term to see if there has been any changes and to have a general catch up with parents.
- Organise community agencies to visit students during school time e.g. Family Planning, Drug Arm etc. take youth to any appointments to deal with any health or wellbeing issues e.g. dentist, doctors, counselling, optometrist, Attend any relevant meetings, Family Group Conferences, court cases etc. for the student giving support to the student and family.
- If a student has been given reflection time because of their behaviour, setting up a time to meet the parent and student in order for the student to return.
- Organising and inviting parents to the celebration event each term (hangi) to break down barriers between staff, students and parents. Community agencies that have been involved with all the students during the term are also invited to the term event.
- Enabling recreational opportunities and mentoring.

Te Kupenga o Aranui operates during school hours but the Youth Development Worker works hours outside of these to fulfil the tasks of the job. There are an average of sixteen youth attending at any one time with around 32 - 36 in any one calendar year. Along with academic education they receive basic life skills, social and vocational education and experience. Te Kupenga are seeking funding towards the youth worker wages to cover those that are not funded by Ministry of Education funding.

The Pükeko Centre is a community sports and recreation hub in Parklands, Christchurch East. This project is requesting funding support to fund a qualified community sport and recreation Coordinator to deliver programmes to children/youth and older adults at the Pükeko Centre and in local schools. The coordinator is in regular contact with Parkview, Queenspark and Waitikiri Schools in the area to address their current needs and deliver services relevant to the school.

This year's programmes are designed for a range of age groups, from pre-schoolers to seniors. To ensure the programmes meet the needs of the community the coordinator consulted with the various user groups, including running a telephone survey to gauge the success of their current programmes. The Club have approximately 60 senior and 120 junior players involved in sport and physical activity with teams in all age groups and abilities from junior T ball through to senior teams. Children and youth play in age group teams - under 9 and under 7 (single gender and mixed tee ball), under 11 and under 13 (Little League), under 15, under 18 (Junior League) and under 23 (Rookie League).

The club provides opportunities for people, particularly children and youth from low income backgrounds, to participate in social or competitive softball. Club team numbers are increasing, particularly in the junior and youth teams.

The club actively supports participation with low membership fees, and fundraising to provide equipment that enables junior/youth teams to participate in softball. This year the Club are seeking funds for a variety of training and game equipment including balls, bats, protective gear and game day resources essential for facilitating participation.

The Clubs name. United reflects their united belief that fencing should be a sport for everyone no matter what their status, gender, background or circumstances and that all should have the opportunity to learn, enjoy the sport and reach their potential.

The Club hold training nights based out of Shirley Intermediate School which they hire as a regular user. They offer a relaxed friendly and safe atmosphere with training sessions encompassing a warm-up, foot work, a focus on move of the day, group work and individual sessions. The coaches concentrate on foil for beginners (one of three weapons used by fencers) and introduce epée and sabre to more experienced fencers.

United Fencing Club are regular competitors in the South Island Schools Competitions, Masters Games and more locally have provided an activity at Parklands at Play and other community events which have proved to be extremely popular with all ages.

The Club are seeking funding for operational costs which include wages for coaching staff, rental hire for the school hall for training and specific fencing equipment. Each member requires around \$400 worth of safety clothing and gear in order to train and tournament costs are around \$1,000 each. The Club have found that most parents are not able to afford this and so aim to subsidise the cost of protective gear and equipment so that participation continues to be accessible for members.

They would also like funding to support six of their coaches to attend a St John's First Aid Course.

Pleasant Point Yacht Club (PPYC) has provided, for 100 years, a place for the New Brighton/South New Brighton and residents of wider Christchurch to participate in yachting and water sports on the Avon-Heathcote Estuary Ihutai (the Estuary).

The club's current fleet of 14 learn to sail junior, intermediate and youth dinghies are outdated and do not match the expectations of new entrants to the sport. To ensure the maximum uptake of new sailors, the Club believes that a fleet of modern (low maintenance, high tech) sailing dinghies is necessary to maximise the success of the learn to sail training programme. The lifespan of this equipment is approximately 20 years.

The Club has attracted 26 new members over the 2020/2021 season. This is a significant increase in Club membership over previous seasons.

The Club have had over 34 people of all ages pass through the learn to sale programmes last season and expect this number to increase over coming seasons due to:

- PPYC's new and expanded facilities at South New Brighton Park
- Increased publicity from the Americas Cup and the upcoming sail GP event planned for Christchurch in 2022
- The implementation of the Yachting New Zealand Kōkōkaha Programme for Schools

The new school programme is called Kōkōkaha Powered by the Wind and will be available to schools and kura throughout New Zealand from term one 2021 as the 36th edition of the America's Cup unfolds.

The programme has been designed by Yachting New Zealand and is aimed at students in years 5-10 but can easily be adapted for older and younger children.

Their projected estimate of 800 learn to sail participants making use of the equipment was based on 40 learn to sail participants per year over the expected 20 year life of the equipment. In reality this estimate is conservative based on the expected interest from the Kōkōkaha programme.

Pleasant Point Yacht Club has fostered community participation through involvement in sailing across all age groups. It is a place that brings together older and younger members of the community and encourages families to be involved.

The Club have confirmed funding support from several gaming charities towards the Learn to sail and rescue boat replacement programme.

Lion Foundation has confirmed a grant of \$10,000 and Pub Charity has confirmed a grant of \$26,309 specifically for the rescue boat, trailer and motor.

A boulder was recently installed with a plaque providing information on the background - the artist, commissioned by South Brighton Residents' Association and the significance of the kuaka/godwit for the area. Illumination at night would enhance its presence in the area and popularity with local residents.

The South Brighton Residents' Association have done a thorough investigation with a variety of options to choose from. There is no doubt that lighting the sculptures would look aesthetically pleasing. The costs of the ongoing upkeep and maintenance of the lighting has not been factored into the costings of this project. Council staff have been consulted and agree that the ongoing costs with this project have not been anticipated nor been factored into any other budgets. For this reason the project has not been recommended for funding. Staff can work with the group if they chose to apply to other funding sources for this project in terms of the ongoing costs from a Council perspective.

- Clients obtain a budgeting (financial mentoring) appointment within a week of enquiry, except in unforeseen circumstances.
- Financial mentoring appointments are run by a trained staff member and will include services such as debt alleviation/consolidation, financial plans, assistance with financial communications and Kiwisaver withdrawal.
- Clients will gain practical knowledge and skills in life to build financial capability independently
- Clients enabled to gain control of their financial situation and move towards improved

How Will Participants Be Better Off?

Participants will be able to manage their finances independently and not rely on high interest loans, pawn shops or food banks to provide for themselves and their whanau.

As clients gain new skills and tools to manage their finances, this brings a huge release from mental and emotional stress and the resultant pressure placed on other members of the family,

By the end of their sessions with the Financial Mentor they will be able to set financial goals with the skills and practical plans to achieve them. Reducing the burden of debt and gaining financial independence can be life changing and enables social inclusion.

Staff Assessment

This application is being recommended as a priority four due to other sources of funding being more appropriate.

The Salvation Army provides services to more than 120,000 New Zealand families and individuals in desperate need each year. The organisation offers a multi-disciplinary approach, working to address client's emergency needs as well as underlying issues. Social needs assessments are undertaken by trained professionals, and clients are then supported with a range of services and advocacy. These include Community Ministry services, such as budgeting advice, short-term assistance with food, clothing and furniture, community finance loans and life skills and parenting programmes, as well as wider Salvation Army services, such as support with alcohol and drug addiction, education and employment.

The Linwood Corps Community Ministries reports that a desperate lack of money is often the main reason that people come to its offices for support. In response to this need, the Budgeting Advice Programme provides free budgeting advice, mentoring and advocacy to clients. Qualified Financial Mentors work alongside and mentor clients to help them stay out of debt, liaise with debtors on their behalf and connect them to other Salvation Army services. This project aims to provide clients with the tools to take control of their finances, increase their standard of their living and help bring balance to their lives. Financial Mentors provide services to approximately 500 clients per year. This project expects to have a sustained increase in demand over the next year due to COVID-19 and the increased level of need within the community. It is crucial during this time of financial uncertainty that people are properly educated and supported with mentoring and practical budgeting assistance.

The Dallington Residents' Association meet monthly in the Trade-Aid building and run three annual events (Skip Day, Clean Up Day, Carols in the Park) and facilitate two community garden projects (Glenarm Gardens, Dallington Organic Garden and Allotments). Their AGM is also treated as an event with speakers and refreshments providing another opportunity to connect. They currently also offer support and deliver their newsletter to residents in the Horseshoe Lake and Golflinks areas who do not have active residents associations of their own.

Skip Day is a long term annual event the group run. It is held in September each year as a part of the Keep New Zealand Beautiful campaign. The Dallington Residents Association hire two skips and encourage residents to fill it with any hard waste they have. This is combined with a sausage sizzle and is an opportunity for locals to meet. It is a well patronized community event with the skips and sometimes additional trailers filled to capacity indicating the need in the community for the project.

Carols in the Park is the other regular event the group have. It is held on the first Friday of December at Burwood Park. There is usually a bouncy castle, face painting, lolly scramble, Santa, a brass band, and carols sung by locals together.

The funding will also cover the regular ongoing costs of web hosting and the annual costs of mowing the Glenarm Gardens.

The New Brighton Friendship Club is affiliated to Friendship New Zealand Incorporated. The club is a welcoming social organisation for people who are retired, semi-retired or soon-to-retire. It offers social interaction and activities, expanding members' interests, keeping their minds active and supporting the fellowship of new friends.

The group consists of mainly older women who meet monthly on the second Monday of each month for friendship and to hear interesting speakers. On the third or fourth Monday of each month the group try to provide a trip or outing. This provides members with the opportunity to visit places they would not normally go to and enjoy fellowship with others away from the structure of a formal meeting.

Trips in Christchurch are done by car-pooling or by using Gold Card Metro Bus services. For trips that go further afield the hire of a coach and driver is required. These trips include lunch and entry fees to the venue being visited.

The group has around 84 members and the annual membership fee is \$30. The award of a grant would go towards the cost of hiring a coach. This then helps to reduce the amount members are required to pay for the trips and they become more financially accessible so all can participate and enjoy the day trip.

The three trips outside of Christchurch the group are partaking in for the funding year are; a three day trip to Tekapo/Mt Cook and Oamaru, a trip to Geraldine and a trip to Violinos Musical Garden, Winchmore. The staff recommendation is for a contribution towards the costs of the trip to the Violinos Musical Garden as this trip is likely to have the most participants taking part from the group due to its location being closest to Christchurch.

The New Brighton Menz Shed offers a community space for men and women to come together. Share their practical skills, enjoy company and work on individual projects, or group projects for the shed or the community. Originally formed in 2009, it did not become active until suitable premises where found in 2013, when the shed was set up in the double garage at St Faiths Church.

In November 2019 the group moved to larger premises at St Andrews Church tripling the space available for projects. Equipment and machinery is now available for woodwork and metalwork projects. The Club plan to apply to other funders during the year for assistance with Coaching Costs and Court Hire.

The New Brighton Netball Club Incorporated continues to prosper. The Club currently have 150 registered players which is made up of four adult teams (three competitive and one social) and the balance which are juniors who will make up 14 or 15 teams. Interestingly about 40% of the players are new to the club this year and they have had a large influx of new women join the club.

There is an ongoing need to replace equipment to enable players to train and compete. Raising funds for the cost of equipment can help to keep subscriptions low, so that as many people who want to, can participate in the game of netball.

The New Brighton Netball Club provides training venues, coaches, uniforms and equipment for the benefit of Club members. They are committed to ensuring that the experience of playing netball is enjoyable, supports all users and fosters the love of the game to ensure that netball across the country prospers. As a founding member of ECSR they are working collaboratively to bring quality netball experiences and facilities to the local community and offer netball to players of all abilities from a keen beginner to experienced players. The junior section is very strong and the Club are committed to fostering the development of netball at grassroots.

All teams are provided with coaches many of whom perform their roles in a voluntary capacity. The Club enable coaches to receive professional development to support them and players so the best possible outcomes can be achieved for all individuals and teams, fostering the love of the game. This year the Club are aiming to contract senior A & B team coaches and there will be 14 volunteer coaches. The Club aim to reimburse volunteer coaches the amount of \$80 each in the form of a sub reduction as without these player coaches who step up to coach the junior teams' participation in netball for those in the area would be limited. The Club organise and pay for volunteer coaches to attend coaching courses.

The Club purchase uniforms and equipment for players via grant funding to enable participation and make netball fun. The Club are conscious of the financial pressures on families and youth so each year they aim to secure funding to enable the Club to offer players subsidised fees.

The North Beach Residents' Association (NBRA) is an active community group which holds well-attended meetings every two months. At these meetings they often have a guest speaker, and then discuss local issues and solutions (for example, any maintenance issues, ideas for improving the local natural and built environment (such as planting days, public art murals), community get-togethers, as well as engaging in Council consultations.

For the 2022 AGM the North Beach Residents' Association would like to also hold a small community event (for example, coincide with Matariki celebrations) and share kai, have children's activities, and entertainment. As part of this application they are seeking funding for operational costs for these meetings, and a community event tied into the AGM.

Regular, well-attended meetings and a popular AGM will increase community pride and strengthen relationships, which in turn leads to safer and more connected communities that have a strong sense of belonging. This also encourages increased participation in community life. The community will also be better off from having a wider range of people being drawn to these meetings, bringing with them new experiences, ideas and skill sets.

Having an operational budget for regular NBRA meetings will allow them to advertise more widely (through social media advertising, fliers etc.), which will increase participation in and awareness of the association and the work it does in the community. Having a small community event tied into the AGM in a relaxed setting will also draw in a wider group of people that may not usually be involved in civic engagement. Community events also strengthen relationships and overall safety.

Strong communities give people a sense of belonging and encourage them to take part in society.

This is the first funding application for operational costs as previously the Association has covered many of these costs from their funds on hand and through other fundraising activities.

The Association has a history of strong community engagement including planting projects at North Beach and park beautification projects such as the mural on the old toilet block at Thomson Park.

The programme runs from September until March and includes approximately 70 children. The aim of this programme is to provide a quality coaching programme to the junior members aged eight to 18 years at an affordable rate and to provide a Kiwi Tennis programme for youngsters aged five to eight to develop an interest in tennis.

The Club employs a Junior Manager five hours (on average) per week during the season. They also employ a Junior Coaching Assistant for four hours per week during the season. The junior members receive a full coaching programme including the opportunity to play Canterbury Tennis Interclub (through their relationship with Burwood Park Tennis Club). There are two teams of 4-5 juniors who play interclub through the various age groups.

The Club is committed to its volunteers and recognizes the huge effort required to maintain a junior programme with many of its senior members involved in running the Club. The estimated voluntary hours for this programme are 300.

The Club is providing a sporting service to the children in the north/east of Christchurch at a very affordable rate. This programme is provided to all junior members, the current junior membership rates are \$65 for 12 year olds and over and \$55 for 11 year olds and under.

The Club collaborate with the Burwood and South Brighton Tennis Clubs regarding children wanting to play interclub tennis.

Children will benefit from a structured coaching programme and learn how to play the game of tennis, to improve their game, be encouraged to progress and play competitively if they wish and to mix with other children, get exercise and learn a sport they can play in years to come.

The Club encourage members of the local community to come along and see what the club has to offer and to give tennis a go via a leaflet drop advertising the new tennis season, advertise through local newsletters and schools. The Club encourage parents bringing their children along to help out with the juniors where possible and encourage them to try tennis themselves.

North Wai Boardriders was established in 1965 to provide opportunities for people to surf and be a part of a club environment. The North Wai Boardriders Clubrooms are located on the beachside ground floor of the North New Brighton Memorial Hall on Marine Parade which is a Council lease. The club season runs from October to March. The current membership numbers for the Club are strong.

The surf and skate holiday programme has been operating for approximately ten years. The programme alternates between surfing/beach education and skating at Thomson Park. The purpose of the programme is to provide the participants with challenges to develop their surf and skate skills, as well as increasing their knowledge about the ocean, the foreshore and water safety.

60% of the participants are from within the club and the rest are from the wider New Brighton community. Fees for this programme are \$25 per child per day. This programme expenditure includes the cost for use of the Club equipment - wetsuits and surfboards and skateboards or children can bring their own if they have it. The biggest cost for the programme is the wages for surf instructors as the programme has an 'in the water' staff ratio of 1:6.

This programme is not approved by the Ministry of Social Development so parents cannot seek childcare subsidies.

The programme is promoted through the local schools and on the Club Facebook page and normally books out quickly with a waiting list.

The Club have a very strong family culture with a junior membership and development pathway for juniors who are competitive.

Staff Assessment

The Parklands Baptist Church have been part of the community discussion in the Parklands/Queenspark area about young people not having enough to do in the community. They feel this project may help to address some of the concerns raised about young people not having activities to engage with in the community leading to antisocial behavior. The Church have observed the positive uptake of families using the Queenspark disc golf course located in Queenspark Reserve, opposite the Church. The disc golf course is popular because it appeals to individuals, families and all ages are able to participate. Given this success the Church looked into other similar activities which provide easy access to participants and could be used by a variety of ages in the community.

The Church have tested the idea with their youth and intermediates group, which are both internal groups, comprising of two-thirds of children who do not attend church. They have also raised the idea at a community meeting and received positive feedback.

The Church already have a basketball hoop in their carpark which is extremely popular. It does get damaged/vandalized and needs to be repaired quite regularly. The basketball hoop is at the far end of the car park.

The church are proposing the table tennis table is located at the front of the church building. This placement would serve multiple purposes.

- 1) Provide another community 'bumping' space place for people to meet and connect. It is an open and welcoming space and clearly visible from the street.
- 2) Provide a low maintenance family friendly activity.
- 3) There is a hairdressers setting up in the building so it could provide fun while others are getting their hair cut
- 4) It would also be likely to protect the front of the building from vehicles.

The Church also plan to include putting some outdoor chairs is this space to provide more bumping opportunities for the community.

The Church would look to provide some bats and balls at certain times when the church is open. They believe it will get good use from the youth groups on Tuesday and Friday evenings.

Parklands Christchurch United Softball Club Incorporated (PCUSC) is an eastern suburb, family based softball club which delivers softball from teeball to premier softball for men and women. The Club has premier men's and women's teams who have a proud history of accomplishment at local and national level. T-ball teams practice at Broadpark every week and this is a growing area of the Club.

The Club has nine senior teams and 28 junior teams (approximately 238 junior members) providing the opportunity for all ages to participate in softball and benefit socially, mentally and physically. The Club is affiliated to Canterbury Softball Association and working collaboratively with Eastern Community Sport and Recreation as a founding club.

Cost is often a barrier to participation and fundraising efforts are undertaken to minimise and/or remove this barrier as the club would not like to raise subscriptions or insist that families provide their own equipment and uniforms.

They recognise that cost can be a barrier to participation for many and are mindful that many families in Christchurch, and in particular Eastern Christchurch, continue to struggle financially. The Pegasus Toy Library Incorporated serves the community of north-east Christchurch. It has a steady active membership of around 70 families, generating a positive influence on local whānau. It is open Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday. It provides a large selection of toys which families can loan at an affordable price for a period of two weeks. This gives parents an opportunity to provide a large range of stimulating, fun and educational toys for their children to play with at home at a lesser cost to themselves. It is also a place where parents new to the area can meet other families and form friendships.

The toy library employ a paid librarian to oversee the day to day running of the library. This ensures that new and existing members have a contact person who knows how the library works, what toys are suitable and available and can assist when needed. They also provide a familiar face to those using the service and ensure continuity and delivery of service to the local community. The librarian is paid for the time when the library is open plus an additional two hours per week to make sure the library and its toys are in good order and additional duties such as banking are done.

Many volunteer hours are put in to the toy library by committee and duty members. It could not however function effectively without the paid Librarian role.

The South New Brighton Tennis Club Incorporated is seeking assistance to fund its Junior Tennis coaching programme equipment costs.

The Club is a member club of Eastern Community Sport and Recreation (ECSR) and will utilise the multi-purpose canopy courts at Rāwhiti Domain for 18 weeks of the year for Junior Interclub and year-round for coaching purposes. For the 2020/21 tennis season they had a total of 155 players - 97 juniors: and 58 seniors, they anticipate 166 members for the 2021/22 tennis season.

The Club is committed to providing children and youth with every opportunity to participate in tennis and do as much as they can to retain current members and encourage others to take up the sport, benefiting the development of tennis in Canterbury. It is the Club's intention to increase the number of tennis players in Canterbury using the skill sets within the club to hone and develop skills of young players. The junior members will participate in the national Tennis NZ Hotshots and the Club will employ a coach to run the programme and a Hotshots Club Champs to foster competitiveness as well as inclusion. This is pathway to Junior Interclub competitions. Via the programme the Club receive a small number of racquets each year to loan out to children to use to participate in the sport. Sufficient numbers of balls will also support delivery of this programme.

The Club keep subs low to encourage as many families as possible and continue to source funding to ease the financial burden on the junior section of the club and ensure that they are encouraged to start playing tennis and once actively involved are able to afford to continue to play. This way participation levels do not drop due to unaffordability.

The Coach is a semi professional tennis coach who provides regular weekly team coaching to the Junior interclub teams and Saturday morning nippers up to 10 hours per week during the season.

The Club has a strong working relationship with the South New Brighton Primary School, they have free access to the Club facilities for their tennis elective programme. Many of the juniors attend the school and the coach runs a pre-season coaching programme there and in other schools in the area on behalf of Canterbury Tennis. Chisnallwood Intermediate also uses the Club facilities as part of their tennis program.

Southshore Residents' Association area encompasses 600 homes. They are an organised residents association with strong engagement with their community through regular events, meetings and newsletters and other communication.

Throughout the year they organise a range of activities for their community. Usually there is one activity each month which provides an opportunity for residents to come together and connect with their neighbours. These events include the annual picnic, an Easter Egg Hunt, a Matariki celebration, Soup Kitchens and Halloween. There are regular planting days to beautify the suburb which residents can join in. Farewell to the Godwits is organised by the group which is a popular event that attracts people to the estuary from across the city.

They undertake dealings with the Council and other applicable government agencies in relation to the environment and any emergency plans and resilience initiatives required on behalf of their community for example the project to purchase an AED for the community. They work to promote and protect the community and the Southshore natural and urban environments.

Following the earthquakes the group purchased items and equipment items that would enable them to hold community events. Events that would help engage residents and strengthen the community's well-being and security. The equipment is available for use by residents for their personal events and by other community groups in the area. The Bridge South Brighton Trust, Common Ground, Sustain South Brighton and the Avon Heathcote Estuary Ihutai Trust, have all utilised the equipment.

For the 2021/22 Strengthening Communities funding period the Association is seeking support for two projects:

1. St Johns first aid training for members of the Association and community, currently only one member of the Association is first aid qualified. The Association own and maintain the AED at the South Brighton Motor Camp ground.

They want to ensure they are prepared to act swiftly if there is a first aid need at one of their events. If they have additional spaces in their private course they would like to open these other to other local groups to use.

2. PA equipment is requested to use at each community event approximately 5 per year. Currently the Association hire a PA system for their larger events. Community events make a big contribution to the wellbeing of the community area and with the coastal hazards conversation on the horizon the Association believe there will be a greater need for community meetings and engagement.

The PA system would be stored at an association member's home or in their locked container at the end of Rocking Horse Road, where they have other events equipment. They already have a booking system in place.

This application is recommended as a Priority Four as the funding sought is for a cost that funding has already been provided for by the Ministry of Education.

The playcentre is applying for funding for a coordinators wages for one term. The Ministry of Education (MOE) has set a requirement that all playcentres in New Zealand employ a qualified coordinator. MOE provides funding for this.

However the playcentre is required to pay half of this to their parent body, Playcentres Aotearoa (PA) under a levy they charge to all playcentres receiving this funding.

Playcentre is a whānau/family run Early Childhood service licensed by MOE. They provide care to children aged up to six years of age. Playcentre believes that parents are the first teachers of their children and sessions reflect parents learning alongside their children.

Burwood Playcentre is one of ten other Christchurch playcentres that are applying for wage assistance. Additionally Playcentre Aotearoa has submitted an application for the 2021-22 Strengthening Communities Fund for funding to support the 23 Canterbury playcentres. This application is recommended as a Priority Four due to the South Brighton Community Toy Library Incorporated having sufficient funds on hand which would enable them to cover the wage cost for the paid toy librarian. The South Brighton Community Toy Library had been considering a change in location and had saved funds toward this potential move. The change in location is no longer occurring and as such the group have sufficient funds on hand which would enable them to cover the cost of wages for the paid toy librarian.

The South Brighton Community Toy Library has been based at St Luke's church hall since 2014. It is open on alternate Saturdays.

The toy library provides an opportunity for local parents and children to connect and get to know one another. A wide range of fun, educational and outdoor toys are available for hire. The annual membership fee is \$50 a year and the average hire charge is \$2 per item.

A paid toy librarian position enables the library to function effectively and provide a valuable service to the community. The librarian oversees the day to day running of the library. This includes the research and purchase of new toys, maintaining the toys, promoting the toy library and providing updates via social media, compiling a toy library photo catalogue and interacting with the Toy Library Federation NZ and keep up to date on best practice and new ideas.

It has become increasingly difficult to recruit volunteers to cover this position due to the time commitment involved. Having a paid librarian position ensures the fortnightly sessions continue to be available for the community. The toy librarian is paid for three hours work per session. STRENGTHENING COMMUNITIES FUND CRITERIA

Purpose

The purpose of this fund is to support community focused organisations whose projects contribute to the strengthening of community wellbeing in the Christchurch City area.

Successful organisations will be those who can demonstrate that they are sustainable, strategic, community focused groups who have a significant presence within their community of benefit. Successful projects will also clearly demonstrate their contribution to the Council funding outcomes and priorities.

Organisations must be able to demonstrate their ability to contribute towards their project(s) and not rely on Council funding as their sole source of funding.

Eligibility

Applications are invited from eligible not-for-profit groups whose activities provide opportunities in the areas of community, social, recreation, sports, arts, environment or heritage to the wider community or to specifically defined communities of interest.

The following criteria must be met by all applicants:

- A community based not-for-profit community, recreation, sporting, arts, social service, environment or heritage organisation.
- All groups applying for more than \$2,000 must be incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 or the Charitable Trusts Act 1957 or be a legal entity that is registered for charitable purposes.
- > Be based in the Christchurch City Council area with funded programmes or services being provided primarily for Christchurch City Council residents.
- Must have provided accountability reports for all previous Council funding and have no unresolved or outstanding accountability issues including outstanding debt to Council.
- > Must have had the funding application approved at a properly convened committee meeting and in writing. Must provide evidence of the need for the project.
- > Have appropriate financial management, accounting, monitoring and reporting practices.
- ➤ Have sound governance and appropriate operational capability and capacity to deliver to the level as agreed.
- > Be able to commit to collaboration and partnering, where appropriate.
- > Groups receiving Council funding at a metropolitan level may only apply for local funding if the project is specifically local and no portion of it has been funded at the metropolitan level.

Note: Recreation and sporting clubs/organisations do not have to be affiliated to a national sporting organisation to be eligible to apply however in alignment with the Physical Recreation and Sport Strategy we would encourage you to affiliate.

What this fund covers
