4. Public Forum Te Huinga Whānui

4.1 Silver Birch Tree - Lynley Gacsal

This scheduled presentation did not take place.

4.2 Upgrade of the soccer goal in Gainsborough Reserve,

Vicki Rowe, resident and local schoolchildren Sheldon Rowe, Taylor Curry and Ria Tara spoke regarding soccer goalposts at Gainsborough Reserve.

Presenters spoke about wanting an upgrade of the soccer goal currently in Gainsborough Reserve, particularly by adding a net to the goal. This is considered to be a safety issue as balls kicked into the goal end up on the road.

After questions from members, the Chairperson thanked Mrs Rowe, Sheldon, Taylor and Ria for their presentation.

4.3 Reduction of the speed limit in Addington.

Graeme Robinson and Gareth Wright representing the Addington Neighbourhood Association spoke regarding a reduction of the speed limit in Addington. The presenters noted that within the wider Addington area there are four different speed limits ranging from 30 kilometres to hour, through to 60 kilometres per hour.

The presenters tabled a document which included two maps, one indicating the current speed limits and the other the Association's proposed speed limits. They requested a consistent 30 kilometre per hour speed limit be introduced throughout Addington.

- A member noted the current flooding event and indicated interest in monitoring the extent of the flooding in the days to come.
- Port Hills Cashmere Working Group and Ōpāwaho Heathcote River Network will be conducting a sediment control seminar looking at community perspectives.

- A member noted extensive waste sorting programmes taking place in the United Kingdom which facilitate greater levels of recycling.
- A member attended the Addington Neighbourhood Association meeting. Issues raised were the availability of the "No Fixed Abode" resource and vaping issues. Staff noted that a briefing to the Board on vaping is being organised.
- A member spoke regarding the role of Canterbury Neighbourhood Support. Members indicated a desire to hear from the organisation to provide the Board with an update on its current work.
- A member noted that Hoon Hay Community Association has held a recent food bank drive and 'love grace handbag' drive. The group will next meet on Tuesday 19 July between 7pm to 8pm.
- A member noted that the Council has agreed to the Hearing Panel's recommendation regarding peak hour bus priority measures on Lincoln Road from Whiteleigh Street to Curletts Road.
- A member noted the outcome of a poll on social media which indicated 95 percent support for the placement of a basketball court in Gainsborough Reserve. The member noted that there has been no formal approach to the Board for this.
- A member has been contacted by a resident about a trip hazard on Barrington Street that has arisen through the placement of plates by developers.

3. Key Points Ngā Take Matua

Strategic Alignment Te Rautaki Tiaroaro

- 3.1 As the name of the fund implies, the projects and organisations recommended for funding in this report align to the Council's commitment to achieving strong communities. In establishing the recommendations we were guided by the Strategic Framework, in particular the Strengthening Communities Strategy and its principles such as capacity building, diversity, participation and partnership.

Decision Making Authority Te Mana Whakatau

- 3.2 Approve the allocation of the local Strengthening Communities Fund for each Community Board area.
- 3.3 Allocations must be consistent with any policies, standards or criteria adopted by the Council.

Assessment of Significance and Engagement Te Aromatawai Whakahirahira

- 3.4 The decisions in this report are of low significance in relation to the Christchurch City Council's Significance and Engagement Policy.
- 3.5 The level of significance was determined by the number of people affected and/or with an interest.
- 3.6 Due to the assessment of low significance, no further community engagement and consultation is required.

Discussion Kōrerorero

- 3.7 The 2022-23 Strengthening Communities Fund opened on 21 March 2022 and closed on 26 April 2022.
- 3.8 A total of 13 eligible applications were received, requesting a total of \$169,706.
- 3.9 The Waihoru Spreydon-Cashmere Community Board has a total funding pool of \$329,471.
- 3.10 Staff have recommended a total of \$307,350 for the 2022-23 Strengthening Communities Fund (this includes \$238,550 of pre-committed multi-year funding), which would result in \$22,121 remaining for the Waihoru Spreydon-Cashmere Discretionary Response Fund 2022-23 (plus any carry-forward from the 2021-22 year which is currently being finalised).
- 3.11 In the 2020-21 funding round, the Board approved multi-year funding to eight projects. The following projects are in the final year of their multi-year funding agreement.
 - Social Services Council of the Diocese of Christchurch - \$61,000
 - Project Esther Trust - \$24,000
 - Rowley Resource Centre - \$37,000
 - Cross over Trust - \$62,000
 - Spreydon Youth Community Trust - \$29,000
 - SHARP Trust - \$5,000
 - Christchurch South Toy Library - \$800
 - Whareora House - \$250

3.12 In the 2021-22 funding round, the Board approved multi-year funding to one project. The following project is in the final year of their multi-year agreement.

- Christchurch South Community Gardens Trust - \$19,500.

3.13 Staff are not recommending any projects for multi-year funding this year due to the elections and ward boundary changes as a result of the Representation Review.

Staff have assessed all applications received and made recommendations. Attached is a decision matrix which includes organisational details, project details, financial information, a staff assessment and a priority ranking (refer **Attachment A**).

3.14 Strengthening Communities Fund Criteria, Priorities and Outcomes are also attached (refer **Attachment B**).

3.15 A workshop was held with the Community Board on 11 July 2022 which provided an opportunity for Board members to ask questions and seek clarification on any of the projects or staff recommendations.

3.16 Community Boards have delegated authority from the Council to make final decisions on the Strengthening Communities Funding for their respective Board area. The Board's decisions will be actioned immediately following the decision meeting. All groups will then be informed of the decisions and funding agreements will be negotiated where relevant. All funding approved is for the period of 1 September to 30 August each year.

3.17 Grants will be paid out in September 2022 following the receipt of a signed funding agreement.

3.18 All successful applicants are required to complete an accountability form at the end of the funded period. A summary of this information will be provided to the Community Board.

Staff Assessment

The OHRN was incorporated in 2017, formalising a network created to enable cohesion between stakeholders working to care for, learn about, and enjoy the Ōpāwaho Heathcote River. As well as local volunteer groups, stakeholders include the Christchurch West Melton Water Zone Committee, Government departments, and local authorities. Maintaining a respectful and productive relationship with Ngai Tahu remains a high priority.

The OHRN currently supports more than 20 riverside groups, maintains an informative website that encourages new members, and contributes direct delivery support to now well established collaborative events such as the Mother of All Clean Ups, Matariki celebrations, and World Rivers Day. After developing a ten year strategic plan to guide and monitor achievements, the group is now ready to implement the plan and its ongoing evaluation. Several research projects underway are funded from other sources, but will contribute to the plan and the information base of the network.

While the binding focus for the network is the ecological health of the river and its immediate surrounds, the function of assembling and supporting community volunteers who enjoy working with others and connect socially means the network contributes significantly to community building and neighbourhood well-being. Working with these local groups means that the OHRN can act as a regular channel for the voice of local residents when meeting with and advocating to wider stakeholder groups, and decision-makers.

The organisation has built and demonstrated capability to undertake research, monitoring and pilot projects with authority organisations and funders of research and specialised monitoring projects. This application is to secure core operational funds that enable ongoing communications and participation as a network of local community groups. The committee meets monthly on a voluntary basis and is supported by one part time paid position for detailed communications and administration tasks. Some hours are also contracted on a casual basis for expertise in areas such as research mapping, narrative development, and river science of interest to the whole network. A key communication and recruitment tool is the OHRN website which is kept up to date with information, plan progress, and participation opportunities.

Recommendation rationale:

- The recommendation is made because the project achieves significant Strengthening Communities Fund participation outcomes alongside otherwise funded environmental outcomes.
- The recommendation of \$12,000 is to support the unfunded operational effort required to achieve cohesion and collaboration across diverse stakeholders and more than 20 riverside community volunteer projects.

Staff Assessment

All programmes are values based and work is primarily with the families in Hoon Hay. Programmes are held at Canterbury Kids Coach office or on board the bus in Rowley. Rowley has a high number of people who are new migrants and also many families with financial challenges.

The Canterbury Kids Coach is a free after school programme delivered in the Rowley area of Hoon Hay on a Wednesday and Friday 3pm to 5pm, from a small bus. Each programme runs for 18 weeks and focuses on values for life. The staffed bus parks up in a local street and children can come on to the bus and join the programme. It offers local children a more casual approach than other mainstream after school programmes. From time to time the bus changes street location. When this is done all families in the new streets are visited, so the project can be explained, participation encouraged and support offered to families as appropriate. Each school holidays the group visit families in the streets close to where the bus is operating.

The pre-school programmes operate from the office base four days a week and include Just Music. There is an online programme using zoom, this has limited impact as most parents do not want their children using up valuable data on zoom to do the programmes. Every six weeks a community newsletter is delivered which helps maintain contact with families.

The project collaborates and links with other local organisations and staff are assisted by local volunteers. Due to covid the group have lost several volunteers and attendance numbers on the bus have decreased. Many families not wanting to be in a restricted space which could increase the risk of getting covid. The project brings families together helping them feel welcomed and value and provides a safe place for children to be after school.

Recommendation rationale:

- The project helps achieve the objectives of the Te Haumako Te Whitingia Strengthening Communities Together Strategy, by contributing to the pillars of People and Place.
- The \$15,000 recognises the street approach unique to the project and that a number of other funding sources are not available to the group.

Rangatahi will benefit from upskilling (first aid), a safe and secure environment (doors and locks) and enhanced learning facilities (projector & screen) for gaining life skills. This will also benefit volunteer leaders through upskilling, safety and access to improved equipment for teaching and group discussion. Further, the maintenance and upgrading of the Hall will benefit all users of the hall.

Staff Assessment

Established in the 1950's, the St Martins Scouts Group relocated to their currently facility on Centaurus Road in 1962. The group sits under the national scouts banner with the aim to 'encourage the development of young people to achieve their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potential, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of the local, national and international communities.
The group delivers youth programmes from ages 5 through to 15. There is a strong focus on leadership development, outdoor skills and camping, first aiding but also photography and electronics. As tamariki/rangatahi progress through the group they are provided opportunity to become leaders, and are able to support the younger groups coming through. The club delivers these programmes to over 120 tamariki/rangatahi in the Spreydon-Cashmere wards. Membership is \$110 a term (less if the term is not 10 weeks). Parents who volunteer for the club and members who are leaders are also offered a discount on memberships, which makes it affordable but also creates an incentive for volunteering within the group.
The hall is used by a variety of community groups with environmental, recreation and youth development interest (Including Cashmere High School, Steiner School, Opawaho River Network, Gecko, Flourish Kia Puawai, Adventure Specialist Trust and other scouts groups). It is a cost-effective space that provides access to not only the hall, but a climbing wall, kayaks and the Opawaho River.
The club is seeking funding towards First Aid Training, Hall Maintenance and a Projector and Screen. First Aid training is essential for the safety of the club and its members, and the training is also utilized for 14-18 year old rangatahi, to not only support the safety of the club but also support personal development. In regards to Hall Maintenance, the club is seeking to upgrade the doors and locks. The hall has wide community use, and regular maintenance is needed to ensure it meets the standards of wider use. Finally, the club is seeking funds towards a projector and screen which will support the delivery of the programmes delivered by scouts, but also make the facility better equipped for current and potential community users.

Staff Assessment

Sydenham Junior Cricket Club was established in 2000. The club is based at Sydenham Park Complex and has 37 teams which equate to around 380 members ranging from four years old to fifteen years old.

The Club is seeking funding to contribute to wages for their administration and coaching staff to continue the work in the community and in particular to targeted populations.

The director of coaching works approximately 30 hours per week on average across the year. This person is responsible for all coach and player development. Each team has an individual coach assigned to them for the entire season. This creates continuity for the children as well as quality coaches, as each of the coaches must be accredited along with a first-aid certificate and Police vetting.

The General Manager does approximately 25 hours per week on average across the year and is vital for the club's day to day operations. This person is responsible for the management of staff, health, and safety, fundraising, sponsorship, general administration, communications, promotion as well as gear, grounds, and facilities.

The coaching director and general Manager roles drives the programmes that the club run. In particular the club has a focus on increasing female participation, through hosting girls only events and trainings. The club also works alongside social agencies to provide participation opportunities for vulnerable children. The club has a strong focus on inclusiveness and diversity, and aims to continue to remove barriers to participation.

Recommendation rationale::

Staff Assessment

The Graeme Dingle Foundation Canterbury have been delivering the Kiwi Can programme at Te Kura Taumatua Addington School for 3 years. The school currently has 260 children, from a diverse range of ethnicities. The programme is delivered one day a week and during that day to every class in the school. The school set goals in their strategic plan that form part of the local school curriculum and they have a service agreement with GDFC to deliver what is needed in the school in terms of a life skills and values programme.

Kiwi Can is based on the theory that by supporting the individual, building their self-efficacy and strengthening their basic values, a real change can be made in downstream behaviour patterns such as educational failure, anti-social behaviour, bullying and crime. It is a preventative programme that aims to equip primary school children with skills to build resilience and self-belief, helping them to overcome barriers now and in the future.

The leaders work with the school on an engagement plan that includes a mix of structured playground activities, tamariki initiated activities and greet and send off at the school gate. The leaders are at the school one day a week, for 8 hour, 6.5 of these are school curriculum hours, 1.5 are not. The time outside of the structured class curriculum allows additional behaviour modelling and coaching across age groups and in a more conducive environment. When the leaders are in the playground they can pick up and change situations in an informal setting.

Recommendation rationale:

- The group runs programmes in schools across Canterbury. It has significant grant funding and sponsorship from many other sources. The programme has been running in Addington School for 3 years without funding from community board.
- Only 2.5 hours of the day the leaders are at the school are outside of the school curriculum. Other funding is considered more appropriate.
